By Associated Press. LAUSANNE, Dec. 14.—Turkey will join the league of nations as soon as peace is signed at Lausanne, Ismet Pasha announced at the near day conference today. As the league exercises general supervision over minority populations, Ismet's announcement was interpreted as meaning that Turkey will accept the league's supervision over the Christian populations of Turkey.

WILL RENEW EFFORTS TO SAVE ORIENT ROAD CONFERENCE CALLED

By CHAS. S. HAYDEN. WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—Renewed efforts to save the Kansas City, Mexico and Orient Railroad will be made by the Interstate Commerce Commission. Assurance to this effect was conveyed to Governor H. J. Allen of Kansas today during a conference with Commissioners Eastman and Meyers and immediately thereafter notices were sent out to traffic men of the lines connecting with or intersecting the Orient asking them to meet in Washington to discuss plans for making the Orient a differential line on transcontinental and export business.

COUNTY ATTORNEY AT TULSA IS SUSPENDED

TULSA, Okla., Dec. 14.—County Attorney W. F. Seaver, who came into prominence in Oklahoma recently when he declared that "the people of Tulsa and Tulsa county do not want prohibition and that he was not going to enforce it," was suspended from office late Wednesday by District Judge Albert C. Hunt. John Goldsberry, Seaver's assistant, and county attorney-elect was appointed his successor.

INCREASED AMOUNT COTTON CONSUMED DURING NOVEMBER

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—Cotton consumed during November amounted to 57,561 bales of lint and 53,123 of linters, compared with 52,950 of lint and 43,406 of linters in October this year, and 57,949 of lint and 57,949 of linters in November last year, the census bureau announced today.

SENATE TO GRANT FURTHER HEARINGS ON BLUE SKY LAW

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—The Senate today granted further hearings on the Denison blue sky law which has been relieved somewhat. The senate committee having charge of the bill has agreed to hold further hearings which are to start next Tuesday and this will give opponents of the measure time in which to marshal their forces.

MARION, Ill., Dec. 14.—Before a hushed and crowded court room at the second day of the trial of five men charged with murder in connection with the Herrin riots, three witnesses testified today that they had seen a mob of several hundred persons driving six prisoners before them through the little mining town on the morning of June 22.

FOOTBALL PLAYER INTERFERES WITH DELIVERY AT JAIL

ABILENE, TEXAS, Dec. 14.—Herman Bond, Abilene high school football player, who is a son of Sheriff John Bond, heard a strange noise at the jail this morning. Investigating, he saw the head of a prisoner protruding from a certain window. "Get that head back in there or I'll shoot it off," young Bond shouted. Further investigation revealed that four prisoners, having sawed the bars, were just ready to climb from the jail.

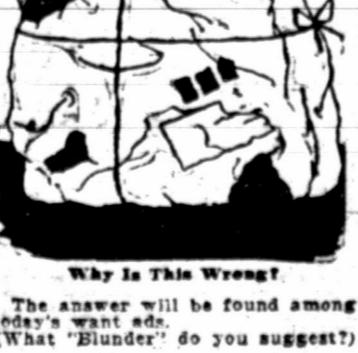
TO START DRILLING OFFSET GAS WELLS AND STOP DRAINING

### HARDING APPROVES COOPERATIVE PLAN FARM MARKETING

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—President Harding in a letter read today at the opening session of the National Council of Farmers Cooperative Marketing associations, declared that he knew of "no single movement that promises more help towards the relief and the permanent betterment of agricultural conditions" than the cooperative organization of farmers to market their products.

The president's letter was read by Senator Ernst, republican, Kentucky, to whom it had been addressed as a greeting to the council. Declaring he wanted the government "to do everything within reason and sound procedure" for the aid of farmers, Mr. Harding said he was "still more anxious that the farmers shall themselves cooperate to make the government's efforts doubly efficacious."

"In the long run government aid cannot be made effective unless the farmers shall be organized and alive to their own responsibility to establish and use practical instruments for the distribution of credit and the assurance of the most economical marketing methods," the letter said. "This association stands precisely for the best, most intelligent effort to establish such methods, and to teach the farmer and his friends to utilize them. Because I am convinced of this, I feel that this meeting is of unusual importance and significance, and I wish you would convey this expression in the most emphatic terms."

Aaron Sapiro of San Francisco, general counsel of the cooperative associations, said in a keynote address that cooperative marketing of the wheat crop had not progressed very far owing to lack of leadership, but that the cooperative system was capable of successful extension to every farm commodity. He suggested action by the conference recommending legislation for rural credits, shipping and other industries, he said, are given paper for periods up to 20 and 120 days where as their turnover is completed within 24 to 42 days, while the farmer, with a nine months turnover period, can get credits for only six months.

### THURSDAY IS FINAL DATE FOR PAYING TAX INSTALLMENTS

Friday is the last day of grace on the fourth installment of the income tax. Frank E. Buckingham, division chief of the internal revenue department, stated Thursday morning that Friday would be a rush day with his office if there was not to be an unusual amount of delinquency on the final payment of the year on income tax.

Payment may be made at the local office in the federal building or may be sent to district office in Dallas. Failure to meet the payment on or before December 14, the day set for final payment, is punishable by a fine of five per cent of the tax plus one per cent per month interest.

### SELL TEXAS LINES OF KATY RAILROAD, BRING \$6,500,100

DENIBON, Dec. 14.—The Texas lines of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas railway were sold at Sherman Junction, near here, today at 1 o'clock to J. W. Seligman and company and Hallgarten and company of New York for \$6,500,100, only \$100 more than the minimum bid. Francis Randolph and H. W. Blumenthal bid the property in jointly.

BRIDGE, MASS., Dec. 14.—The Davis and Brown Woolen company has declared a stock dividend of 3,233 per cent. The increase in capital stock is from \$15,000 to \$500,000. The new shares comprise part of a surplus of \$140,000. The entire \$500,000 is made up of common shares. The company manufactures woolen goods.

The new rates have served to increase the cost of newspapers and magazines and other second class matter circulating through the mails, and, as said before, have driven them to seek other means of transportation, where this is possible, but of course this is not possible where the newspaper or periodical is addressed directly to the subscriber, being practical only where they are distributed through an agent.

The government's policy is one that affects nearly every subscriber who receives a newspaper or periodical through the mails. It is now a question whether the government ought to return to its old policy of recognizing that the spread of information is a thing to be encouraged or whether it ought to continue rates that will make this class of mail matter pay its full cost of transportation and handling.

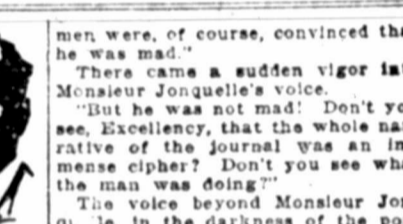

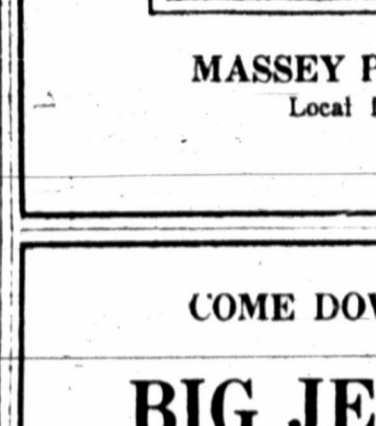

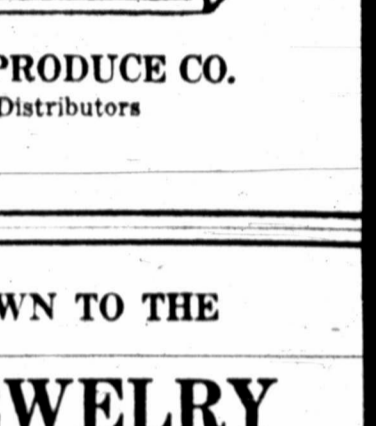

Carpentier also would have been signed but for the absence of his manager, Francois Descomps, who will affix his signature to the document Friday evening.

The bout will be for 25 rounds under the usual boxing rules. Four ounce gloves will be used.

Meanwhile Siki is playing hide-and-seek with the French boxing federation, saying that he will not appear before its committee which is investigating the alleged fraud in the Siki-Carpentier bout, in which the negro fighter deviously defeated the white man. The federation is still awaiting an answer from Siki to its last letter summoning him before the committee on Friday to make a statement.

Physical condition is the chief requisite of sport. No matter how clever a man may be he cannot do his stuff unless he is in condition.

Bernie Kirk of Michigan was the leading end of the west this year. He was the popular choice and there is no question but that he had a great deal to do with Michigan's ability to win the western conference championship.

Condition made Kirk a star. He lacked condition in 1921. At that time he was injured, other than this year, but nobody mentioned him and he did nothing much to help his team.

Kirk realized why he failed in 1921 and immediately began preparing for the season of 1922. Careful diet, regular hours and well-planned exercises brought into him remarkable physical condition. Kirk was fit when the training season started.

Kirk played every minute of every game he started this year. He never had time taken out. He was really a physical marvel, considering how hard he played.

As the players trotted off the field at the close of the Michigan-Illinois game, Kirk rushed into the clubhouse, changed clothes and was away before the crowd had left the stadium. While other players were lying exhausted on the hands of the trainers, Kirk was on the way to the woods outside of Ann Arbor and here he spent several hours hunting.

And the Illinois game was Kirk's hardest and most brilliant. In that game he was directly and indirectly responsible for Michigan's 14 points and pulled the most spectacular play performed by a Michigan player this year when he ran 46 yards for a touchdown from kick-off.

George Carpentier fell before the comparatively unknown Siki because of lack of condition. He underestimated his opponent, failed to train properly and was forced to pay the penalty in defeat.

Babe Ruth suffered from the same ailment last summer—lack of condition. Twenty-five pounds of excess weight added many inches to Babe's waistline, interfered with his swing and made an ordinary hitter out of the greatest slugger of all time.

In any sport, condition is the first and chief requisite. Both Ruth and Carpentier are now well aware of that fact.

### DARBY ACQUITTED BY JURY'S VERDICT ON MURDER CHARGE

MYSTERY OF J. W. WHITMAN'S DEATH IN APRIL, 1921, STILL UNSOLVED.

### MOTHER COLLAPSES WHEN REPORT IS MADE

Defendant On Stand Late Wednesday Repudiates 'Confession' Introduced By State.

J. W. Whitman's murderer is still at large.

Vernon Darby, charged with the murder, was acquitted Thursday morning by the verdict of the jury, which heard his confession in the case. The mystery that surrounded the killing of Whitman on the night of April 8, 1921, assumes a darker veil because officers who worked diligently on the case believed that they had hunted down the only possible clue to the homicide. The jury however, in its verdict, voiced the sentiment that the officers are wrong.

The case went to the jury at 10:15 o'clock Wednesday evening and at 11:15 the court bailiff announced a verdict had been reached. At 9:00 o'clock Thursday morning the jury was ushered in and the foreman, E. Leopold, announced that a verdict had been reached and handed the papers to Judge P. A. Martin.

To Jury Wednesday Night. Following three hours of argument Wednesday night in which the attorneys in the case discharged their duties most efficiently, Judge Martin stated that he would arrive at a verdict soon. The court was told that the jury would remain until 6 o'clock Thursday morning.

The defendant took the stand at 6 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, corroborated the story as told by half a dozen other witnesses, denied that he was in Wichita Falls on the night of the murder and labeled the confession as introduced by the state as a lie.

He told the jury that the alleged confession which he had signed had been made in a room where he was afraid and with hopes of reward. He said that he did not know anything that was in the statement as he was unable to read.

Bob Red and K. F. Bean, deputies of the constable's office had arrested him in the corridor of his father's place, near the Douglas Hotel. He said he did not know anything about extradition papers and willingly returned to the jail at Wichita Falls on a train.

Tells About Statement. On the way to Wichita Falls the defendant said Judge Martin told him that the best thing he could do was to go before the officers and make a statement because if he didn't "they'll break your neck next week."

He also told the jury that officers told him that if he would bring the name of J. B. Malone and Pearl Malone into the statement that he would see to it that he, Darby, got off with a five years suspended sentence.

In the district attorney's office while he was making the statement, the defendant said that Walter Domerville, who wrote the statement did not misuse him in any shape or manner but the things that he had told Mr. Domerville to put in the statement were false. He said the reason that he told all the lies was because he was afraid of Bob Red when he was sitting nearby getting his gun which he had stuck under his belt in plain view.

Came Back to Mystery. The verdict of the jury in the case in effect means that J. W. Whitman was murdered on the night of April 8, 1921, on Second street near Seymour by some party unknown. The shot that caused the man's death was fired from a speeding automobile. The bullet struck Whitman in the head and he fell, a corpse, at the feet of Miss Cecil Hester, who had accompanied him to a show that night.

Vernon Darby, the acquitted, had been a friend of Miss Hester's. The state's contention was that the defendant had come to Wichita Falls to collect a debt for his father and that he went riding with Pearl Malone, a friend of his and a close friend of Miss Hester's.

As they were proceeding home toward the Ford automobile, they saw Whitman and Miss Hester walking along the street. The state contended that Darby fired at the pair and that the bullet had struck Whitman.

Says Was in Oklahoma. The verdict of the jury further means that Vernon Darby was not in Wichita Falls on the night of the murder but that he was in company with a number of other teamsters, spending the night at Walters, Okla. The mother of the defendant walked into the court room Thursday morning just as Judge Martin was reading the verdict. Her face was lightened with hope and as the words "not guilty" were enunciated clearly and plainly the smile was broader. The defendant showed no emotion.

Mrs. Darby grabbed her son and

The revenue received from the thresher development alone for the year ending September 30, 1922, will equal the cost of maintenance.
