WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—American steel industrialists are in position to change from the present 12 hour labor day to one of eight hours without increasing the cost of the labor component in their output, in the opinion of a committee of the Federated American Engineering Societies, which has completed a nationwide inquiry into the "eight hour" system of labor.

JUSTIFIABLE HOMICIDE VERDICT OF CORONER IN CLARA HARLOW CASE

FRESNO, CAL., Oct. 22.—Justifiable homicide was the verdict returned today by the coroner's jury that inquired into the death of Mrs. Clara Harlow, 19, whose husband, George A. Harlow, 31, an electrician, was said to have shot her to death with a shotgun near their home at North Park early yesterday when he found her in the company of a young man of her age.

CREDIT HALF MILLION DOLLARS TO ACCOUNTS FRANCE AND BELGIUM

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—Aside from the interest payment on the foreign debts received the month from Great Britain, the treasury was able to credit something over \$500,000 to the accounts of Belgium and France. The Belgium item was an interest payment of approximately \$150,000 on account of maturing purchases from the war department, while the French credit was \$350,000 paid into the treasury by the railroad administration in satisfaction of a claim of the French government against that administration. It was explained that the transaction was in accordance with an agreement under which claims of foreign governments against the United States growing out of the war would be credited to the principal of the debt of those governments in this country.

MEETING TO ORGANIZE FOR SWEETWATER FAIR

SWEETWATER, Oct. 22.—A mass meeting has been called for Monday night, October 23, to organize a fair association for the coming next fall one of the greatest fairs in west Texas. The call was issued by Walter Booth. It is proposed to have a show and auction sale of Hereford cattle next spring in connection with a poultry show. Then work will begin on the erection of a fair plant to carry through an annual fall exposition which will be one of the leaders west of Fort Worth and Dallas, according to the plan. It is pointed out that Sweetwater is the leading railway center of west Texas, making it a desirable place for a large fair.

OPEN PORT LAW AT DENISON IN PLACE OF MARTIAL LAW

DENISON, TEXAS, Oct. 22.—Martial law having been lifted here at 6 o'clock Saturday evening, Denison today was under open port law with Texas Rangers on duty. Campfire Girls Found But Refuse To Return Home

CHICAGO, Oct. 22.—Over the long distance telephone from Dover, N. J., Catherine and Pauline Wilson, the Camp Fire girls for whom a wide search was made in the belief they had been abducted, declared today they never would return to live with their mother, from whom they ran away to join the brothers they were separated from five years ago.

With the discovery of the girls in Dover last night the story of their unhappy lives in the home of a man who compelled them to call him "father" came to light. The man, George Magson, known here as George Wilson, admitted he was the father of the young sisters, whose real names are Fox, the police said. Five years ago the girls were taken by their mother from their home at Washington, N. J., according to their story. They went to St. Louis where the police said, a former neighbor in the New-Jersey town, Magson, the police said, abandoned his family in Philadelphia and after meeting Mrs. Fox and her daughters in St. Louis, came to Chicago, where they all lived under the name of Wilson.

PLAN INVESTIGATION OF STATEMENTS BY FORMER CAPT. ROBT. ROSENBLUTH

NEW YORK, Oct. 22.—Investigation by the federal grand jury of statements made by former Captain Robert Rosenbluth in connection with his indictment on a charge of murder at Tacoma, Wash., were to be started today. The former army officer is at liberty under \$40,000 bond pending hearing of removal proceedings on Thursday. He is charged with the murder of Major Alexander F. Cronhill at Camp Lewis four years ago. One of the statements to be investigated and which was attributed to John J. Gopstein, Rosenbluth's counsel, was that days before the grand jury was to hear the case against Rosenbluth, persons closely associated with the department of justice made the direct proposal that it would be cheaper for Rosenbluth's friends to contribute to a fund to prevent the indictment than it would be to go to trial.

FORDNEY CLAIMS PROSPERITY INSURED BY NEW TARIFF LAW

CHICAGO, Oct. 22.—Prosperity is insured by the new tariff law, Congressmen Joseph Fordney of Michigan, one of the authors of the Fordney-McCumber tariff bill, declared today before the Illinois Manufacturers' association. The emergency tariff which preceded the permanent law, he asserted, was a decided turn in business in general toward prosperity, he asserted.

A year and a half ago, the speaker said, record breaking importations of farm products and bank failures in the northwest were affecting adversely the country's business generally. The new tariff law, he said, acted as a stop-gap and although never was abused, it has insured prosperity, an era which has never been so abundant as now.

"With the new law affording a just measure of protection, not only to the farm but the factory as well," he continued, "increased prosperity is assured."

Under the emergency act, he said, the duty on wool in an average suit of clothes was only \$2 cents, and that in an all wool overcoat \$17.75. He said the duty on wool in the new law is slightly less.

"Any merchant who will state to the public," Representative Fordney declared, "that he is compelled to advance the price of his goods because of an increased duty in the new act, is dishonest and untruthful."

PLAN REDUCTION IN PASSENGER FARE ON MISSISSIPPI ROADS

HATTESBURG, MISS., Oct. 22.—The Mississippi railroad commission has cited all railroads engaged in intrastate commerce in Mississippi to appear at Jackson on November 7 and show cause why passenger fares should not be reduced from 2.5 cents a mile to 2 cents, it was announced here today by C. M. Morgan, president of the commission.

TEMPERANCE VOTE TO FIGURE IN ELECTION

LONDON, Oct. 22.—There is a strong probability, says a Central News dispatch from Edinburgh today, that the Scottish temperance vote which in 1918 was cast solidly for the coalition, will be cast for the forthcoming election in favor of candidates supporting Mr. Lloyd-George.

If the report is accurate it is estimated it would mean approximately 400,000 votes for the former premier.

It is considered unlikely the Scottish temperance advocates will support the unionist as Mr. George Younger, present party chairman, is a brewer. Whether they will throw their influence solidly on the side of a party is considered here highly speculative.

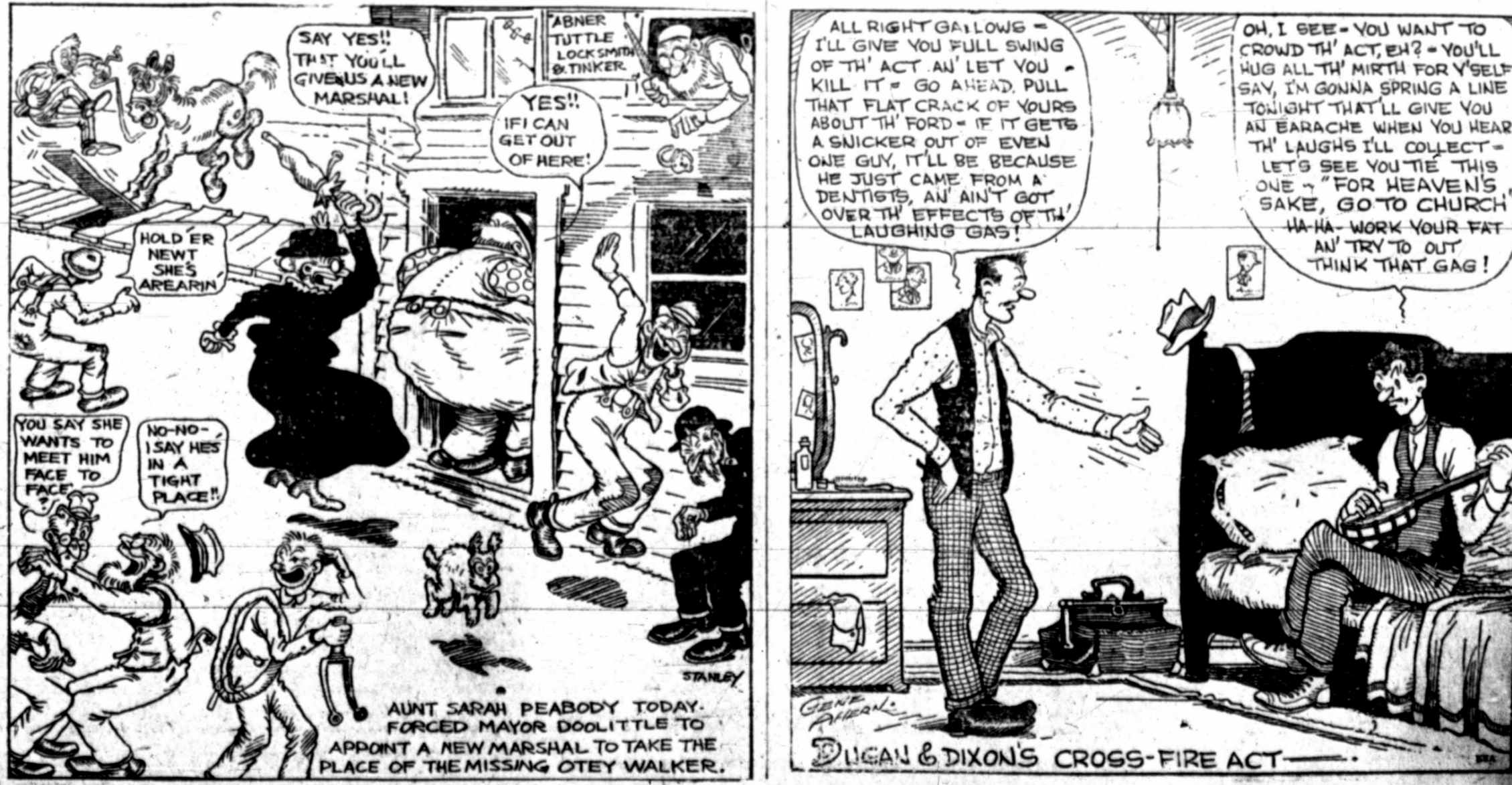
H. T. SCOTT (SCOTTY) TO BE RETURNED HERE

MAN WHO WAS TOO BUSY SUBJECT OF REVIVAL SERMON

DR. S. D. GRAFTON PREACHES SUNDAY ON STORY OF BEN HADAD.

COMPLIMENTS KLAN FOR WORK AT AUSTIN

Says It Has Been Factor in Improving Conditions For University Students.

By FRANK S. REID.

The story of the man who was too busy was the theme of Dr. S. D. Grafton's sermon at the First Presbyterian church Sunday morning. He selected his text from 1st Kings, 20th chapter, first part of the 40th verse. "And as thy servant was busy here and there, he was gone."

Dr. Grafton, "Ben-hadad: King of Syria, had gone up against the Israelites with a great army and because of his high-headedness; because of his statements that God could not deliver the people of Israel, acknowledged his defeat and appeared before Ahab, king of Israel, in sackcloth and ashes; then it was that the king of Israel spared his life."

I get from this lesson this morning this thought: This man said, "I was too busy here and there and the man was gone." In other words the man had in keeping a certain thing, and he busied himself with other things and failed to do the thing he was charged with. Sentence was then pronounced upon the king that he should pay with his life. We miss much of life because we are too busy with so many things that we do not do the work that God intends for us to do. We miss the emphasis on life and there is too often no sense of responsibility to God upon the part of people. Many think they can go on in life giving to themselves pleasure and business and have no responsibility towards God and their fellow men. The thing Jehovah intended to be done was not carried out.

I want to call your attention to a very searching scripture, Ezekiel, 18th chapter, 18th verse. "When I say unto the wicked thou shalt surely die and thou givest him not warning, nor speakest to warn the wicked from his wicked way, but his blood will I require at thine hand." We are living in a time of condemnation and strife. We condemn a great many things and oftentimes we condemn without proper thought. I want to make a statement to you and to preface my remarks. I am going to make a statement concerning some of the work of the Ku Klux Klan. I am glad that I am not a Ku Klux Klan; I have never been; I have never taken an oath; I have no present intention of becoming a member; but I want to say to you people blinded by prejudice and who have children going to the state university at Wichita, Kansas, I am glad that I am not a Ku Klux Klan. I am talking as a pastor and know the work of the Ku Klux Klan. I am glad that I am not a Ku Klux Klan. I am in connection with the Ku Klux Klan and I know of some of the things these men are doing and they have largely cleaned up their work because of their work. I am not saying this because I have any friendship for any individuals that are in the Ku Klux Klan. I am saying they at least have a sense of responsibility and are seeing that the laws are enforced.

Some people have no sense of responsibility. They simply go through life taking things easy and letting other things go as they will. There are many men and children who can testify to the joy they have had in doing something for God and their fellow men. People can't shut their eyes and simply go here and there forming their lives just as they wish—the man too busy to do his own work. What is the trouble? Misplaced emphasis. Much depends upon your point of view as to whether you get pleasure out of the work God has called you to do and whether it is a hard task. If you have the right point of view it means a pleasure and a joy. Michael Angelo, in working up a piece of marble, went down into the marble works and stood with the workmen, worked with them, carried the marble to the chiseling place and often worked 12 months in getting the image he desired. Work, yes, but at the same time play, for he loved to do it. "You cannot go wrong" someone has said, "if you are busy." I know we say "an idle brain is a devil's workshop," but there is another question and that is what is he busy about? If a man is emphasizing material things and losing sight of the spiritual things he will be going wrong. May God help us that we don't satisfy ourselves just because we are at work.
