





MR. CULLINAN'S NATURAL REJECTION

I. S. Cullinan, who advanced \$35,000 to the Peddy camapign, has surrendered himself to disappointment and dejection over the indifference of the people of Texas to the maintenance of their rights and constitutional government, and has resigned as head of the Texas chamber of commerce and has announced that he will make no contributions in money or effort to "church, educational, economic or similar work until such time as our people come to their senses."

The dejection to which Mr. Cullinan has sur endered himself comes to nearly every man who has felt deeply, striven earnestly and sacrificed greatly for the common good. It came to George Washington and it has come to other patriots from Washington's time down to Woodrow Wilson. The people oftener than not show an utter indifference and even perversity to efforts in their behalf. They fall to accept salvation. They refuse to be saved. Every man who has gotten out and fought and worked and sacrificed for some principle or for some movement for the public good only to see it rejected must have felt dejection. So it is not unnatural that Mr. Cullinan feels that way.

Mr. Cullinan points to the fact that more than \$00,000 of the 1,200,000 qualified voters of the state remained away from the polls and construes it as meaning that an overwhelming portion of the electorate "was either weak-kneed and thus intimidated, or were moral cowards." Mr. Cullinan characterizes the offense of the majority of the electorate too se verely. It was indifference or uncertainty and confusion rather than moral cowardics that kept them away from the polls. And he should take courage from the knowledge that the defeat of any right principle or movement can be but temporary and that a fight for the right is never entirely in vain. Of course, there are folks who will not place such a high estimate on Mr. Cullinan's efforts and to whom his statement will sound only as the bitter railings of a man disappointed in an unworthy effort. But it is out of such very conflicts of opinion that interest is aroused and convictions formed and advancement made.

There are even now folks who are optimistic enough to believe that the storm of religious prejudice and racial hatred has spent its force and that the discussion in the recent campaign has strengthened the belief of the people in religious freedom, the separation of church and state and in government of law under the constitution.

CRIME NEWS IN THE NEWSPAPERS.

Even the best and most conservative of newspapers publish a considerable amount of news of erimes. Probably all of them publish too much of such news. But as long as there is crime and criminals such reports will get into the newspapers. And it is the duty of newspapers to publish such reports. Tom Finty Jr., of the Dallas News and Journal, in an address at Houston recently gave one good reason why it is the duty of newspapers to publish reports of crimes.

"The news of crime," said Mr. Finty, "has to do with the act or inaction of public officers. Newspapers cannot fail to publish it without failing of their duty, as implied by the laws to which I have referred. If they suppress it, the citizen, in ignorance of the operations of burgiars, yeggmen, hijackers, bootleggers, moonshiners, etc., falls property to protect his home, his business and his person; the merchant, unaware of the presence in his community of swindlers and forgers, fails to guard against them; and public officers, being largely without the restraint either of the physical or constructive presonce of their constituencies, draw their salaries while asleep at the switch. Under these conditions, there wouldn't be much business to advertise. The idea that crime would cease under an ostrich-like policy is highly imaginative."

But there is a right and wrong way to publish such news, Mr. Finty points out, declaring that much of the extreme display and sensationalism is repre-

"Enlargement upon a crime at the expense of truth marits severe condemnation," declares Mr. Finty. "It is damnable for a newspaper to try a se in its columns, either to convict or acquit. fuch of the sob-stuff is nauseating or worse, Also, lased or prejudiced way, or reach beyond the progs with forecasts of prospective testimony, predictions of results or statements of the standing of a fury yet deliberating.


Our Underworld Castles That Defy Both Man and the Elements

STRANGEST of the many puzzling things about the prehistoric cliff dwellings of the Southwest are the circular subterranean sooms found in every one of them that are of considerable size. The famous Cliff Palace, in the Mancos Canyon, Southwest Colorado, contains twenty-three such cham-

The use to which they were put is sufficiently well known, however, owing to the fact that the Hopi Indians of today, who are unquestionably descendants of the ancient cliff-dwellers, have in their pueblos similar underground rooms for purposes of religious ceremonial.

The rooms are underground, because, in the belief of those people, it was from an underworld that the first human beings emerged upon the surface of, the earth. Hopi Indians, when they die, go back to that underworld-as did their aucestors, the cliff-dwellers and communication is thereafter maintained with them by the tollowing means:


One might suppose that the underworld was a dark and dismal place; but it is not. way very different from the upper world; for the sun, descending into it as evening falls, illuminates it during the bours when there is darkness on top of the earth. The ghosts live just like ordinary folks. They have snake dances and other ceremonials berresponding to those of the people upstairs.

The prehistoric cliff villages were built usually on rock shelves overhung by the eliff. It was necessary, therefore, to dig the circular rooms out of the solid rock. Inasmuch as the inhabitants were unacquainted with any metal and had only flint tools, it might be supposed that work of the kind was extremely difficult. As a matter of fact, it was not so because the rock was a soft sandstone, easily grubbed out with the most primitive implements.

People always use for building purposes the material readiest at hand. Thus one of our greatest cities, having vast beds of excellent clay easily accessible, is built of brick. The Eskinmos build their winter houses of snow, the plains Indians make their tepees of the skine of animals. For the. prehistoric cliff-dwellers the material readiest at hand was sandstone, with which, cut into blocks, they built the wonderful struetures which remain to this day as their memorials in the canyons of the Mesa Verde.

The region bounded by the Mancos, La Plats and San Juan Rivers is a triangle. around the edges of which is a network of deep ravines that are fairly incrusted with ruins left behind by the cliff dwellers. They thickly occupy the precipitous sides of the Mancos Canyon, which is thirty miles long and 1000 to 2000 feet deep. It is in this canyon that stands the Cliff Palace, on a rock-shelf 500 feet above the stream. With Sts great towers, strong walls and battlements, it surpasses any fortress castle to be seen on the Rhine. To call it a palace, however, is not appropriate, inasmuch as it is more properly to be described as a walled

Dr. J. Walter Fewkes, Director of the

Bureau of American Ethnology, has done much more than all other scientists put together to make known the history and manner of life of the ancient cliff dwellers. He says that their rock-shelf villages were deserted centuries before the landing of Columbus. No white man ever saw an anhabited cliffdwelling in the Mesa Verde region, and no article of white man's manufacture was ever found in any of those prehistoric

babitations. .Dr. Fewkes says that, contrary to the renerally accepted notion, the rock-shelf vilages were not built primarily for defense, or occupied for safety against attack byenemies. Overhung as they ordinarily were by roofs of rocks, and sheltered in caves which often were of considerable depth, they served as places of winter residence, and for the storage of food supplies.

The Mesa Verde, or Green Plateau, has an area of about sixty-five square miles, its north face rising over 1500 feet above the plain below. It is cleft by deep canyons which contain the most remarkable eliffdwellings of the Southwest. The caves along the walls of these canyons were carved out

by wind. Wherever a stratum of soft sand or other friable material was exposed on the side of a cliff between layers of rock, winds that swept through the gorge blew away the loose stuff, leaving hollows. The overhanging rock formed a natural roof. affording excellent protection against rain.

In spring the people went up on top of the ness, where they grew corn, beans, squashes and cotton. Of the cotton they made cloth. Some of the old folks and the very young children were doubtless left in the cayes. When the corn and other agriculture products were garnered they were brought down to the caves for winter storage. There was no other place in which to put them. For this purpose large bins were built of cut. stone, proof against rate and mice.

It is not thought that the cliff-dwellers were originally native to the region described. They came from the south-1. e., from Mexico-probably driven northward by stronger and fiercer tribes. For a long time they lived in the way here outlined; but later on perhaps because they had become so much more numerous as to feel able to defend themselves against any hostile attack—they abandoned the rock shelves and built villages on top of the mesn; villages of stone, that is to say, which, like those in the caves, were in effect communal dwellings, of a sort of beeblee pattern. Their descendants, the Hopi Indians of today, occupy similar "apartment houses."

Apparently this took place some centuries before the discovery of America by Columbus; and it would seem that the lofty plateau called Mesa Verde, 500 or 600 years ago. must have had quite a large population. This may be judged from the ruins of numerous villages that are found scattered over it, pueblos unquestionably prehistoric, marked by great mounds. Extensive excavations have been made in some of these mounds, one of which revealed what is believed to have been a temple for the worship

THOSE ancient people, like their Hopi de-A scendants of today, were worshipers of the forces and phenomena of nature. The subterranean chambers were for earth worship. They worshiped the sun as creator of the crops. Recently Dr. Fewkes, by the excavation of a mound, brought to light the ruins of a tower which was undoubtedly used for observations of the solar orb. This does not mean that it was designed for astronomical purposes, but merely that the priest of the sun mounted to the top of it' to watch the progress of the sun on its journey northward, and, as a result of his observations, to proclaim to the people the arrival of the date for planting the corn or

On the southern edge of the plateau were found the ruins of a very large apartment house, part of it three stories high, in front

rooms were always roofed over, the only entrance being by a ladder through a scuttle in the top.

The ancient occupants of this apartment house where able to look southward upon a region of magnificent scenery which embraced corners of four of our States. For right there is the only place where four States come together at one point-Utah, Arizona, New Mexico and Colorado. Thus a glance at a map will show exactly where the Mesa Verde is located. It was set apart as a national monument not long ago by Congress, for the sake of preserving its prehistoric remains; and, for the benefit of tourists, the top of the mess has been made accessible by a road for automobiles -s red

One of the most interesting things to be seen on the mesa top is the so-called Mummp Lake. It is not a lake at all, but a preshistoric reservoir, built for irrigation and presumably to supply drinking water. Circulas in shape, it is over ninety feet in diameter, and is surrounded by a wall of cut stone fourteen feet thick. Blown sand and other debris have partly filled it up, but it is believed to have had anciently a considerable

Although the rock-shelf villages were meant chiefly for shelter, precautions for their defense in case of attack were not neglected. Thus, in the case of the CHIE Palace, a solid wall of masonry, built flush with the edge of the precipics and extending from one end of the rock shelf to the other. continued the sheer face of the cliff upward to a height of several feet above the floor of the cave. Steps cut in the nearly vertical cliff gave access to the rock-shelf; but enfrance to the prehistoric structure was practicable only by rope ladders let down for the purpose.

FEEEE ruins of the Cliff Palace are strung out in the form of a crescent. It was 425 feet long, with four stories and 200 rooms arranged in suites, affording accommodation for perhaps 500 people. A round tower and a square tower importantly help its archiectural grandeur. Behind the wall above described, the space of the cavern is mainly occupied by buildings of masonry, strong and well laid. They have no roofs, needing none. At the back of the cave is a large open space in which, it is believed, tame turkeys were kept.
