DRASTIC ACTION EXPECTED IF MINE CONFERENCE FAILS

CHICAGO, Aug. 5.—With possible peace in sight in the coal strike, federal and state officials today were withholding action calculated to prevent a resumption of production, but continued preparations for such a contingency should the projected settlement prove unworkable.

SAN ANTONIO, TEXAS, Aug. 5.—Formal motion to strike the name of James B. Ferguson from the list of the democratic ballot as a candidate for United States senator has been filed with Chairman Frank C. Davis of the state democratic executive committee by Judge John W. Gaines of San Antonio. This is in line with the declaration of intention made by Judge Gaines last week and is a further link in the efforts being made to have the state democratic executive committee at the session to be held in Dallas Monday nullify the primary results of July 22, in so far as Ferguson was concerned, by depriving him of the right to be considered an aspirant for the place now held by Charles A. Culberson.

FIRST BAE COTTON SOLD AT WACO NETS THE OWNER \$429.72

WACO, Aug. 5.—The first bale of cotton for this year was sold at auction today for sixty and one-half cents a pound. It weighed 545 pounds and classed strict middling. The bale was bought by the Waco cotton exchange and resold to the Miller cotton mills for 25 cents a pound. The Y. M. R. L. gave a bonus of \$180 to the grower, making the bale net him \$429.72.

KENTUCKY VOTERS IN FIVE DISTRICTS SELECT CANDIDATES

LOUISVILLE, KY., Aug. 5.—Kentucky voters in five of the state's eleven congressional districts were today casting ballots to go on the ballots of the two major political parties at the November election. In the other six districts there were no contests on either side. It was expected that a heavy vote would be polled by the republicans in the third and tenth districts where there have been bitter fights in the past.

SIX MEN ARRESTED CHARGE VIOLATIONS OF OPEN PORT LAW

DENISON, TEXAS, Aug. 5.—Six men were arrested in Sherman last night and charged with violation of the open port law, according to a report from Fort Worth. It is alleged that the men intimidated a non-union worker employed by the St. Louis and San Francisco railroad, the report states. The men under arrest are: Claude Atkin, Ollie Tatum, Ches Meyers, Peter Johnson, a man named Spraggins and one whose name was not revealed by the police.

DENISON, TEXAS, Aug. 5.—A serious situation has been created here by the attack Friday evening upon C. H. Eggleston, a fireman, by H. F. Orsiddle, a deputy United States marshal. Action by the "big four" brotherhoods at this point is threatened as a result of the attack, it is believed.

GOVERNOR NEFF SAVES THE LIFE OF ERNEST VICKERS

PORT WORTH, Aug. 5.—Though saved from the gallows just 18 hours before he was to die, Ernest Vickers, convicted murderer, was spared by Governor Neff. Vickers was convicted of murdering a man during an attempted holdup, still occupied the death cell in the county jail here Friday night when he was moved until a formal mandate, commencing the sentence to life imprisonment, is received from Governor Neff. The sentence was commuted to 10 years and the execution was for 11:30 a. m. today.

ESTIMATE 1500 TYPHOON VICTIMS NEAR HONG KONG

HONGKONG, Aug. 5.—Wednesday night's typhoon at Sawtooth north of here, was the worst in the history of that city. Bodies are floating amid the wreckage everywhere in the harbor. Nearly every house in the city was damaged. A flood following the wind drove in from the sea, and the water was so high that it is believed at least 5,000 lives were lost in the typhoon at Sawtooth. Telegraph lines between Hong Kong and Swatow are down but details of the disaster were brought here today by steamer. The storm broke at 10:20 Wednesday night and gathered force until dawn, when it was blowing, leading death and destruction in the city and harbor. The death list is placed at 5,000.

HIGHWAY MEETING ASKS LEGISLATION TO AID THE WORK

GALVESTON, Aug. 5.—Enactment of necessary legislation to empower the state highway commission to designate, build, maintain and operate highways, was proposed in the report of the legislative committee of the Texas highway association unanimously adopted by the convention here today. Resolutions were adopted asking the legislature to call a constitutional convention in view of the inadequacy of the present highway laws, opposing any increase in the raising of funds for road construction by increasing motor vehicle license fees, a tax on gasoline used in motor vehicles, an ad valorem tax as may be required to comply with the federal road funds act, a revision of road and traffic laws; and a modification of the act regarding the operation of motor trucks.

GRAHAM, TEXAS, Aug. 5.—Barley Gaudin is in jail here this morning charged with shooting a local barber by the name of Denning, the bullet making effect in the right side. The wound is not necessarily fatal. An examining trial will be held today. Particulars of the shooting are not available at this time.

FRANCE TO BEGIN IMPOSING PENALTY AGAINST GERMAN

PARIS, Aug. 5.—The French government today ordered into effect the penalties against Germany for failure to pay in full the installment on the pre-war debts to French citizens.

NO MILITARY ACTION IS CONTEMPLATED IN MOVEMENT

PARIS, Aug. 5.—Premier Poincaré today notified the German ambassador at Paris that a series of measures to conserve French interests against a lapse in Germany pre-war debt payments would be put into effect which have been jeopardized by the German refusal to meet the 2,000,000 pounds installment of the payments to French citizens due August 15.
