Chemical Engineer Believes Entombed Miners Are Alive

JACKSON, CAL., Sept. 15.—Dr. L. H. Duschak, consulting chemical engineer of the California Industrial accident commission, today issued a signed statement in which he predicted that the 47 miners entombed for 14 days in the Argonaut mine would be found alive.

"There is ground for assuming that the men underground were not overcome by the poisonous gases from the fire zone and that these gases are not now passing through the parts of the mine in which the men sought refuge," Dr. Duschak's statement said.

"The memorandum of September 11, particularly attention has been given to sampling the gas coming up from the mine through the shaft at the 2400 level. Samples taken at this point are undisturbed by the surface air and represent a mixture of gas from the fire zone and gas from various underground sources which mingle at the lower levels and come up through the shaft of the mine.

"There is no reason for thinking that the movement of air in the low levels of the mine has changed materially since the early stages of the fire."

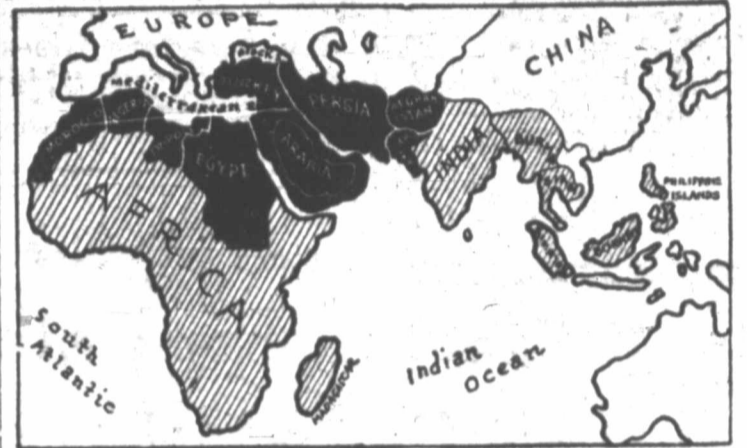

Conclusion of pacts with Mohammedan leaders and rulers in other countries will be easy, and Kemal will see to it that such compact strengthen his position as head of the Islamic world.

At the peace table Kemal will force the abrogation of the treaty of Sevres, signed after the World War, which chopped off much of Turkey's territory.

NEW RULING PUTS DEADLY FANGS ON PROHIBITION LAW

HIGHER COURT CONSTRUES THAT STATE NEED NOT DISPROVE EXCEPTIONS.

TRANSPORTING OFFENSE WITHOUT PROVING INTENT

State Need Not Prove That Sale Was Purpose in Transporting Liquor.

A very recent ruling of the court of criminal appeals on the state prohibition act places a deadly fang in the law which, according to the construction placed on it by local attorneys, makes it an absolute offense when a man is caught transporting liquor.

The new construction placed on the ruling of the court is that the state is not required to prove that the whiskey being transported is for the purpose of sale.

The case in which the ruling was given is cited in Southwestern Reporter 242, page 471.

Heretofore it has been the opinion that it was an absolute necessity for the state to prove that when a man was charged with transporting liquor that the purpose of the transportation was selling the whiskey. The new ruling, it is said, removes this necessity.

The opinion on the case also cites that the state need not further allege in the indictment that the whiskey had in possession transported or sold came under the four exceptions, namely, medicinal, mechanical, sacramental or scientific. The higher court rules that this is a matter of defense and that if the defendant possessed the liquor for this purpose that it behooves him to prove it.

The intent of sale need only be proven under two circumstances, according to the construction placed on the ruling. This must be proven in cases of possession and receiving.

The higher court in writing the opinion on the case states that this has been the construction of the law of the court at all times but that their ruling thus far have been misunderstood.

Three men were charged with transporting liquor. The purpose of the transportation was selling the whiskey. The new ruling, it is said, removes this necessity.

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THREE MEN BONDED FORFEITED IN POLICE COURT FRIDAY

Vagrancy, drunkenness, and gambling were the chief sources of revenue at the police court Friday morning. Officers smart and Gorman interrupted a quiet game Thursday morning which netted the city \$75. There was a \$25 cash bond in each case. Five of the defendants appeared for trial Friday. All three of the bonds were forfeited. Fines on charges of vagrancy and drunkenness amounted to \$15. There were three of each charge on Thursday's docket.

Fried Tomatoes on Delicious Toast

Of Columbia University.

Now that tomatoes are at their best and cheap, one should use them often and serve them cooked or raw at almost every meal. When a tomato is stuffed with meat, or egg, or fried and served with a cream sauce it is a hearty dish for either luncheon or supper. The following recipe supplies all that is needed except a sweet: 8 large tomatoes, butter or bacon fat, 6 slices toast, 2 cups milk, 4 tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1-2 teaspoon salt and 1-2 teaspoon pepper.

Wash, cut tomatoes in halves, roll each piece in flour seasoned with salt and pepper. Fry in butter or bacon fat until a nice brown, and soft but not broken.

Make a sauce by melting butter, adding flour and seasoning; add milk and cook until smooth and thickened.

Toast bread quickly on either side. Dip each slice in the sauce, and
