COTTON MILL MEN BETWEEN HIGH PRICES AND BUYERS STRIKE

Not only is the 1922 cotton crop bringing a good but the indications are that there will be a demand for all the cotton that is likely to be rown in the United States next year, and a good demand means a fair price. It is estimated that the carry over of cotton into the next season's crop will be approximately 6,000,000 bales. This year it was 9,000,000 bales and the year before 13,500,000 bales, so that it is readily seen the position of the stop from the standpoint of the grower is likely to remain very good indeed.

The Dallas News says: "Data given by the New York Journal of Commerce may be taken to indicate that the cotton spinners of the country consider that they are between cotton on the one hand and a buyers' strike on the other. Neither horn of the dilemma has actually put in its appearance, but apprehension is said to prevail as to both. According to the review by the New York publication, the quality of cotton being forwarded to market is unusually good. But little low-grade cotton has been picked thus far. throughout the cotton belt the weather has been favorable to picking operations, with very little rain. By Oct. 18 nearly 7,000,000 bales had been picked and se 1916, but on the other hand it is estimated that 92 per cent of the crop has already left the fields, though not that percentage has been ginned. 


