RECORD'S FIGHT FOR SENATE PLACE STIRS FREILINGHUYSEN MEN

REPUBLICANS SEE DUPLICATION PROGRESSIVE FIGHTS IN WEST.

PROHIBITION ISSUE TO FIGURE IN THE RESULT

Senator's Friends Pin Hopes to His Stand For Dry Act Enforcement.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25.—Tomorrow we are going to see duplicated in the east for the first time a republican primary contest analogous to those which when they have happened in the west have created wide-spread sensations. Also we shall see the opening move of what is going to be the storm center of the "wet" versus "dry" fight in the November election.

This primary which is the last of the year occurs in New Jersey and the information about it that comes from that state to the republican party leaders and others in Washington is startling. It is the effect that the progressive candidate for the republican senatorial nomination, George L. Record, who was regarded a few weeks ago as being almost negligible now in the lineup threatens the "regular" sitting republican, Senator Joseph L. Frelinghuysen, to such a degree that Frelinghuysen's friends are described as being deeply disturbed. The fight between these two men is a duplicate of the fight which has taken place between "reg. lar" republicans and radicals of progressive in Iowa, Wisconsin, Nebraska, North Dakota and elsewhere in the west. Record has the same kind of platform and is much the same kind of man as LaFollette, Brookhart of Iowa, Frazier of North Dakota, Howell of Nebraska and the other progressives who in various western communities have unseated conservative republicans. Record, in fact, is a rather better man than some of these. While the cause he advocates are largely identical with those that have been successful in the west, Record personally has a better trained mind than some at least of the progressives who in the west have ridden to success on these issues.

For Government Ownership.
Record stands for government ownership of the railroads; state ownership of gas companies, street railways and other public utilities; government ownership of the coal fields and for other sweeping measures designed to destroy private monopoly wherever it exists. He advocates also the restoration of the excess profits tax and other higher taxes on the rich. One of his issues has been an assault on

FIRST SECTION DOES NOT ARRIVE UNTIL 1 P. M.

Damage Is Small and No One Was Injured In Slight Wreck Near Childress.

A broken wheel on car No. 26 of the first section of Ringling Brothers and Barnum-Bailey circus train caused the delay in the arrival of the traveling circus in this city Tuesday morning. The first section was scheduled to arrive at 5 o'clock Tuesday morning, but did not pull into the local yards until after noon. Thousands of little tots and grown-ups arose early Tuesday morning and hurried to the Seventh street crossing to watch the trains unload. A large number were still waiting at 9 o'clock when the announcement was made that the first section would not arrive until after 11 o'clock.

One of the wheels on the rear truck of the circus car broke entirely in two, according to advice received here, at a point 13 miles west of Childress at 11 o'clock Monday night. The damage was repaired early Tuesday morning, but in the meantime all the other sections had caught up with the delayed one. Passenger train No. 4 was also held up back of the wreck. No one was injured and the damage was slight.

The first section of the circus train left Childress shortly after 8:30 o'clock Tuesday morning and the remaining sections started at 10 minute intervals thereafter. Local railroad officials stated that the best engines of the division had been sent to carry the trains to this city and that all possible haste would be made to get the trains here as early as possible.

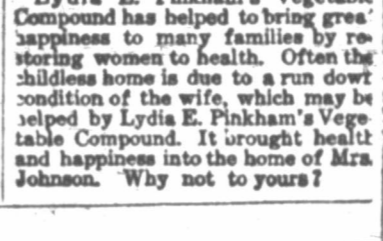

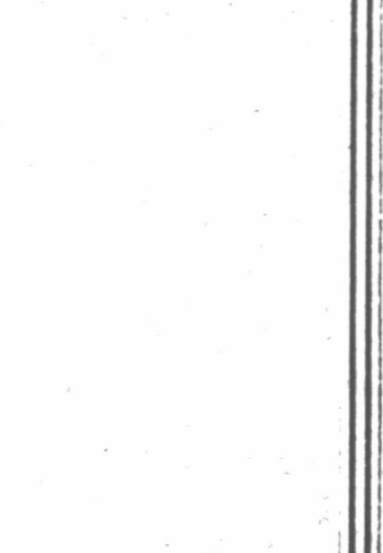

SUNSHINE EATING.
There is no accurate way by which we are able adequately to measure the powerful efficiency back of good humor, cheer and a pleasant, happy frame of mind.

But we do know that the one who emphasizes and exercises these qualities of control may be selected as a leader and a doer of deeds.

I know of no place, however, where an attitude of mind and heart count for more to the individual and to those about him than at the eating table.

Scientific men long ago discovered the effect upon digestion of the thoughts of a person. They proved that unhappy, angry thoughts changed many of the juices that mix the food in the digestive process, and caused them to act as so much poison.

On the other hand, they also proved that pleasant, cheerful thinking while eating, and the dispensing of food through veins of laughter, was a most effective manner in which to "grow healthy, wealthy and wise."

Sunshine eating, let us call it—wherein the eaters take their time and leave their table nourished in mind and heart as well as in body.

Better to eat not at all than to sit down to food in an angry or worried frame of mind.

I like the custom of rendering thanks for one's food in the first place. By it we are placed obedient to a higher power than our own. And then I like stories, happy incidents, cheerful comment and bright conversation to spice my meal.

And to eat alone is almost punishment! On such occasions, however, one may be fortified by a well filled mind and pleasant memories.

The dining room should be the most cheerful in the whole home. It should be flooded with light. And there should be many touches of beauty to smile the food of the day to its task in the body.

If I were an architect, I would specialize on outdoor eating rooms—as open as possible for the warmer months and as sunny as possible during the months of cold and snow.

For I believe in "sunshine eating" in every sense of the word.

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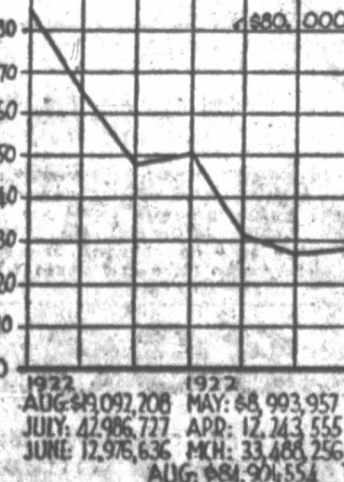

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American Receipts of Yellow Metal Reported by Commerce Department for 13 Months



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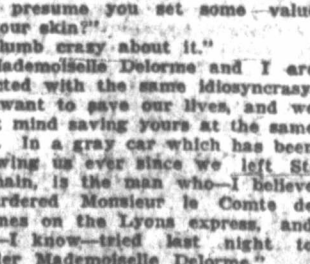
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
