**Contract Awarded For 60 Apartments**

This year being a census year, we noticed with more than passing interest a cartoon in our old files while working up the "Friona Flashbacks" column this week.

The cartoon, in our issue of 40 years ago, dated January 31, 1930, had to do with the census taker.

It was entitled "Why not get all the information?" and what may have been drawn just for laughs 40 years ago has been making the headlines for real during the past year, as arguments have been presented on the subject of how personal to make the every 10 year questionnaire.

The cartoon to which we refer shows the census taker with a form which appears to be about 20 feet long, marking down the answers, as the poor old "Mr. Average" has almost passed out from exhaustion.

Some of the questions that the cartoon version of the census blank shows in readable fashion include: "Do you like salads?" "What brand of cigar do you prefer?" "How many times have you been married?" "Are you left handed?" "Do you have a radio? A car? A conscience? Do you prefer blondes or brunettes?" Some of these questions may have seemed facetious at the time the cartoon appeared in 1930, but as is so often the case, what was done in the line of humor in the past has just about come to pass.

The old saying about West Texas weather, "If you don't like the way it is today, just wait awhile, because it will change" was never more true than in the past couple of weeks.

We were made to realize that on Sunday afternoon as we drove by Friona Country Club and saw the local golfers enjoying themselves in the nice, 70-degree weather.

Exactly a week earlier, the course was buried beneath seven or eight inches of snow, and the temperature was floundering down below freezing. Actually, the type of weather we had this last weekend and the first of this week is the kind that we always brag to newcomers that we have in West Texas in the winter. The other kind-like we had around New Year's Day-must have been brought in by some of you newcomers. We didn't use to have that kind of weather hereabouts.

We're going to have to find out where Rev. Albert Lindley, Methodist pastor, gets his material. Could it be the good parson writes it himself? The latest church mail-out bulletin contained the following definitions, in "space lingo."

"All systems go"-the Sunday morning service is about to begin. "Burned out Booster"-the preacher, about ten o'clock Sunday night.

"Escape velocity"-speed at which the people leave the church. "Mission Control"-heaven. "Radiation Belt"-the area around the pulpit.

Contract has been awarded for the 60-unit apartment project to be built at 1300 Walnut Street in Friona.

High Plains Building Co. of Amarillo is the general contractor, and hopes to be on the site in the next three weeks. Completion of the project is expected to require some nine months. When the work is in full swing, there will be be-

tween 60 and 90 people employed on the project, according to K.S. (Bud) Reynolds, a spokesman for the contracting firm.

The project will cost in the neighborhood of \$908,000. It is the largest single housing project in terms of apartments ever designed for Friona.

There are still a few small

details that need to be worked out before the project can be started, according to Reynolds. However, the loan has been approved by FHA.

Reynolds and Roy Hunsitt are the principals in the High Plains Building Co.

Sizes of the apartments will range from one bedroom to three bedrooms, and retrace from \$85 to \$117 per month.

The apartments will be of French Provincial architecture, and will be a nice addition to the city, according to Dr. Loyd Shackelford, a spokesman for the Friona Industrial Committee, sponsors of the project.

Location of the project is on Walnut Street between 13th and 14th Streets. The project will cover about two full city blocks.

Apartments will have refrigerated air conditioning, carpet, cooking units and refrigerators.

Some apartments could be available for renting within six

weeks after construction is begun.

The apartments will be of brick construction. They will be two stories high, with residents living "over themselves."

Playground equipment and play area will be provided for residents of the two and three-bedroom apartments. The one-bedroom apartments will be restricted to only couples.

A total of \$59,150 has been included in the budget for the landscaping. The grounds will be grassed, and will contain trees and other shrubbery.

There will be 90-off-site parking places, or about one and one-half spaces per family.

The project, announced last October, has been in the mill for about 18 months.

The local non-profit corporation has an eight-member board of directors. They are H.K. Kendrick, Benny Pryor, Dr. Shackelford, A.L. Black, Andy Hurst, Doyle Elliott, Elvin Wilson and Bill Wooley.

In addition to the game, the Boosters will hold a "slave auction" at the game, at which time all of the Friona High School coaches and players will be "auctioned off" for a day of work, the proceeds to go toward the purchase of a weight machine, to be used by the Friona athletes.

The Harlem Stars, owned by Bold Bule, are a group of razzle-dazzle Negro stars, who tour the world making fans laugh.

Included on the team which will play in Friona are six-eight Richard "Honey Bear" Dabney, six-eight Sammie "Sweet Sam" Smith, six-five Curtis "Young Blood" Williams, six-four Don Presley and six-four James "Big Daddy" Batiste.

Admission to the game will be \$1.50 for adults and \$1 for students. It will be played on

a night when the local basketball schedule had an open date.

Sammie Smith, the big (6-8, 210 pounds) center, is called the "Bill Russell of the Harlem Stars" because he is always blocking so many shots and coming up with the key rebound. During a game with the British Columbia champions, he set a record for the most shots blocked in a single game (18).

"Honey Bear" Dabney, also 6-8, is a born clown, and is a native of nearby Hobbs, N.M.

"Young Blood" Williams is sometimes referred to as the "Snake." "He has moves they haven't even named yet," says coach Bold Bule. His fakes have brought a smile to faces

of sports fans all around the world, as he leaves the bewildered opponent in his tracks. He grew up in the Watts district in Los Angeles.

"Big Daddy" Batiste is a native of Houston, and is known as the top clown in the Harlem Stars Organization. Basketball players from the sandlot level to professionals attempt to copy some of his amazing shots and passes.

Don Presley, center and guard, is one of the newer players on the team, having been with the Harlem Stars for three years. "He is a good ball handler and just needs a few more years experience to become one of the top players in the organization," Bule says.

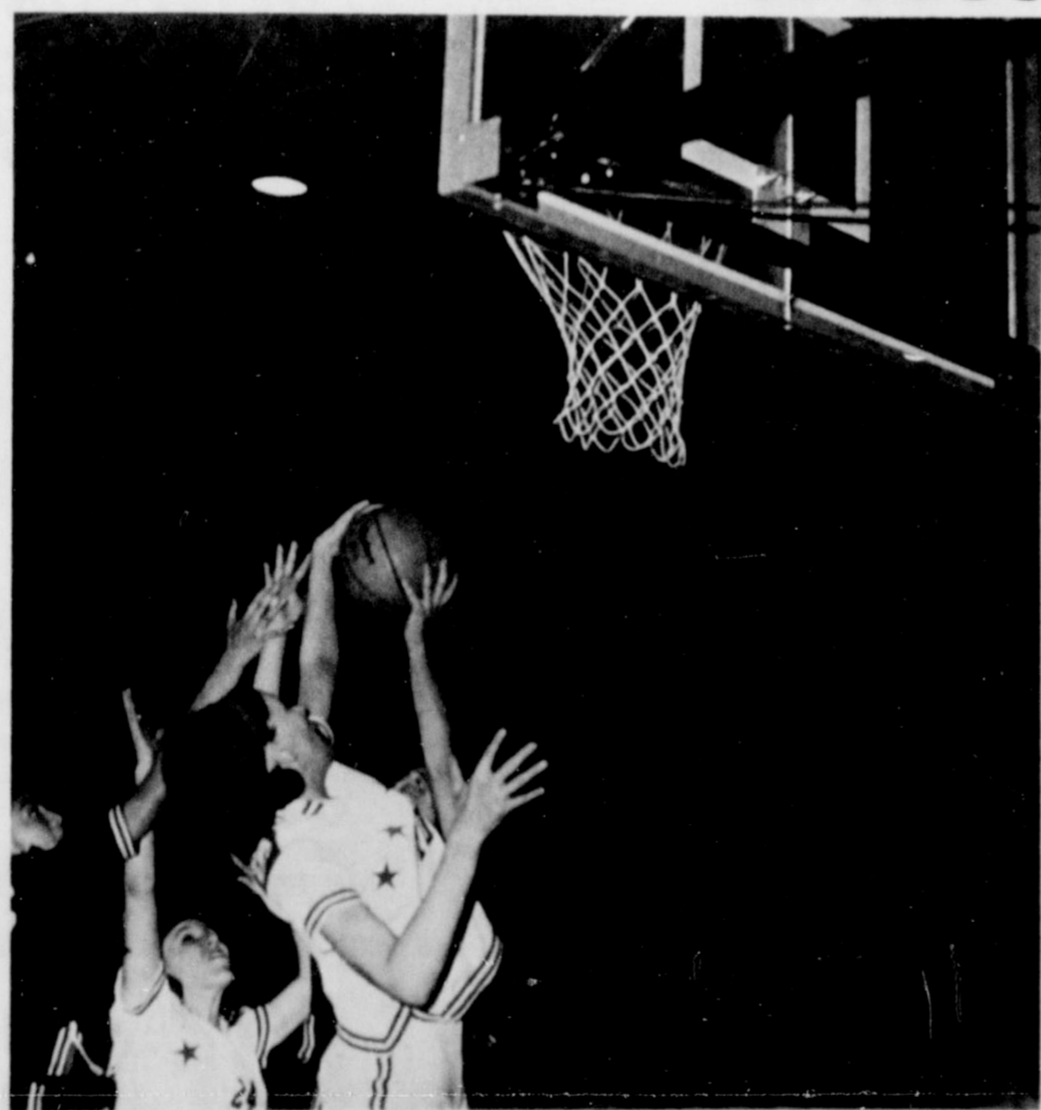

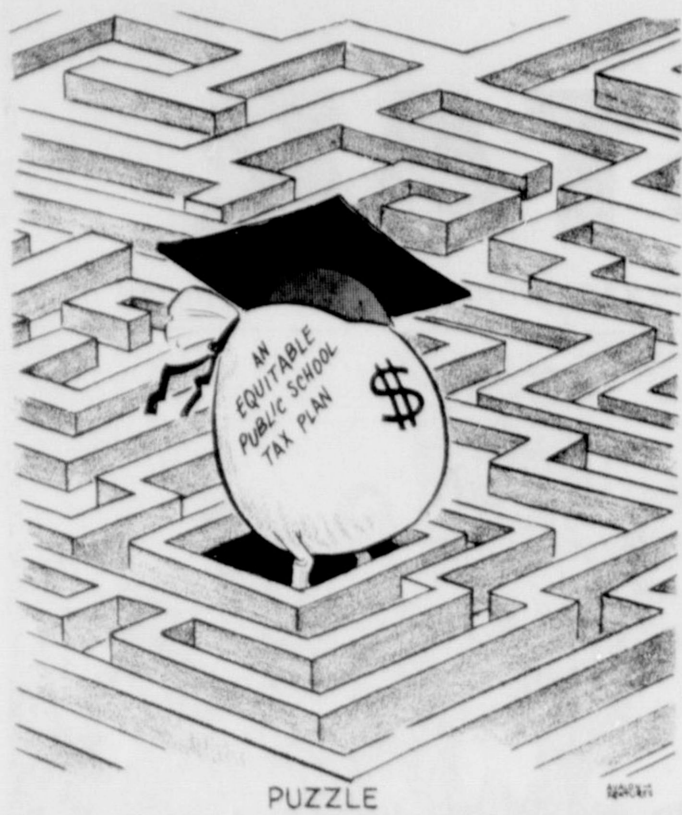

**OUR Government - -  
Not THE Government**

Often times we as citizens fail to remember that our nation is one "of the people, by the people, and for the people." Our government-local, state, and national-are comprised of people elected to office by us, the voters.

When things go wrong in government, who's to blame . . . the men who are in office or the apathetic citizens who either failed to vote, or voted and then displayed little or no concern about what is being done by our elected officials?

YOU and every citizen of voting age have the inherent right to say how our country should be run. Don't let others speak for you by your failure to vote.

General telephone President L. Gray Beck comments: "Freedom and responsibility are inseparable. Your presence at the polls is one of the greatest privileges and responsibilities you earn as an American. Your vote is equal to any other cast and says what kind of government you want. Be a voting citizen in 1970!"

In case you are one of those people who may think . . . "My vote won't make any difference" . . . here is a bit of thought provoking recorded history.

In 1840 the ONE VOTE of a miller in Indiana started a chain of events which ultimately brought five states, including Texas, into the Union. The miller intended to stay home and grind flour but was finally persuaded by a friend to go vote. The candidate for whom he voted was elected to the State Legislature by ONE VOTE.

In those days, U.S. Senators were chosen not by popular vote but by the selection of the State Legislature. The Indiana Legislature elected Edward A. Hannegan to the U.S. Senate by the margin of ONE VOTE. . . . the vote of the State Legislator from the miller's district.

In Washington Senator Hannegan, acting as presiding officer of the Senate, cast the deciding vote which broke a deadlock over admitting Texas as a state. That ONE VOTE led to the war with Mexico, the end result being a land purchase treaty for a new territory which is now California, Utah, New Mexico, and Arizona.

Not convinced about ONE VOTE being important?  
In 1812 our Congress declared war on England by the margin of ONE VOTE.

In 1876 Rutherford B. Hayes became President by ONE electoral vote.

By the margin of ONE VOTE the Selective Service Act of World War II was passed in the U.S. House of Representatives. And so it goes. ONE VOTE does count. YOURS!

...from the files of the Friona Star

40 YEARS AGO--JANUARY 31, 1930

Weather in the vicinity of Friona for the past three weeks has been decidedly wintery. In fact, it has been claimed to be the coldest we have had since the winter of the big snow about ten years ago. Sometime during the night of January 16, the wind whisked to the north, becoming very cold and blowing fiercely. This continued throughout the day Friday, with some flying thickly part of the day, and during the night on Friday some thermometers in Friona registered as low as 14 degrees below zero.

35 YEARS AGO--FEBRUARY 1, 1935

At the regular meeting of the County Commissioners Court at Farwell Monday, one of the items of business attended to was the provision of the court to pay a bounty of two cents a head for all jackrabbits killed within the county during the period of February 1 to February 16. This action was taken in an effort to so decrease the number of rabbits in the county that they will cease to be a menace to the growing crops.

30 YEARS AGO--FEBRUARY 2, 1940

The local Chamber of Commerce elected officers to serve the organization for the coming year at its meeting last Friday night. J. A. Blackwell was re-elected as president, Ray Landrum is vice-president; Dan Ethridge is secretary and Lloyd Brewer is treasurer.

25 YEARS AGO--FEBRUARY 2, 1945

A machine has been invented and a working model of it now being built in Friona which will solve the problem of man shortage in the handling of threshed grain on the farm. Roscoe Parr is the inventor of the machine, a diagram of which is already filed with the U.S. Patent Office along with an application for a patent.

20 YEARS AGO--JANUARY 27, 1950

Political announcements carried in the Star included A. D. Smith, for re-election as County Judge; W. L. Edelman as his opponent; Loyde A. Brewer as county and district clerk; Charles Lovelace for sheriff and tax assessor-collector and Emmett Day, for re-election as county commissioner.

15 YEARS AGO--JANUARY 28, 1955

Fifty-four irrigation well permits have been issued at the local water committee office during the last two weeks, Secretary Raymond Euler stated today. Considerable land sales activity is reported by the real estate dealers, the irrigation of course being a major factor in both rapid sales and higher price.

10 YEARS AGO--JANUARY 28, 1960

Maynard Greeson of the Friona Future Farmers of America chapter showed the grand champion barrow at the Hereford Junior Livestock show this past weekend. Two more Friona boys, Larry Potts and Floyd Reeve, also received honors in the swine division of the show, Potts' barrow taking first in the light Hampshire class and Reeve's animal second in the heavy cross-bred class.

5 YEARS AGO--JANUARY 28, 1965

G.S. Loooper, escaped injury Tuesday morning when the pick-up truck he was driving was struck by a west-bound freight train at the crossing on South Main Street in Friona. Loooper, an employee of Kendrick Oil Co., said his brakes locked and the pickup skidded on the ice which had accumulated from the previous night's snow. The vehicle skidded through the wooden warning arm and into the path of the train, almost clearing before being struck on the left rear and spun completely around by the impact.

### Strike Affects MBP's Plant At Rock Port

Missouri Beef Packers, Inc. announced that it has been unable to negotiate a new labor contract for production and maintenance employees of its Rock Port, Mo. division with Local 76 of the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen of North America AFL-CIO. As a result, the local called a strike effective with the expiration of its previous contract on January 16.

A spokesman for Missouri Beef said that operations at the company's Friona division are under a separate contract and have not been affected.

According to Missouri Beef, the primary issue in the Rock Port strike is pay rates for jobs in a new breaking and fabricating unit which the company expects to become operational in four to six weeks.

No further negotiations are now scheduled, according to the company.

## Signup For 1970 Farm Program Begins Monday

Sign-up period for 1970 Farm Program starts next Monday. The sign-up period for the 1970 wheat, feed grain, and cotton voluntary programs will begin on February 2 and continue through March 20. Eligible producers may sign up at the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Office in Farwell during office hours throughout this period.

Notice of feed grain base acres, projected yields, and payment rates are now being mailed to farmers. Leaflets explaining the program are included with these notices. The programs are almost identical to the 1969 programs and it is believed that most farmers understand the details. However, the ASCS Office will continue to issue information on a weekly basis thru the sign-up period.

As has been mentioned previously, the 1970 programs are

about the same as the 1969 programs. There are two big changes. These are: There will be no advance payments made and the planting of sweet sorghums (cane) and forage sorghums is NOT permitted on designated diverted acres.

Parmer County farmers are urged to come in and sign up at the earliest convenient time as there's always a last minute rush. Farmers are also urged to try to have their 1970 wheat acreage measured and be ready to report it when they come to the ASCS Office to sign up in the programs. Farm operators are required to certify their cropland acreage in 1970 just as they have done for the past few years.

Anyone having a question about any phase of the farm programs are invited (even urged) to call on the people in their ASCS Office. They will be glad to try to help you.

... stir finely diced cheese into steaming potato soup till melted (allow 1/3 cup cheese for each bowl of soup).

... brown day-old bread cubes in butter seasoned with garlic salt; toss cubes in grated Parmesan cheese; float on soup.

... blend a little hot tomato soup into softened cream cheese; stir into remaining soup and serve.

... top bowls of cream soup with bits of sharp cheese and minced parsley.

Do you leave the house comfortably, knowing your children are left in the care of a competent sitter who has feeding instructions, bed times and a

But, that's not enough. Precious time may be lost because you did not leave authorization for the doctor to do whatever he thinks is necessary.

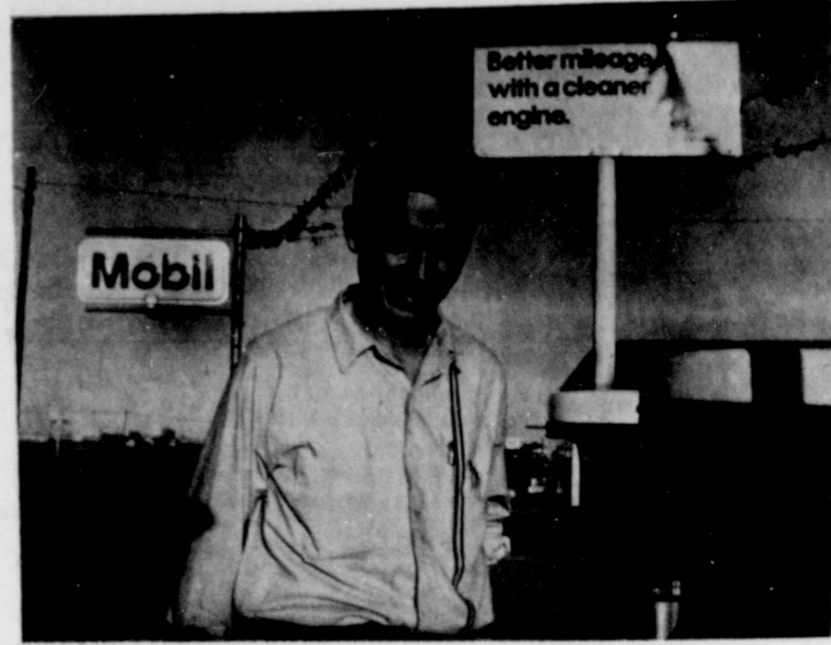
Laws prohibit the use of certain medications and surgical procedures on minors without the consent of parents or legal guardians.

"This will authorize whatever treatment (medical or surgical) is necessary in the event of illness or accident of our (my) child (ren) whenever neither parent can be located. Such treatments are to be performed by M.D., address or/ and phone number. . . . or by a phy-

# GETS SCS AWARD Preach Edelman Cited For Conservation Work

W. L. (Preach) Edelman has been selected by the Tierra Blanca Soil and Water Conservation District (Deaf Smith County) as the "Comeback Farmer of the Year 1969." It was announced by district officials in Hereford.

The nomination of Edelman will be entered in the Texas Conservation Awards Program sponsored by the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce.

Selection to the "Comeback Farmer of the Year" is done so on the basis of a farmer or rancher who has done the greatest job of reclaiming an eroded place he owns or operates.

Edelmans' farm is located 3 miles north of the Summerfield Community. He is carrying out a complete conservation program on the 160-acre irrigated farm. He purchased the farm in 1962. At that time it was a dryland farm. An irrigated well was drilled. The farm has a large number of acres of excessive slope which presented problems with irrigated cropland. The farm did not have any underground irrigation pipeline. Edelman tried farming the land but could not avoid the soil and water loss due to the steep slope.

In 1966, Edelman entered into the Great Plains Conservation Program, a program administered by the Soil Conservation Service. Both technical and cost-share assistance were given in planning and applying the needed conservation practices to improve the farm. Included in Edelman's conservation plan were practices such as conservation cropping system, crop residue use, irrigation pipeline, tailwater return system, irrigation water management, stubble mulching, contour farming, pasture planting, pasture management, and

proper grazing use. These conservation practices are being carried out by Edelman. They have helped in preventing erosion and the farm has become more productive.

Edelman says that the conservation practices that he has carried out on the farm have more than doubled the value of the farm.

Selection of Edelman as "Comeback Farmer of the Year" was made by directors of the Tierra Blanca Soil and Water Conservation District which included all of Deaf Smith County.

Add the date and your signature. This form can also be left at school, or where your child works if he is a minor. A copy should be also with the family doctor to be sure there will be no frantic delays in case of an emergency.

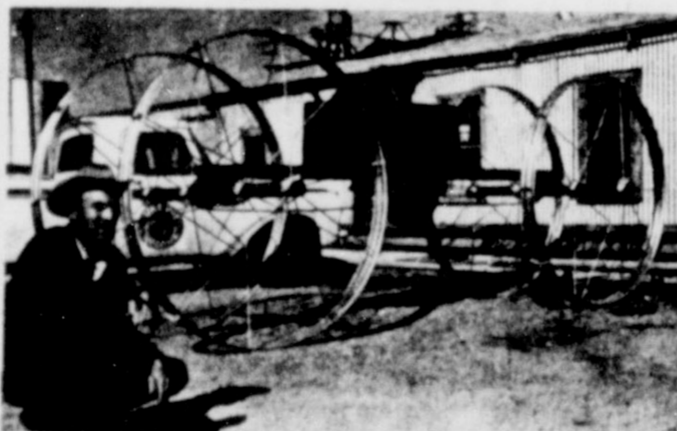
