

SOFT COAL STRIKE IS HARD PROBLEM FOR GOVERNMENT

STABILIZATION OF INDUSTRY NECESSARY TO END WASTE.

TROUBLE IN ANTHRACITE MERELY ONE OF WAGES

This Feature of Industry Gives Little Concern to the Administration.

WASHINGTON, July 7.—It is not two but three strikes with which the government is confronted.

The coal strike is really the most important of the circumstances of the anthracite industry are so different in the bituminous industry that the questions involved are who the laborers are in these three strikes, the one that causes the most apprehension is the railroad strike.

It is not anticipated, however, that the strike will take such a turn as to call for strong action on the part of the government, which will undoubtedly be taken promptly if the conditions deteriorate. The expectation is that the railroad strike will not grow more formidable and that it will not at any time grow greater than the strike in the country.

Of the two aspects of the coal strike the anthracite one is much the more simple. The anthracite mines are an industry apart. They are restricted geographically. They have been in the course of development for a very long period and the industry is well established.

Bituminous Strike Most Difficult. It is the bituminous strike that confronts the government with the greatest difficulty. Bituminous coal mining is an industry in which the supply greatly exceeds the demand. The consequence is it raises difficulties, not only of wages, but also of continuity of employment.

As regards the settlement of the present controversy, there is apparently no disposition to appeal to the courts, but there is complete confidence that the government, with the proper authorization from congress, can find adequate means to handle the situation.

GARRISON REVOLT PART OF PLAN FOR GENERAL UPRISING

RIO JANEIRO, July 7.—The revolt of the garrison of the Copacabana fortress which was put down by the government forces was to have been part of a general uprising in which all the forts would join.

The Journal do Commercio, semi-official newspaper, describing the talking of Copacabana states that at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon the forces occupying the fortress, tired of waiting for the return of Captain Fonseca, decided to attack the government forces.

Advancing down the Avenida Atlantica, which is the residential driveway along the coast, they met a force of loyal troops who at first believed the rebels were on their way to surrender.

J. O. COLVIN KILLED OFFICERS GIVE BOND

on the porch and sit down, which they did. My husband came home in just a few minutes. The officers told my husband that they had heard that there had been a disturbance out here and my husband told them just exactly what had happened.

At this point Mrs. Colvin told that her husband had been warned two months ago by a friend that the city officers were waiting for a chance to "bump him off."

Continuing amid sobs she said: "I guess it was some time between 9:30 and 10:00 o'clock when four officers got out of the house in front of the house and started to the porch. I was sitting on the porch swing and my husband was in a chair."

"I noticed my husband put his hand back to his side and he pulled out another gun. McDonald grabbed it and one of the other officers grabbed his other hand. They took that away from him and then with force all four of them drug him off the porch to the corner of the house."

"I think McDonald had hold of him there and my husband leaning partially against him. The first I knew I heard two shots fired. Shook's gun was smoking. My husband reeled against McDonald. Then there were three more shots and Jim fell to the ground."

"My baby started to cry in the house and I started in. One of the officers stopped me. I told him that he wasn't going to stop me and if he wanted to he could follow me into the house as I wanted to get the baby. I ran in, picked the babe in my arms and came back out and ran over to where my husband was lying on the ground."

"They ordered me away. I told them that I was going to stand there and see to it that they didn't do anything more to Jim."

"By that time one of the neighbors, Constable Morgan came running up and he got a pillow and placed it under Jim's head. I could see that the father of my four little children was dead."

Deeds Husband Fired Mrs. Colvin was told that it was reported that one bullet had been fired from her husband's gun and that it was stated he had fired one shot before the guns were taken from him.

To this Mrs. Colvin replied, "If my husband's gun turned up at the court house with one shot fired they fired that shot themselves because my husband did not shoot a single time."

Officer Belcher, who with Shook had made the visit to the Colvin house earlier in the evening said that they had been given a tip that to two men were going to Colvin's house to buy some whiskey.

Mr. Belcher said that they saw the car with two men stop, and that Cotton Huey entered the house and came out with something under his coat. When they drove north on the street and approached the intersection of Fifth and Holliday, they shot out with their car, he stated, and stopped them.

"I told them to give me what they had," Mr. Belcher related, "and Cotton took the object out from under his coat and threw it to the ground. It was a bottle and it broke. It was whiskey. I told them they were under arrest and I got in the car with them and drove up in front of Colvin's house."

"I called to Colvin and he came out to the edge of his yard and threw his gun on the lawn. He told the man I had under arrest to get out of the car. He spoke to this man several times. His wife came out and led him back into the house. Before I drove away I told him that I was going to get a search warrant and come back."

Issue Search Warrant. United States Commissioner J. A. Lantz said that the officer had called on him to issue a search warrant and that the warrant was properly issued. It was signed by Tom R. Shook. Mr. Lantz said the warrant had been sworn to at probably 8:30 o'clock.

Justice of the Peace R. V. Gwinn, who was called to the Colvin home to hold a coroner's inquest said that five shots had entered the man's body from the right side and that all of them went through and came out on the left side. He ordered the body removed to the undertaking parlors and set the home against the two officers after each had waived preliminary hearings.

County Jailor Will Allen, who, in company with John B. Brown, night jailor, went to the Colvin home at probably 7:45 o'clock, told of his visit.

Mr. Allen said that when they drove up to the house that Mrs. Colvin was sitting on the porch and that they walked up on the front gallery.

"I asked her what the disturbance was about," Mr. Allen said, "and she told me about what had happened. In a few minutes Mr. Colvin came up and he sat down on the porch with us. He was excited over what had happened but told us that we were welcome to search the house even without a search warrant."

"I told him that we had not come to search the house. He told me that without a doubt a complaint would be filed against him in the county and asked me to either come out after him in the morning or call him by telephone. I told him I would if a complaint was filed. Just before we left, however, Colvin said 'Never mind about calling me or coming after me, I'll be up to the court house in the morning. I want to talk to you boys anyway.' We left."

None of the officers who participated in the raid made a statement for publication. All said that they would rather not relate any of the incidents and replied that it would all come out later.

At 11 o'clock Friday morning all of the city officers involved were awaiting their turn to enter the grand jury room.

When asked, Mrs. Colvin positively denied that either Huey or Bradshaw had been at their house Friday evening.

She told that her husband had worked for the city for four years, Sundays and every day and that no trouble was had until he had been let out by Commissioner Lantz two months after the latter took his seat of office.

"Since that time they have harassed my husband. They have stopped him on the streets and searched him. They have come out to the house and searched the premises. My husband told the two county officers who were here Thursday evening at about 8 o'clock that he didn't mind being taken to the county but would not go to the city hall where they kick and cuff everyone around."

Mr. Colvin is survived by the widow and four children: Rita, aged 10; Novella, aged 9; Anna, aged 6, and Marie, aged 17 months. A brother and eight sisters also survive him.

Government Attitude Toward the Shopmen's Strike

In His Address at Marion, Ohio, July 4th President Harding Declared:

"The foremost thought in the constitution is the right to freedom and the pursuit of happiness. Man must be free to live and achieve. Liberty is gone in America when any man is denied by anybody the right to work and live by that work. It does not matter who denies.

"A free American has the right to labor without any other's leave. It would be no less an abridgement to deny men to bargain collectively. Governments cannot tolerate any class of grouped domination through force. It will be a sorry day when group dominion is reflected in our laws. Government, and the laws which government is charged with enforcing, must be for all the people, ever aiming at the common good."

The United States Railroad Labor Board Has Declared the Strike of Railway Shopmen to be in Effect a Strike Against the Authority of the United States Government, and the Labor Board Accordingly Adopted the Following Resolution, July 3rd:

"Whereas the six organizations composing the Federated Shop Crafts have notified the Railroad Labor Board that a very large majority of the employees which they represent have left the service of the carriers, and that the members of said organizations are no longer employees of the railways, under the jurisdiction of the Railroad Labor Board or subject to the application of the transportation act and,

"Whereas, in the future submission of disputes, involving rules, wages and grievances of said classes of employees of the carriers, it will be desirable, if not a practical necessity: for the employees of each class on each carrier to form a sort of association or organization to function in the representation of said employees before the Railroad Labor Board in order that the effectiveness of the transportation act may be maintained; now, therefore be it

"Resolved, that it be communicated to the carriers

"Resolved, That, if it be assumed that the employees who leave the service of the carrier because of their dissatisfaction with any decision of the Labor Board are within their rights in so doing it must likewise be conceded that the men who remain in the service and those who enter it anew are within their rights in accepting such employment; that they are not strikebreakers seeking to impose the arbitrary will of an employer on employees; that they have the moral as well as the legal right to engage in such service of the American public to avoid interruption of indispensable railway transportation, and that they are entitled to the protection of every department and branch of the government, state and national"

President Harding has announced that the Labor Board has the full backing of the government and the full power of the government will be employed to support its policies. For these reasons, patriotic and law abiding citizens everywhere must regard the strike as directed at the United States government and should support the declaration of Chairman Hooper of the Labor Board that

and employees remaining and the new employees succeeding those who have left the service to take steps as soon as practicable to perfect on each carrier such organization as may be deemed necessary for the purposes above mentioned; and be it further

"Resolved, That, on any carrier where either of the above named organizations, by reason of its membership severing their connections with the carriers, ceases to represent its class of employees procedure similar to that above suggested in the case of the shop crafts is recommended; and be it further

"Resolved, That the employees in the service and the new ones entering same be accorded the application and benefit of the outstanding wage and rule decision of the Railroad Labor Board, until they are amended or modified by agreement with said employees, arrived at in conformity with the transportation act or by decision of this board; and be it further

COMISKEY AND SON MUST APPEAR FOR AN EXAMINATION

MILWAUKEE, July 7.—Charles Comiskey and his son, Louis, owners of the Chicago White Sox, are required to appear in Milwaukee July 12 before Court Commissioner Emil Ludwig for examination under the discovery statute in connection with the Felch and Jackson cases, on orders signed by Judge John J. Gregory, of the circuit court here today. Summons will be taken to the north woods for service on the Comisks today. Felch and Jackson are suing the Comisks for alleged back salary, bonuses and damages for being ousted from organized baseball following the 1919 world's series scandal.

GERMAN MARKS PLUNGE TO A NEW LOW LEVEL 18 CENTS A HUNDRED

NEW YORK, July 7.—German marks plunged to the lowest level in history today, being quoted at 18 cents a hundred, following publication of the German bank statement, revealing an increase of 11,500,000 marks in the paper currency issued last week. In September, 1918, shortly after the outbreak of the war, the total circulation in Germany was 2,24,000,000 marks as compared with a circulation of 163,185,228,000 marks last week. The normal or pre-war value of marks was 23.5 cents each. Various reasons are assigned by bankers for the decline, among them the recent failure of international bankers to agree upon a loan for Germany and the apparent disposition of German government officials to continue unchecked the reckless printing of paper currency.

FLYER IS KILLED IN MAKING SHARP TURN TO AVOID A HANGAR

DETROIT, July 7.—A sharp turn made in an effort to avoid striking a hangar led to the death of Captain George C. Tinsley, 26, of the army air service, who crashed to earth with a plane while flying at Selfridge field, near here, late yesterday. The motor flying during the maneuver, according to an official report from the field today. The craft fell 100 feet and burst into flames as it struck the ground. The flyer was dead when spectators succeeded in extinguishing the fire. His home was at Richmond, Va.

CONTINUE INVESTIGATION OF LYNCHING OF NEGRO

SHREVEPORT, La., July 7.—Officers of Bossier parish continued their investigation today of the lynching yesterday of Joe Pemberton, negro, who was taken from jail at Benton by a mob of white men after they had overpowered Deputy Sheriff J. M. Wilson. Pemberton's body was found several hours later swinging to a tree in black bayou swamp, two miles from Benton. He had been arrested following the shooting of two negro women.

THREE FLORIDA MEN ARE CHARGED WITH PEONAGE

GAINESVILLE, Fla., July 7.—Charged with peonage for the alleged holding of two negroes to work out a debt, three prominent naval store operators of Dixie county have been ordered held for the December term of the federal district court after a preliminary hearing yesterday before U. S. Commissioner A. J. Costa. The men, who were released on a joint bond of \$150, are W. Austin Brown, Moses L. Brown and W. H. Mathias. The alleged peonage is said to have extended over a period of two years. There are 30,000,000 grade and scrub dairy animals in this country and less than 1,000,000 pure bred.

PLAYERS OBTAINED BY SPUDDERS ARE SUBJECT TO RECALL

CHICAGO, July 7.—Earl Adams of the Wichita Falls club, leading fielder of the Texas league, has been obtained by the Chicago Nationals for three players and a sum of money. Adams will report to the Cubs at the close of the Texas league season. As part payment for the star, Fletcher Alex Freeman has been released outright to Wichita Falls, and Pitcher Victor Keane recalled from the Toronto club of the International league, and Arthur Welsh, outfielder, who was with St. Paul club of the American association and who was returned to Chicago, also were sent to the Texas club, subject to recall.

REPORT INCREASE RETAIL COST PRICE OF FOOD PRODUCTS

WASHINGTON, July 7.—A slight increase in the retail cost price of food products in 18 out of 22 representative cities of the country occurred from May 15 to June 15, according to a statement today by the department of labor. Newark, New York and Pittsburgh noted an increase of 3 percent; Bridgeport, Chicago, Cincinnati, Kansas City, Milwaukee and Rochester, 2 percent; Baltimore, Dallas, Fall River, New Haven, Philadelphia, Richmond and Scranton, 1 percent; Portland, Maine, Washington, D. C., Manchester, N. H., Norfolk and Providence, less than five-tenths of one percent. For the period June 15, 1921, to June 15, 1922, 19 of the 22 cities show a decrease.

CASE OF MRS. SIMS AT HOUSTON CONTINUED

HOUSTON, July 7.—The case of Mrs. Laura Sims, charged with murder in connection with the killing of her husband, W. R. Sims, 46, at his home near Scott's bay on May 10, was continued until the next term of court when it was called today. Earl Beaver, Mrs. Sims' brother, charged jointly with her, was given a 2½ year sentence by a jury late Thursday.

ELECTRA BANK DEPOSITS SHOW A LARGE INCREASE

ELECTRA, TEXAS, July 7.—Bank deposits in Electra have increased nearly half a million dollars during the last 30 days, according to figures given out in a report today. The call of June 26. The total for three banks here is, right at \$2,000,000. Cash reserves amount to more than \$800,000.

CHICAGO BANDIT KILLED STAGING SECOND ROBBERY

CHICAGO, July 7.—A bandit identified as F. J. Brennan, former Milwaukee dishwasher, who staged a spectacular single handed hold up in a pawnshop and escaped with \$1,000 last night in a getaway car, attempted to escape after an \$8 robbery in a restaurant.

KILLS HIS FATHER TO PROTECT HIS MOTHER

CHARLOTTEVILLE, Va., July 7.—Emmett Wilkerson, 23, yesterday shot and instantly killed his father, W. S. Wilkerson, a farmer of Gilchrist, in defense of his mother, according to the young man's story to the sheriff. Wilkerson, released on bail today, was said to have told the sheriff he killed his father after being attracted by cries from his mother, whom he found lying on the floor with his father standing over her after having choked and beaten her. The story is said to have been corroborated by the family physician.

CHIEF JUSTICE TAFT ENJOYS HOSPITALITY SHOWN IN ENGLAND

By Associated Press. CAMBRIDGE, July 7.—Chief Justice Taft, nearing the end of his visit to England, has asked the Associated Press to inform the American people of the hospitality he has received from the British. Before leaving tonight for Aberdeen, Scotland, where he will receive another honorary degree, he said: "My greeting has been so generous and so sincerely cordial that I am unable to find words adequately to convey gratitude but I can not help feeling that England's warm manifestations were not toward me as an individual but toward my capacity to convey gratitude of the millions of Americans overseas. "Everywhere in Great Britain I have found the strongest evidence of the friendship of the English people for America and I go home with unbounded admiration for the country whence my ancestors came. If, therefore, the British are to receive from which American obtained its common law. "I have gathered an immense fund of information respecting England's judicial procedure which I will try to digest on the ocean waves to present the main features of the system to the American Bar association convention in August. English practice simplifies the procedure by embracing both law and equity in a single action. Preliminary hearings compel both parties to disclose the evidence that is relevant on each side that when the issue is presented in court it can be expeditiously disposed of. "I cannot speak too warmly of the comradeship the British bar have shown me and the feeling they have given me of at once being at home with them."

CONTEND CITY HAS POWER TO GOVERN ITS OWN HIGHWAYS

INJUNCTION SUIT AGAINST COURT OF COMMISSIONERS SET FOR SATURDAY.

SUIT FILED IN 30TH DISTRICT COURT FRIDAY

Suit Grows Out of Proposed Routing of Meridian Highway into City.

Contending that the city of Wichita Falls was granted the power under the city charter to have exclusive control, supervision and jurisdiction over all the streets and alleys and public highways within its corporate limits and that the commissioner acted within jurisdiction in routing the Meridian Highway into the city, a suit was instituted Friday by the city against the county commissioners' court.

Judge H. R. Wilson, in whose court the case was filed, set the case down for hearing for Saturday morning at 9 o'clock.

The city asks an injunction restraining the county from continuing further in the paving of the proposed route of the Meridian Highway into the city.

The petition sets forth that the proposed routing of the highway as outlined by the court is down Fort Worth street to Virginia, thence to East Seventeenth and thence to Lamar street.

It is understood that the city wants the Meridian Highway to enter the city via Jatic street, and open directly into Lamar street.

This matter has been before the court and the city council for several weeks. Resident property owners on East Seventeenth street, together with those residing on Lamar street, donated a sum of money for the grading of the streets provided the highway would enter the city on these streets. A portion of this money has been spent.

It was stated Friday that all of the grading has been done on the proposed routing and that the contractor has completed the laying of water lines.

SCOUT TROOP 16 PRESENTED WITH CHARTER AND FLAG

At the regular meeting Thursday night of troop No. 16 of the factory district, the troop was presented with the troop charter from national headquarters, and "Old Glory" by 5 feet donated to the troop by Mr. Flury of Austin, Texas. You stand by and watch the other boys pass their tests and meet the requirements; your scoutmaster may pass the tests, but unless you meet the requirements you will be in the same rank and will not get anywhere." Continuing he said: "The opportunities boys have in the scout organization are unlimited; professional and business men are giving their time and money for your benefit; doctors are giving their services in the examination for merit tests; in first aid; shop men are giving their services in the examination of machinery; automobile dealers are giving their services in the examination for autombiling; and many others are giving their services in the expert examination of the various merit tests."
