# RECORDS TALK

## FRED K. SMITH

38 Years a Citizen of Wichita County

## VS. W. W. (PAT) MURPHY

3 Years in Wichita County

W. W. Murphy and those supporting him as their principal argument for sheriff represent to the voters of this county that Murphy has saved the county \$100,000.00 in one transaction, that being the guardianship of the business dealings growing out of the several contracts for the construction of the Wichita county roads, and these leaders of the political machine organized under the disguised name of the law enforcement league say that Pat ought to be rewarded for this great saving. So far as this committee has been able to ascertain and diligent inquiry made no one has ever said how Pat saved this money and in what particular regard he saved it. We desire in this connection to review the record.

February 16, 1918, (before Murphy was appointed auditor) a contract with the Womack Construction company for the construction of 108 miles of road was entered into by our commissioners court. This contract was made before the voting of the second bond issue which was for the construction of the paved or more permanent roads.

February 13, 1919, this contract was canceled, a bonus of \$20,000.00 was paid for its cancellation. On July 1, 1919, the commissioners court entered into a contract with the Chico Bridgeport Cement & Stone company of Chico, Texas, for the purchase of certain stone to be used in the building of the Wichita county roads, to be purchased at \$1.25 per ton, an advance of \$100,000.00 to be made to the Chico Bridgeport Cement & Stone company in the nature of a loan to bear interest at the rate of eight per cent, the payment of which was properly secured, money to be deposited in the First National Bank of Wichita Falls, liquidated by credit of 75 cents per ton on stone as purchased until such amount was so received to discharge the \$100,000.00 with interest. This contract was not performed.

At about this stage a meeting of some of the prominent citizens of Wichita county was held and violent protests were filed with the commissioners court protesting their contracts in the building of these roads, our friend Pat Murphy lead these fights as auditor of the county, and such a protest was made from the citizenship of Wichita county in support of their auditor that pressure was brought to bear on our commissioners and this contract and others were modified, and the one with the Chico Bridgeport Cement & Stone company was not performed.

This committee desires to correct an error made in the ad of yesterday's afternoon issue of the Daily Times, wherein they were enumerating some of the audits made by Murphy of books other than those of the county while drawing full salary for an assistant and himself, wherein they named the Petrolia Machine & Tool company as the party for whom the audit was made, when in truth and in fact the committee intended to name the Burkburnett Machine & Tool company, there being no such company as named that we know of.

On July 15, 1919, a contract was entered into by our commissioners with the North Texas Stone company, whose directors are R. E. Huff, G. D. Anderson, J. A. Kemp, R. S. W. Womack, (the Womack who had the first contract) A. S. Goetz, by the terms of which these parties through that company called the North Texas Stone company procured a contract to furnish the stone for the county at \$1.25 per ton and by which these parties procured a loan from the county and a warrant drawn on the county by our friend Pat Murphy in the sum of \$100,000.00, money advanced these parties to open and operate their stone quarry in Wise county, Texas. This money was loaned to these citizens to draw five per cent interest, drawn from the bank by warrant of our friend Murphy, which was under contract by the commissioners theretofore made, was drawing 7.52 interest on the daily balance, secured under contract to be repaid by these parties as follows: 40 cents of the \$1.25 to be paid per ton to be credited on their contract in liquidation until the full amount and interest may have been paid, 85 cents per ton on this purchase to be paid through the auditor's office in cash as each ton of rock was received.

On July 29, 1919, this so-called North Texas Stone company entered into a contract with our commissioners whereby they agreed to furnish the county an additional 50,000 tons (that is in addition to the 250,000 ton contracts above mentioned) of rock at a stipulated price of 95 cents per ton, being an optional purchase which the county was not required to consummate unless needed.

The roads contemplated to be built in Wichita county are almost completed and under this contract to furnish the rock on a credit of 40 cents per ton as performed to date, the auditor's office has recovered and collected only approximately one-third of the \$100,000.00 leaving approximately two-thirds of it unpaid.

One of the commissioners some six weeks ago called upon Pat Murphy for an itemized statement of the condition of the account showing the rock purchased by him as purchasing agent from different stone quarries, (he having purchased some from companies other than the North Texas Stone company) and to date has not received this statement. This commissioner says that at the last session of the commissioners court Murphy walked in with a sheet of paper containing

only these words and figures: "Wichita Falls, Texas, —, 19—, Wichita county to — Dr. for general fund. (Hargrave Printing Co., Dallas, Texas.) 2135 cars stone, 106,750 ton." no auditor's name or any other person's signed thereto, but read to the court in open session and Murphy threw the instrument in the waste basket but was recovered by this commissioner while they were in session.

We find then a political machine organized in Wichita county with many unsuspecting good citizens joining hands in the fight not knowing the real motive of these men who have profited, or had their chance to profit from the building of our roads, through the assistance of our auditor for what—the elevation of Pat Murphy to the sheriff's office and we submit to the good people that they have not done or offered to do any other thing than the elevation of Pat Murphy to the sheriff's office.

Did Pat help these original organizers of this political machine in the way he has handled their account with the county, and their loan of \$100,000.00 to open their business in Wise county to operate their business there for the profit they might make in furnishing of this material to the county, in taking it out of the bank where it was drawing 7.52 per cent interest daily balance by his warrant to them consummating this loan to them of \$100,000.00, at five per cent, do they owe him a political debt and would you expect anything other than for them as good citizens of this county to pay this political debt with the proper opportunity.

We find one of these men acting chairman of the law enforcement league at its organization and with the support of the others living in this county chiming bells for Murphy.

Suppose you ask Murphy if he would have issued a warrant against the county advancing you money to have engaged in an enterprise to furnish the county or any one else material in a business where you and no one else had a profit, and then ask yourself if you would not have organized a political machine to reward Murphy if he had issued a warrant to your favor on the county for \$100,000 to engage in business for profit for yourself, and then ask yourself why Murphy is running for sheriff with the support of these men at the head of this so-called law enforcement league.

### REPUBLICANS CALL LASKER ASSISTANT TO THE PRESIDENT

#### LEADERS RESENT GROWING INFLUENCE OF CHAIRMAN IN ADMINISTRATION.

### PRESIDENT GREAT HAND FOR PLAYING FAVORITES

#### One After Another They Ask For a Time in Good Graces of the Executive.

By CHAS. S. HAYDEN, Washington Correspondent, Wichita Daily Times.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 24.—

Republican leaders in both the house and senate confess to a feeling of some chagrin over the growing influence of A. D. Lasker, chairman of the U. S. shipping board, in this administration. Those who do not fear committing less majestic refer to him rather slightly as "the assistant president" since it appears he has difficulty than any one else in gaining the ear of President Harding and current gossip holds him responsible for some, if not all, the unfortunate blunders in treating the strike situation. Events of the last 18 months have indicated that President Harding "plays favorites." One after another they ask for a time in the favor of the executive, only to give place ere long to some one else who has managed to catch his fancy. It is true that President Harding doesn't follow the good old practice of the orient and either behead or dismiss in disgrace the grand victor, but he longer pleases to him. In fact he may go out and play golf with the erstwhile favorite but the close communion of interest that once bound them together, when once lost, apparently is gone for good.

Along about inauguration time it was Ed R. McLean, newspaper proprietor and international sportsman, who had the president's ear on all occasions. He was in and out of the white house many times during the day and, accordingly, was on every side by those who sought power or social recognition gained through executive favor. If there was a forenoon at golf Mr. McLean was one of them, if there was a trip down the Potomac on the "Mayflower" the McLeans were in the party.

But one day it became noised about that Mr. McLean was slipping. A new star in the person of Brigadier General D. Dawes, then director of the budget, appeared in the firmament. Before long it was Dawes this and Dawes that. Members of congress were appealing to him to help get executive sanction or endorsement for some pet legislative measure or program. And in some instances, he it is known, the applicant's appearance was not made in vain. General Dawes was always found in the white house train. He was carried out to Marion, Ohio, for the retention of his rank and no official function was quite complete without his presence.

Now whether all this palled on him, whether he felt a growing coolness or he merely decided to return to his banking business in Chicago may never be known but one day it was announced that he would resign as director of the budget the star of Mr. A. D. Lasker appeared in the ascendant. He gave a party at his house to drum up sentiment for the ship subsidy with President Harding as the guest of honor and the idea so captivated the president that he demanded congress should pass a bill to do just what Mr. Lasker wanted. In fact, it was given out, that President Harding was so determined on the passage of this measure that it congress failed to enact the desired law it would be called back in extra session and kept right here, right on the job, until it "obeyed its master's will."

The house recess appears to have taken some of the edge off of that demand. In fact the white house seems ready to soft-pedal the ship subsidy but this has not served, as yet, to weaken the entree of Mr. Lasker. He has been at the president's elbow in many of the conferences relative to the strike situation and in one or two instances has served as the executive mouthpiece, telling interested senators what the president would or would not do. Underground gossip has it that it was Mr. Lasker who insisted on the president delivering his address to congress, although Senators Lodge, Watson and others had urged against it as untimely and more likely to delay than hasten a compromise. However, the address was delivered and the president having reconsecrated himself to the defense of the constitution against all enemies both foreign and domestic, is expected soon to reaffirm his faith in the Ten Commandments.

### Activity in the Spinning Industry Slackens in July

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.—Activity in the spinning industry slackened up somewhat during July as compared with June, the number of active spindles hours being reported today by the census bureau as 7,044,977,615, a decrease of 40,000,000 from June. Every important cotton spinning state showed a decline in the number of active spindle hours. North Carolina showing a decrease of 113,000,000, Massachusetts 97,000,000 and South Carolina 96,000,000. In June there was an increase of 125,000,000 active spindle hours over May.

There were 36,943,042 spindles in place July 31, of which 31,976,259 were operated at some time during July, compared with 34,350,924 in place June 30 and 31,877,015 operated some time during June. Of the aggregate spindle hours those in cotton growing states numbered 4,015,648,363, a decrease of 255,000,000 from June, and those in all other states 3,029,329,252, a decrease of 246,000,000.

The average number of spindles operated during July was 32,542,349, or at 87.3 per cent capacity on a single shift basis, while in June the average was 31,802,253 at 84.6 per cent capacity. The average number of active spindle hours per spindle in place for July was 191 compared with 207 in June.

WICHITA COUNTY CLAIMS THE HONOR OF STATE AS HENRIETTA ROAD IS OPENED.

### BURKBURNETT ROAD TO BE OPEN SATURDAY

Entire Pavement to Red River Bridge Will Be Clear On September 2.

Wichita county claims the distinction of having the longest stretch of concrete pavement in the state as the Henrietta road will be open for traffic Friday and from the Wilbarger county line to the Clay county line is a distance of 25.5 miles of the county paved 34.25 miles.

County Engineer J. M. Isbell announced Thursday that workmen were engaged in removing the dirt and obstacles on the pavement and that the Clay county road would be open for traffic Friday.

By Saturday morning there will be an open stretch of concrete road from Wichita Falls into Burkburnett as the dirt will be removed Friday from the last 1900 foot paved near the cemetery.

On September 2 the road from Burkburnett to the Red river bridge will be cleared which will give the traveling public a smooth hard surfaced road all the way to the Oklahoma state line.

The town of Burkburnett has planned an elaborate celebration for September 4 in commemoration of the completion of the road.

### LOCAL CONCRETE TESTS FAR ABOVE STANDARD OF STATE

According to reports received from the laboratories at Austin, the concrete that has been poured on all the roads in this county has tested far above the standard.

Twice each month a sample of the concrete mixed by each machine in operation was forwarded to the state by the county engineer.

The standard for the state is 1,500 pounds pressure to the square inch. The minimum compressive strength of any of the samples sent was 2,000 pounds to the square inch and the maximum 3,500 pounds.

During the month of July 24 blocks were sent to the laboratory by Engineer J. M. Isbell. The blocks are 4 by 8 by 12 inches.

In addition to testing all the concrete poured all material used is tested in the same laboratory.
