



A GOOD SUGGESTION.

The Wichita County Promoter, published at Iowa Park, formerly the Iowa Park Herald, has caught a suggestion from the letter of Frank G. Carpenter printed last Sunday, which it believes could be adopted in Wichita county with profitable and pleasing results. The suggestion is a good one and this paper endorses it. Here's what the Promoter says: "Frank Carpenter, world traveler and writer of note, is now touring New Europe, as he calls it, and Sunday's issue of the leading daily papers dwelled at length on the resources of France. He says that France is the richest agricultural country in the world and her farmers are thrifty and her people are commercially awake. Every inch of ground is made to produce money-paying crops; even the ground adjacent to the modern highways is lined with fruit and poplar trees. For miles one can drive a car on a highway without the rays of the sun pouring down upon him. The dead wood from the poplar trees is used by bakers in firing up their ovens and is sold for a fair price. Compare the highways of France with those of Texas and you will note that we have

ne trees bordering our highways. However, very little hardsurfaced road has been constructed th Texas up until the past few years. Wichita county has over fifty miles of concrete road and not a tree of any sort has been planted alongside. A solid stretch of concrete road from Wichita Falls to Electra, 30 miles in length could be made most beautiful with the planting of some specie of fruit-bearing tree, say pecan or bols d' arc. In three or four years these trees would be large enough to afford an abundance of shade and beauty. If trees were planted on this stretch of road twenty feet apart on both sides it would take 528 to the mile; leaving off the tree planting inside the corporate limits of each town it would cut down the amount of trees needed by several hundred. If every tax-payer of Wichita Falls, Iowa Park and Electra would donate two trees each and set aside Arbor Day for tree planting the greatest civic movement the world has ever known will have been accomplished. This is not a dream but something that could be accomplished with the concerted effort of the chambers of commerce and civic leagues of the three cities. If you consider the suggestion worth while pass it on to your neighbor and let's get to work on it as soon as possible. What France can do we as Americans can excell. Let's show France our superiority."






