





cotton crop 6,277,000 bales of 500 pounds each, or nearly five times as much as in 1909. The boll weevil's damage averaged 109 pounds

for each acre devoted to cotton culture. Nearly a third of last year's potential cotton crop was destroyed by the weavil.

TEXAS EDUCATIONAL NEEDS.
