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

How many times have you seen drawing, instructions for laying out finish with a plane. • Hold the col-

How many times have you seen mother or sister drop a spool of thread on the floor, lose track of where it has rolled, and look for several minutes before it is located? Often it rolls under some heavy piece of furniture and has to be habed out; sometimes it even rolls down a register. With the holder shown in today's drawing such petty accidents may be avoided.

Use a gouge for cupping out the piece so it is square, but tapers from the tray. Make a light of thin wood for testing the depression gouged out. If you have paper all parts well before finishing. The pins that hold the spools are ordinary finishing nails.

HEAVY DEMANDS UPON THE RAILROADS.

The railroads of the country are making new records in the volume of freight traffic handled and the demand for railroad transportation in 1923 will likely exceed the capacity of the roads to handle, says the Railway Age, published at Chicago. It urges shippers to ship all the freight they can as soon as possible, to load cars to their full capacity and to unload cars and release them as quickly as

Here are some of the new records the Railway Age says the railroads have made in recent months:

"1. They moved more treight in November than in any previous November in history, and thus far have broken all records for December. In the four weeks ended on December 2, which correspond roughly with the month of November, the number of carloads of freight moved was 483,000 more than in 1918, 532,000 more than in 1919, 221,000 more than in 1920. and 763,000 more than in 1921. In the week ended December 9 they moved \$1,875 more carloads than in the same week of any previous year.

"2. The week ended November 25 terminated a period of ten consecutive weeks in every one of which the railways moved more than 950,000 carloads of freight. This is the first time in history that they ever moved this many carloads for more than seven consecutive weeks.

"3. The amount of freight moved in November and December has so greatly exceeded all previous records that it has made the total carloads handled in the 16 weeks ended on December 9 larger than the amount ever moved in the corresponding 16 weeks of any other year. To state the matter in another way, the total number of carloads of freight moved since the coal mines began to open late in August is 156,245 greater than in 1920, the previous

"4. In 34 out of 35 weeks ended on December 2 up to its name by spilling all over the paper.

the railways moved more carloads of 'miscellaneou freight' than they ever did in the same weeks of any previous year. Transportation experts regard the imount of miscellaneous freight shipped in any given period as the best indication of what general business activity and the total amount of freight business oftered to the railways in the months immediately shead will be. If the loadings of miscellaneous freight during the last nine months are any criterion, the railroads will be called upon to handle a recordbreaking business for months to come,

"5. The railways on Monday, December 11, loaded 45,886 cars with bituminous coal. This is the largest number of cars ever loaded with bituminous coal in one day.

"6. During six consecutive weeks the total 'car shortage' reported exceeded the largest car shortage ever reported in any single week of any previous year. The largest net shortage ever reported before was on September 1, 1920, when it was 146,070 cars. In the six weeks ended on November 23 the net car shortage was never less than 147,259 cars, and went as high as 175,523 cars. On November 30 the net shortage was 128,191. This figure represents a substantial reduction, but it shows that in spite of the fact that the railways within recent weeks have broken all records with respect to the number of cars loaded and moved at this time of year, the inadequacy of transportation is still almost unprecedented.

"The lesson the foregoing facts suggest to the railways is that next year's business will break all annual records and that they should put forth every effort to secure greater utilization of the existing facilities and to improve and enlarge their facilities as rapidly as possible.

"The moral for the shippers is that first, they should ship all the freight they can as soon as practicable, and that, secondly, they should cooperate with the railways in increasing the efficiency with which existing transportation facilities are used by loading cars to their maximum capacity, by loading them and unloading them as promptly as possible, and by delaying them in case of reconsignment as little as possible.


