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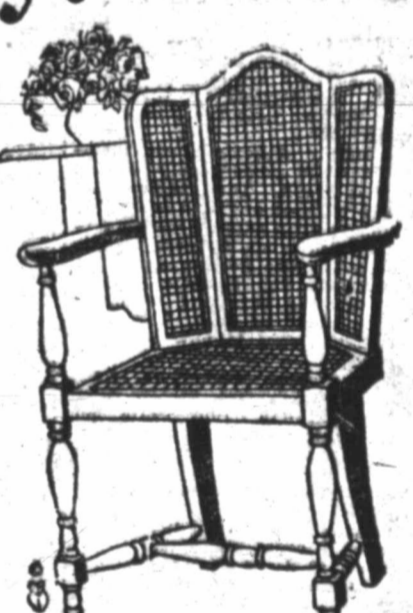

AUTOMOBILE NEWS

NASH SALES IN 6 MONTHS EQUAL THAT OF LAST YEAR

Sales of Nash cars so far this year exceed the total passenger car sales of the Nash Motors company for the entire year of 1921. In the six months period ending June 30 all previous records have been swept aside. The company's books, just closed for the first six months of 1922, show a volume of passenger business far beyond that of the largest previous half year in the history of the Nash Motors company.

Orders on hand for July shipment and reports from Nash dealers throughout the country indicate a continuance of the heavy demand throughout the summer months. The factory is still behind on orders, a condition which has prevailed since last March. Additions to the Nash four cylinder plant at Milwaukee are now being made. When completed they will permit a volume that will more nearly supply the demand for this car. At the same time the Nash Six plant at Kenosha will be in a position to increase its production to a point commensurate with orders received. The new building at Milwaukee is to be 600 feet long by 100 feet and three stories high.

"Increasing demand for Nash cars is due primarily to the splendid value they represent in their price field," said C. K. Voorhis, vice president and director of sales. "In addition to this and of almost equal importance to the owner is the matter of service. 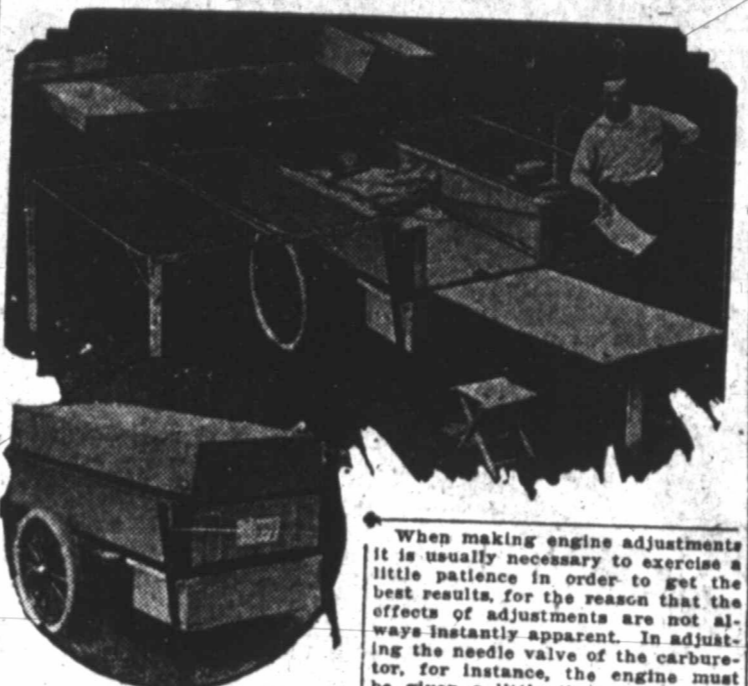
CAR EASILY MAKES ALL TWISTS AND TURNS ON ROAD

The old Cripple Creek stage road up Cheyenne mountain near Colorado Springs turns and twists like a creature in pain. For miles it is dotted with horseshoe curves so sharp that long wheelbase cars have to slow down or stop to make the turns.

ST. LOUIS, MO., July 29.—Cost of operation is the item that automobile dealers are giving more attention to at present than any other perhaps outside of immediate selling, according to information gathered by the National Automobile Dealers' association representative in investigations that now cover the entire country. Since March of this year every city of more than 10,000 population has been visited by representatives of the organization and dozens of cities of from 5,000 to 15,000 also have been made up of these cities the leading dealers and distributors have been conferred with concerning future developments in the industry and their desires and suggestions will be used as the basis for adding to the business service program of the N. A. D. A.

The insurance service provided for members of the N. A. D. A. One of \$1,000 is being received by the dealers as a very definite asset, not only from the viewpoint of the immediate results obtainable but as indicative of what can be accomplished by the "high grade automobile merchant." It seems to be very clear that the dealers have actually taken up a study of costs, for they are asking as to costs of various departments of the business in localities other than their own.

How are salesmen generally being handled, and paid? Commissions or salaries, or both? How can better salesmen be obtained? What is the practice on finding and reporting prospects? What are the systems most in use?

What are the developments in dealer advertising in various parts of the country? How do the dealers like the factory advertising campaigns? Will the factory advertising campaigns ever be improved? Are there any statistics or is there any widespread data available as to the cost of selling per car? Is there any definite data possible on the average percentage of overhead? Has anything been worked out as to the definite departmentizing of cost accounting?

Can maintenance departments be made to show a profit and how? What are some of the systems used to fix costs in the maintenance department? Will it become necessary in properly maintaining these transportation units to come to a seven day 24-hour maintenance service?

The questions are almost innumerable. But one significant fact sticks out and that is that the used car which has been a very prominent subject in dealer discussion in the last two years has not continued to absorb all of the discussion. HELPFUL HINTS.

A quick test for quick adjustment may be made by pressing down on the air valve while the engine is running throttled down. A slight pressure should not change its speed, but a greater pressure will stall it if the mixture is correct. If the engine stalls with a slight pressure the mixture is too lean.

Sometimes compression cocks have a tendency to stick, making it hard to open them. Put a drop of oil in them occasionally, while engine is not running, and work it round to reach each part. You can take better care of your car if the compression cocks are easy to operate.

KNOWLEDGE FOR CAR OWNERS

Interesting and important facts that every motorist should know.

A floorboard edged with felt or aluminum strips will seldom squeak.

To make both surfaces of carburetor and intake gaskets airtight, they should be sealed with shellac.

It will be to your advantage to place a boot over the ball and socket joint of the steering assembly.

A few drops of paint applied to the rusted spots may save you many needless delays and repair bills.

When oil gets into the clutch and causes slipping, all traces of the oil may be quickly removed by washing the clutch in gasoline.

For economy in operation, it is imperative that you should change the oil in the motor every 500 to 1000 miles.

Broom shavings, mixed with flake graphite, makes an excellent cement for pipe joints and other connections subjected to heat or compression.

Never allow the motor to run for any length of time with the spark retarded. Such practice will overheat the motor and cause rapid carbonization.

A good method of cleaning a motor is to spray kerosene over the exterior of the motor. This is a very effective way of washing down all the dirt and oil.

In the event of a tight ignition, it is not safe to operate a car until the coil and distributor are thoroughly dried. A wet ignition system will cause many short circuits and electrical disorders.

Be careful how you prime your motor—an excess quantity of gasoline may be sucked into the cylinders and will in time thin out the motor oil.

Squeaking is often due to dirt and grit imbedded in the brake lining. When the brake lining is forced against the drums, squeaks and rattling sounds develop.

Many times a slipping fan belt has been overcome by sprinkling the belt a little powdered resin. Glycerine or even talcum powder.

Those who must economize may like to know that in using a tire that has been its best day, it is a comparatively simple matter to retread a worn tire, using one of the hands sold especially for the purpose. First wash the tire thoroughly in warm water; clean it well with gasoline; rough it all over with a file and finally give it two good coats of structure solution with a quarter-hour's wait between the two. At the same time, solution the band.

If your engine has a starter attached you miss the opportunity to test compression by hand cranking. Many an engine is losing power because of loss of compression. So get out the starting handle occasionally and test the compression, particularly if you note falling off of power.

Nash Leads the World in Motor Car Value

BACK-TRAILING ON THE OLD FRONTIERS

Sacajawea, the Bird Woman, Indian Heroine Who Guided Lewis and Clark Across the Rockies to the Pacific, Won as Slave by Trapper in Gambling Game.

Of the heroic figures who stand out here and there among the host of trail-blazers who pass in panoramic procession across the pages of American frontier history, none has a greater appeal to human interest than that pathetic figure, Sacajawea, the Bird Woman, slave child-wife of a disolute French-Canadian trapper, whose services as guide to the Lewis and Clark expedition across the western wilderness to the Pacific in 1804-1806 have caused her to be idealized by artist and historian, by fiction writer and historian. Without her guidance and assistance the expedition of Lewis and Clark probably would have failed on several occasions. Her sacrifices were manifold and the hardships she endured, considering that she was but fifteen years of age, seem incredible. But more than the great service she rendered to the expedition, it is the character and the nobility of soul that have given her a place in the hearts of the people. Her story is a story of a woman who was captured at Three Forks, the source of the Missouri river, by a Mandan chief, together with another girl of about the same age, Otter Woman. The chief took his small captives down the Missouri to the Mandan village in what is now Dakota, where he made them a part of his family and treated them as he did his own children. A young Mandan warrior, White Cross, fell in love with Sacajawea, and she, in turn, fell in love with him. The unfortunate girl became the slave-wife of a French trapper and a brutal master, who refused to sell her as a slave to the Americans. After a fight between the Mandans and the Arickaras, left her to a hopeless life of a servitude and drudgery.

Shortly after this last occurrence, Charbonneau started on a trapping expedition, and when he returned to the Mandan camp where he made his headquarters, he found the Lewis and Clark expedition at the Indian village on their migration expedition from St. Louis to the Pacific. The explorers were in need of an interpreter, and Charbonneau was engaged to accompany the expedition. Then, engaged of the British Northwest company, wishing to hinder the American explorers, gave Charbonneau a present of considerable value as a bribe to dissuade him from joining Lewis and Clark. This offer was refused, and the fact that he had quarreled with Jesuina, another interpreter employed by the Americans and also was being killed shortly after which he had been engaged, nearly brought Captain Lewis and Clark to a decision to leave him behind. It happened, however, that Clark had talked with the Sacajawea and was so impressed with her knowledge of the passes beyond the Rockies that he felt she must accompany them. He accordingly patched up the differences with Charbonneau. Had it not been for this, the latter would have gone with the expedition. At the time the captains left the Mandans, Sacajawea was carrying a young babe, the care of which greatly added to her hardships on the journey.

Both Captains Lewis and Clark admired the unusual qualities of mind that the young Shoshone girl displayed, as well as her willingness, patience and her remarkable powers of observation and memory. Often she rode in the canoe of one or other of the captains after the expedition left the Mandan village, near where today, the date of their departure being April 7, 1805.

The outfit of the exploration party had not gone far before Sacajawea performed her first signal service. She, with her husband and young baby, had been placed in a canoe with the scientific instruments, records and medicines. The frail craft caught in a rapid and filled with water almost instantly. The journals—priceless records of the trip—fell overboard. Charbonneau, thinking only of his own safety, abandoned his wife and child, but the Bird Woman, with courage and appreciation of the value

of the papers, recovered them and then was rescued with her baby. Trained after the custom of Indian women to do all kinds of drudgery, Sacajawea labored with the men in the toilsome journey up the Missouri, and when difficulties arose, Captains Lewis and Clark often found her advice and counsel of more benefit than that of any other of the members of the party. Her value increased after they had left the Missouri and faced a search for the unknown passes of the Rocky mountains. The danger of overland transportation had become vital. The only chance to advance appeared to be to find the Shoshone Indians, with their friendship and purchase horses from them.

Sacajawea, coming into a country familiar to her youth, assumed the tremendous responsibility of sole guide. On July 30 she showed her white companions the place where she had been made prisoner by the Minnetarees. She guided them unerringly up the Jefferson to a landmark, that today is historic—the Beaver Head Rock. This point, she told them, was not far from the summer retreat of her own tribe beyond the mountains and she was certain that they would find the Shoshones after a few days' travel. True to her prediction, the Shoshones were encountered on August 11th, but the first of that tribe who saw them fled in terror, and warned the others of the party, who, beat a hasty retreat. The explorers pursued them slowly and with much toil on foot until the following day, August 12, 1805, which was destined to be the most memorable of the expedition. After struggling over the continental divide that morning they descended upon a handsome bold creek of clear, cold water, running to the westward. They stopped to taste for the first time the waters of the Columbia river.

Sacajawea's leadership had been proved worthy of the trust reposed in her. In obedience to her counsel the party had traced the chief source of the Missouri to the top of the continent's watershed, and then found the first stream that empties into the distant Pacific. Later that day some Shoshone women were encountered, and their meeting with Sacajawea made possible a conference with their chief.

Sacajawea was called into the conference to act as interpreter. She at once recognized Cameahwait, the

chief, as her brother whom she had not seen since childhood. The meeting was a most affecting one. Sacajawea acted as any white girl would have done, throwing her arms about her brother and weeping profusely. The chief was greatly moved, also, and the explorers, when the situation was explained to them, realized that as far as the powerful Shoshones were concerned, their troubles were over. Through Sacajawea the Shoshone chief showed the explorers every courtesy, supplying them with horses and food, and directing them on their way. After that incident Sacajawea became the most important member of the expedition in the opinion of the two captains, but while grateful toward her, they never concealed her in any manner or expressed their appreciation excepting in the notes of their journals.

When the expedition reached the coast, Captain Lewis persuaded Sacajawea to give him her girle of blue beads so that he might trade it for a sea-otter skin. The Indian woman, whose blue beads were her only finery, gladly made the sacrifice, and at Christmas time presented Lewis, who appears to have been her favorite of the two explorers with a dozen tails of the white weasel. Also, at a time of distress, she gave him a piece of bread that she had saved for a long time, intending in case of emergency, to give it to her baby.

Sacajawea's services did not end when the expedition reached the coast. On the return trip the explorers divided the expedition in order to cover more territory. The Indian woman accompanied Clark's party, and on two occasions when the expedition was hopelessly lost, pointed

ed out the trail. She showed Captain Clark the way out of Ross' Hole on July 6, 1806, and later in the same month piloted him over what is called the Bozeman Pass to the Yellowstone river. She had passed over the region with her father and a band of Shoshones when a child, and remembered the landmarks.

When the Lewis and Clark party reached the Minnetaree villages above the Mandan camp on the Missouri river on the return trip, Charbonneau decided to stay there to enjoy the \$600 which the captain paid him for his services. The Bird Woman, who had rendered services incomparably of more value to the explorers and to the country, received nothing. She went back to the old life of drudgery with her vagabond husband.

The fate of Sacajawea thereafter is not definitely known. H. M. Brackenridge, in his journal of a voyage up the Missouri river in 1811, relates that he met Charbonneau and his Indian wife, who accompanied Lewis and Clark to the Pacific. Of her he says: "The woman, a good creature of a mild and gentle disposition, was greatly attached to the whites, whose manners and dress she tries to imitate, but she had become sickly and longed to revisit her native country."

Three years ago the Journal of John C. Luttig, clerk of the Missouri Fur company, describing an expedition on the upper Missouri river in the years 1812-13, was found in the collection of the Missouri Historical society, and in this journal he relates the death of a wife of Charbonneau as follows: "Sunday the 26th (December 1813) clear and moderate * * * this evening the wife of Charbonneau, a Shoshonee squaw, died of a

fever; she was a good, and the best woman in the fort, aged about 25 years; she left a fine infant girl."

There seems to be little doubt that this account describes the death, on that "clear and moderate Sunday," December 20, 1813, of Sacajawea, who left the girl baby, Lisette, as well as the boy, Toussaint. The latter was the child she carried with her on the Lewis and Clark expedition.

Luttig, who expressed much contempt for Charbonneau, took the infant girl to St. Louis in June, 1814, where the boy was also taken at about the same time either then or earlier. The court records of St. Louis show that Luttig applied for appointment as guardian of the children, but they appear to have been reared and educated by Captain Clark, who by that time was governor of Missouri. There is some historical evidence that the boy Toussaint, became a free trapper in the Rocky mountains during the 30's, but nothing definitely is known of his life.

The death of Sacajawea, described by Luttig, took place at Fort Manuel, a trading post on the Missouri close to the present line separating North and South Dakota.

Several monuments have been erected to the memory of Sacajawea. A statue in bronze at Portland of the Bird Woman marks the terminus of the expedition of which she was guide. At Three Forks, Montana, is a great boulder with bronze tablet erected by the Montana Daughters of the American Revolution. At Armistead, Montana, near where the exploring party met members of Sacajawea's own tribe, the Shoshones, and from them obtained horses necessary to complete their journey to the Pacific, is another stone monument erected by the Montana Daughters of the Revolution. The woman and children of North Dakota have erected a fine statue in bronze at Bismark, the site of the old Mandan village where Lewis and Clark met Sacajawea. But the most suitable monument to this heroine of western history is that towering eminence in the Brigadier mountains in Montana named Sacajawea Peak, which overlooks the valleys of the Gallatin, Jefferson and Madison rivers, where she was captured when a child by an enemy tribe; the place where she stood and pointed out to her captain the pass—Bozeman—she should take to cross the mountains to the Yellowstone.

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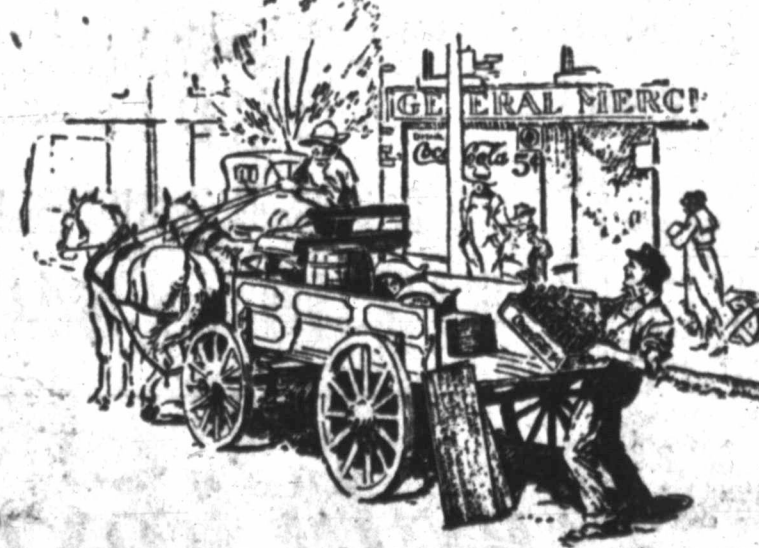

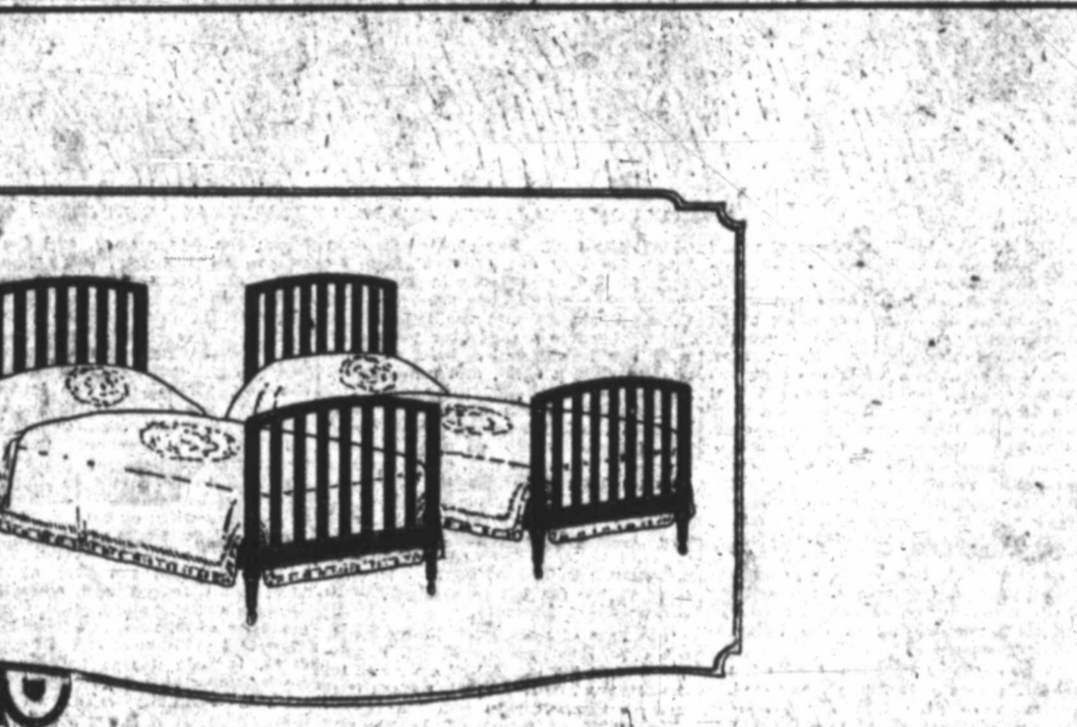

Miss Elizabeth Lanier and "Silver Crest," Her Old Gray Juniper, Who at Tuxedo Recently Added Another Blue Ribbon to Becky's Collection. He Has Been a Most Consistent Winner.



She is Becky Lanier, Aged 16, of Connecticut, Who Now, According to the Latest Statistics, Has More Than 60 Silver Trophies and 550 Ribbons. She Won Her First Prize When She Was Nine.

BECKY LANIER, of Greenwich, Conn., started riding when she was five. At 16, her present age, she is America's greatest horsewoman. Had Becky been a musician or a little less modest she might have justifiably claimed that title years ago, for she has long since lost count of trophies she has won. When Miss Lanier, whose given name is Elizabeth, recently ran away with the honors in the hunter class at the Brooklyn Horse Show, a fan barked with a snarl for big figures attempted to compile a list of her prizes. The result was pretty much an approximation, because Miss Lanier could give him little help. But he was able to establish that she had won more than sixty cups and more than 550 ribbons. These figures easily established her supremacy.

Miss Lanier's first experience as an equestrienne was with a horse named Sue. This Sue was tethered out in the Lanier pasture at Greenwich. She was the sort of beast usually described as a "family nag." Mr. Charles D. Lanier, Becky's father, said Sue was a "grazer."

Becky struck up an acquaintance with Sue at the age of five by wandering down into the pasture and climbing aboard with the aid of the fence. Sue wasn't averse to responding to Becky's demand that she get up, but as soon as the horse spied a succulent clump of grass she would stop short and start to graze, much to Becky's fury.

Becky managed to pump a little vitality into Sue by hard work and after a while actually put her over short fences.

By the time Becky was nine she had become a real hunter and rode with the best in the field.

She first appeared in the show ring at Stamford, Conn., at the age of nine and won the cup for small horse jumpers. Later on she won a cup and ribbon at Piping Rock.

The following year Becky rode for several of her Southern horse-breeding friends in the jumping events at the Washington, D. C., horse show. She took one horse, new to the show ring, over 56 jumps through the week without knocking down a bar. After that no Eastern horse show was complete without her.

But riding in horse shows is tame stuff for Becky Lanier. Fox hunting is her idea of genuine sport. She likes to be out eight or ten hours a day in the Piedmont section of Virginia where she can follow the hounds through the woods, fields, over hills and across deep creeks. But with her it's not the guerdon, but the game. She doesn't care about being in at the brush. She is never so well satisfied as when the fox, after giving the field a glorious run, gets clean away.

Though she is a hard, fast rider, she has had few accidents. She had her worst fall in 1920 at the Madison Square Garden show in New York. She was riding a horse named Down East in a hunt team of three members, jumping tandem. She fell to avert riding "on top" of another competitor. But she was soon in the saddle again.

Miss Lanier comes from a family of riders. Her father, who is Master for Hounds at Fairfield and Westchester County Hunt clubs, says she learned to ride by watching him.

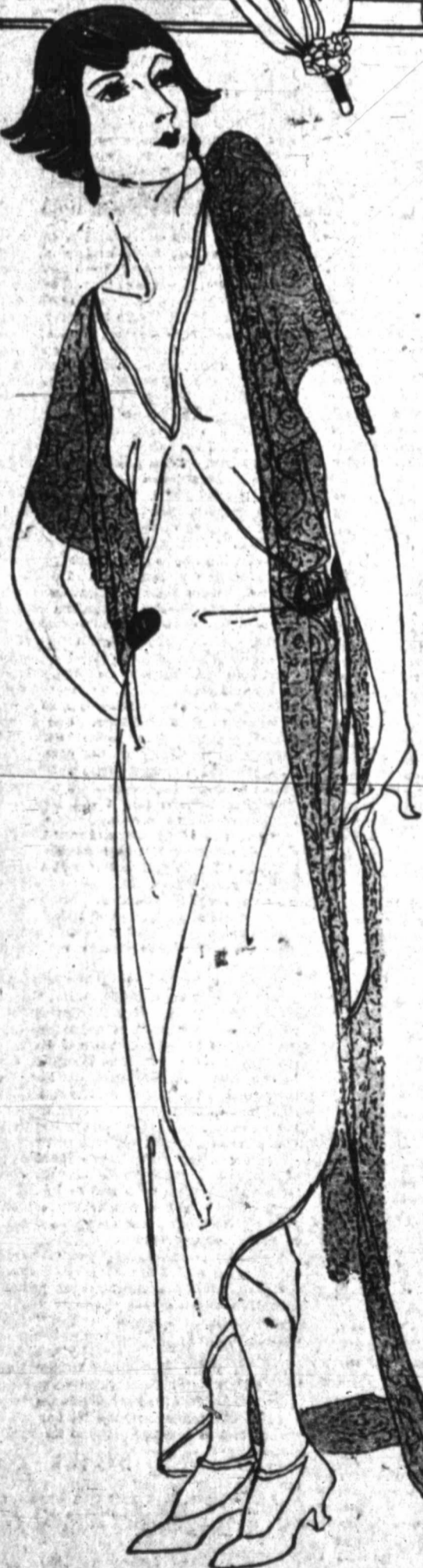
"She has been studying my riding since she was seven years old," he said. "Then she goes and does the very opposite. I have not taught her anything since she was eight and neither has anyone else that I know of."

THIS season has sponsored the use of lace so strongly that we may say it occupies a position of importance not enjoyed for years. Of course, the charm of lace is not a new discovery with us, for one has but to look back into the pages of history to realize the large part the making and wearing of it played in the lives of people who lived and died many years ago.

Lace was first called "ponti in aria," which is the old Italian for "points in air." This describes the first simple edging which served to break the outline of the goods and form a slight decoration. Its first ascent to great beauty was in Italy, and later it reached a stage of exquisite workmanship in Belgium and in France.

In these countries laws were passed regulating who might wear lace and who might not. Gold and silver laces were only worn by those of high degree, while people of a lower station could only have laces of a limited value. During the Middle Ages, lace making became such an important industry that it entered strongly into the economic situation of the times. Also, during this time, a painter's reputation rested partly on his skill in painting laces, and the wonderful detail of old lace is best preserved in portraits.

Among notable examples of this is the exquisite workmanship shown in lace ruffs and collars worn by ladies of the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries. Their calm, placid expressions contrast with the delicate grace of laces on their voluminous gowns. Their hands are folded in such a way as if unconsciously to show their beautiful lace cuffs.

Laces this season are for the most part dyed in clear, bright hues such as almond green, like the soft green underside of a leaf, and moss rose pink. Orchidee is the name of a luscious tint that the French seem to make better than we do. It is a lavender tint with a lot of pink in it and is often used with steel or silver lace.

In fact, lace this season has taken an extremely adaptable turn and is combined with almost everything, from beads and silver tissue to fur. Pale gold lace and kolinsky are very smart, while silver lace encrusted with beads is used in long, sweeping panels over sheath-like slips of satin or velvet.

Many bridesmaids' dresses are in lace.

as indeed are a big majority of the daintiest summer frocks. On very hot days they may not feel cooler than anything else, but they certainly look cooler, which is always an asset.

Dainty summer laces are best over ecru or flesh for the girl, while for the older woman a darker color should be chosen. As a rule it is more becoming to her, and it undoubtedly makes an effective background for the delicacy of the lace. Then, too, black lace over white satin is stunning for the woman who possesses slender lines.

Among the combinations which show the versatility of lace, I may mention filet over chiffon, Val. lace and fine net together, or metal cloth and lace. Another smart and new note is seen in the use of lace with applications of organdie flowers and leaves.

The use of lace with crepe back satin is effectively carried out in "Fickle Jade," the frock I am showing here which relies on amusing elephant ornaments of jade to catch its folds at either hip. The frock is white, and cream lace falls over either arm to simulate a sleeve, hanging down in panels which fall longer at the front than at the back.

The frock is made over a flesh-colored underslip and shows an interesting treatment in its straight front panel which is split straight down at the front with its fullness drawn over to either shoulder to leave the becoming "V" neckline. Below this the folds draw in softly about the figure and the skirt portion drops in a point much longer at one side. A short cape of satin falls from the shoulders at the back, ending just about the waistline.

The seated figure at the top of the page poses cream lace over flesh satin and binds its lace in flesh charmeuse. Pale pink chiffon gives added softness, for it forms the blouse foundation and appears again beneath the lace at the girdle. It emerges at either side in long sash ends which blend with panels of lace, all combining to give the frock its smart uneven line. A lovely touch of pastel color appears in

chartreuse and silver leaves at the girdle. The Chinese figured black lace frock to the left, is just the type of smart dinner dress that every well-assembled wardrobe should contain. It is chic and becoming in its material alone.

Lace is the most adaptable of materials. On the youthful person it is extremely youthful, and it imparts an air of sophistication when worn by the more mature woman. For the youthful person the lace in itself need not be so handsome. If it is fragile and soft this is sufficient for the young girl. Good looking lace is more of a necessity for the older woman.

Dyed laces, too, are very smart this season. Lovely bright colors are worn.

In this all-black lace frock, the circular overskirt drops longer at one side, while black nailheads on elastic confine the girdle. Elastic has come into great prominence of late. In the simple frocks which have figured so largely this season it plays an invisible though important role, for it is used in most of the dresses which fall in a bit to a lowered waistline instead of dropping straight from the shoulder.

The green creation at the top drops its emerald lace over a flesh slip and girdles the whole in green satin and green beads. The sleeves are cut on straight kimono lines, except that they allow alluring tag ends to continue down and float behind as the wearer walks. The front lace panel is a bit shortened, while all about this the lace drops longer than the underslip.
