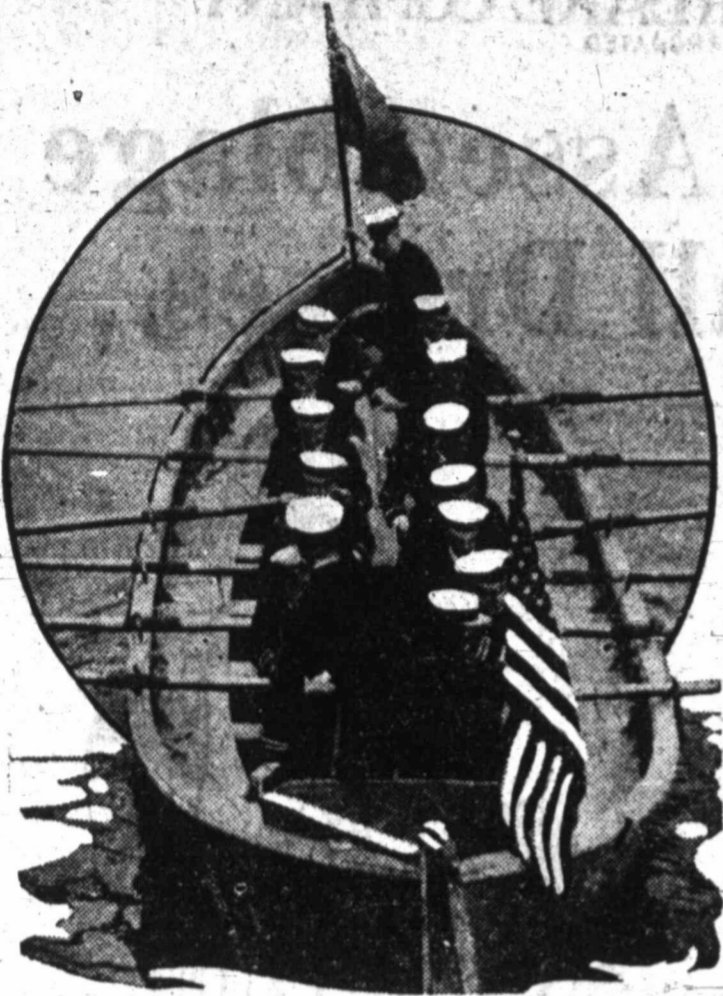

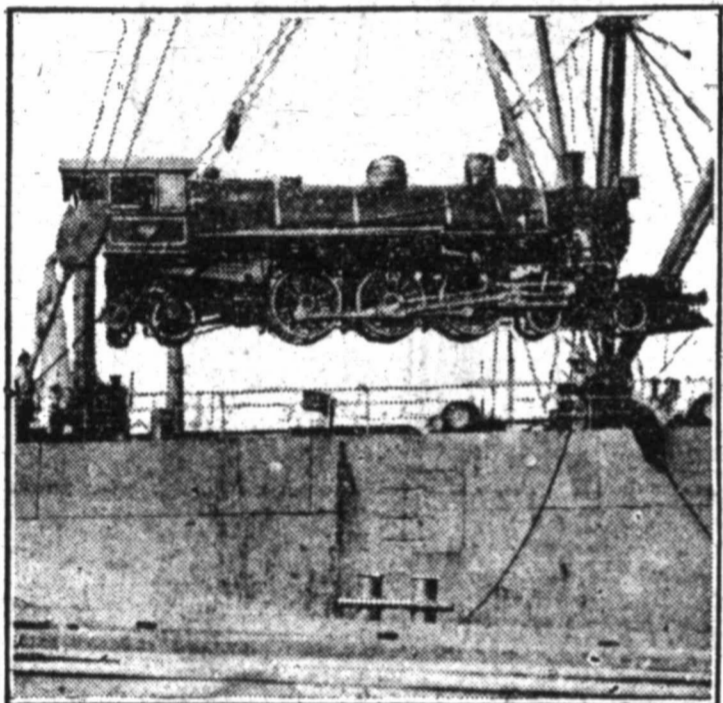

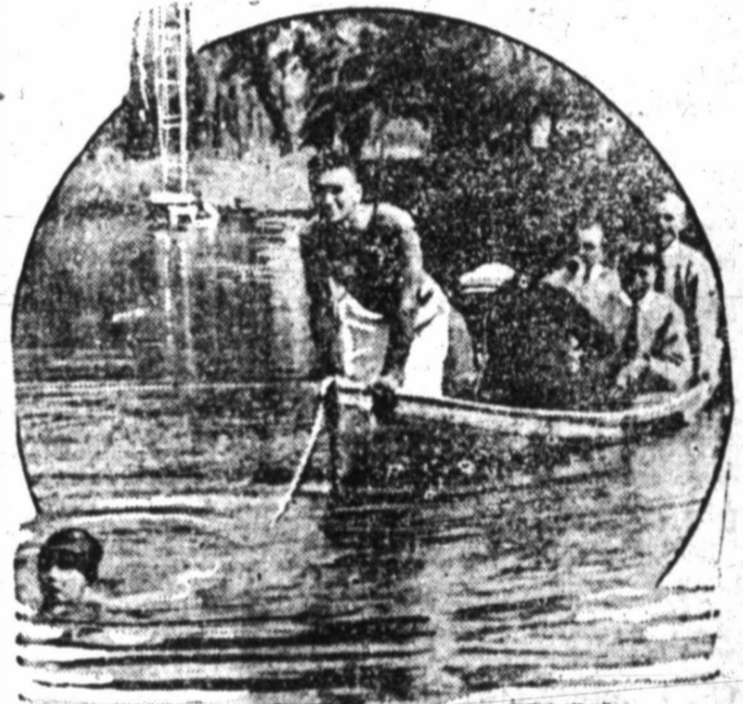

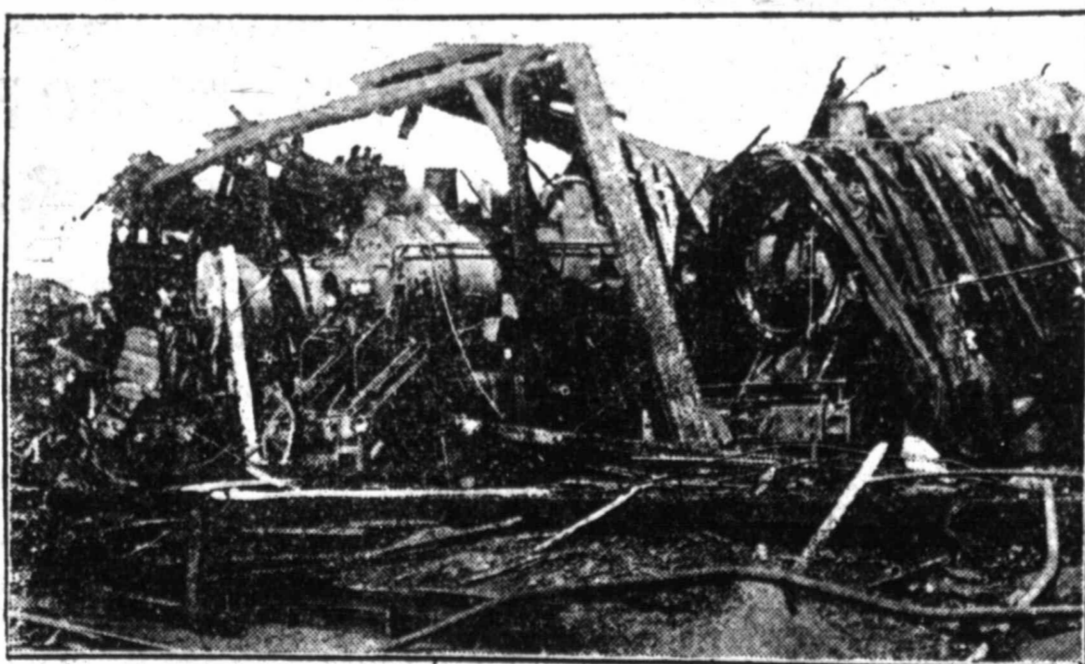

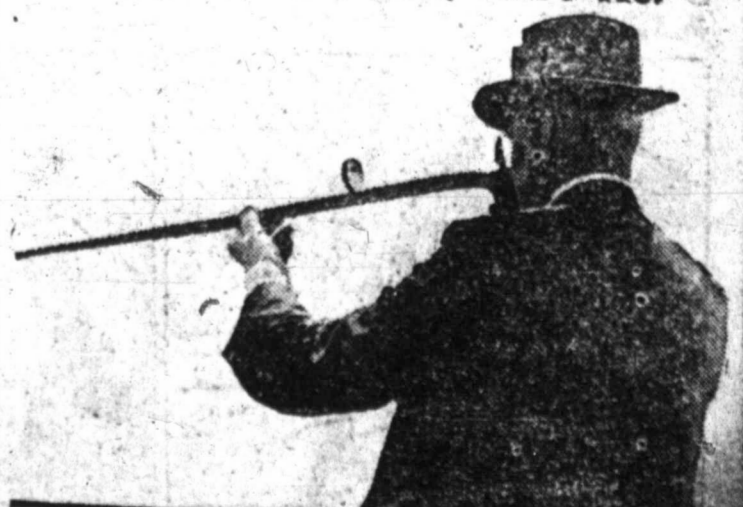

COMPANION AVERS THAT HI-JACKING WAS NOT MOTIVE

BELLEVUE YOUTH SAYS SULLIN HAD SHOT AT THEM BEFORE THE KILLING.

LOCAL MAN STILL PRISONER IN JAIL

A. Allman Remains in Critical Condition As Result of Bullet Wound.

HENRIETTA, TEXAS, Aug. 22.—A companion of the victim who was killed in a shooting affair near Bellevue Sunday night, avers to officers, according to the latter's statement, that the motive was not the motive that prompted them to stop A. L. Sullin of Wichita Falls just before the affair.

The youth's name has been withheld but officers state that he has not been placed under arrest. A. Allman, who was mortally wounded, is still in a serious condition and although he showed some improvement Monday night, doctors stated that his condition was critical.

A. L. Sullin of Wichita Falls, connected with the sales department of the Magnolia Petroleum company of that city, remains a prisoner in the city county jail. Last Tuesday afternoon an effort was being made by attorneys from Wichita Falls to have a bond agreed upon.

The third member of the automobile party which stopped Sullin last Sunday evening stated that he ran from the scene when Sullin fell. He told officers that Sullin had passed them on the road and that at that time they had been shot at. He said they turned around in the road and repeated Sullin and then came back and met them.

According to the officers no arms of any nature were found on the body of Hester or Allman. The third companion states that they had none.

Mr. Sullin is a married man and resides with his wife and two children at 1420 Collins street. He has been a resident of Wichita county for many years and has been connected with the Magnolia Petroleum company practically all the time he has resided there.

For several years he acted as the commissioned agent of the company in Burkburnett and was transferred to the Wichita Falls office two months ago.

MILITARY REPORT SAID TO EXONERATE LIEUT. PAUL BECK

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—Secretary Weeks has received a voluminous report made by the army board of investigation into the killing of Lieutenant Colonel Paul W. Beck by former Judge Jean Day of Oklahoma City early last April. The secretary was today said he had not read the report, but it was indicated that the army officer was found by the board to be not guilty of misconduct.

Reports that the investigators had recommended that evidence collected should be given to civilian authorities with a view of reopening the case in civilian courts for trial of former Judge Day could not be confirmed.

SECRET HEARINGS ARE CONDUCTED BY OFFICERS

OKLAHOMA CITY, Aug. 22.—Lieutenant Colonel Paul Ward Beck, one of the army's foremost fliers and commandant of Post Field, Oklahoma aviation station, was slain here early on the morning of April 4 in the fashionable home of former Judge Jean P. Day, wealthy barrister and oil operator.

Day admitted to a coroner's jury that he killed the officer when he returned home after escorting to their residence a number of guests who had attended an informal party in honor of Lieutenant Colonel Beck and found the aviator attempting to assault Mrs. Day. The verdict of the jury exonerated Day and recommended that no criminal action be taken against him.

At the same time an army board of inquiry from Fort Sill was conducting an independent investigation, a report of which was forwarded to the war department and was said the secretary of war expressed dissatisfaction with the report and several weeks later another board, composed of ranking officers at Fort Sill conducted secret hearings in the federal building here.

It is a report of this second investigation that now is in the hands of Secretary of War Weeks. Since the tragic relations as well as officers and men who served under Lieutenant Colonel Beck have declared that the coroner's verdict was unjust.

WAS TOO WARM FOR A CREW OF BRITISH NOVICE NAVIGATORS

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 22.—The "strike" of the crew of the British steamer Mexican Lady, which came into port at Beaumont, Texas, late yesterday, manned only by Captain Griffith and his three officers, was caused by the lack of electric fans aboard the vessel, according to Neal M. Leach, manager of the J. H. W. Steele company, agents for the vessel.

The Mexican Lady, laden with a cargo including coal, cleared from New Orleans last Saturday en route to Vera Cruz, according to Mr. Leach, the crew of the steamer is composed of novices navigators from London who were unaccustomed to the brilliance of the sun in the tropical latitudes and the temperature increased so did their discontent.

"They quit work somewhere off Beaumont and the captain and his officers had to take the ship in," Mr. Leach explained, adding that everything is all right now. "We have equipped the ship with electric fans and the crew is willing to work."

It is understood here that no charges will be lodged against the strikers.

NINE MEMBERS OF CREW DISCHARGED FROM VESSEL

BEAUMONT, Aug. 22.—Of the Mexican Lady's crew of 14, nine were given discharges and paid off this afternoon after an investigation of their refusal to work when the vessel was en route from New Orleans to Beaumont.

British Consul R. E. Crossland has advised the crew that their sole "kick" against the accommodation of the ship is without grounds, Captain James Griffith of the Mexican Lady stated today when he went ashore to get the funds to pay off the crew. Another crew will be signed at Port Arthur. The five men who remained loyal declared they were satisfied with the quarters and wished to remain under Captain Griffith. Mr. Wilson, marine superintendent of the Steel Steamship company, owners of the ship, took his turn at watch with the ship's officers on the trip to Beaumont.

ONLY WORTHY LEADERSHIP IS BASED ON RIGHTEOUSNESS JUDGE KAY TELLS HIS CLASS

The only leadership worthy of man's confidence and following is based on righteousness, Judge John C. Kay told his Bible class at the Olympic Theatre Sunday morning. There 155 present, Judge Kay said: The lesson this morning is about leadership. How are we going to know a real leader when we look for him? There have been many in the world, both in sacred and profane history, but the public always know when he comes along. They may get fooled with many a one that is not a leader but, when a real one comes, they know it. You are helpless in the presence of a leader. Oh! Oliver Cromwell goes down to the parliament; they didn't suit him in England, and he said: "You all get out of here and give way to men that are honest," and they got out. Leadership, to be good leadership, must be a leadership that feels warm toward humanity and, no man is fit to lead unless he has a heart that doesn't beat in an honest, strong sympathy for all his fellowmen. That's the reason I don't take up a hundred little rows and riots, that are going around this country, with this class. It is because I respect the opinions of other men. And, at times, I sometimes find that they are right and that I was wrong. You have to do that. You, young men, did you know that these through opinions are mostly peculiar to youth? Parents overlook it in you when you as a boy have an immense strong opinion, but they won't in men, because with us, it is a narrow doctrine, and they have got a suspicion that I know what I am talking about. We don't want to bring into our class any of these factional troubles, anything like that. We are not here for any such business. And, I wouldn't be here at all if I didn't love every member of this class and every man that comes in here; hoping that, in my poor way, I may do him at least some little good. And every man is welcome to come and no man is compelled to accept my views about things. How are you going to tell a big man when you see one? Why, it's easy. Look at some of these fellows in the Bible. Let's take a look at Abraham. His cowboys got in a row with another great cowman's cowboys over a water hole, like there has been done many a time right here in Texas. Abraham says: "Now, don't let's have any row. The whole country is before you, if you want to go east, I'll go east, and if you want to go west, I'll go west. What are you going to do with a man that's that big? Now, many of you ever got up on the scales that weigh that kind of a man? It is no wonder that Abraham is respected in all nations as a great man. And, what would you do with a man like that? Now, this man Ezra, in this lesson, was doing an important thing that we are so apt to miss the effect of. He never said anything about making some new laws; he never had any platform; he didn't denounce anybody; but he says: "We are going to take the laws, the statutes and the judgments that we have got and enforce them."

horsesmen to help us against the enemy in the way of a sinner. Learn something from me, men! The man that said that lives in history, and in song, and in story. But, old Napoleon, who said that God was on the side of the heavy battalion, died on a desert island, with a broken heart, and with no hope, and no help. Of course, there ought to be no operation, but a man ought never send for the army to do something that he could do himself. That's what I mean. I was ashamed to stand for the soldiers. Why? Because it would show that he had no faith in himself and no faith in his Maker. Learning on somebody else. I said the politician was satisfied with the majority, but the greatest of all leadership was the Master. He spoke, not about minorities, not about majorities. He had no army, no navy. He had no constable nor magistrate, but he thought that was sublime thought, not about majorities, but He arose to that height which is beyond the conception of man, and said: "There are ninety and nine that are safely in the fold, yet there remaineth out in the frosty mountains one, that I must go to lest he perish." That's the most sublime thought, I think, in the New Testament; or one of the most. That He was not willing that even one should be lost. And His religion and His gospel is not for the rich; it is not for the poor; it is not for the educated, or for the ignorant, but it is for everyone, that whoever should believe on Him should not perish. There's a platform not made for a faction, not made for a few, not made for a majority, but broad enough and basic enough to carry to safety the soul of all men and of every man. Then, how little does a man become, as it seems to me, when he comes and speaks of a narrow doctrine, or a narrow doctrine, that has been wrought out by humanity, when he comes to face this doctrine that "my grace is enough for all of you." Men! Get that thought, and when you get that, you come in sight of the only leadership that ever offered to all of humanity redemption. That is the only leadership that humanity has ever had that offered to lead out. Our politics change from age to age, and our law from year to year, and our conceptions of these things change from time to time, but His doctrine that "who believes on Him shall have everlasting life," remains as the one steadfast and sure doctrine; not for a party, a faction, and not for one church, but for all men! And that's my creed, if it can be called a creed, which is as universal as that doctrine is. Leadership? Then there is but that leadership, and if men would accept His gospel, these other troubles would disappear, as I think, and the failure to accept His gospel is the reason that we wander around in the wilderness and follow from age to age, false ideas and false leadership.
