Banquet Honors Outstanding Citizens

Friona's outstanding citizens for 1969 were honored last Saturday night at the annual Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture Banquet.

Louis Welch was honored as the Chamber's "Man of the Year," Mrs. Robert Alexander was chosen "Woman of the Year," and Mrs. Cleo Gauna, of Gib's Cleaners was cited as "Most Courteous Employee."

The committee which selected the "Teacher of the Year" from the Friona School system came up with a novel choice when both Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Hodgson were chosen. Hodgson teaches in high school, and Mrs. Hodgson teaches in junior high. Both work with the speech students in extra-curricular activities.

Grady Nutt, professional entertainer, had the near-capacity crowd in stitches, as the main speaker. Nutt gave a humorous description of himself as a youngster, telling about the most frustrating experiences he encountered along the way.

Holding degrees from Baylor University and Southern Seminary, Nutt attended school in Amarillo, and later at Wayland College. "I wanted to be an athlete in the worst possible way and that's about the kind of athlete I was," he said.

Nutt had the audience in tears with stories of his school experiences from high school through the seminary, and threw in several jokes on Baptist ministers. (He is an ordained minister, and filled the pulpit on Sunday at Friona's First Baptist Church.)

The speaker wound up his talk by challenging those present to work together to help the community grow and progress. "You must coax those who are

slow to accept change into going forward with you," he said.

New directors for the Chamber were installed. They are Dr. Jon M. Roden, Carl Schlenker, Ralph Shirley and Marc Houser. Holdover directors are W. Doyle Elliott, Steve Messenger, W.D. Buske and Dale Smith.

Retiring directors are Wesley Barnett, John Bingham, D. C. Herring and Paul Fortenberry.

Messenger will serve the Chamber as president during 1970. Smith is vice president and Houser is secretary. Elliott is the retiring president. Messenger served as vice president and Smith as secretary.

FOR HUB FIRM

"Good Deal" Turns Out Stolen Property

What started out to be a good buy on farm chemicals by West Hub Gin last week turned out to be stolen goods.

Leo Ruzicka, manager of the company, said he was given the opportunity to buy 100 cases of Atrazine, a herbicide, at a price lower than wholesale. He understood that the party was about to declare bankruptcy, and needed the cash.

Upon unloading the goods, Ruzicka and his employee, John Baca, noticed that some of the boxes had been painted over,

but found the name "Monsanto Ag Center, Dumas" on one box.

Baca called the Friona Monsanto manager, Sonny Brito, and found out that sure enough, the Dumas plant had been hit for 125 cases of Atrazine the previous night.

The man who sold the goods to West Hub Gin was taken into custody and questioned, but was later released. A truck had also been taken from the Dumas fertilizer company.

Law officers in the area are checking out leads in the case.

Card Deadline Moved Up Day

A change in the deadline for making deposits to "Project Christmas Card" has been brought about, due to the fact that Friona State Bank will be closed on Saturday.

The deadline is now 3 p.m. Friday, December 19. All contributions should be turned in to Friona State Bank by that time.

Other stores having deposit boxes should turn them in to the Bank by Friday before closing time.

Proceeds from the project will go to provide something for Parmer County Community Hospital.

Permits Set Sights On \$1 Million

Four building permits were issued by the City of Friona during the past week, for construction amounting to \$46,500.

This represents the total for December and boosts the construction figures for the city for the year to \$969,900—just \$30,000 short of the \$1 million total.

If another \$30,000 in permits are issued before December 31, it would mark the second straight year for the city's construction to top one million dollars, and the third time in six years, if achieved.

The permits issued during the past week were all issued on December 10, for four homes in the Ridgeview Addition, all in the \$11,000-\$12,000 class.

Hunt Season About Over

After today, only three days remain in the county's pheasant season for 1969, and the word is that the season has not been as good this year as in the past, particularly as compared to last year.

The number of tail feathers turned in to Friona Consumers this year testifies to how hard the pheasants have been to come by. Many hunters testify to going hours without kicking up a single cock.

Many theories have been advanced as to why the "crop" was short this year.

Young Farmers Meet Tonight

The Friona Young Farmers Chapter will hold a meeting Thursday, Dec. 18 at 7:30 p.m. at the Friona High School Agriculture Building.

A program pertaining to cattle pasturing and its tie-in with the local area will be presented. Anyone interested in the subject is invited to attend.

The chapter is planning a short course on beef production for January 12-15. Details on this course will be announced later.

School Holiday Lasts 2 Weeks

School will dismiss Friday for the two-week Christmas holiday period.

Under the new holiday arrangement for Friona schools this year, the mid-term period comes during the Christmas break.

Classes will resume Monday, January 5, giving students a full two-week vacation.

Seventeen residents of Parmer County attended as delegates to the national convention of the National Farmers Organization (NFO) last week in Louisville, Kentucky.

Some 15,000 farmers and

their wives from across the nation attended the convention, including about 120 from the Texas Panhandle.

The group heard Secretary of Agriculture Clifford Harding, and Texas Congressman Graham Purcell among the speakers. Purcell told the group, "You have to sell the residents of large metropolitan areas on your problems as farmers, since that is where the majority of the population, and congressional votes, is going to come from."

Don Kimball of Amarillo, state president of the NFO, was elected to the board of directors of the national organization.

Pause And Reflect

In keeping with their idiotic proposals in the area of politics, some elements of the new left extremists are objecting to the observation of Christmas in our National Capital. The following article is reprinted from the Baptist Standard of December 10, 1969.

We use it in the hope that you will be able to recognize these traitors when they appear in the news media, and will therefore be able to consider them in their true light.

No one can deal adequately and responsibly with the topic of extremism without sooner or later making an effort to identify and characterize various groups and persons that commonly are so classified. It is a risky task.

Nevertheless, if the topic is to be treated in more than a general way, one needs some illustrations. This research is based upon reliable information from the news media and from books written by recognized authorities.

Communist Party, USA: Any treatment of the left perhaps ought to begin with the Communist Party, USA. During the 1960's, it is estimated that the party doubled its membership. It was strong enough to conduct a spring mobilization against the war in 1968, an October Stop the Draft Week, and to have made a major impact upon some of the groups of the New Left.

The New Left: The most controversial radical movement in America today is known as the New Left. Young extremists within this broad category are becoming bolder in advocating violence. The New Left is composed of black, white, and racially mixed groups. The common denominator seems to be protest, rebellion and sometimes anarchy. Common concerns seem to be the war and the draft, civil rights and poverty, the reaction to authority, and the establishment.

Following are several groups which have been a part of the New Left movement:

Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC): Though formed in 1960 as a nonviolent civil rights organization, this group in 1966 elected Stokely Carmichael, succeeded by H. Rap Brown, as its leader and basically adopted the goal of gaining black power through violence. With philosophy and methodology greatly changed, some members drifted off into other movements and SNCC recently had declined in influence.

Students for Democratic Society (SDS): Founded in 1952, today the SDS has become the chief instrument for campus rebellions, riots, strikes, and take-overs. According to the New York Times Service, SDS in May of 1969 had 70,000 members on 350 campuses. In strength and influence, they have been able to smear several corporations in defense business, deny job recruiters for defense industries access to several campuses, and disrupt colleges and universities.

Black Panther Party: Formed in an Oakland, Calif., Negro slum the Black Panther Party has become a nation-wide organization committed to armed black revolution. It claims 2,500 hard-core members in 70 cities. Black Panthers have waged battles with police and attacked the California state capitol. A severe reaction has set in, and the Black Panther movement appears to have gone a bit more "underground" in its operations.

Students Afro-American Society, Black Student Union, and Black Liberation Front: Each of these three groups has similar aims and methodology. They attempt to recruit Negroes from large city slums for enrollment at predominantly white institutions. They seek to force compliance with demands for black faculty additions, black studies, and even separate facilities. All such groups probably number no more than 300,000 out of 7 million Negro students.

National Black Economic Development Conference: Composed of 23 national religious agencies and community groups and organized in 1969, James Forman is the primary spokesman for this organization. The Black Manifesto adopted by the conference, using Marxist language, and Forman's demands for \$500 million, later increased to \$3 billion in reparations from churches and synagogues, has been well publicized.

Revolutionary Action Movement (RAM): Organized in 1963, it is composed of militant blacks dedicated to the overthrow of the capitalist system in America and the installation of a socialistic system modeled after Red China. RAM operates under tight secrecy, but members have been charged with long-range plans to assassinate high officials and policemen.

Youth International Party (YIP): The members, frequently known as "Yippies," express their aim as destroying "The Man," their term for present government. This group has no major organization and the movement is one that is more a philosophy of protest and ridicule than it is one of action. This group joined the SDS in crippling the Democratic National Convention in Chicago. The major activity is to operate an underground press which has published about 200 anti-establishment publications, many of them obscene.

Progressive Labor Party: This is a youth splinter group from the American Communist Party and was formed in 1962 by persons expelled from the Communist Party because of their stand favoring Red China. It seeks an alliance between students and workers and has been related to the Black Liberation Commission headed by Epton. The organization is committed to wage a ceaseless struggle against "the ruling class" and one of its aims is to get control of the SDS in order to extend its influence.

Young Socialist Alliance: This is a Marxist organization founded in 1960 which aggressively seeks to recruit high school students for members. It claimed about 2,000 members at the end of the last school year. Its goal is the destruction of capitalism and imperialism.

W.E.B. DuBois Clubs: These clubs were organized in 1964 as the "Youth Front" for the Communist Party. They have been particularly active in their efforts to lead students to resist the draft.

What shall be said of all these various groups composing the "New Left"? The similarity of objectives, the rapport among chapters, and the ability to mount massive protests all point to some sort of organized conspiracy directed from a central headquarters. Such a conclusion connecting the New Left with Moscow, Peking, or Havana cannot, however, be proved.

All indications suggest that the New Left does not have a single international sponsor. United States intelligence officials have said as much, although they indicate some financial support may be given to the professional student agitators. This money, investigators say, is "riding piggy-back on a tiger already on the loose."

The entire New Left movement today involves so many different groups that they are not well correlated. If the movement ever became one in purpose and methodology it would have considerable more strength than exists today. Even as it is, it has left its mark on American society, and the end is not in sight.



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SQUAWS STUMBLE

Chiefs Win 5th Place In Tulia Tournament

The Friona Chieftains basketball team won two out of three games at the Tulia Invitational Tournament last weekend, and came home with the consolation championship. The Squaws lost in their bid for a similar trophy.

After dropping a 54-40 decision to tournament finalist Childress, Friona rebounded to beat Idalou, 49-39, and then polished off Slaton, 42-37 on Saturday.

A cold second quarter hurt the Chiefs in their game with Childress. The teams were all tied up, 7-7 going into the second quarter, but the Bobcats went to the dressing room at halftime with a 24-15 lead.

On Friday, Friona was off to a better start against Idalou, and had a 25-19 halftime edge. Although nursing just

a four-point lead, 33-29 going into the last quarter, the Chiefs found the range with 16 fourth-quarter points, including 12 by J.V. Finley, to win by 10 points.

Finley, who also hit four of five free throw attempts, came out as high point man with 20 points on the strength of his last quarter surge, surpassing Donny Carthel by one point.

In the Saturday game, the Chiefs jumped to a 28-18 lead at halftime, and then held off the Slaton Tigers for a five-point lead. Friona's lead was trimmed to just two points, 37-35, going into the last quarter, but Slaton scored only a pair of free throws in the last quarter.

James Weatherly led the Chieftains with 17 points, as the team had different scoring leaders in its last four games.

The two wins lifted the team's season record to 5-6.

The Squaw's caught tourney champion Slaton in the opening round, and fell, 37-28. Falling behind 15-5 after the opening quarter turned out to be more than Friona could overcome. Diane Day's 14 points led the Squaws.

The Friona girls bounced back in the consolation semifinals on Friday, trouncing Clarendon, 53-27. The team had a 29-16 lead at halftime, and coasted from there.

Three players scored in double figures, led by Randle Kelley's 17 points. The team hit 22 of 32 free throw attempts, and the 68 per cent figure was the team's best this season.

Friona came back on Saturday to drop a 52-29 decision to Dimmitt, a team it had beaten the previous Saturday, 45-29 in their own tournament.

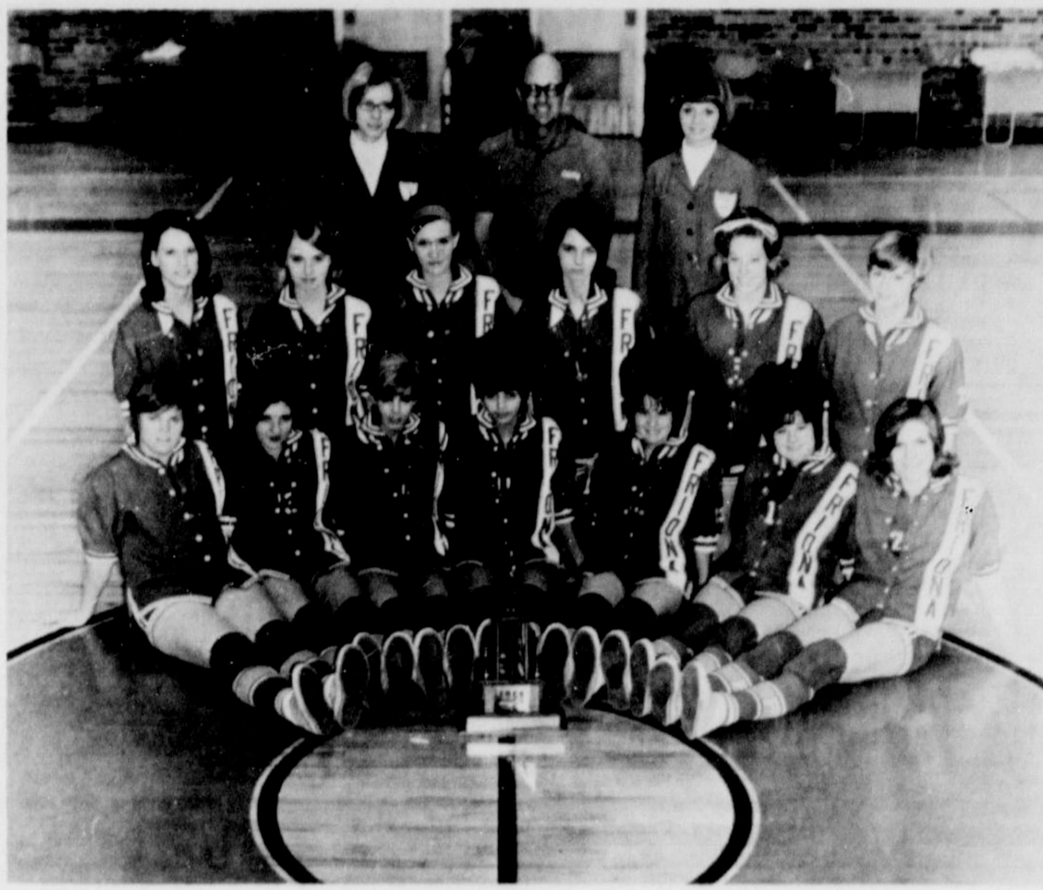
"We just couldn't hit our shots," was the way Coach F.G. Crofford explained his trouble. Although trailing by just six points at halftime, 20-14, Dimmitt got hot in the third quarter and increased its lead to 34-16 going into the final stanza.

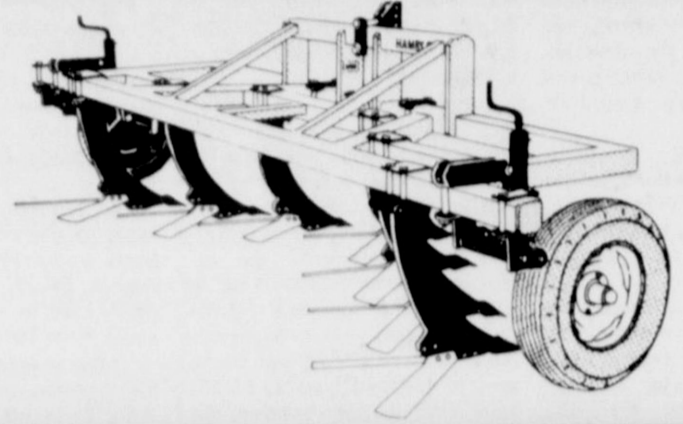

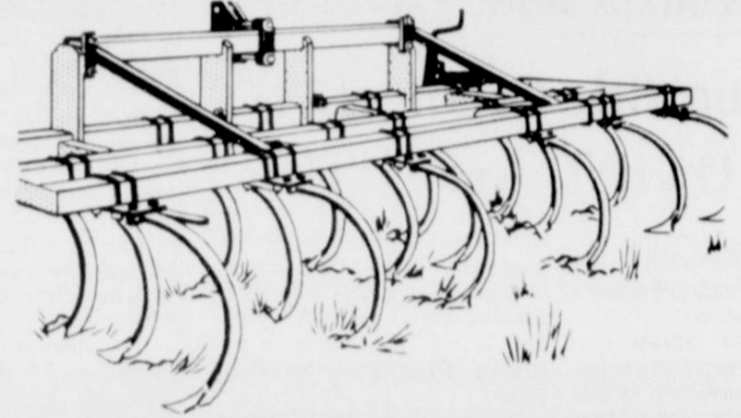

Local Church To Take Part In Fund Raising

Six fire calls were logged during November, only one being inside the city limits. This was at the Jim Rule rental property at 703 E. 9th, for an estimated loss of \$500.

The police department reported 27 arrests. Seventeen of these were for traffic violations: seven on drunkenness; two for vagrancy and one for driving while intoxicated.

The City Library completed moving into its expanded quarters in the east side of the American Legion Building during the month. It was reported that visitors and usage of the facility has increased since the expansion.

The city manager attended the annual fall conference of the Texas Municipal League in San Antonio November 9-11.

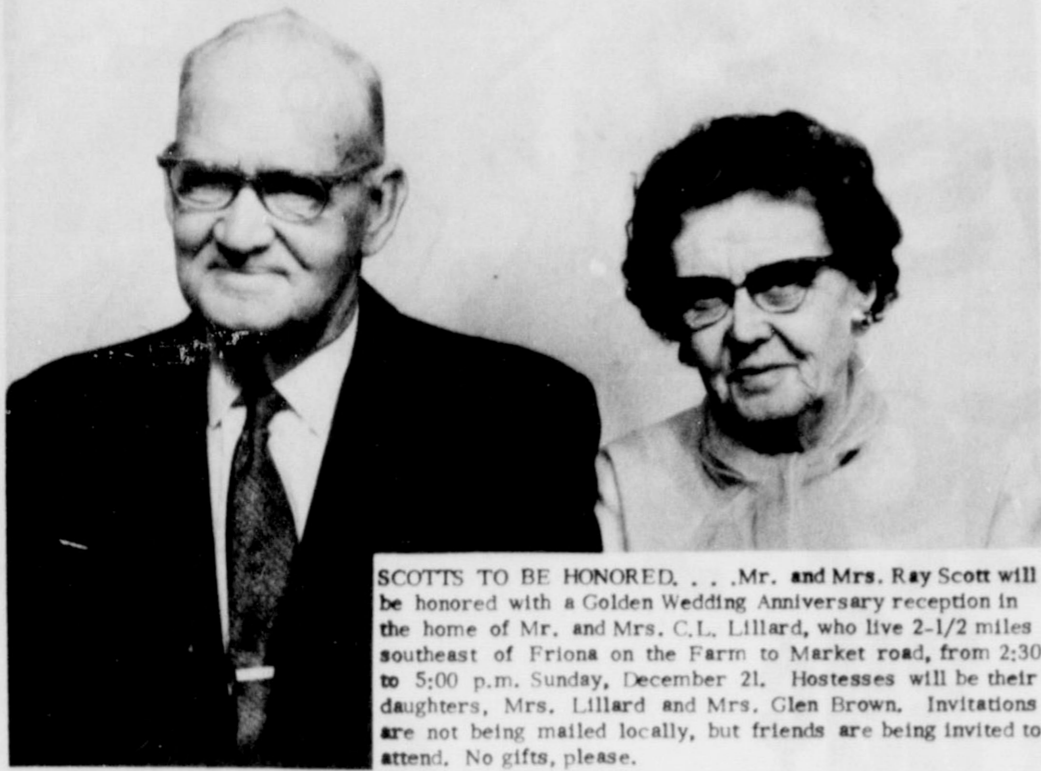

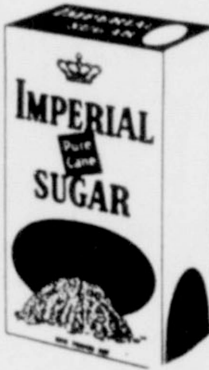
