Into an ordinary coffee pot or sauce pan, measure the desired amount of ground coffee and add water; bring to a boil, stir thoroughly, then take from the fire. It is most important to do this, for continued boiling causes the flavor or aroma to escape and leaves a drink that is bitter and unsatisfactory. A dash of cold water added at the time the water is removed from the fire will help to set tle the grounds.




