

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Dr. House has been experimenting with the anaesthesia for five years. he told members of the association and declared in that period during which he had tried the "twilight sleep" method of securing evidence on a number of criminals and others in his own state, he had "never failed in any attempt to rob the mind of its stored truths."

He is now seeking permission, he told the convention here, to go to Leavenworth prison and carry on these experiments on the inmates of that institution.

Since the market can do a lot of shifting in 15 minutes, plungers will welcome a faster-geared ticker. It brings them closer to the battlefield where their dollars are fighting heavy odds.

The stock ticker was invented by a preacher, Dr. Samuel S. Laws, back in civil war days.

A gold exchange had been established in New York, to adjust the price of gold at regular intervals, thus letting bankers and other business men know what their paper money was worth on a gold board of trustees met each morning, to ad-







# Looking to the Wilds to Replenish Our Larder

RECENT recognition of the value of the whale as a meat producing animal has suggested the idea that certain cetacean species might, for that very purpose, be introduced into the Great Lakes and bred

At first glance such a notion might seem an absurdity, for two reasons. First, whales are too big to make practicable their transportation from the ocean to the lakes; second, they belong to the sea, and not to fresh water.

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When the matter is duly considered, however, these objections disappear.

Whales are all sizes, from the gigantic sulphur-bottom, which is the biggest animal that ever lived, attaining a length of eighty feet and a weight of forty tons, down to the everyday porpoise, whichthough most people are not aware of the fact-is a small species of whale.

Whales, it is frue, are native to the ocean; but they are mammals and not Sehes, and the sea is to them merely water in which to swim-just as you or I swim in it on occasions. Unlike ourselves, they do not come out of it, but they are obliged to rise at intervals to the surface in order to all their lungs with air. Like ourselves, they are air-breathing animals.

There is no reason whatever for suppos ing that whales would not be as comfortably at home in fresh water as in salt water if there were enough of it. There is plenty of it in the Great Lakes, the combined area of which is about equal to that of the Mediterranean. Lake Superior is ever 1000 feet deep in places, and the northern part of Lake Michigan has depthe exceeding 900 feet.

In choosing a species of whale for introduction into the Great Lakes it would be necessary, of course, to consider the matter of food supply. The aperm whale subsists mainly upon cephalopods related to the cuttlefishes, which are not found in fresh water. A like difficulty would apply in the case of the right whale, which feeds on minute pelagic mollusks and crustaceans. Both, however, are impossible by reason of their

BUT there are plenty of fishes in the Great Lakes, and there is no lack of fish-eating whales. One of these, the little piked whale, is found in large numbers along the Atlantic Coast from Labrador to New Jersey. It is about twenty-five feet long when full-grown, and attaine a weight of a ton and a balf.

This whale, known to science as the least rorqual, is a shore-frequenting speeles, avoiding the high seas. It frequents bays, estuaries and other shallow waters in

To obtain specimens alive would not be Sehermen and, because of the damage they do to traps and nets, the fishermen usually kill them, regarding them as a nuisance.

They are hardy animals, and it would surely be practicable to transport living and healthy specimens by rail in suitably constructed tank cars from the Atlantic Coast to the Great Lakes. There they might be expected to breed rapidly, when ence introduced, being freed from the deatructive persecution of their natural enemies, chief among which are the swordfish and the ferocious orce, or killer

If with proper protection; herds -tn the ocean we would call them "schools"of little piked whales were established in the Great Lakes, they might, after a while, form an important source of meat supply. Whale meat is hardly distinguishable from beef, either in appearance or in flavor. When raw it is red, and the fat looks exactly like beef fat. In the markets of San Francisco and Seattle it now sells at ten to twenty five cents a pound, according to cut. Considerable quantities of the mest have been shipped in refrigerator cars to eastern cities from the Pacific Coast. It is now being canned on a large scale at Victoria. B. C. Whale steak, roast whale and whale in other appetizing forms are offered on the menus of some of the best hotels and resraurguts in New York, Boston and Phila-

If little piked whales were successfully bred in the Great Lakes, they would yield valuable products other than meat. Their bides today are worth eight cents a pound for leather. The oil derived from their jaws (the finest known for certain lubricating purposes) sells for \$8 a gallon.

The little piked whale is one of the whalebone whales. But the whalebone, which it earries in its mouth, has no commercial

value, being too small. There is no question of the fact that the early progenitors of modern whales were land animale; but their descendants took to the sea, doubtless because it offered abmore plentiful food supply and, no longer needing legs, lost them. This remark applies to hind legs. The forelegs of whales are represented by their flappers. As if to prove the abovementioned theory, the sperm whale possesses a rudimentary thigh bone. So, likewise, has the Greenland whale, with the addition of a rudimentary tibia.

THE ancestors of all marine mammals I were presumably land entmals. An intermediate condition may be observed in the seals, which live on land to some extent. Save for one reason, which has to do with temperature, fur seals might be successfully introduced in the Great Lakes. They are rapid breeders and, freed from their natural enemies, chief among which is the killer whole, a devourer of the pups, they would multiply at such a rate as to make sealskin before long a cheap fur.


But the winter climate of the Great Lakes region would cutckly freeze them to death. The fur seals, which breed on the Pribylof blands in Bering Sea, escape the winter's

the pups are sufficiently grown, for a swim southward, journeying as far as the latitude

of San Diego, where it is always summer. Nevertheless, it is thought that these same fur seals might be successfully bred in the far southern part of this country-perhaps in Lake Okeechobee, where they would have plenty of water in which to swim. That it is fresh water makes no difference. Recently the United States Fisheries Bureau sucreeded in rearing two fur seal pups from the Pribylof Islands in a tank of fresh water They were perfectly healthy and happy, but when six years old they were attacked by a disease which, most unfortunately, killed

When consideration is given to a project for introducing an exotic species of animal, the question that first arises is whether it will find the climate suitable. Thus, if the Great Lakes were in a southern latitude they would never do for the little piked whale, which belongs to the temperate and southern arctic zone, not ranging further south, it is believed, than New Jersey. But,


as it happens, those "unsalted" inland seas of ours are bodies of cold water, which, save near the surface, has about the same temperature all the year around.

It is worth remembering that all of our domesticated mest-producing animals are of exotic origin. Cattle, sheep, hogs and poultry have all been imported from Europe; the chicken was originally Asiatic, Even our often caught in, the nets and traps of wild surkey of the United States being of a different variety

Production of meat-producing animals in this country is steadily diminishing, relatively to population, and the problem of meat supply for the future is one of utmost seriousness.

It has been suggested that the hippopotamus might help to solve the problem, if introduced and allowed to breed in the bayous and awaraps of Louisians and Florida, where there are more than 10,000 square miles of water and march highly suitable as a habitat for that interesting and valuable animal.

The Beah of the hippopotamus is highly esteemed in South Africa, and when salted and cured is known at the Cape of Good Hope as "zee-koe speck" - meaning lake cow bacon. one of meat per annum. In addition, their hides would be of great value. It would not be necessary or desirable to domesticate them in the ordinary sense of that term. They would take care of themselves, finding such a habitat extremely congenial, and would feed and fatten upon the water weeds.

At the present time the water hyacinth is making an immense amount of trouble in Florida, where the masses of its beautiful but unwelcome vegetation are choking the rivers, killing the fish and seriously interfering with navigation. This plant would furnish an ideal provender for hippopotami, which, while converting it into meat, would get rid of the nuisance to a large extent. Cattle are extravagantly fond of the water hyacinth, wading up to their necks in the shallows and browsing upon it; and it: fe well known that the hippopotamus will feed on anything that cattle will eat.

If properly seeded to water hyscinth and other aquatic plants, the vast areas of bayou and swamp in the Gulf States would be capable, it is estimated, of producing \$100 .-

Attention has been called to the possibility of introducing into this country certain antelopes from South Africa, which, if bred in a sort of semi-domestication. might importantly help out the problem of meat supply. There are in that part of the world about 200 species of antelopes, which are of all sizes, the least of them, only a foot high, being bagged with small shot like a rabbit. There is thus an excellent opportunity for choice, one of the most desirable being the springbok, which would seem to be admirably adapted to arid regions of the

United States. The springbok is extraordinarily fecund. reproducing its species at such a rate that it might soon furnish a great and profitable source of venison supply in the Southwest, Its meat is of a delicious flavor. In Cape Colony it feeds on the parched, shrubby vegetation that covers the plains and seems to be able to go without water for months together. The Hottentots in the old days looked upon the springboks as a regular

source of food and called them their "sheep." The body of the springbok is in color a bright cinnamon fawn, with face, throat and stomach spotless white. Its horns are black and a foot in length, and its eyes very large. Folded flat on the crop is a blase of white bair, which, when the animal is frightened or excited by play, erects itself, standing up like a fan. The spectacle of

standing up like a fan. a number of these fleet and marvelously active creatures displaying the blase and springing repeatedly, as they will do, straight up in the air eight or ten feet, is singular and most fascinating. They bound upward without any seeming exertion, the slender legs held stiff and rigid and, all four feet striking the ground simulta-

neously, fly upward again and again. I'm to fifty years ago the numbers of the springbok in South Africa were so prodigious that the frontier Dutch looked upon their periodical migrations with slarm and even terror. Driven by drought and lack of grass, hundreds of thousands of them would drift across the country, devouring every particle of vegetation and sometimes sweeping away in their onward march the farmers' flocks of sheep and goats. So short a time ago as 1892 such a "trek" of springboks in the northern part of Cape Colony obliged the Government to large rifles to farmers with which to protect their

threatened crops. One of the handsomest and most desirable of the South African antelopes is the gemsbok, which dwells in dry and waterless wastes. By some authorities it is thought to have been the original of the unicorn of beraldry. Apparently, the notion of this fabulous beast was derived by the crusaders from carvings on Egyptian monuments representing some kind of an antelope in profile, so as to give the effect of one horn inseed of two. The gemebok is four feet high, warm gray in-color, with white breast and lower legs, and spear-like horne nearly four feet long, straight and proudly carried.

It is particularly for our dry plains regions-Arizona, New Mexico and other areas lacking water supply—that the South African antelopes seem adapted. Another species is the eland, which is as big as a fair-sized horse and can get along, it is said, for weeks or even months without a drop to drink. Hence it would flourish to a country that is impossible for cattle, the sparsest of sun-crisped herbage serving to

keep the animal in good condition. A full-grown eland weighs 1600 to 1800 pounds, and its meat is excellent, affording a first-rate substitute for beef. It is almost as quiet and harmless as a cow and, not being one of the swift-paced antelopes, can often be overtaken by a man running. The young will drink milk out of a bowl and are soon tamed.

The eland's horns are long and straight; its coat has a ground color of warm reddisa fawn, the sides sometimes banded with broad white stripes. It is a dweller of the desert, and in South Africa roams about in small bunches, grazing like cattle and obtaining some moisture from the wild watermelon, which might easily be introduced in New Mexico and Arizona. Taking inte view its size and other advantages, the eland would seem on the whole to be most desirable of all the antelopes for introduction into the United States for meat supply.

# Here's Scientific Sauerkraut

HEY are making scientific saverkraut at the Department of Agriculture in Washington. It is a product obtained by the use of "cultures" of certain bacteria, which contribute the desirable flavor.

Ordinarily sauerkraut may be first-rate, or it may be inferior. That is because its quality depends largely upon accident. The material must undergo fermentation, which is the work of bacterial "germs." If the germs are not of just the right species, the product is ansatisfactory.

Government experts have isolated the particular species of bacteria that make the best sauerkraut. They have identified certain others which are undestrable. The problem, then, is easily solved by contributing a small quantity of a culture of a desirable species. They multiply with great rapidity, and, having a favorable start, shut out the bad ones. Thus the sauerkraut is sure to be of first-class quality.

As a result of these experiments, cultures of the proper bacteria will soon be on the market, so that anybody can buy them and by their use make sure of producing sauerkraut of the highest grade.

It is by the application of like methods that the department has recently succeeded in producing Swiss cheese equal to the imported article and indistinguishable therefrom. In that case cultures of two species of bacteria are used, one of which gives the desirable flavor and aroma, while the other fights and subdues germs of objectionable varieties. The cultures employed were originally obtained from imported Swiss

Requefort cheese owes its much-appreciated aroma and flavor to germs-not to bacteria, however, but to microscopic funzi. The fungus concerned, in feeding upon the ripening cheese, makes the familiar bluishgreen streaks. It was obtained from imported Roquefort by the experts in Wash-

com cow's milk an imitation quite equal to the original, which is made from sheep's

In brewing establishments nothing is con sidered quite so important as the preservation and propagation of particular species of fungous germs, called 'yeasts,' for accomplishing the work of fermentation. Only recently have wine-makers applied the same principle in their business; and, thanks to recognition of the potentialities of selected reasts, it has actually been proved practic-

able to make excellent wines from apple

The flavor and aroma of sherry are not due to the grape juice from which the wine is but to the fungous germs that cause its fermentation. In the soil of the Xeres district of Spain these fungi are native. Floating about in the air, or adhering to the skins of the grapes, they get into the vats of freshly pressed grape juice and, multiplying in incalculable numbers, give to it the peculiar sherry flavor. If the proper yeasts (obtained from the sediments of the

vata) are introduced into the apple juice, a wine is obtained that is hardly distinguish-

able from sherry

If the happy days ever come back, any farmer can turn out sherry, bock, madeira, sauterne, or even champagne, from his apple orchard by the aid of yeast derived originally from European vineyards and put up in little bottles.

### Bad Eggs for Good Hens

ROTTEN eggs offer a somewhat puzzling economic problem. Stale ones seem to find a ready market, but those that are really back numbers in an extreme degree do not invite purchasers.

Hence the new idea of utilzing them as feed for poultry. For that purpose they can be "broken out," cooked, dried, ground up and packed in barrels. Cheap and guaranteed nutritious,

The Federal Government has not wholly approved of this scheme, being apprehensive lest the product be employed in one way or another as human food. Accordingly, it was disposed to insist that the preserved rotten eggs should be "denatured" by mixing with them certain chemicals. The suggestion, however, was not deemed practicable, because such treatment would necessarily render the stuff impossible as chicken

To get over the difficulty, decision h finally been made that rotten eggs for poultry feed shall be admitted to interstate commerce if they are hard-boiled, and then ground up shells and all. Or, as an alternative, they must be broken out and 50 per cent of cottonseed meal added. In either case, it is thought, they will not deemed desirable for human consumption.


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
