NORTH TEXAS FIELD PRODUCTION GAINS AS BUREAU REPORT

INCREASES 3,000 BARRELS FOR WEEK ENDING NOVEMBER 18.

TOTAL GAIN FOR WEEK 4,900 BARRELS DAILY

Central Texas Field Shows a Decrease of 2,500 Barrels Daily.

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—Gross crude oil stocks held in pipe line and tank farm storage in the United States increased 4,900 barrels in October, according to the weekly summary of the American Petroleum Institute.

For the week ending November 18 the daily average gross crude oil production of the United States was 1,446,409 barrels, compared with 1,440,409 in the preceding week, an increase of 6,000 barrels.

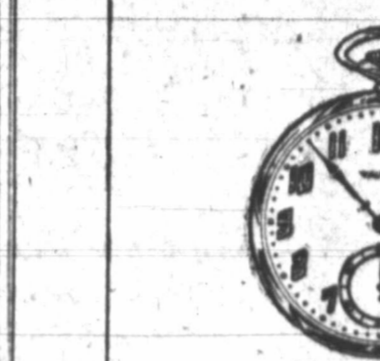

A meeting of resident property owners of irrigation district No. 2 will be held sometime soon, probably at Iowa Park, according to present plans of the directors. In connection with the plan under consideration, figures have been compiled showing the cost per acre of other irrigation projects, the figures in nearly every instance being higher than for the local project, on which the water will cost \$22 per acre. The figures follow: Casabad, N. M., \$15 to \$18; Sun River, Montana, \$11; Yakima, Washington, \$13 to \$15; Tuna, Arizona, \$14 to \$16; Minidoka, Idaho, \$23 to \$26. The low cost of the Idaho project is due to the water power development which provides an added source of revenue.

DELEGATES TO SOUTHERN COMMERCIAL CONGRESS MAKE TRIP TO MEXICO

CHICAGO, Nov. 22.—Activities of delegates to the Southern Commercial congress who adjourned their fifteenth annual session here last night today shifted toward Mexico where a representative body is to spend two weeks in the interest of trade promotion. The itinerary of the trade delegations called for departure this morning for San Antonio where the party will remain Friday night, leaving Saturday morning for Mexico City where they are scheduled to arrive Monday. Among other resolutions adopted were recommendations for the addition of a department of health to the president's cabinet; amendment of the immigration law; an amendment increasing maximum farm loans from \$15,000 to \$25,000; extension of credit to foreign purchasers of America's farm crops; a nationwide reclamation plan; construction of the Atlantic-Mississippi canal; support of the proposed Great Lakes waterway; and completion of the Mississippi River improvement; creation of a federal body to study and make recommendations for procedure to insure world peace; and

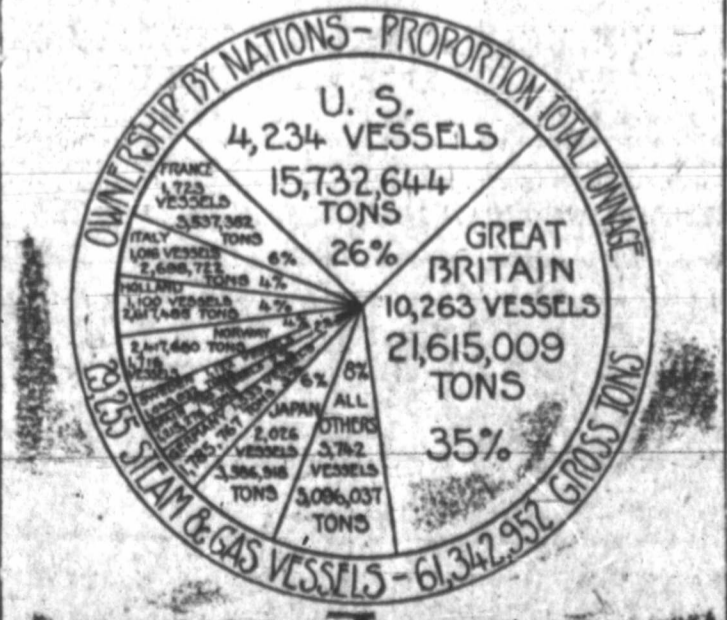

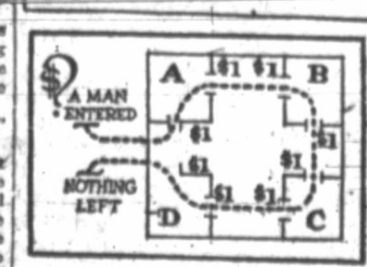

Our Underworld Castles That Defy Both Man and the Elements

STRANGEST of the many puzzling things about the prehistoric cliff dwellings of the Southwest are the circular subterranean rooms found in every one of them that are of considerable size. The famous Cliff Palace, in the Mancos Canyon, Southwest Colorado, contains twenty-three such chambers.

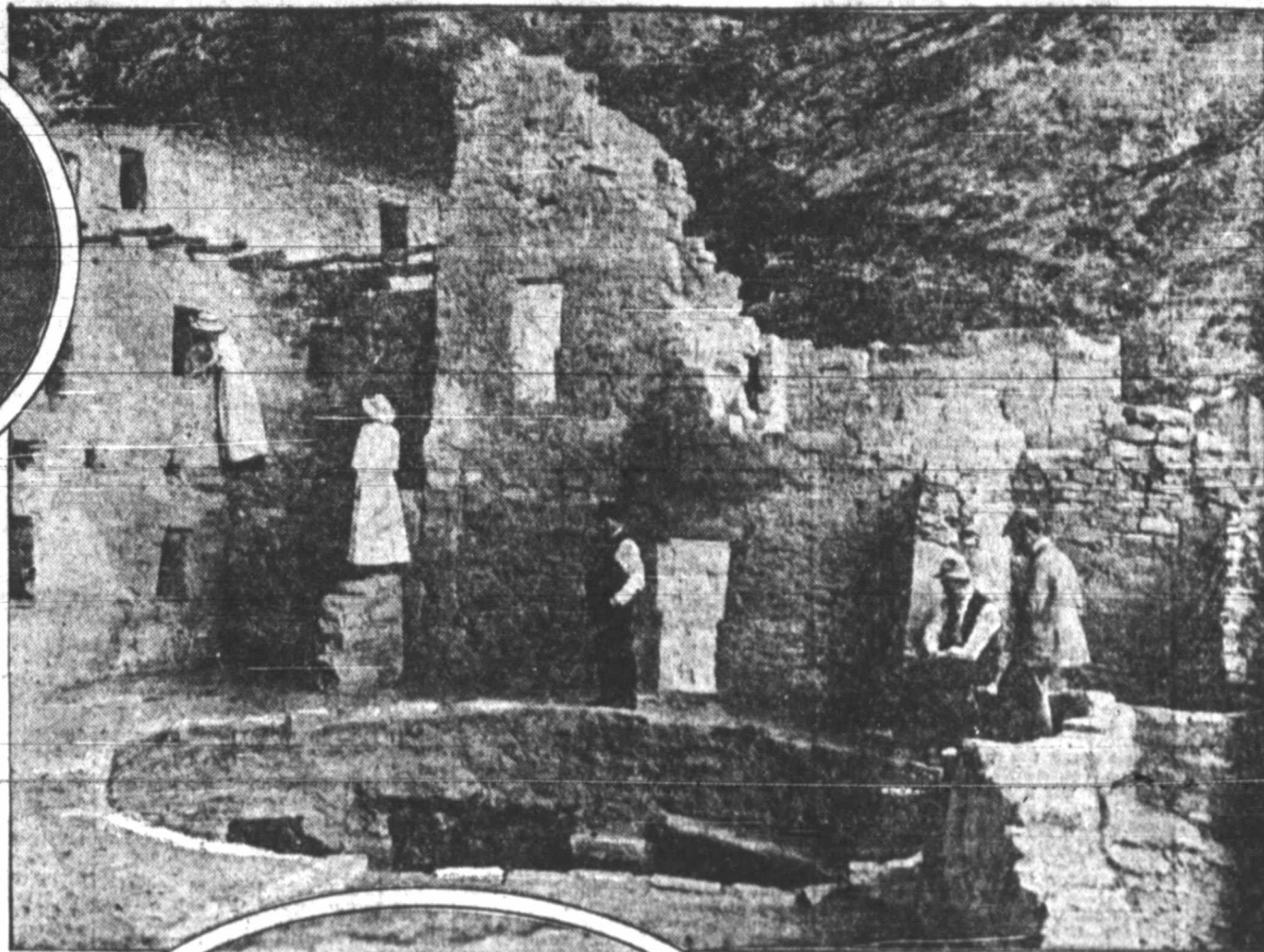
The use to which they were put is sufficiently well-known, however, owing to the fact that the Hopi Indians of today, who are unquestionably descendants of the ancient cliff-dwellers, have in their pueblos similar underground rooms for purposes of religious ceremonial.

The rooms are underground, because, in the belief of these people, it was from an underworld that the first human beings emerged upon the surface of the earth. Hopi Indians, when they die, go back to that underworld—as did their ancestors, the cliff-dwellers—and communication is thereafter maintained with them by the following means:

In the center of the floor of the sub-

of which was a dance plaza paved with lava stone and running the full length of the building, 110 feet. It had four circular underground chambers, one of them thirty-two feet in diameter, with pillars to support the vaulted roof. Such subterranean

terranean chamber there is always a small hole, which leads down to the underworld. Through this hole the Hopi priest talks to the ghosts down below and the latter reply.

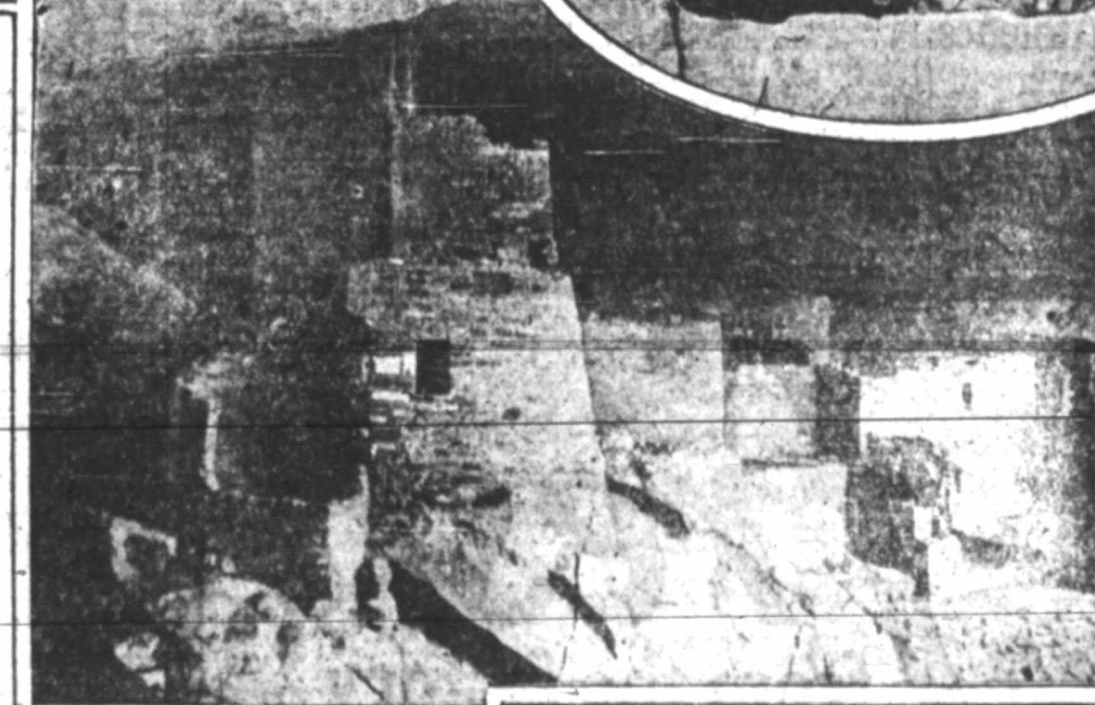
One might suppose that the underworld was a dark and dismal place; but it is not. It is in no way very different from the upper world; for the sun, descending into it as evening falls, illuminates it during the hours when there is darkness on top of the earth. The ghosts live just like ordinary folks. They have snake dances and other ceremonials corresponding to those of the people upstairs.

The prehistoric cliff villages were built usually on rock shelves overhanging the cliff. It was necessary, therefore, to dig the circular rooms out of the solid rock. Inasmuch as the inhabitants were unacquainted with any metal and had only flint tools, it might be supposed that work of the kind was extremely difficult. As a matter of fact, it was not so because the rock was a soft sandstone, easily grubbed out with the most primitive implements.

People always use for building purposes the material readiest at hand. Thus one of our greatest cities, having vast beds of excellent clay easily accessible, is built of brick. The Eskimos build their winter houses of snow, the plains Indians make their tipis of the skins of animals. For the prehistoric cliff-dwellers the material readiest at hand was sandstone, with which, cut into blocks, they built the wonderful structures which remain to this day as their memorials in the canyons of the Mesa Verde.

The region bounded by the Mancos, La Plata and San Juan Rivers is a triangle, around the edges of which is a network of deep ravines that are fairly incrustated with ruins left behind by the cliff-dwellers. They thickly occupy the precipitous sides of the Mancos Canyon, which is thirty miles long and 1000 to 2000 feet deep. It is in this canyon that stands the Cliff Palace, on a rock-shelf 500 feet above the stream. With its great towers, strong walls and battlements, it surpasses any fortress castle to be seen on the Rhine. To call it a palace, however, is not appropriate, inasmuch as it is more properly to be described as a walled town.

Dr. J. Walter Fawkes, Director of the

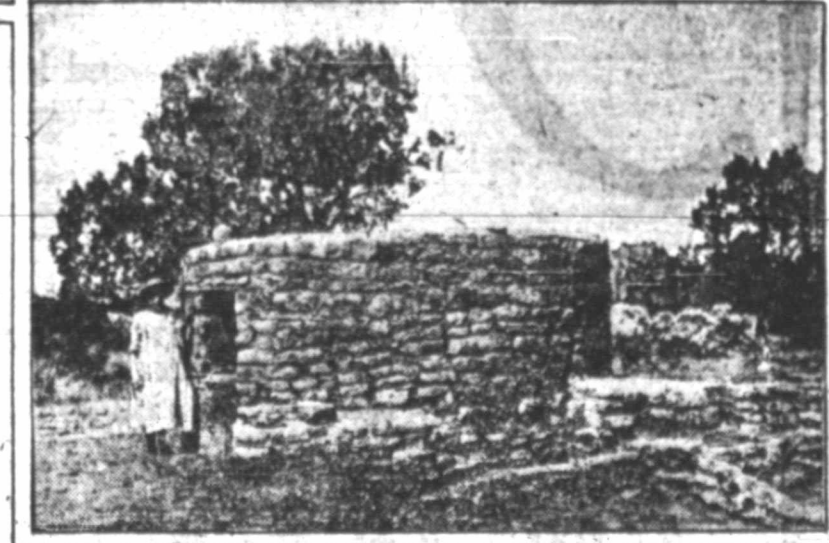


Round tower of the Cliff Palace

Bureau of American Ethnology, has done much more than all other scientists put together to make known the history and manner of life of the ancient cliff-dwellers. He says that their rock-shelf villages were deserted centuries before the landing of Columbus. No white man ever saw an inhabited cliff-dwelling in the Mesa Verde region, and no article of white man's manufacture was ever found in any of those prehistoric habitations.

Dr. Fawkes says that, contrary to the generally accepted notion, the rock-shelf villages were not built primarily for defense, or occupied for safety against attack by enemies. Overhung as they ordinarily were by roofs of rocks, and sheltered in caves which often were of considerable depth, they served as places of winter residence, and for the storage of food supplies.

The Mesa Verde, or Green Plateau, has an area of about sixty-five square miles, its north face rising over 1500 feet above the plain below. It is cleft by deep canyons which contain the most remarkable cliff-dwellings of the Southwest. The caves along the walls of these canyons were carved out

by wind. Wherever a stratum of soft sand or other friable material was exposed on the side of a cliff between layers of rock, winds that swept through the gorge blew away the loose stuff, leaving hollows. The overhanging rock formed a natural roof, affording excellent protection against rain.

In spring the people went up on top of the mesa, where they grew corn, beans, squashes and cotton. Of the cotton they made cloth. Some of the old folks and the very young children were doubtless left in the caves. When the corn and other agriculture products were garnered they were brought down to the caves for winter storage. There was no other place in which to put them. For this purpose large bins were built of cut stone, proof against rats and mice.

It is not thought that the cliff-dwellers were originally native to the region described. They came from the south—i. e., from Mexico—probably driven northward by stronger and braver tribes. For a long time they lived in the way here outlined; but later on—perhaps because they had become so much more numerous as to feel able to defend themselves against any hostile attack—they abandoned the rock shelves and built villages on top of the mesa; villages of stone, that is to say, like those in the caves, were in effect communal dwellings, of a sort of beehive pattern. Their descendants, the Hopi Indians of today, occupy similar "apartment houses."

Apparently this took place some centuries before the discovery of America by Columbus; and it would seem that the lofty plateau called Mesa Verde, 500 or 600 years ago, must have had quite a large population. This may be judged from the ruins of numerous villages that are found scattered over it. The pueblos unquestionably prehistoric, it is true, but extensive excavations have been made in some of these mounds, one of which revealed what is believed to have been a temple for the worship of the sun.

Those ancient people, like their Hopi descendants of today, were worshippers of the forces and phenomena of nature. The subterranean chambers were for earth worship. They worshiped the sun as a deity of the crops. Recently Dr. Fawkes, by the excavation of a mound, brought to light the ruins of a tower which was undoubtedly used for observations of the solar orb. This does not mean that it was designed for astronomical purposes, but merely that the priest of the sun mounted to the top of it to watch the progress of the sun on its journey northward, and, as a result of his observations, to proclaim to the people the arrival of the date for planting the corn or other crops.

On the southern edge of the plateau were found the ruins of a very large apartment house, part of it three stories high, in front

rooms were always roofed over, the only entrance being by a ladder through a scuttle in the top.

The ancient occupants of this apartment house were able to look southward upon a region of magnificent scenery which embraced corners of four of our States. For right there is the only place where four States come together at one point—Utah, Arizona, New Mexico and Colorado. Thus a glance at a map will show exactly where the Mesa Verde is located. It was set apart as a national monument not long ago by Congress, for the sake of preserving its prehistoric remains; and, for the benefit of tourists, the top of the mesa has been made accessible by a road for automobiles and carriages.

One of the most interesting things to be seen on the mesa top is the so-called Munsup Lake. It is not a lake at all, but a great historic reservoir, built for irrigation and presumably to supply drinking water. Circular in shape, it is over ninety feet in diameter, and is surrounded by a wall of cut stone fourteen feet thick. Blown sand and other debris have partly filled it up, but it is believed to have had anciently a considerable depth.

Although the rock-shelf villages were meant chiefly for shelter, precautions for their defense in case of attack were not neglected. Thus, in the case of the Cliff Palace, a solid wall of masonry, built with the edge of the precipice and extending from one end of the rock shelf to the other, continued the sheer face of the cliff upward to a height of several feet above the floor of the cave. Steps cut in the nearly vertical cliff gave access to the rock-shelf; but entrance to the prehistoric structure was practicable only by rope ladders let down for the purpose.

The ruins of the Cliff Palace are strung out in the form of a crescent. It was 425 feet long, with four stories and 200 rooms arranged in suites, affording accommodation for perhaps 500 people. A round tower and a square tower importantly help its architectural grandeur. Behind the wall above described, the space of the cavern is mainly occupied by buildings of masonry, strong and well laid. They have no roofs, standing none. At the back of the cave is a large open space in which, it is believed, tame turkeys were kept.

Magellanic Star-Cloud

THE measurement newly made by Harvard astronomers places the greater Magellanic star-cloud at a distance from us more than three times as great as was previously supposed. The north pole in the sky is represented by the Pole Star. The south celestial pole, therefore, is at a point exactly opposite in the heavens. In the neighborhood of that south pole are two star-clouds named after the explorer Magellan, the Greater and the Lesser. They are vast fields of stars which by their combined luminosity produce to the eye a cloud-like effect in the night sky.

They are certainly far outside of our universe which we call the Milky Way. The Harvard measurement puts the distance of the Greater Magellanic star-cloud at 110,000 light years, and its diameter at 150,000 light years. Its extent through space is actually greater than the width of the gap which separates us from that star-cloud.

Light travels 186,000 miles a second. A light year is the distance covered by a ray of light in a twelvemonth—i. e., 25,418,618,000,000 miles. Thus, according to the reck-

oning of the Harvard observers, the greater Magellanic star-cloud must be 645,225,500,000,000,000 miles away from us. Its diameter is 879,854,400,000,000 miles.

Such huge figures are uncomprehensible to deal with, and the human mind is totally unable to grasp them. Therefore astronomers, in reckoning the distances of stars, do not use them. They state the distances in "parsec"—a parsec being eighteen trillion miles. Thus the distance of the greater Magellanic cloud from us is just about 33,645 parsecs.

Photometric measurements indicate that many of the stars—all of them suns, of course—in that star-cloud are far brighter than any yet found in our own universe. Great numbers of them are more than 10,000 times as bright as our sun.

Quite a number of these giant suns appear to the telescope as if surrounded by luminous rings. This, however, is an optical effect, the fact being, in such instances, that the blazing star is the center of a sphere of gas emitted from it. In other words, they are shells of luminous matter seen as rings against the background of the sky.

Smallpox in the Philippines

THERE was recently a frightful epidemic of smallpox in the Philippines, more than 100,000 people dying of it in 1918 and 1919. Ninety per cent of the deaths were of children. The American authorities, taking the problem vigorously in hand, discovered, owing to a widespread ignorant prejudice against vaccination, local authorities, dice against distributing the vaccine with which they were supplied, made a regular practice of destroying it or throwing it away, submitting reports that it had been duly used.

Thus a huge unvaccinated population accumulated, few of the children having been subjected to the preventive treatment. It needed only a spark to start a conflagration. The epidemic began with the unvaccinated children, spreading like wildfire among them, and was quelled only through the adoption of the sternest measures.

While the Philippines were under Spanish rule, there was no systematic vaccination in the archipelago, and the number of deaths

from smallpox averaged 40,000 a year. The Americans made vaccination compulsory, and, as a result, the disease disappeared from province after province.

There were 989 deaths from smallpox in Manila in 1918. In 1919, there were fifty-five deaths; in 1920, there were only five, and since then not one.

Pele's Hair

THE only volcano goddess in the world dwells in the great crater of Kilauea, in Hawaii. She is called Pele, and violent eruptions of that burning mountain are attributed to her anger. In former days the natives made sacrifices to her on such occasions to appease her wrath.

Very abundant in the vicinity of the crater is a peculiar fine-spun lava, which the natives call "Pele's hair." It is by origin a very liquid lava, which, caught by the wind, is drawn into delicate fibers like spun glass.

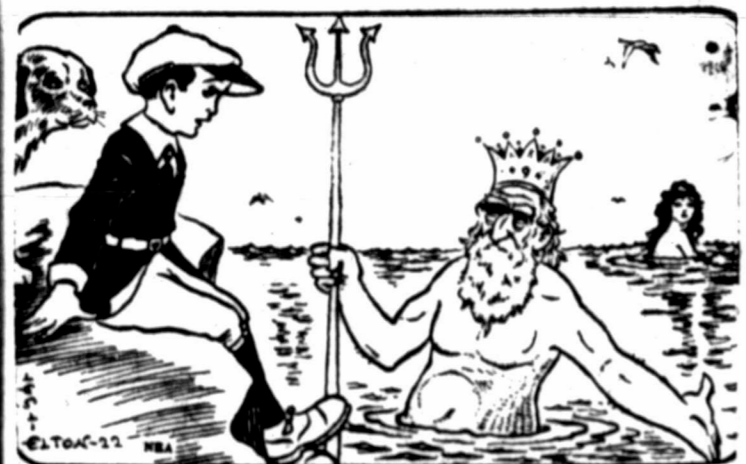

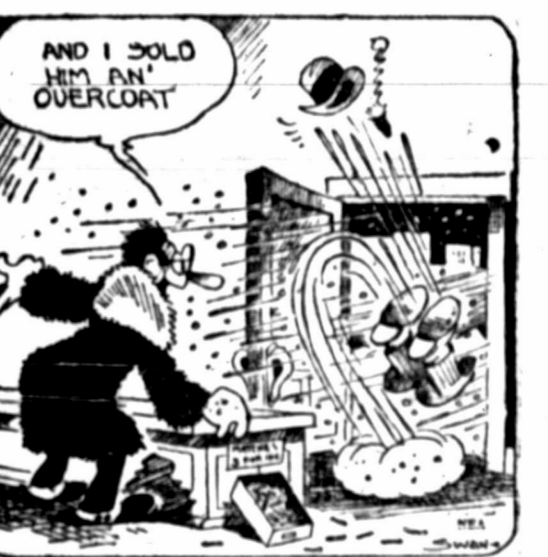

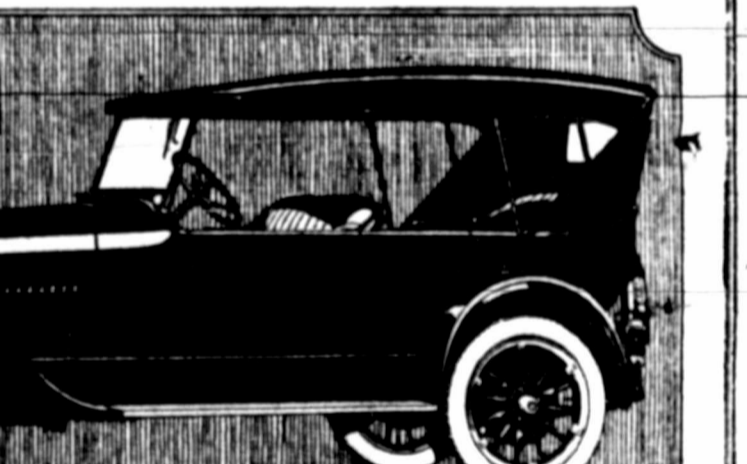
