DAILY CRUDE OIL PRODUCTION GAINS 11,050 BARRELS

TOTAL FOR WEEK 1,555,050 BARRELS AS COMPARED WITH 1,544,000.

NORTH TEXAS DISTRICT HAS SLIGHT DECREASE

Mexia Pool Daily Average Drops From 99,000 to 88,500 Barrels.

NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—The daily average gross crude oil production of the United States increased 11,050 barrels for the week ending October 14, totaling 1,555,050 barrels as compared with 1,544,000 barrels for the preceding week, according to the weekly summary of the American Petroleum Institute.

The daily average production east of the Rocky mountains was 1,135,000 barrels as compared with 1,134,000 barrels, an increase of 1,050. California production was 426,000 barrels as compared with 416,000 barrels, an increase of 10,000. Oklahoma-Kansas showed a daily average gross production of 493,250 barrels, an increase of 4,500; north Texas showed a decrease of 100 barrels and central Texas showed a decrease of 200. North Louisiana a decrease of 50 barrels, and Arkansas a decrease of 2,500. In Oklahoma production of the Ouage nation was shown as 129,400 barrels against 124,500; and output of the Lyons Quinn pool was 14,500 barrels against 15,500. The Mexia pool, central Texas, was reported at 88,500 barrels, against 92,000; Haygoodville, north Louisiana, 55,150 barrels, against 54,400; and Eldorado, Ark., 26,200 barrels against 25,400.

In the Gulf coast field, West Columbia was reported at 76,700 barrels, against 77,000, and Orange county 14,800 barrels against 15,000. No changes were reported in crude oil prices for the major districts—midcontinent oil crude, quoted at \$1.25 a barrel; Pennsylvania at \$1.24 a barrel and Gulf coast at \$1.25.

According to figures collected by the institute, the imports of petroleum (crude and refined oils) at the principal United States ports for the week ended October 14 totaled 1,930,814 barrels, a daily average of 274,402, compared with 1,788,597 barrels, a daily average of 255,082 for the week ended October 7.

Wealthy Club Man Questions Paternity Of Child of Wife

By Associated Press.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 19.—Henry Herman Laumeier, prominent local club man and wealthy real estate dealer, whose attorneys yesterday filed a petition asking the circuit court to determine the paternity of a child born to his divorced wife, Bryd Shoemaker, could not be reached for a statement today. A caretaker at his estate in St. Louis county said he was on a hunting trip along the Missouri River.

In the petition Laumeier stated that the child was born 23 months after his separation from his former wife on January 5, 1918, the day following their marriage, which he said took place while he was intoxicated at Salem, Ill. She was granted a settlement of \$20,000 by agreement, the petition continued, and her maiden name restored to her by the court. According to the petition the former Mrs. Laumeier was granted a divorce on charges of desertion on June 18, 1918, and at the trial testified that she had no relations as wife with her husband after he left her the day following their marriage at Salem, Ill. She was granted a settlement of \$20,000 by agreement, the petition continued, and her maiden name restored to her by the court.

The petition asserted that Laumeier was served with a summons on September 20, 1922, to appear in the supreme court of New York and answer charges brought by Miss Shoemaker for the non-support of their child, Herman H. Laumeier Jr., born December 23, 1919. It is added in the petition that Laumeier considers his former wife an unfit and improper person, to have the custody of a legitimate child and requests the court to appoint a guardian for the child. If the court determines the child is not his Laumeier asks that it be forever enjoined from asserting any claim on his estate. If it is found that it belongs to him, the Laumeier asks that the custody of the child be awarded to him.

CONTINUES EFFORTS TO GAIN PERMISSION FOR AN EXPERIMENT

HOT SPRINGS, ARK., Oct. 19.—Dr. E. E. House, Ferrist, Texas, physician, will probably continue his efforts to secure a permission to conduct experiments on prisoners at the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kan., to demonstrate that while under the influence of scopalamine anesthetic, which produces "twilight sleep" subjects will tell the true facts regarding crimes of which they are accused.

The medical association failed to give its official endorsement to Dr. House's plan but the subject was widely discussed and much interest was expressed in the continuation of the experiments which, Dr. House says, have been under way for several years and brought invariable satisfactory results.

In the informal discussion the physician emphasized that the results of his experiments could not be expected to stand as evidence in any court but claimed that the facts obtained through questioning of accused persons or witnesses during the period of "twilight sleep" could be advantageously used by authorities in the solution of many mysterious crimes and in dozens of instances would prevent miscarriage of justice even if the real criminal was not brought to justice.

In one experiment at Dallas which he cited to the association, he said that a man under arrest charged with a serious crime seemed almost certain of conviction on circumstantial evidence. "Twilight sleep" was induced without the prisoner's knowledge and he gave information which, when checked up by the Dallas police, proved the man's innocence and resulted in his acquittal.

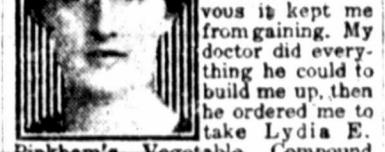

DEMOCRATS SURE THEY WILL CARRY ELECTION IN OHIO

REPUBLICANS REALIZE DANGER; HOPE TO RECOVER BEFORE NOV. 7. ARE DISSATISFIED WITH STATE ADMINISTRATION

Voters Are Also Displeased With Record of Harding and Congress.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Oct. 19.—At Columbus, Ohio, it is clearly set to go over to the democrats in the more surely democratic than any of the other doubtful states. It is ready to give the democrats the governorship, and the rest of the state ticket, and any where from eight to fourteen of the twenty-two congressional seats, all of which seats the republicans now hold.

The republicans in their hearts realize that this is how things stand with Ohio, but they profess not to admit defeat. They say they can recover before election day. They say that sort of thing has happened in Ohio before. They say it is merely the reverse of what occurred in the presidential election of 1916. In that year on the first of October, Ohio was set to go republican, but developments during the last four weeks of the campaign reversed the situation and election day Hughes lost the state to Wilson.

But the unbiased observer is unable to read the same result into this analogy that the hard-pressed republicans do. It is hard to see anything likely to happen in the next three weeks that would change Ohio's present determination to vote the democratic ticket. The republicans will send in their cabinet members and other orators. They will do every thing that energy and organization can do, but the present state of feeling in Ohio is not the sort of mood arising out of the campaign, which might be

changed over night by some future developments. It is more in the nature of a crystallized conviction that has been accumulating for two years. The principal basis of it is extreme criticism and dissatisfaction with the present republican state administration. If half the things the democrats say about wastefulness leading to high taxation and other alleged defects of the present republican state administration are true, no one could be surprised at the determination of the voters to make a sweeping change.

The republicans to some extent have acknowledged the validity of this criticism by not renominating the present governor. They have named in his place Carmel Thompson, a candidate whose ability and standing are conceded to be high, but the Ohio voters are determined to have not merely a different and better governor they are determined to vote their criticism and to have through a going change. The democrats have played up to this mood among the voters by nominating a former member of the Sherman-Holmes watchdog of the treasury in the person of "Vic" Donahay.

Harding Regime Also Criticized.
Next to criticism of the present republican state administration, the chief reason for Ohio's democratic mood is dissatisfaction with the republican congress and with Harding's national administration. It is chiefly among the farmers that this prevails, and as usual the reason is economic. The farmers are in a bad way. They contrast their affluence during Wilson's time with their hardships during Harding's time and do not go very deeply or minutely into the exact causes, they do not deal in any refinements about the relation of war inflation to post-war deflation. They merely know what they know. As one farmer expressed it, "I was able to buy my farm during Wilson's time, but during Harding's time I am not sure I shall be able to hold on to it."

I had no time to verify the figures, but I was told that during the past two years 20 per cent of the mortgages in Ohio have been foreclosed. At the county seat of Lucas county a lawyer told me that for several years there had not been a foreclosure sale, but that recently not a week passes without a sale on the court house steps.
On Saturday I went to a meeting in southeastern Ohio at a point where the mining country meets the farming country, which was addressed by ex-Gov. James M. Cox and Senator Pomeroy.
Mr. Cox told the farmers that the principal cause of their troubles is the lack of a foreign market for their surplus, and that this in turn is chargeable to the timidity and conservatism of the national administration's policy about our foreign relations. Cox also bore down heavily on the tariff and in doing so had the unmistakable approval of the listeners.
At one point he asked if there was a clothing dealer in the crowd. An embarrassed and reluctant man was pushed forward by

his friends. Cox asked him how much higher a price he is compelled to pay for the goods he is now ordering. The dealer answered "75 per cent." Cox asked if he drew the reason. The dealer replied that he is told by the eastern manufacturers from whom he buys that the tariff is the reason.
The answer of "75 per cent" was even more than Cox expected but he told the audience it would run from 15 to 20 per cent. Aside from these two references to the business aspects of the republican administration Cox made a moral and spiritual appeal to the moral and spiritual aspects of the failure of the administration to have a foreign policy which would help protect the Christian in the near east against what is now happening to them.

Republicans View Applied.
On the same day, in other parts of the state, James G. Davis, secretary of labor, and Senator Frank Willis speaking for the republicans, restated the republican theory that due to the beneficent wisdom of the republicans Ohio's sons are not today in danger of being drafted to fight in Europe and Asia.

To this sentiment these republican speakers got a warm response from the republican audience as Cox got from a democratic audience for his sentiment. To these contrasting democratic and republican ways of presenting the question of our foreign relations the less partisan reader will have his own reaction. One thing is clear, the problem of America's relation to the rest of the world is an issue that is hard to keep down in all the states. It is right beneath the surface and every speaker who alludes to it gets responses which sometimes are extreme in one direction and sometimes in the other, but which always show the vitality of this issue as a source of public discussion and controversy.

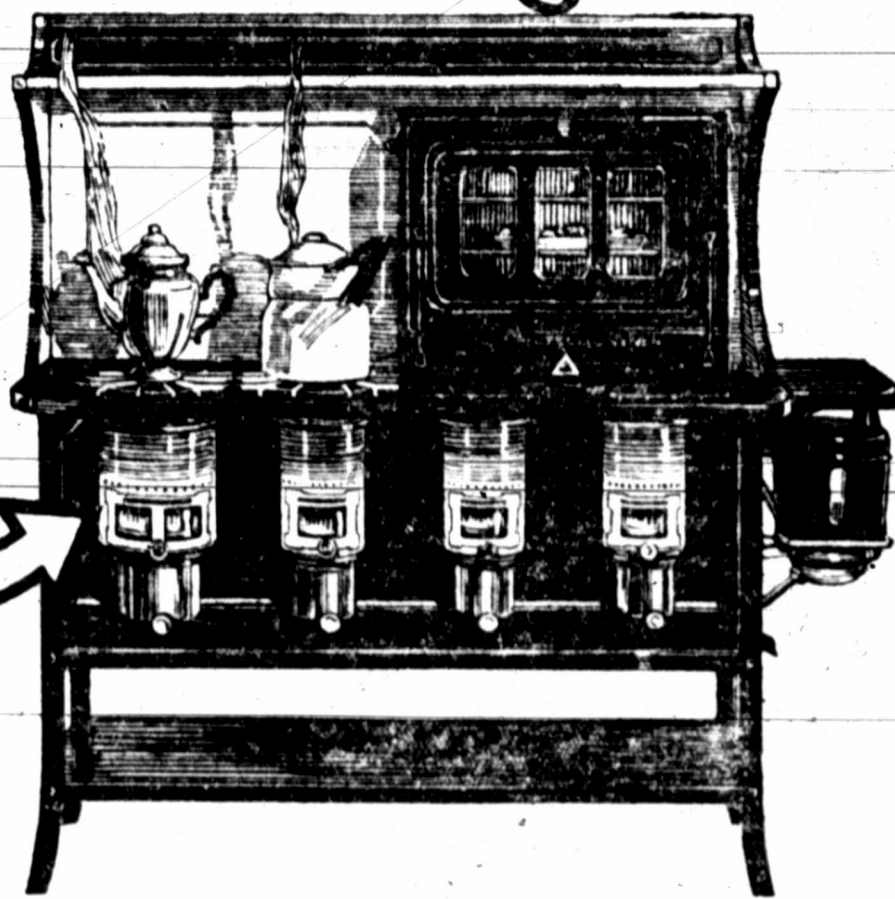

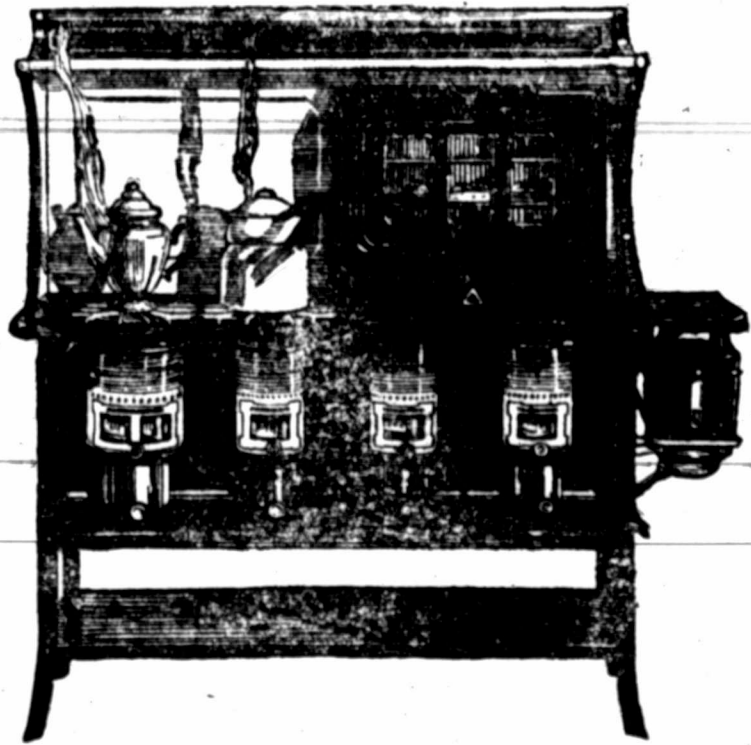

Senior members of the team volunteered certain class activities Friday and Friday evening that they may be in least condition possible for the game. Only Saturday alone can determine the outcome of the contest. Both teams, both coaches and centers of both cities are already timed for the first whistle.

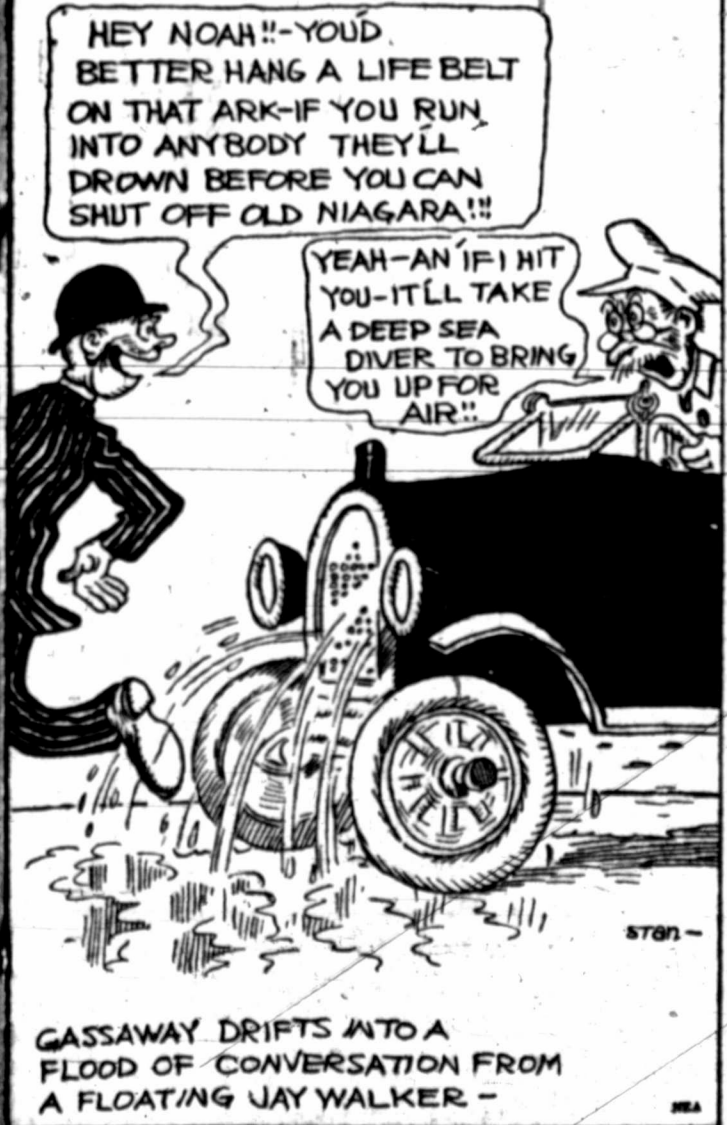
