





### GREAT BRITAIN SHIPPING GOLD TO UNITED STATES FOR INTEREST PAYMENT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.—Great Britain is shipping gold to this country in preparation for the interest payment due on the British war debt to this country in October, according to a report to the commerce department today, from Consul General Robert P. Skinner at London.

Quoting Sir Robert Horne, chanceller of the exchequer of Great Britain, the report said: 'Gold has been withdrawn from the reserve for the purpose of shipment to the United States of America in connection with the dollar requirements of the government, more particularly, the approaching interest payment on the British debt to the United States government.




