

CRISSINGER URGED FOR NEW GOVERNOR OF RESERVE BOARD

LIFELONG FRIEND OF PRESIDENT MAY BE SUCCEEDED BY CRISSINGER

CONTROLLER OF CURRENCY WOULD SATISFY FARMERS

Agricultural Interests of West Have Severely Criticized Board.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—Every editorial aspect of the progressive or radical movement reinforces the proof of how much its fundamental principles are in the nature of things, and how deeply it reaches into the very heart of the country.

The federal reserve board which is the head, essentially of the country's banking system, is a subject of inquiry and discussion having largely to do with the nature of criticism throughout those parts of the west where the board and the existing system and its methods and personnel are taken for granted. It would be a fair guess that the long delay on the part of President Harding in filling the vacancy in the office of governor of the board has been caused by this condition in the west.

The vacancy has existed since August. In the meantime, the board has been in the hands of a committee of the board, W. P. G. Harding, who is a democrat, but it is clear that he has been troubled by the fact that his own party in the west was strongly and most vocally opposed to him.

This opposition was based generally on the allegation that Governor Harding reflected the thought of bankers and business men, and specifically on the fact that Governor Harding had carried out the policy of post war deflation, on which the western farmers put the blame for many of their troubles.

Many in the west wanted Meyer, but most of the past six years he has spent in the government service. Lately he has been at the head of that branch of the treasury which has been loaning government money to the west and south in order to prevent the forced sale of farm products at a sacrifice, and otherwise to ease the distressed farmers over their time of trouble.

The manner in which Mr. Meyer has carried out this project is responsible for that good opinion in the west which urged President Harding to give Mr. Meyer the vacant leadership of the federal reserve board. There are serious geographical objections to this, however, because Mr. Meyer is from New York and that state already has one of its seven members of the board in the person of Edmund Platt.

In this trying problem of many angles which has faced President Harding for more than four months, it is the judgment of many that he will seek the answer in appointing David R. Crissinger. Mr. Crissinger is at present controller of the currency, to which office he was appointed by President Harding. As a controller of the currency he is an ex-officio member of the federal reserve board and has acquired extensive experience and knowledge of its policies and practices. Originally Mr. Crissinger was a banker and lawyer in President Harding's home town of Marion and has had a lifelong intimacy with the president. As a small city banker from a point within the reasonable geographical limits of what can be called the agricultural west, Mr. Crissinger would carry no liabilities of odium to those western farming interests from which most of the present embarrassment comes. As one who came into the treasury as late as March 1921, he would be free from charges of having initiated or conducted the policy of deflation. At the same time, his nearly two years of experience as controller of the currency and ex-officio member of the federal reserve board would carry reassurance to those who demand a man of sufficient banking experience. Excepting Mr. Meyer, whose relation to the western farmers happens to be unique, any other appointee who had acquired his banking experience in the larger cities would undoubtedly bring up on President Harding the embarrassment of opposition from the suspicious and truculent farmers.

CONGRESSMAN MANN LEAVES \$200,000 ESTATE.

CHICAGO, Dec. 7.—Mrs. Emma C. Mann, widow of the late Congressman James R. Mann, who died several days ago in Washington, will inherit his entire estate with an estimated value of \$200,000, according to her will to be filed for probate this week, George W. Miller, attorney for the family, announced.

DETECTIVE EXPECTS TO QUESTION BANKER IN HALL-MILLS CASE

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., Dec. 7.—Fred A. David, Middlesex county detective, announced that he planned to question a New Brunswick banker who he believes may have been an eye witness to the murder of Rev. Edward Wheeler Hall and Mrs. Eleanor R. Mills on September 14.

According to David, the banker, whose name he declined to divulge, has been mentioned in the case and has been questioned at least twice, but has refused to confirm or deny the story that he was on the Phillips farm the night of the crime. David would not indicate why he wanted to question him further.

OKLAHOMA ATTORNEY IS SENTENCED TWO YEARS

OKLAHOMA CITY, Dec. 7.—O. T. Shinn, local attorney, was found guilty by a jury here late yesterday on a charge of stealing four year old Jack Karam, son of Mr. and Mrs. Karl Amund Karam. He was sentenced to serve two years in the state penitentiary. He gave notice of appeal.

County Attorney Hughes announced after the verdict he was not sure that he would prosecute Shinn's wife who was charged jointly with her husband. The Karam boy has been returned to his parents.

CAPITAL AND CENTRALIZED GOVERNMENT REQUIRED FOR DEVELOPMENT OF ALASKA

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—Capital and a home centralized government are the prime requisites for development of Alaska, Governor Scott Bode declared today in his annual report.

"Not until mining is inaugurated on a large and generous scale and industries started and permitted to thrive," he added, "will homesteads find occupants and markets and population multiply and opportunities offer in all directions."

A summing up of progress made during the year is bright with promise, the report declared. Customs figures for the year should show a commercial improvement of at least 50 per cent.

Capital should be drawn to Alaska to develop mineral resources, the report added, declaring there still was plenty of gold there. It was said also that prospective oil development and greater coal development promise great returns in the future.

PREMIER OF ITALY HAS ACCEPTED INVITATION TO CONFERENCE IN LONDON

LONDON, Dec. 7.—Premier Mussolini of Italy has accepted the invitation to come to London, and the conference of the allied premiers at the weekend preliminary to the Brussels conference on reparations and war debts is thereby assured full representation. Announcement that the Italian premier's acceptance had been received was made today by the foreign office.

Premier Mussolini left Rome this morning. He will stop off at Lauenburg to look in for a short while at the near east conference but is expected to arrive in London tomorrow night.

RAILROADS NOT LIABLE FOR JEWELRY LOST OR STOLEN FROM BAGGAGE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—Railroads are justified in refusing to pay damages for jewelry that is lost or stolen from the baggage of travelers, the interstate commerce commission held today, and Mrs. F. Berkley Jones of Kirkwood, Mo., lost a claim of \$250 which she made against the Missouri Pacific.

Mrs. Jones raised the question of the legal right of railroads to make such a rider after she lost \$250 worth of jewelry from her trunk while traveling. In checking her trunk Mrs. Jones declared that it contained articles valued at \$500 and paid extra charges for its shipment but the railroad refused to pay the loss.

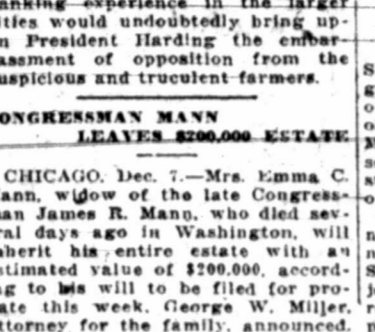
The commission held that all railroads had in effect a regulation refusing to accept responsibility for money, jewelry and negotiable papers when enclosed in baggage and that this rule was reasonable.

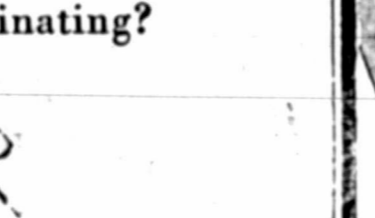

PLAN RABBIT DRIVE IN
GRAY COUNTY CHRISTMAS

McLE, TEXAS, Dec. 7.—Rabbits have become so numerous and such a nuisance to the gardens and field crops in this section of the panhandle that the farmers and business men of the McLean community chamber of commerce have decided to take active stand against them in the form of one big rabbit drive. This will take place Christmas and will cover a territory approximately 100 square miles, the entire south side of Gray county.

Last year it was learned through cards sent out to the farmers that damage done by the rabbits to the individual crops in this vicinity ranged from \$15 to \$100. It is expected that every man, woman and child in the south part of the county will take part in this event. Areas of about four sections will be taken at a time; the rabbits will be driven into high wire rabbit traps which will later be killed and sent to eastern markets. It is thought that the money made from the sale of the meat will be sufficient to cover the most of the great amount of wire that is needed for the undertaking.

This is the first work of this kind that has been undertaken here, though for some time the farmers have realized the great amount of damage done to the crops and gardens by the rabbits. VERNON SHERIFF IS

On Monday morning the justice court opened with 22 negro crop shooters and poker players wanting a trial, all of whom had been arrested Sunday morning at 3 o'clock some eight miles east of Vernon by Sheriff Edmondson's force. The first negro tried before Justice T. J. Griffith was convicted even though he stoutly contended that he was in the kitchen of the little house where the negro festivity was being held and in testimony he stated, "Judge, I just had got to do house and do sweat hadn't dried on my face as I asked for a cup of coffee and was drinking it when de laws—meaning the officers—called all up. He further said, 'I thought robbers had done come and—see I heard one nigger say: 'Oh! Boy get up quick, dat's de ugliest man I ever seed' and Judge I'm telling de truth when I say I was in de kitchen and never seed no kinder game.'"

In spite of the negro's seemingly straight tale the testimony of two deputy sheriffs could not be overruled and the court found him guilty as he did two other defendants. Moments were filed to arrest the judgment and all three of the complaints were held to be defective by the justice and the cases dismissed and the negroes went free. Three other negroes were acquitted by the justice, who stated that it was hard for him to disbelieve the testimony of the deputy sheriffs but that he thought the negro's story was probably true in that there was a doubt in his mind if this was the dark
