





What the radio fans really are interested in, is the mysterious wireless itself, rather than what they

The wireless has a basic and universal appeal cause it is closely allied with the supernatural,

The history of wireless began 70 or 80 years ago with the experiments in electro-magnetic induction by Faraday, Englishman, by trade a book-

Heinrich Herts, German professor, came along later, and in 1886 made amazing discoveries about an electric spark bridging a gap or break in a wire. the problem of making the electric wave jump thousands of miles instead of an inch or so.

People discussed the sanity of Sir William Crookes when, in 1892, he predicted the coming of actual communication by wireless.

In 1901 Marconi, brilliant young Italian, sent the first wireless messages across the Atlantic-the letter "S." in code.

Many readers will recall the wireless telegraph erase that followed among boys-also their antiquated equipment, including the coherer and decoherer, which few youthful radio fans of 1922 ever heard of. Radio equipment now in use will be just

as obsolete, 21 years hence. Today nearly every lad knows the wireless secrets that Faraday groped for, 70 or 80 years ago. But radio itself is just as mysterious and uncanny as it was in Faraday's time.

The more we learn about nature's mysteries, the less we know. Education is merely the process of extending our horizon—increasing our conception of

the infinite mysteries that surround us. The system is one of mysteries within mysteries -like the Japanese boxes within boxes.

It is admitted even by his friends that he is broken in health but their claim that his mind functions with its old brilliance and wisdom can hardly be disputed when his record on public issues even within the last year is reviewed. The sentiment against the discharge of a public servant with a record like Culbertson's because of physical disability is very strong and it now seems certain that the senior Texas senator will go into the second primary with a long lead. It seems almost as certain that his opponent in the second primary will be Clarence Ousley.

Ever since he entered the campaign Mr. Ousley has been discussing public issues with courage, understanding and dignity, and his views have shown a breadth and statesmanship and have been expressed with a clarity and vigor that have arrested the attention of thoughtful men in every part of the state. Mr. Ousley has not resorted to the small tricks of the politician or to demagoguery and his candidacy, which for a long time seemed to hang and fail to gather momentum, now appears to be gathering strength, and as the day of the primary approaches it is expected to become more apparent that the contest will be between Senator Culbertson and Mr. Ousley.

James E. Ferguson says that when he goes to the United States senate he will have a bill passed making it a penitentiary offense to charge more than six per cent for money. Those who want lower interest rates should take notice that this law won't be passed and made effective until Mr. Ferguson goes to the senate.
