COMMISSION SUGGESTS VOLUNTARY REDUCTIONS BY RAILROADS

COMPLAINT IS MADE BY LIVESTOCK ASSOCIATION

Producers Point Out Roads Serving New Mexico Have Secured Concession.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27.—The interstate commerce commission refused today to order railroads serving the northwest section of Texas to make emergency reductions in freight rates on cattle feed which were sought by livestock producers.

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MAYOR AT HOUSTON IS EXONERATED OF CHARGE MADE DURING CAMPAIGN

HOUSTON, Dec. 27.—Mayor Oscar Holcomb stood cleared today of charges of impropriety made against him by opponents to his candidacy for reelection as mayor, as a result of action taken by the city council here yesterday.

Charges were published that the mayor had been in a gambling game a year ago in a downtown office building which was raided by police and that he used his authority to prevent the police from taking action.

The decision of the city council, which was made by a vote of 12 to 7, exonerated him of the charge, as well as a charge made at the same time that no fair hearing had been given.

Yesterday, at the mayor's request, the council voted to order the city manager to advise the city council of any charges, police officers and many others who wanted to offer testimony.

After an all day session, the council announced that they had found no evidence to substantiate the charges made against the mayor.

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SAYS ORIENT MORE OF A PUBLIC THAN RAILROAD PROBLEM

STATEMENT IS MADE BY CONGRESSMAN FROM EL PASO DISTRICT

DECLARES CONGRESS WILL DO ANYTHING IN REASON

Receiver Willing to Turn Over Road to Anyone Who Will Assume Management.

RAN ANGELO, TEXAS, Dec. 27.—Congress is cognizant of the plight of the Kansas City, Mexico and Orient railroad, which is threatened with enforced suspension, and is willing to enact any sort of reasonable legislation to save the system, according to Representative Claude B. Hudspeth of the 16th Texas congressional district, here on his way to his Crockett county ranch.

Commenting on the plan of Chief of the Texas Rehabilitation of the road, through San Antonio and extension of the line from San Angelo to Del Rio, where it would connect with the Mexican National railroad, Mr. Hudspeth said congress realizes that saving of the Orient system is more of a public than a railroad problem.

While "opposed to government ownership," congress, he said, would be willing to do anything to prevent suspension, which would work hardship on territory served by the line.

Representative Hudspeth said W. Z. Kemper, receiver of the Orient, told him recently that he would deed the road to anyone who would assume its management, and he (Kemper) would add \$100,000 to get "the sick line off his hands."

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APPROVE BILL FOR AMNESTY FOR ALL REBEL PRISONERS

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 24.—The bill presented to the chamber of deputies by President Obregon, proposing amnesty for all rebel prisoners, was approved by the chamber today with only slight modification.

Immediate freedom for all political prisoners, including those serving sentences for rebellion and those awaiting trial of such charges, is provided for in the measure. The chamber, however, requested that excepting be made in the case of those responsible for the tragic deaths in 1913, at the time Francisco Madero was assassinated, and for the dissolution of the federal congress in October of that year.

The bill now will go to the senate where its passage is assured. With General Obregon's signature, all the prisoners affected by the law will be liberated on January 1.

FURTHER INCREASE IN FOREIGN TRADE DURING NOVEMBER

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27.—Further increases in America's foreign trade were reflected today in figures compiled by the department of commerce, showing exports of cotton and lint for November to have been \$85,527, valued at \$199,487,718. October exports of cotton totaled 785,664 bales valued at \$23,750,000.

The November total places the aggregate exports of cotton for the eleven months ending November 30 at 5,562,689 bales, valued at \$232,525,125 and approximately \$129,000,000 better than the value of the cotton sold abroad in the same period in 1921.

PIGG ET AL NO. 9 FLOWING AT RATE OF 500 BARRELS

The No. 3 tract of Pigg and others in the Ebbetts tract, north of Clara, is reported flowing naturally at the rate of between 500 to 550 barrels daily from the sand at 1850 to 1885 feet, making the second producer to be finished in Wichita county's newest producing area.

The No. 1 or discovery well on the same tract, 700 feet to the east, is still producing in the neighborhood of 450 barrels.

Two other tests are on the sand. No. 1 Bob Waggoner to the east, in block 222 Foster-Allen, is producing with a heavy flow of water which from the present amounting will be numbered among the producers by the end of the week.

Northwest of the Pigg well the Texoma test is in a good looking sand at 1895 to 1915 showing much oil. The well is being standardized and is expected to be drilled during the week.

Norwegian Home Life Little Changed By 25 Years of Equal Rights—Women Still Cooking Three Meals Day

Woman suffrage doesn't change home life much. Perhaps it hasn't been tried long enough in this country to warrant such a conclusion, but it has in Norway. There it's prevailed for a quarter of a century.
"Norwegian women," says Mrs. Margrothe Somme, the Norse pianist, who made her American debut recently, "take their participation in public life very calmly."
"They don't allow it to interfere with important things—like cooking three meals a day and bathing the baby."

Chivalry isn't dead. Neither have Norwegian men lost their chivalrous attitude toward women. Mrs. Somme continues, "Nor have women renounced their right to being protected by the men."
"Such things aren't regulated by law."
"And our industrial life still takes women into consideration. There are special factory regulations for them. In that respect, we don't want equality."
"They have 'careers'?"
"True, many Norwegian women enjoy 'careers.'"
"They are in every profession—except the mines. Perhaps, she says, 'I get the impression that the American women's thoughts, like their gowns, are too much from one mold.'"
"Of course, this may be because I don't know them very well yet and am over-conscious of their makeup. They seem to be hiding themselves behind masks."
"Matter of climate?"
"As for her complexion, the Norwegian woman worries little, the pianist remarks. Perhaps, she thinks, it's a matter of climate, the Norwegian air being as favorable, seemingly, to white skin and pink cheeks as to blue-eyes and glassen hair."
"But undoubtedly," adds Mrs. Somme, "the musical advantages here are greater. Every artist's ambition is to come to America."

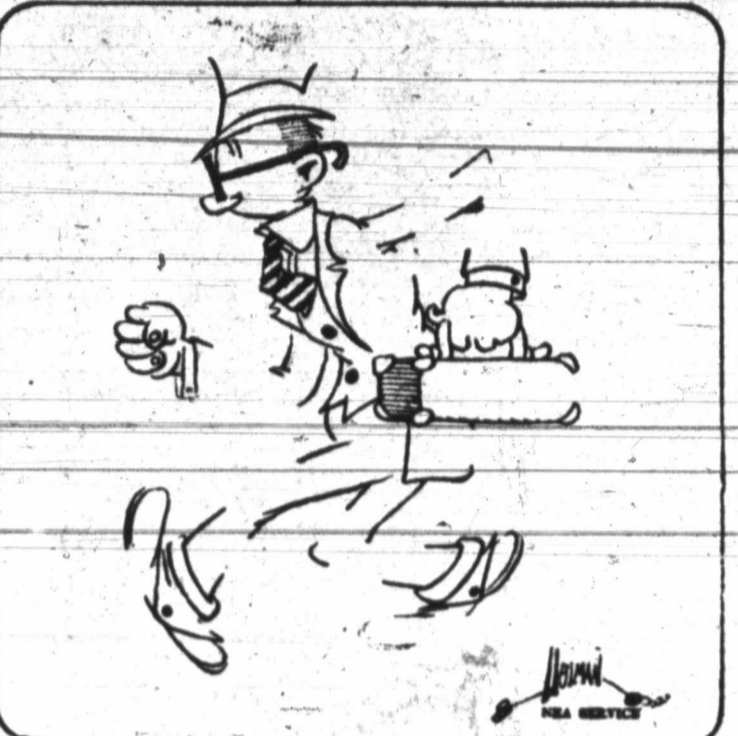

Prune Scallop

1 cup prune juice
1 cup bread crumbs
1 cup butter
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 cup sugar
Remove stones from prunes and cut into quarters. Melt butter and add crumbs; mix cinnamon with sugar. In a buttered dish place a layer of crumbs, over this a layer of prunes, sprinkled with some of the sugar and cinnamon; add a part of the prune juice. Repeat until material is used, having crumbs on top. Bake 25 minutes. Serve with cream or hard sauce.
This is a good way to use prunes already cooked, after part of them have been served for breakfast—a good dessert for the children.

Superintendent Bryant Discusses The County Unit School Plan

The Times—In a recent issue of the Times you invited your readers to discuss the county unit plan now proposed for administering school affairs. I shall briefly state some of the things proposed and the advantages that the advocates of such a plan believe will be gained.

The county unit does not mean the same thing as the different states and there is a difference of opinion by its proponents in Texas. All of its advocates, I think, agree that the county board of education should be reorganized so that the school tax in order to more nearly equalize the educational advantages in the separate districts and that the county board of education of the county schools should be more centralized. They believe that there should be more uniformity in the county board of education, the districts living into themselves.

Most people say that they believe in equal educational opportunities for all, but no one can deny that there is a wide difference of opportunity furnished under our decentralized district system.

Some say that such a plan is undemocratic, but those who favor it point to the fact that the people will still retain the power as they elect the county board. The condition of the roads used to depend upon small districts, but we have better roads. There was a time when the district system prevailed in cities. The city of Wichita had 15 school districts with no uniformity. The cities would not think of changing to the district plan.

The next legislature will doubtless be called upon to consider making some changes in our educational system.

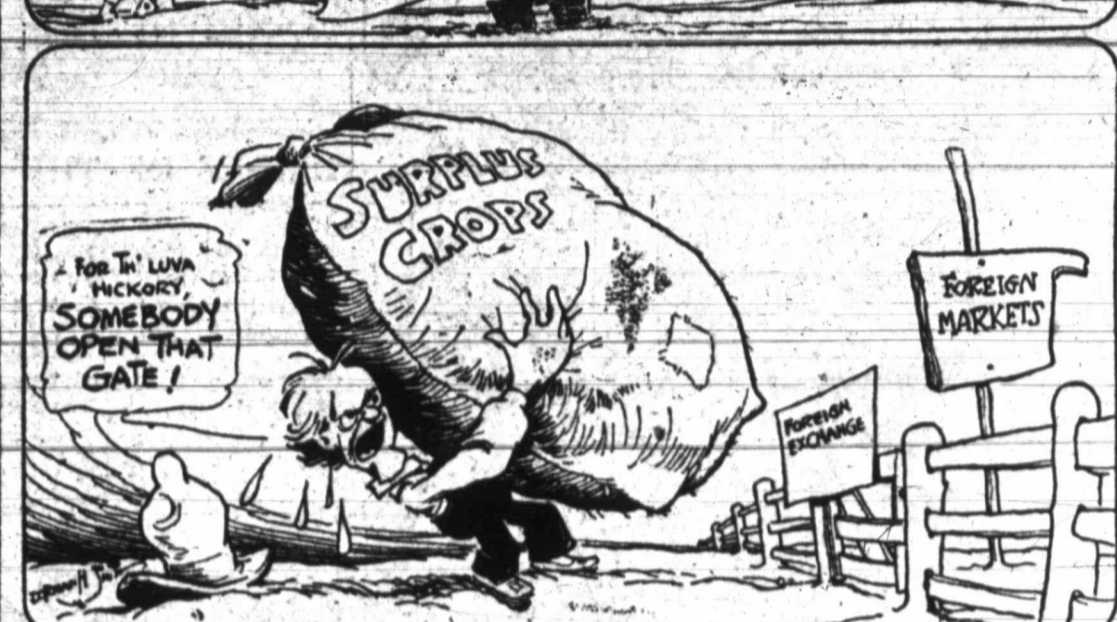

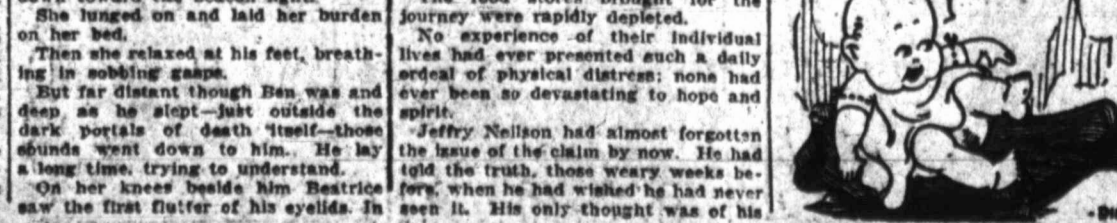

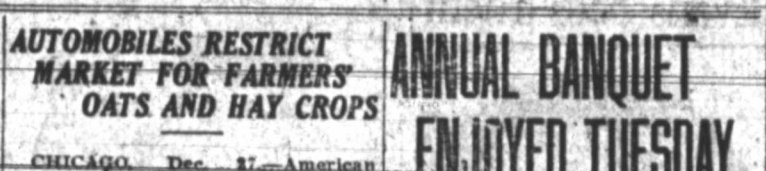
