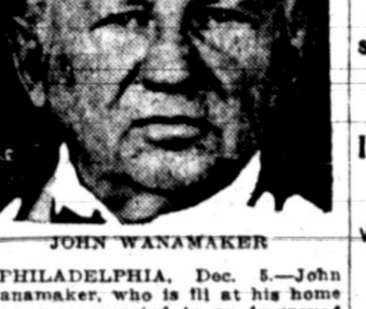
NEW YORK QUOTATION ON SILVER IS INCREASED

PROGRESSIVE BLOC WINS FIRST ROUND IN SENATE BATTLE

COMPLAINT FILED AGAINST NEGRO IN SKIPWORTH CASE

This is the negro that was identified by the girl companion of the young man who was also attacked, according to her statement to the officers, and thrown off another cliff, nearly a mile away.

REORGANIZATION OF KATY APPROVED BY I. C. COMMISSION

SOME LINES OPERATED IN TEXAS NOT INCLUDED IN NEW SYSTEM.

COMMISSION OPPOSES FROM MAJORITY OPINION

Wants General Policy Laid Down For the Reorganization of Companies.

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—Reorganization plans for the Missouri, Kansas and Texas railroad which has been in receivership for several years, were approved today by the interstate commerce commission.

The new company, authorized to acquire all of the railroad lines and terminal properties of the old system, will have total stock and bond issues with a par value of \$184,000,000 and 1,000,000 shares of common stock without par value.

Its annual fixed interest charges will amount to \$14,813,000. The commission calculated that the total capitalization of the old company was \$242,176,000 while its annual fixed charges had been \$7,193,000.

The reorganization will start the new Missouri-Kansas-Texas railroad in operation with capital liabilities of \$46,376,000 less than those carried by its predecessor and annual interest charges less than that of the former corporation by \$1,708,000.

Earnings of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas for the last 18 months, the commission said, have been sufficient to meet the total annual interest and other fixed charges as the reorganization will leave them. Most of the securities which the new company is permitted to issue will be exchanged for securities of the old company to finance the reorganization, assessments of \$25 per share to be levied on the common stock of the old company and \$20 per share on the preferred stock which assessments are expected to raise about \$18,435,000 in cash, the commission said.

The payers of the assessments will receive shares of the common stock in the new company which stock will have voting privileges.

Lower Capitalization.

"The new capitalization will be substantially lower than the total system liabilities of the present Missouri, Kansas and Texas system," the commission said, "and the fixed charges will be materially reduced with the consequent improvement in credit. The evidence also indicates that the new capitalization will not be disproportionate to the earnings of the applicant. Under these circumstances, in view of the manifest desirability of ending the long period of receivership, we think that the approval of the proposed capitalization should not be withheld."

Commissioner Eastman dissented from the majority opinion on the ground that the commission should have a general policy laid down for the reorganization of companies in receivership and that this policy should not allow a new company to be organized to take over any insolvent railroad when bond issues in excess of one-half the property value were created by the reorganization.

While all of the property of the new Missouri-Kansas-Texas is acquired from the holdings of the old system, a number of lines, chiefly branches in Texas and Oklahoma, which the old company operated will not go into the new system.

The commission gave notice that its approval of the reorganization was not to be construed as granting authority for the abandonment of such lines. Most of them, it indicated, would be acquired by other railroads or persons, and would be continued in operation.

CHINESE BANDITS IN CHARGE IN SHANTUNG AND KIAOCHOW PORT

By Associated Press. TIENTSIN, China, Dec. 4.—Reports received here say that Chinese bandits have taken control of Telingtao, Shantung and the Kiao-chow port whose stormy career in war and diplomacy was to culminate today in its return to China after 24 years of alien rule, the first 16 under Germany and the last eight under Japan. The population is reported fleeing from the city.

Trainees from Tientsin are said to be crowded with refugees. Chinese police sent from Peking to take over the city are reported to have been driven out of their barracks.

The bandits, according to the telegrams, demand \$100,000 ransom for the delivery of government officials and police in their hands. The outlaw also held out for the appointment of their chief as governor of the port.

Shops and residences are being looted nightly, the dispatches say. The 30,000 Japanese who remain in Telingtao, unorganized for departing the port, apparently are impeding in the face of the menaces.

This was the day set for the actual delivery of the Kiao-chow territory from Japan to China under the terms of the Washington armament conference. The region was handed to Germany in 1915 as indemnity for losses in the boxer uprising. At the outbreak of the world war, Japan captured it and was awarded it at the peace of Versailles but in conversations with China at the Washington conference agreed to turn it back this winter.

JAPANESE DESTROYERS IN KIAOCHOW HARBOR

KIAOCHOW, CHINA, Dec. 5.—Two Japanese destroyers are in the harbor here as a precaution against trouble from bandits who are feared, may molest Japanese nationals. Many bandits are known to be in the district.

MASONIC MASTER PROTESTS MIXING KLAN WITH ORDER

TURKEY AND EUROPE DRIFTING FAR APART PEACE IS UNLIKELY

RESUMPTION OF THE WAR IN SOUTHEASTERN EUROPE IS EXPECTED.

EXTREME NERVOUSNESS RESULT OF SITUATION

Suggested General War May Be Launched by the League of Nations.

By Associated Press. WACO, Dec. 5.—The grand lodge Texas Masons assembled here this morning for the annual communication, Grand Master D. Frank Johnson presiding. The initial session was given over to the usual preliminaries, all the grand officers being present and performing their several functions.

A feature of the grand master's address was his reference to attempts on the part of business men and politicians to use the name of the order to promote their private interests which he believed he had checked in every instance where such practice had been called to his attention. He also referred to activities of solicitors for the Ku Klux Klan among the members of the order and the factional strife caused thereby, at times threatening to break up an entire lodge. He strongly condemned the efforts of solicitors for the Ku Klux Klan to connect that organization with Masonry and had been pleased to observe that the officers of the Klan had also condemned such efforts.

The grand master had refused to allow a baseball club to use the name "Masonic" and had denied participation to a Masonic lodge to attend a special church service in a body. He declared that while the Masonic order was a religious organization it was non-sectarian and non-denominational.

Another Discovered.

SAN FRANCISCO.—Discovery of a second specimen of the baluchitherium, a long extinct mammalian which roamed the Mongolian desert ages ago, is announced here by J. B. Shackelford of the American museum of natural history who arrived from the Orient. The mammal is supposed to have roamed the desert 2,000,000 years ago. It was so large, Prof. Shackelford said, that it took two men to lift its "funny" horns from the earth.

TURKEY AND EUROPE DRIFTING FAR APART PEACE IS UNLIKELY

### RESTRICTIONS AGAINST GENERAL RUN TO STAND

Various Large Employers of Labor Bring Pressure on Members of Congress.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—Various large employers of labor are beginning to bring pressure on congress to modify the immigration law in the direction of admitting more male labor.

It is reported that the shortage of unskilled labor is embarrassing and that it has resulted or is now resulting in advances of wages to such a degree as to disturb seriously our whole industrial life.

While there is this spectacle of rising wages in the cities there is on the farms the contrasting spectacle of increasing distress.

The forces which passed the present immigration law by a majority of more than nine to one, is not less powerful in the new congress. Moreover, sentiment throughout the country tends to grow more and more right in its insistence on a purer Americanism.

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### CHARLES REPORTS 4,000 BALES COTTON GINNED

CHARLIE, TEXAS, Dec. 5.—About 4,000 bales of cotton have been ginned in Charlie this year, and one gin still runs two days in each week. A few bales were brought from Oklahoma, which fact indicates that much cotton raised in the neighboring sections of that state has been ginned here.

## JURY'S MISCONDUCT MADE TOUSSAINT'S VERDICT "TAINTED"

The verdict as returned by the trial jury in the Henry J. Toussaint case in this county was a "tainted" verdict, in the words of the honorable court of criminal appeals by reason of the misconduct of the jury.

The mandate and opinion of the higher court, in which the case was reversed and remanded for trial were received by District Clerk A. F. Kerr Monday afternoon.

The higher court found no reversible error in any of the exceptions which were taken to it by the defense except the one pertaining to the misconduct of the jury.

The court of criminal appeals points specifically to the fact and assigns it as an error that the members of the jury held conversations over the telephone and to other persons while coming to and from their meals without the consent of the trial judge and the attorneys in the case.

The opinion also devotes considerable space to the affidavits that occurred on the fire escape of the court house when two members of the jury spoke to two women who were being held as prisoners.

By reason of these various occurrences, the higher court states, the verdict of the jury is finding him guilty and assessing the death penalty is a "tainted" one.

The case against the alleged slayer of his father remains on the docket of the 29th district court. Judge H. R. Wilson who was then serving as district attorney is disqualified to try the case and it is the plan to have Governor Neff transfer the case to either the 78th

or the 29th district court, where it will be set for trial at an early date. The procedure of transferring will be done after the 30th district court opens up its December term here on December 15.

## EMPLOYED AS SECRETARY OF ELECTRA METHODIST CHURCH

ELECTRA, TEXAS, Dec. 5.—Mrs. F. M. Baker has been employed as secretary by the officials of the First Methodist church. Her duty will include a canvass of the membership to secure pledges on the church budget and the collecting of such pledges as have not been paid. Nearly 60 per cent of the members

were canvassed by the stewards before Mrs. Baker was employed, and 50 per cent of these have indicated here, and the idea seems to meet popular sentiment unanimously.

Conference collections are \$400 heavier than last year. The total budget of the church is \$7,300.

## WHEAT AROUND ELECTRA REPORTED LOOKING FINE

ELECTRA, TEXAS, Dec. 5.—Wheat in this section of Wichita

county is in fine condition and the acreage is unusually large. According to County Agent Guy R. Jones, the condition of the crop is better at this time than for many years.

Four and a half inches of rain fell during the last half of October and first 15 days of November, as a result of which there is sufficient moisture to insure growth through the winter, even though no more rain should fall. The acreage is large.

Local gins have handled 1,500 bales of cotton or about 200 more than last year. It is estimated that the cotton crop in this section is practically all out of the field.

People who are tempted to go away with them-

self, and who conquer the impulse, never look back to their decision with regret.  
We should never lose sight of the truth that, while things may look black now, with apparently no escape from trouble, there is an escape from every trouble, and there always comes a turn for the better. The blackest hour is just before dawn.  
Most suicides are cowardly. And all are futile, for we cannot escape from our troubles. We carry them with us, beyond the grave, for there is no real trouble except mental. The agony of a physical condition annoys us chiefly in its effect on the mind.  
Solve problems instead of running away from them. There's always a solution.

## Trade Miller for Outfielder Silva Of Birmingham

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Dec. 5.—Kenesaw Mountain Landis, baseball commissioner, declined today to be drawn into a controversy with President Ban Johnson of the American league because of President Johnson's action in calling the annual meeting of the league in Chicago on December 12, a day in advance of the scheduled joint meeting of the major leagues which Commissioner Landis had scheduled for New York, December 14.

Commissioner Landis declared that insofar as the organization work and appointment of committees is concerned, he is not prepared to say whether the American league club owners, or the American baseball leaders pointed out that it would be impossible for the American leaguers to attend on the date set because of their Chicago meeting. President Johnson, in announcing the meeting for Chicago, said he could see no reason for a joint meeting of the major league heads in New York as no subjects of importance were facing the club-owners of the two leagues.

The white-haired commissioner with his floppy black hat and carrying a cane that resembles a limb of a small tree, was a picturesque figure at the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues convention today.

The first session of the minor leaguers is scheduled for this afternoon when President H. M. Sexton will begin the organization work and appoint committees to consider important problems. The first important session will be held tomorrow afternoon. The question of the draft probably will be brought up and it is reported that the Texas league and the Southern association, which now recognize the right of the majors to select players annually, would seek to join the American association, International Pacific coast, Western and Texas leagues, the five organizations that declined to subscribe to the draft.

The American association club owners who yesterday re-elected President Thomas J. Rickey for a five-year term, reconvened today to consider the question of the draft.

Outfielder Silva of the Birmingham club of the Southern association was traded for Outfielder Miller of the Wichita Falls club of the Texas league.

President by Ambassador Jusserand. From the white house he expects to strike home in the afternoon. He will be introduced by Hugh S. Wallace, who was American ambassador to France during the greater part of the peace negotiations at Versailles. His only engagement for Thursday is a luncheon engagement with President Harding.

Whatever Clemenceau plans to deliver here in the way of a broadcast in his campaign to win American sympathy and participation in the affairs of France will be reserved for Friday—his last day in Washington. On his way to Washington from St. Louis where he delivered his fourth formal address in this country, Clemenceau stopped off at Baltimore for six hours and delivered a speech before the Maryland historical society.

In it he voiced a plea for better understanding between the people of the United States and those of France and declared he was going to take home the message.

"Don't fear, America is in the same boat as we are. We have had toward us and which we have toward her is put on such a solid foundation that it cannot be moved forever."

May Be Differences.  
He said he realized there might be differences between the two governments "about interests and actions and activities."

"But what is that?" he exclaimed, "differing on a matter of today which is not a matter of tomorrow? The bottom of it is that we must not differ on things that are lasting."

"We have great defects. We are full of faults and I wish you would see them in order to love us better, if possible. I think it is so in happy households. A man and a woman as long as they don't know their weak points, cannot love each other as they ought."

"The great point, I want to say, is that we are men, that we want to work for men, that France does not consider only the interest of France, but she takes into account that the best work she can do is to work for mankind in the future."

## MILLER BROTHERS PLAY LEADING ROLE IN THE GRID RECORD OF NOTRE DAME

The success of Notre Dame football has been credited to many causes—among which are the Miller brothers.

What the Five Brothers are to tobacco and the Smith brothers are to dough drops—all this and more are the Miller brothers to Notre Dame football.

The family has been reduced to a chemical formula by Notre Dame coaches. A coach will looked over his prospects and then decide how much Miller he needs—after which the call goes to Defiance, Ohio, and on comes the speed package.

In 1904 a good team needed a halfback to be great. The first Miller to be recruited was "Red" Miller. He is now the superstar of Notre Dame football tradition. He played four years on the squad, captained the 1922 team which defeated Michigan at the height of Wolverine glory. He was the greatest halfback Notre Dame ever knew.

In 1911 Ray Miller was added to the brood and played two years. Walter came after the war, the third halfback Miller and played fullback for two seasons.

The plight in which Knute Rockne found himself at the beginning of the season was fairly well known. It happened that he faced a heavy schedule without a team—that was all. He aligned his Chester, his Carberry, his Degres and his Cotton; he figured the ability of his various freshmen candidates. Then he decided: "Two shots of Miller will do the trick."

Gerry, the fourth brother, is a backfield candidate who is kept from the right-half job by one man only—and that man is brother Don. The youngest of the five Millers, and potentially the greatest of the lot in his first season on the team, Don has distinguished himself against Georgia Tech, West Point, Indiana, Purdue and a host of lesser teams.

After the next two seasons Notre Dame will get Millerless for a few years—but then will come the second edition—for Red Miller is already the father of a pair of dashing halfbacks in Cleveland.

## Billy Evans says

Jake May, a southpaw pitcher from the Vernon club of the Pacific coast league, is the very latest couple of the great uncertainty of the national pastime.

In the spring of 1921 May was picked to win a regular berth on the pitching staff of the St. Louis Cardinals in the series with the Browns he justified that belief by working two fine games.

Shortly after the opening of the season he lost control entirely and despite his great natural ability was unable to win for the Cardinals.

Manager Rickey had designs on the National league pennant. He felt that the best left-handed pitcher available to turn the trick. The poor showing of May in the early games caused Rickey to lose faith in him.

Rickey wanted a southpaw. Bill Halley, a veteran big leaguer, was the best left-handed prospect in the minors. They figured Halley's experience would help him get by. Rickey sought a southpaw who could take his regular regular and win a majority of his games.

Rickey had lost confidence in May to such an extent that he was perfectly willing to send May to the Beaumont club of the Texas league in exchange for Halley. May met with just so-so success in that organization.

In the fall of 1922, Vernon of the Pacific Coast league made a trade which brought May from the Texas to that league. Vernon needed a southpaw and May looked like the best bet in the minors.

Last season May was one of the shining lights of the Coast league. The southpaw had a wonderful year, winning 35 and losing nine games. He was the most-talked-about pitcher on the coast.

May originally cost the St. Louis Cardinals \$150. When the Cardinals wanted to make a trade with Beaumont for Halley, every National league club waived. Not a club owner or manager believed May would be any help to his club. Halley, secured in return, had passed out of the majors the year before.

Now report has it that May is to be a member of the New York Yankees next year. The Yankees certainly need a southpaw, and if May can deliver he will do much for the cause of Higgins & Co. in New York.

It has been hinted that May will go to the highest bidder. I doubt this since the New York Yankees already have some kind of a working agreement with Vernon that gives the Yankees first shot. Several players and a vice-pres of money will likely turn the trick for the Yankees.

May, a big league discard two years ago, suddenly becomes the most-sought-after pitcher in the minors. You never can tell it baseball.
