





SECOND CLASS POSTAGE RATES.

Although second class postage rates have been creased between 200 and 400 per cent for news-pers and magazines since 1912 and the circulations newspapers have greatly increased, it is reported at the postal department is actually receiving less mue from this source than before the increases ent into effect. The reason is that the high postage tes have driven the newspapers to the express nts, and are using the mails for such service only points not conveniently covered by the express ies. The newspapers are also using their

n trucks to deliver papers to nearby points. There was once a time when kings believed it to interest to suppress the spread of knowledge. of the methods by which they did so was through imposition of a stamp tax on newspapers and rnals and all kinds of printed matter. This served purposes; it raised revenue for the crown and ped to keep subjects in ignorance and suppressed

democratic ideas. This stamp tax was not a postage stamp for in those days there was no postal service as we know it today, but simply a tax levied somewhat as our internal revenue taxes are imposed.
