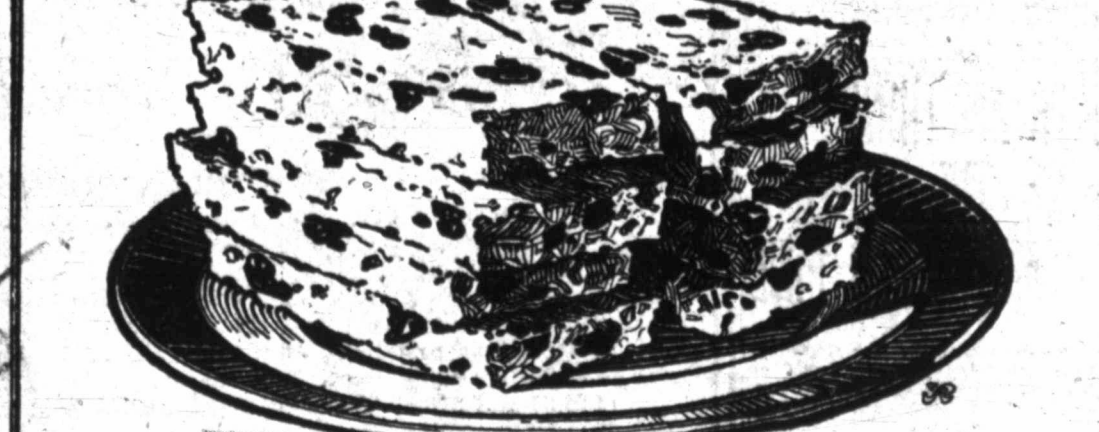

Equalization Board May Be Asked to Convene to Straighten Out Problem.

The equalization board may be compelled to go over the majority of its work again, as is indicated in a statement made Friday morning by Commissioner J. P. Jackson...

## NEGRO JUVENILE BENEFITS LITTLE BY CERTIFICATE

DR. W. P. LOWREY TESTIFIES THAT BOY WAS NOT TOO ILL TO COME.

### M. T. WILLIAMS, 13, TRIED BEFORE JURY

Negro Doctor Who Gave Certificate Ordered to Appear Before Judge Jones.

M. T. Williams, negro juvenile, aged 13 years, tried but little by presenting a certificate stating that he was ill and could not be in court Friday morning. Dr. W. P. Lowrey, city health officer, was sent to the Williams home and reported to the court that he found the boy well enough to attend court.

Officers were sent and the boy was brought into the court room and the trial began. The boy is being tried as a delinquent, it being alleged in three separate counts that he is a delinquent juvenile by reason of the fact that he stole a bank containing money; stole a bicycle and struck another negro boy with the head with a ball bat at the ball park a month ago.

A postponement of the trial of this case was sought by the defense when the case was called for trial Friday morning upon the presentation of the health certificate signed by a negro doctor, Dr. W. P. King. Judge J. P. Jones called the doctor to appear before him after Dr. Lowrey had made his examination of the boy and had testified in court.

## TWILIGHT EXECUTIVE BOARD RULES ON PROTESTED GAMES

Upholds One, Throws Out One and Takes Third Under Consideration.

The executive board of the Twilight League allowed one protest, refused to allow another, and took a third under consideration for a few days at a called meeting in Collier & Landolt's sporting goods store Thursday night. The Baptists' protest against the University club was allowed though the game was not thrown out. The Baptists contended that with a runner on first base and two out the catcher dropped a third strike and did not throw the batsman out at first. The runner on first reached third and the batsman reached first. The umpire, however, ruled that the batter was out. The executive board reversed the umpire's decision and ordered the game to be played out from that point, namely with runners on first and third and two out. The Legion also protested a game won by the University club on the grounds that the umpire called a man out at the plate when he was safe. This protest was not allowed as the umpire's decision in this case is final. It was a question of judgment, not of rules. A protest entered by Fond Laundry against the Shrine team has been taken under consideration and a decision will be made by the board within a few days.

PANAMA, June 29.—Two persons were killed and several injured today by an explosion in a Balboa boiler shop, caused by the blowing up of an acetylene tank. The dead are a negro employee, and Leopold Johnson of Portland, Ore., employed as a riveter. The machinery of the plant was not damaged.

## Chicken and Ham Croquettes

By BERTHA E. SHAPLEIGH, Cooking Expert for NEA Service and Columbia University. All measurements are level measurements of materials called for in these recipes. A tablespoon of material is all the spoon holds when leveled off. One rounding spoon is equal to two level measuring.

Two cups cold, chopped chicken, 1 cup cold, chopped ham, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, 1 teaspoon paprika, 1 teaspoon grated onion, 2 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 cup milk.

Make a sauce by melting butter and cooking it in the flour and adding the milk. Cook until very thick. Add to chicken and ham and seasonings. Season more if necessary. Cool.

Make into balls having a rounding tablespoon in each ball. These may be rolled in fine sifted bread crumbs, dipped in beaten egg and again rolled in crumbs and fried in deep fat. Or the balls may be shaped into cylinders, two inches long, or made cone-shaped before dipping in the egg.
