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CHIEF RECONSIDERS PLANS TO RESIGN, WILL REMAIN HERE

NEEDS WISHES OF COUNCIL AND FRIENDS TO STAY ON JOB

HAD INTENDED TO REJOIN RANGER FORCE

Councilmen Wednesday Morning Urge Him to Remain With Police Force

Police Chief J. Walter McCormick, who last Tuesday resigned his office, reconsidered the step Wednesday, and will stay on the job.

Chief McCormick had planned to return to his old job with the state ranger force, which he expected to rejoin September 1. He had been in conference with Captain Tom Michman and other officers of the force.

Wednesday morning the chief was called before the council and was told by Mayor Collier that the council had heard of his intentions with great regret, that his services were greatly appreciated, and that the aldermen would be glad to have him continue in his old job.

The question of remuneration was left up to Commissioner Pitts, and while the commissioner made no announcement on the subject when he stated that the chief had agreed to remain, it is understood in city hall circles that there has been a readjustment of the pay question.

Mr. McCormick has been getting \$250 a month since he became chief last April.

A number of citizens Wednesday morning went to the chief and urged him to remain here, and the pressure brought to bear on him in this way is thought to have weighed heavily in his decision to continue here.

Suicides Result Wife's Interest In Home Healer

CHICAGO, Aug. 29.—The body of a man, in the clothing of which the police found a card bearing the name of W. Talcott, missing since last Thursday, was taken from Lake Michigan near the downtown district here today.

Following an investigation of the teachings of A. J. Moore, self-styled "home healer," among whose disciples Talcott's wife was numbered.

Mr. Talcott resigned his position with a manufacturing concern and started a business in the prosecution of Moore, who was fined \$100 in municipal court on a charge of obtaining money from women followers by deception.

Following the Moore trial Talcott instituted a suit proceeding against his wife, but physicians declared her sane. Talcott vanished last Thursday. At first Mrs. Talcott was said to have been grief-stricken, but later expressed the opinion that her husband had not ended his life. The suicide theory first was suggested by police who with coast guards dragged the lake last Friday in search of the body of a man who leaped from an excursion boat.

In the clothing, according to the police, were found identification papers and three bricks with which his clothing had been weighted.

An unsigned notation on a slip of paper found in the clothing read as follows:

"If you do not withdraw your suit against Moore, evidence will be brought against you from six years ago."

The police are without information on which to base an explanation of the note.

Moore, when told of the finding of Talcott's body, expressed surprise and said: "I never expected that it would turn out that Talcott had committed suicide."

"As to a motive, well, there was something a long time back before I came to know him."

Grand League of Protestant Women Secures Charter

AUSTIN, Aug. 29.—The Grand League of Protestant Women, a non-profit "charitable and benevolent" organization, with headquarters at Houston, was chartered by the secretary of state today.

The body is declared to be national in its scope. Mrs. H. D. Morse of Houston is designated as grand president.

The purpose of the organization as stated in the charter is "encouragement and promotion of better, more improved and higher civil, political, social and religious conditions." A similar organization, the American Women, was chartered recently.

Wants America To Be Physician Not Undertaker

LONDON, Aug. 29.—James M. Cox, former democratic candidate for president, whose recent statement suggesting that Herbert Hoover be sent to Europe to straighten out the reparations tangle, has aroused widespread interest, today issued the following statement:

"There is some measure of reassurance in the statement from Washington that the administration will interest itself in the economic affairs of central Europe, even though Mr. Hoover will not be sent here at the present time.

"Let us hope that our services will be that of a physician and not an undertaker."

CHARGES OF ARSON FILED AGAINST 3 MEN OF ELECTRA

Charges of arson were filed late Tuesday evening against Henry Day, T. A. Duns and Clyde Swaburn, all of Electra.

The men were ordered sent to the district attorney by Mayor Collier of Electra following two days' investigation of the affair of last Sunday night.

Three negro shacks and a cafe were burned to the ground and the negro Baptist church caught on fire during the riot which broke out in the city jail when a feeble attempt was made to break the jail and get the negro who was being held there on an alleged charge of assaulting a white woman.

It is understood that the grand jury investigated the Electra incident during its sessions Tuesday. The jury is not expected to report before Friday afternoon.

COUNCIL PASSES NEW ORDINANCE TO REGULATE STORES

MEASURE BELIEVED TO MEET OBJECTIONS THAT COURT PASSED UPON

PROVIDES FOR NAMING BOARD OF REVIEW

Three Citizens to Pass on Applications for Stores in Residence Sections

An ordinance prohibiting the erection of business buildings in a residence district when such buildings are shown to be harmful to the morals, good order, convenience, comfort, prosperity or general welfare of the residents, was passed by the city council Wednesday morning, under suspended rules.

The ordinance is designed to meet the objections to the old ordinance and to correct those features held unconstitutional by the state supreme court. That court held that a business building in a residence section could not be objected to on artistic or aesthetic grounds; the ordinance passed Wednesday is designed to prevent any building that is harmful to morals, good order,

convenience, comfort, prosperity or general welfare.

It is the council's theory that a building that affected the prosperity of a neighborhood could be burned, and that a grocery store or filling station, in a residence section, affects the prosperity of property owners because, as pointed out, it reduces the value of adjacent properties.

Where application is made for a business building in a residence section, it is referred, under the ordinance, to a board of review consisting of three property owners, who have the right to summon witnesses and take testimony as to the probable effect of the store or whatever business is desired to be established. The applicant has the right to appeal to the courts.

The council passed the ordinance as the result of two protests, one against the building of a grocery store by J. E. Gida on Burnett street and another protesting against the installation of a marble works on Grant street near the Sunnyside school. In The Times of Tuesday it was erroneously reported that Ray Black had made the application for the Burnett street store. Mr. Black has a store in another part of the city, and is not connected with the Burnett street store in any way.

The council decided to visit the group of stores at Tenth and Van Buren and the site of the proposed group at Eighth and Brook to determine what steps are necessary to maintain safe crossings and traffic facilities at those points.

The ordinance passed by the council Wednesday appears in full in the legal notice columns of today's Times.

DEARTH OF NEW BOND FINANCING IS IN PROSPECT

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—Investment bankers and bond dealers reported today that there was a dearth of new bond financing in prospect. For three successive weeks new bond offerings have established new low records for the year, the total last week being only \$7,750,000 as against a weekly average of \$100,000,000 in the early spring of the year, and an average today of something under \$50,000,000.

Continuance of easy money rates also has resulted in corporations finding it more profitable to raise money through the issuance of stock in preference to the sale of bonds. Two large railroads, the Illinois Central and the Chesapeake and Ohio, already have chosen this method with a large eastern trunk line reported to be contemplating similar action. The American Telephone and Telegraph company recently announced the issuance of \$11,000,000 additional common stock to take care of business expansion.

CHICAGO, Aug. 29.—Eugene Elsh, star outfielder with the St. Louis club and runner up for the batting championship of the Western league, today was awarded to the Chicago club of the American league in a decision by K. NINE MEN ESCAPE FROM MUSKOGEE THREE RECAPTURED

MUSKOGEE, OKLA., Aug. 29.—Three of the men who made a sensational escape from the Muskogee county jail last night were captured in the vicinity of Claremore this morning, according to the sheriff's office. William Bennett, alleged motor car thief, who led the delivery, was captured 14 miles north of Claremore. George E. Savage and his brother Frank Savage were arrested in Claremore. According to information reaching here the prisoners were taken without a struggle.

MUSKOGEE, OKLA., Aug. 29.—Nine prisoners who escaped from the Muskogee county jail here last night after a sensational break were still at liberty early today with pursuers close on their trail. Five of the men were seen to pass through Coveta, 31 miles northwest of Muskogee, at 10 o'clock last night in a stolen motor car. The third had taken since their escape at 6:45 o'clock. One car was returned to the driver at the outskirts of the city. The other was wrecked at Spaulding bridge on the Okmulgee road, where a third was forcibly required.

Officers believe the men are headed for Tulsa where William Bennett, leader of the fugitives, has relatives. Four of the prisoners apparently took another direction from the bridge. Twenty-eight prisoners refused to leave when Bennett, after throwing papers to the warden, called Natley, opened every cell door.

GREAT BRITAIN SHIPPING GOLD TO UNITED STATES FOR INTEREST PAYMENT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29.—Great Britain is shipping gold to this country in preparation for the interest payment due on the British war debt to this country in October, according to a report to the commerce department today, from Consul General Robert P. Skinner at London.

Quoting Sir Robert Horne, chancellor of the exchequer of Great Britain, the report said: "Gold has been withdrawn from the reserve for the purpose of shipment to the United States of America in connection with the dollar requirements of the government, more particularly the approaching interest payment on the British debt to the United States government. Of the total of about \$42,000,000 of gold imposed by this country during July approximately \$15,000,000 came from Great Britain in round numbers. \$19,000,000 of interest on the British debt is due during October. The balance of \$25,000,000 being payable on October 15."

MEXICAN MESSENGER AND COUSIN ARE ARRESTED IN CONNECTION WITH THEFT

LAREDO, Aug. 29.—Juan Salinas 17 years old, messenger for the National Exchange bank here, with a cousin, is in jail at Nuevo Laredo charged with abducting with funds amounting to 4,000 pesos Mexican gold which Salinas was sent to deliver to a commission broker there. Salinas was found bound and gagged this morning. When questioned, the police said Salinas told a plot to kidnap him and two cousins to abscond with the money. One of the cousins was arrested and the other is being brought to Nuevo Laredo from Tampasco, where he was found, police reported. Whether the letter cousin had the 4,000 pesos said to have been entrusted to him for hiding was not reported.

'SAUCE' ETC., SAYS JUDGE

INDIANAPOLIS, IND., Aug. 29.—It's a poor rule that doesn't work both ways, Federal Judge Francis E. Baker of Chicago declared when he granted an injunction to striking railroad shophmen. His announcement was predicated on the basis of equal rights for both sides after the railroad executives had secured an injunction restraining employees from interfering with business of the road. The strike declared that if they couldn't interfere with "the business of the road" then the carriers couldn't interfere with their picket lines. Judge Baker upheld their contention.

HEARING ON PLEA FOR SPECIAL JUDGE IN OKLAHOMA CASE

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., Aug. 29.—The state supreme court today granted an alternative writ, ordering District Judge Mark L. Bosarth to show cause why a mandamus petition filed by Governor J. B. A. Robertson to disqualify him as trial judge in the case charging him with accepting a bribe, should not be granted. Final hearing on the mandamus action was set for Monday, by which time Judge Bosarth's answer is expected to be filed.

Jones for a five cent judgment against the local street car company because of alleged failure to return extra money placed in a cash receipt box. Verdict for defendant. Cost to plaintiff \$5.

NINETEEN BUILDINGS IN OKLAHOMA TOWN BURN

DRUMRIGHT, OKLA., Aug. 29.—Fifteen business buildings and four residences at Slick, 10 miles southeast of here, were destroyed by fire early this morning when a blaze starting in a rooming house got beyond control and spread to adjoining buildings. For a time the entire business section of the town was threatened. Property loss is estimated at about \$150,000. No estimate of the amount of insurance carried was available. The fire is under control. Fire companies from Sapulpa and Bristow responded to calls.

MEMBERS OF GUARD RETURNING TO SCHOOL

DENISON, TEXAS, Aug. 29.—Thirty-three members of the national guard units encamped here have been granted furloughs to return to school this fall. Colonel C. W. 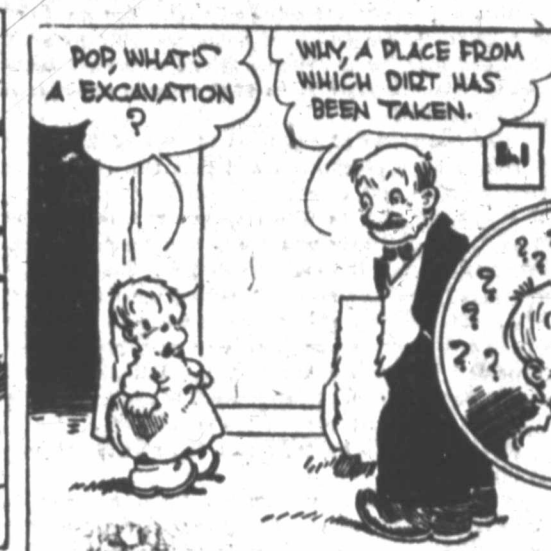

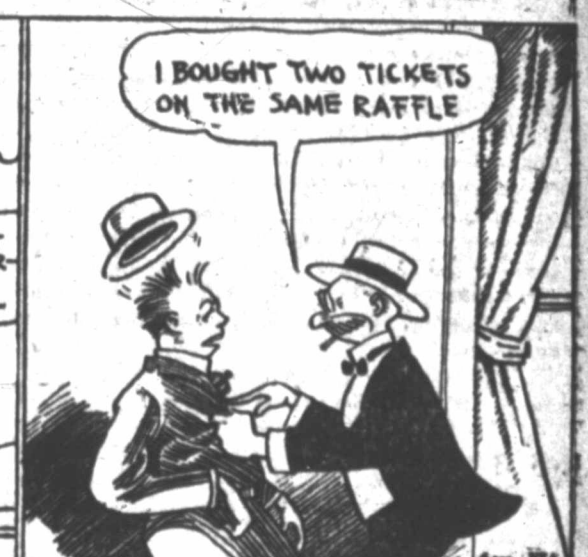
