### MEXICO OFFICIALS DENY THAT ARTICLE 27 HAS CONFISCATORY EFFECT

Evidence of returning business prosperity is shown in a survey by the National Bank of Commerce in New York based on recent reports of national banks to the Comptroller of the Currency. Recovery has been more marked in cities than in Send them throughout the world. rural communities.

"A study of the con-fluence! dition of the banks of the country compared by geographical districts should therefore give some important indications of the relative position of the business cycle in different types of communities. The movement of certain items in the combined resource and liability statements of banks is indicative of the general condition of banking. Important among such items are loans and discounts, demand deposits and borrowings.

"Loans and discounts significantly reflect bank esistance to the business community. When business is active, expanding loans and discounts are exacted. It is obvious that in a credit economy such our own a relatively large amount of bank assistis needed when a relatively large volume of ds is being regularly produced and marketed. But it does not follow that loans are, or can be, reed in proportion as business activity declines.

"The recent movement of loans and discounts id seem to indicate improving business condiin some communities prior to the call of last For instance, loans for reserve city banks Pacific region have recovered considerably at September, and slight improvement in citof New England, the Middle West and the South be read in the figures since the end of last year.

"It is a well-recognized fact that there is a close moe between the deposits and loans of fal banks. Little difference between the progress of decline in city and country banks is observable, though it is noteworthy that the decline TIMES PUBLISHING COMPANY, PUBLISHERS among the country banks began earlier and has been somewhat more consistent. In some districts among the city banks, the recession has been interrupted by temporary recoveries, particularly in the eastern district, which includes New York.

"No doubt this difference between city and country banks was largely due to the relatively greater activity of trade in cities, by which the flow of deposits tends to be maintained even in depression and thus provides the means for meeting withdrawals of funds and maturing obligations for money borrowed. On the other hand, country banks had relatively small amounts of cash coming in by way of current deposits and loan payments once the period of delation was under way.

"With regard to the recent movements of the deposit figures as an index of business conditions, the conclusion seems plain that 'here has been more improvement recently in the cities than in the rural districts. On the whole, demand deposits in city banks have been increasing for the last six months, which is not so generally the case among country banks. The Harvard curve began about ten months ago to indicate improved business conditions, and city deposits seem to have followed suit after a lag .\$2.75 of a few months. On all sides is heard the statement that conditions in agricultural communities .16c are improving. Perhaps an increase in country bank \$4.00 deposits can be expected to reflect this within the next few months.

"The increase of bank borrowings for many months after the depression began is indicative of the strain imposed upon the banking community in meeting the demands of liquidation. Indirectly such an expansion of borrowings evidences the desirability of a banking system which keeps power in re-serve to meet such unasual shocks.

"The hardship that the period of liquidation has occasioned in agricultural communities is directly reflected by the relative borrowings of banks in such communities. Borrowings of country banks increased up to the end of the year 1920. Moreover, the decline of their borrowings since that time has been only 35 per cent against the decline of 75 per cent for all banks. Decrease in the amount of borrowings continues to be the rule. This is a condition, of course, that is to be expected as coincident with easier money conditions, and precedent to a sustained business revival.

"Deposits in recent months have shown more endency toward improvement than have loans. It appears that the process of liquidation has put commercial firms in possession of funds for meeting current operating expenses without resert to bor-

"In general, liquidation win city banks began earlier and moved toward completion more rapidly his campaign. than in country banks, though liquidation seems still to be incomplete as far as borrowings are concerned. 

# Government Attitude Toward the Shopmen's Strike

## In His Address at Marion, Ohio, July 4th President Harding Declared:

"The formost thought in the constitution is the right to freedom and the pursuit of happiness. Man must be free to live and achieve. Liberty is gone in America when any man is denied by anybody the right to work and live by that work. It does not matter who denies.

"A free Ameircan has the right to labor without any other's leave. It would be no less an abridgement to deny men to bargain collectively. Governments cannot tolerate any class of grouped domination through force. It will be a sorry day when group dominion is reflected in our laws. Government, and the laws which government is charged with enforcing, must be for all the people, ever aiming at the common good."

The United States Railroad Labor Board Has Declared the Strike of Railway Shopmen to be in Effect a Strike Against the Authority of the United States Government, and the Labor Board Accordingly Adopted the Following Resolution, July 3rd:

"Whereas the six organizations composing the Federated Shop Crafts have notified the Railroad Labor Board that a very large majority of the employes which they represent have left the service of the carriers, and that the members of said organizations are no longer employes of the railways, under the jurisdiction of the Railroad Labor Board or subject to the application of the transportation act and,

"Whereas, in the future submission of disputes, involving rules, wages and grievances of said classes of employes of the carriers, it will be desirable, if not a practical necessity: for the employes of each class on each carrier to form a sort of association or organization to function in the representation of said employes before the Railroad Labor Board in order that the effectiveness of the transportation act may be maintained; now, therefore be it

"Resolved, that it be communicated to the carriers

and employes remaining and the new employes succeeding those who have left the service to take steps as soon as practicable to perfect on each carrier such organization as may be deemed necessary for the purposes above mentioned; and be it further

"Resolved, That, on any carrier where either of the above named organizations, by reason of its membership severing their connections with the carriers, ceases to represent its class of employes procedure similar to that above suggested in the case of the shop crafts is recommended; and be it further

"Resolved, That the employes in the service and the new ones entering same be accorded the application and benefit of the outstanding wage and rule decision of the Railroad Labor Board, until they are amended or modified by agreement with said employes, arrived at in conformity with the transportation act or by decision of this board; and be it further

"Resolved, That, if it be assumed that the employes who leave the service of the carrier because of their dissatisfaction with any decision of the Labor Board are within their rights in so doing it must likewise be conceded that the men who remain in the service and those who enter it anew are within their rights in accepting such employment; that they are not strikebreakers seeking to impose the arbitrary will of an employer on employes; that they have the moral as well as the legal right to engage in such service of the American public to avoid interruption of indispensable railway transportation, and that they are entitled to the protection of every department and branch of the government, state and national"

President Harding has announced that the Labor Board has the full backing of the government and the full power of the government will be employed to support its policies. For these reasons, patriotic and law abiding citizens everywhere must regard the strike as directed at the United States government and should support the declaration of Chairman Hooper of the Labor Board that



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

## STATE EXPERIMENT EIGHT COMPLETIONS STATION WILL AID IN IN ELECTRA DISTRICT: IRRIGATION PLANSFIFTY-SEVEN IN JUNE

Urges Need of Horticultural Sur vey of the District Included.

ELECTRA, TEXAS, July 7 .- Be cause of the high character of the men behind the project, the state experiment station will lend its ald

possibilities for growing fruits and vegetables on the lands that are to irrigated. The staple crops such as corn and cotton will not justify irrigation, he thinks, unless per-haps some long staple cotton may be grown to a limited degree.

Undoubtedly a great deal of al-falfa will be grown, the experiment station executive suggests, because vill undoubtedly be developed throughout the county. Even if root rot cannot be eliminated from the alfalfa, it is pointed out that the ersp can be grown for three years and then plowed up to make room for some other crop. This should be done to keep up the fertility of the soil, and Mr. Jackson pointed out that at the experiment farm similar treats of ground have been similar tracts of ground have been under observation for more than, a decade. On one tract a system of crop rotation has been followed.
With the use of sifulfa and commercial fertiliser the production of corn, for example, has been increased from 16 to 56 bushels to an agre. Where the sifulfa has not have reversely but with all other conbeen grown but with all other con-ditions similar, the increase in yield has been only from 16 to 20 bushels. It is Mr. Jackson's opinion that

peaches and pears may be grown very profitably on the land which is to be irrigated in this county. He suggests that strawberries may be found to be the most profitable crop; and if it can be put on the market when celery from other sections is not ready, that delicacy may be found to yield a rich return.
