MISSOURI COUNTRIES UNDER WATER WEDNESDAY

CHILLICOTHE, MO., July 12.—Farm lands in Mercer, Grundy, Livingston, Daviess, Gentry and Nodaway counties are under water today and both forks of the Grand river, which unite near here, are rising rapidly. The United States weather bureau here predicts a 25 foot stage of the river by tomorrow, the highest ever known here. NEGRO EMPLOYE REPORTED BEATEN AT SAN ANTONIO

SUN-YAT SEN'S MEN ONLY ONE MEMBER OCCUPY FORTS PROTECTING CANTON

By Associated Press. CANTON, July 11.—Their way paved by bombardment from Sun Yat Sen's warships, Sun's troops late today occupied without opposition the Macao forts, two miles down the West river from the city. Yip Kue, commanding the forces of Chen Ching Ming, which wrested Canton from Sun, is inactive. Forces of Sun and Chen have met near Wuchow, 150 miles west and slightly north of Canton, in the province of Kwangsi. Sun hourly awaits the arrival of reinforcements from the north, he states, and on their arrival will take the initiative to recover possession of Canton. A strike of workers at the electric light plant has been called and a general strike of laborers is threatened. Sun declares the merchants' association of the city has invited him to resume the presidency.

MORE THAN 10,000 ACRES FARM CROPS RUINED BY FLOODS

LINCOLN, NEB., July 12.—Sixteen sections of farm land totaling more than 10,000 acres of farm crops was devastated by a hail storm Monday night around Greenwood, Neb., for a distance of about 11 miles, it is learned here. The only salvage will be a part of the fall wheat crop which was in the shock and it is estimated 25 per cent of that is lost. At Greenwood, Neb., it was estimated that 50 farms suffered complete destruction of the corn crop.

NEGOTIATIONS WITH RUSSIAN DELEGATES WITHOUT SUCCESS

By Associated Press. THE HAGUE, July 12.—The conference with representatives of soviet Russia here broke down at 1 o'clock this afternoon without apparent hope of further meeting. Maxim Litvinoff of the Russian delegation said on leaving the conference chamber that further meetings were unlikely, as the non-Russians insisted upon the Russians making promises with regard to property compensation and giving guarantees which the Russians knew what credit and loans would be granted. M. Litvinoff added that the peace pact would hold for one month after the last meeting.

LIGHT WINES AND BEER REFERENDUM LIKELY IN ILLINOIS

CHICAGO, July 12.—A statewide referendum in Illinois on light wines and beer sentiment is virtually assured at the November election, according to Anton Cermak, Chicago alderman and chairman of the committee in charge of gathering signatures for the petition to put the question on the ballot. More than 500,000 signatures have been obtained, Alderman Cermak said. Only 300,000 are required.

FLORIDA REPUBLICAN ORGANIZATION FAVORS ELECTING WHITE MEN

ORLANDO, FLA., July 12.—The Independent republican party, recently organized here with the declaration that it was unalterably opposed to the election or selection of any person to public office or position of trust who is not a white American citizen, will place a candidate in the field for the United States senate to oppose Senator Park Trammell, democrat, for reelection in November. W. C. Lawson, chairman of the executive committee, announced today.

VICTIM OF KNIFE WOUNDS WILL RECOVER

BURKBNETT, TEXAS, July 12.—The Burkbnett hospital reports that the condition of Phillip Bedwell is at this time good and that he will recover from knife wounds sustained last Thursday night in an altercation with J. V. Pardo which took place at the Tidal Western plant. Deputy Sheriff H. L. White arrested Pardo and upon his appearance before Justice of the Peace Chatham, his bond was placed at \$150 which he readily gave. Family troubles are given as a reason for the trouble which ensued and culminated in the serious stabbing of Bedwell.

MEXICAN GIRL KILLS DEPUTY TO AVENGE DEATH OF FATHER MAN HAD ESCAPED COURTS

By Associated Press. MEXICO CITY, July 11.—Maria del Pilar Moreno, the 15 year old girl who yesterday avenged her father's death by shooting Deputy Francisco Tejeda Llorca, today was consigned to a correctional school pending legal procedure. The child again today related the story of the killing to the presiding judge, asserting calmly that she had killed Llorca because his immunity as a deputy had kept him out of the courts and his election last Sunday, as senator from Vera Cruz had apparently extended that immunity another four years. "If I had been a man I would have challenged Llorca to a duel," said the girl, "but as I am only a girl there was nothing for me to do but keep my promise of vengeance and shoot at the first opportunity." Prior to the order committing Maria to a correctional school men friends of the family made a formal request of the judge to be allowed to serve the girl's time in Belem prison, each man serving one day without food. The request was denied. X-ray burns are treated the same as those from flame. King Ferdinand of Rumania drives his own car.

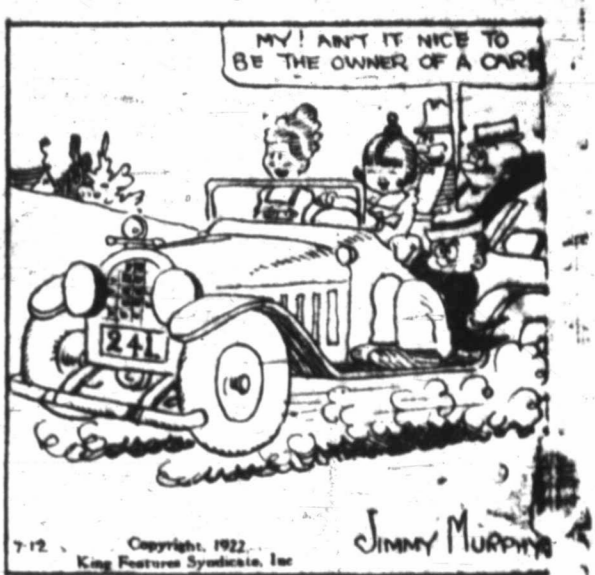

HOUSTON, TEXAS, July 12.—Eight of the striking shopmen to be named in a grand jury indictment in federal district court here today.

The test was to come on an application for an injunction by the United States against the picketing of individuals from "picketing" interfering in any way with the operation of the railroad.

Events in the strike came with startling rapidity here yesterday. Eighty before noon the Harris county grand jury returned a report denouncing the situation growing out of the strike as "a regime of terrorism and lawlessness inaugurated by the striking shop craftsmen."

Mayor Rice issued a statement branding the report as "untruthful and hurtful to the city." He declared that Houston officials are adequate to maintain law and order and that violence has been reduced to a minimum here.

Almost simultaneously with these developments Judge Hutchison in federal court authorized the appointment of 20 additional deputy United States marshals to be used in guarding railway lines entering Houston.

Seven men were taken into custody after an attempt to stone shop workers last night.

WORST CONGESTION AT WILLARD JUNCTION

CLEVELAND, July 12.—The worst all-congestion in northern Ohio because of the shopmen's strike is at Willard, a Baltimore and Ohio railroad junction point, according to dispatches received here from Willard.

Forty-six dead engines stand in the roundhouse and twenty-one of the twenty-four tracks at that point are blocked with cars.

Federal Judge D. C. Westenhaver has granted an injunction to the Erie railroad company restraining pickets or strikers from interfering with men at work in the Erie shops and the roundhouse at Kent, Ohio, where between 300 and 400 men are out on strike.

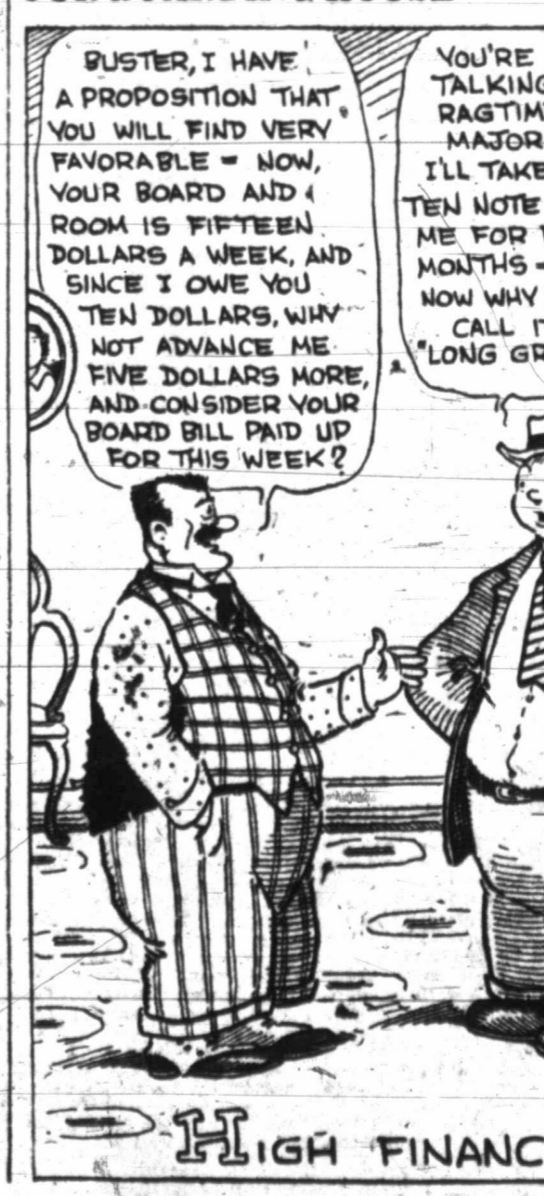

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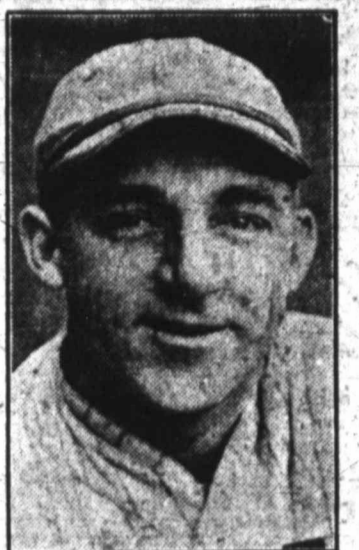

Ten deputies appointed by United States Marshall Baggett of Dallas arrived in this city Tuesday evening and reported for duty to the offices of the Wichita Falls and North-western.
