LAMAR KILLED; MAJ. CULBERSON UNDER BOND FRENCH TO ADVANCE IN GERMANY THURSDAY

THOUSANDS GATHER AT OKLAHOMA CITY FOR INAUGURATION

Associated Press. OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Jan. 8.—

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PARIS, Jan. 8.—In a last effort to save the Ruhr valley from French seizure, an attempt was made last Friday to arrange an interview in Paris between President Poincaré and Hugo Stinnes at which the head of the German government and the chief of the German cabinet might make peace. President Poincaré rejected the offer.

By Associated Press. PARIS, Jan. 8.—The occupation of Essen by a small French force, accompanied by engineers and customs officials, is now expected for Tuesday morning, it was stated on good authority today.

Belgian and French engineers and technicians are working to determine the French but only the Belgians, it is understood, will contribute to the force of occupation.

"France is going just far enough in action in the Ruhr to show Germany she is in earnest," it was said at today's council of ministers.

There is every desire on the part of France, it is stated, to avoid any unnecessary show of force—any indication that the French government is disposed to rely on force alone to reach a satisfactory agreement with Germany.

Premier Poincaré does not intend to mobilize a single soldier in addition to the regular forces under arms nor call out a single additional railroad man to effect that operation, it is declared.

The silence of the government regarding its plan to seize additional railroads does not mean that it conceals no designs to make a great show of military force, it is affirmed, but it is only a natural precaution in the face of the serious and serious an undertaking as that in view.

FRANCE HAS REPLIED TO THE AMERICAN PROPOSAL. WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—The plan for settlement of the reparations controversy between France and America, outlined by Secretary Hughes in his New Haven address has been communicated to the French government through official channels.

No final reply has been made by Paris, although it was learned today that a preliminary answer had been received here from the French foreign office. It was said at the state department that the proposal regarding reparations still before the French government for decision.

It was not stated when the American communication was sent, but indications were that it was in character and it was suggested that it revolved about the suggestion that international financial centers be called in to formulate a reparations payment plan.

Official comment as to the nature of the reply already received from Paris was withheld. The statement that the American suggestion still was definitely before the French government, however, was interpreted to mean that the French answer was not an unqualified rejection of the scheme.

Officials would not indicate whether they had any reason to expect further communication from Paris prior to the actual occupation of the Ruhr by French forces. It evidently was desired in Washington, however, that the American public should understand that the Washington government had lost no opportunity to present its conclusions and suggestions on the reparations difficulty in such fashion that the French authorities fully understood what had been proposed, including the direct intimation that adoption of the American plan might lead the way to economic help for Europe from the United States.

Conversations between President Harding, Secretary Hughes and Ambassador Harvy with relation to the European situation are continuing but with no finality has been thrown by officials upon the specific nature of these talks.

There is no question that the American government is planning to keep the door open to a direct or indirect American aid, direct or indirect, through the plan suggested or in any other way.

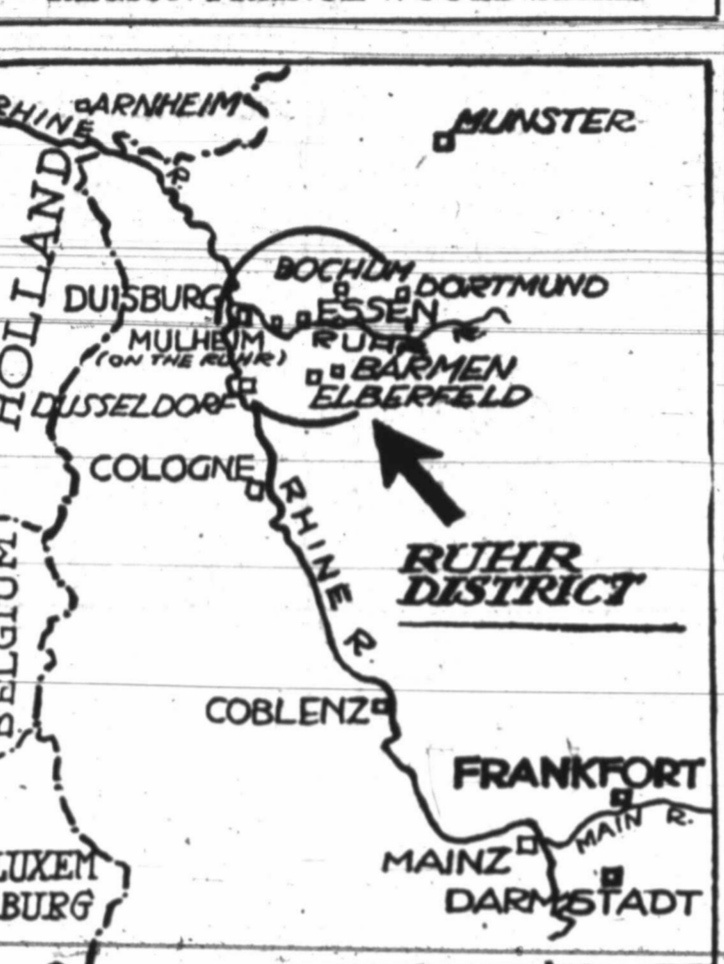

FIND CHARRED BODY OF P. M. MORRISON WHERE STORE BURNS

The charred, limbless and headless body of a man, thought to be P. M. Morrison, 50, was found Sunday morning by oil field workers near the ruins and ashes of a small store that Morrison conducted near the river bridge seven miles south of Iowa Park.

Circumstances and evidence secured early Sunday morning by Sheriff Pat Murphy and his deputies, and the district attorney's office agreed of murders but after thorough investigations were made Sunday afternoon, the conclusion was reached that the fire which resulted in the death of the man was an accident.

L. J. Long, a farmer residing within a half mile of the scene of the tragedy, was questioned by officials on a charge of possession of whiskey.

The oil field workers who were on duty near the K. M. A. field from Iowa Park stopped at the point where the Morrison store had been and at a point which indicated that an attempt had been made to force an exit, the trunk of a man's body was found.

Officers were notified at once and in company with the district attorney and assistant left for the scene.

WARRANTS EXPECTED IN CONNECTION WITH LOUISIANA HEARING

FEDERAL AND STATE OFFICIALS CONTINUE TO GATHER EVIDENCE

NO ANNOUNCEMENT OF NEXT MOVE IS MADE

Expected Testimony Involving Others Will Be Given During the Week

BASTROP, La., Jan. 8.—Twelve witnesses, men who were held up by the same black hooded band that kidnaped Watt Daniel and Thomas Richards, others who found the bodies of the two men floating in Lake La Fourche, and several, the purpose of whose testimony could not be ascertained until after the witness stand at tomorrow's session of the open hearing investigation of masked band depredations in Morehouse parish.

BASTROP, La., Jan. 8.—With the hope of a day in the open court hearing in observance of a state holiday, Attorney General A. V. Coco and his corps of assistants, directing the state's investigation in the kidnaping and slaying of Watt Daniel and Thomas Fletcher Richards and other masked band depredations in Morehouse parish, turned their attention today to a digest of testimony intended to establish by scientific deduction and physical exhibits, that the two men were subjected to extraordinary tortures before they were put to death.

Meanwhile federal and state investigators continued the assembling of evidence on which it is expected today to digest testimony intended to establish by scientific deduction and physical exhibits, that the two men were subjected to extraordinary tortures before they were put to death.

No announcement was made by Attorney General Coco in advance of conference with his assistants today as to the next move to be made and the possibility that the testimony would proceed before anticipated arrests will be made.

It is generally expected, however, that witnesses who have already been before the week's end.

J. I. Daniel testified Saturday that his son told him he recognized from beneath their hoods J. K. Skipwith, Charles Calhoun, and James K. Klum; Mr. E. M. McKinnon, former mayor of Morehouse deputy sheriff.

The elder Daniel and W. C. Andrews, both of whom were whipped by that mob, declared they could not recognize any of their assailants. Andrews said he believed the klansmen made up the mob.

Witnesses during the present week were expected to include many members of the Daniel and Richards families including some women and children.

Calhoun declined to comment today on the testimony of Daniel.

"Any statement I may make would be in the witness stand if I am called upon to testify," Calhoun said.

BRECKENRIDGE HAS REQUESTED ACTION AGAINST I. W. W.

AUSTIN, Jan. 8.—An appeal to Governor Neff and Adjutant General Barton for state action regarding the alleged activities of I. W. W. workers in the Breckenridge district has been made. It became known here today. A representative of Breckenridge has been here and has made a large majority in both houses of the state legislature.

SHOOTING MONDAY MORNING IN FRONT OF STORE ON INDIANA AVE FRIENDS MAKE BOND FOR \$5,000

Major W. L. Culbertson, who shot and killed W. L. Lamar, talking machine salesman, Monday morning was released from custody under \$5,000 bond for a hearing on Tuesday.

A formal complaint charging murder was filed against Culbertson by Chief of Police J. W. McCormick, Justice of the Peace R. V. Gwinn, before whom the complaint was filed, set Culbertson's bond at \$5,000.

Those signing the bond were Walter Clime, G. C. Wood, A. H. Britain, Dr. Everett Jones, M. W. Blair, Dr. M. Perkins, Jerome R. Stone, J. B. Harbert, Luther Hoff, Mack E. R. Fales, Harry W. Taylor, N. O. Moore and Ross Robinson. Many others called at the court house to offer their names for the bond.

A number of witnesses were before the grand jury during the morning and early action in the case is expected.

These few words preceded the firing of two shots by Major W. L. Culbertson at 11:30 a. m. Monday morning at 1:30 o'clock when he shot and killed W. L. Lamar in front of the Phonograph Shop on Indiana avenue near Fifth street.

Hundreds of people who were hurrying to their places of work or business heard the shots ring out and looked around. Major Culbertson was standing with his eyes fixed on the man he had just shot.

Chief of Police J. W. McCormick said they looked up when they heard two shots fired. He was standing on the other side of Indiana avenue holding a conversation with a doctor.

"Major, this is Mac. Give me the gun," the chief had touched the barrel of his revolver. McCormick did not move nor did he remove the fixed position of his eyes. Chief McCormick repeated the same words three or four times.

"Oh, is that you Mac? Alright I'm ready to go."

Other officers who appeared and searched the premises of the store where the other man in the tragedy. He was dead. Lamar, who is 36 years of age, resided at 1319 Thirtieth street with his wife and two small children.

Major Culbertson had been seen walking in front of the place of business a few minutes before the shooting occurred.

He called to Lamar to come out, that he had come to speak to him. Friends of the dead man state that Mr. Lamar asked the man to come into the building but that he had refused. It was then that the man walked to the front with Major Culbertson.

A few words were spoken by both of the men in a low tone of voice which no one heard. Nothing had transpired that attracted the attention of the police officers who were in the building. The two men were talking in the entrance to the Phonograph Shop.

"You've ruined my home," were the words spoken in a loud and commanding tone that attracted the attention of all nearby. No sooner had he spoken than he drew his revolver and fired twice on his heels and fell out on the sidewalk, partly on the face.

According to witnesses, Major Culbertson stepped out of the hall way onto the sidewalk and stood there with his arms raised, as the dead man until he was placed under arrest by Chief of Police McCormick.

He was escorted to the court house after he had been relieved of the 45 Colts Army special. He was turned over to Sheriff Pat Murphy and held while the district attorney's office ordered witnesses summoned, stating that the case would be investigated at once by the grand jury, now in session.

The shooting was the culmination of alleged domestic affairs. The wife of Major Culbertson had instituted suit for divorce three weeks ago after he had been charged with brutal inhuman treatment.

Last Wednesday night M. L. Lamar and Mrs. Culbertson were looked at by the grand jury. Lamar was charged with the murder of his wife's brother-in-law.

Nelsores had testified that he had seen Lamar's automobile parked in front of the Culbertson home at various times but no testimony was introduced which warranted a substantiation of the charges preferred and Police Judge Martin dismissed the cases.

According to Mr. Lamar's employer, Lamar had gone to the Culbertson home to arrange for some kind of a settlement on a talking machine which had been purchased some months ago, installment payments having been delinquent since the filing of the divorce suit.

Major Culbertson returned from an official visit into Oklahoma Sunday night and, according to his chauffeur, he was driven to the business section of the city.

The officer was in civilian clothes at the time of his arrest and was clean shaven.

At the beginning of the world war, the six months' mortgage of Major Culbertson, had been told of the case against Lamar and his wife.

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WILL DIVIDE COST ON BRIDGE AMONG ALL 4 PRECINCTS

Late Monday afternoon by a vote of the commissioners court it was decided that the expense of constructing the new bridge across Beaver creek in precinct four be divided equally among the four precincts in the county.

The Electric precinct in which the bridge is located does not have sufficient funds to construct the bridge. Commissioner J. P. Jackson strongly opposed the motion as put before the court and was the only vote against the motion.

The bridge will be 1,200 feet long and will cost \$175,000. It will be built on the site of the old bridge which was destroyed by a flood in 1918.

REJECT CLAIM OF BOY FOR LOSS OF HORSE ON ROAD

The claim for \$102.50, as asked by P. O. Groves, a high school student of Electra for the loss of a saddle horse was rejected by the county court today.

The boy in his petition stated that on November 1, 1922, while he was returning from Newton, in the county, his horse was stolen by a man who was riding through a broken plank on a bridge and suffered a broken leg.

"But there are others, and many of them, too, who will tell you, if you ask them what time it is by the great time marker of the universe, that though the shadows do come and the time is long, yet there is truth and light, and that even amid the shadows there is peace and rest and assurance. They contend that the bond of friendship, brotherhood and love are not severed even by the shadows of death. They say that words are most refreshing just here. He said: 'If you will open your window at 3 o'clock in the morning and listen you will hear the wind rushing to call the dawn and the sun to rise. So the man of lost hope and dead faith says that the light of day is put out by the shadows of night which follows, but the man of hope who has the faith of God says that the shades of night are driven away by the light of day and that the day follows the night.'"

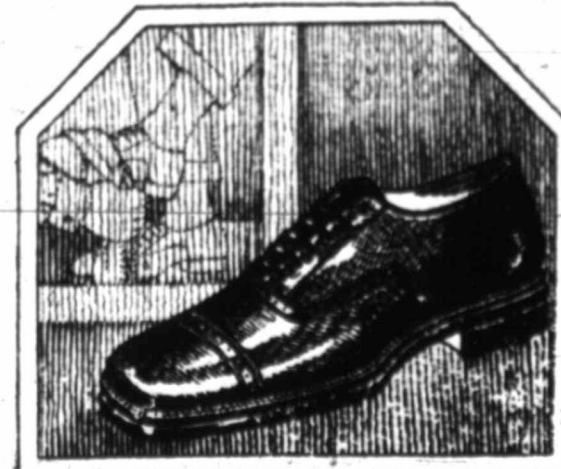

BRING HOME THE AMERICAN SOLDIERS

By an overwhelming majority the United States senate has voted a request to President Harding to bring home the American troops stationed at Coblenz.

This ought now to be done without further delay. Following the armistice a considerable number of American troops were stationed in the Coblenz area to insure the carrying out of the terms of the armistice until a treaty was negotiated and ratified.

The United States failed to ratify this treaty but adopted a resolution declaring that a state of war with Germany no longer existed.

When that resolution was adopted, it appears, would have been a good time to have ordered every American soldier on German soil home. Indeed a greater part of the American troops stationed in Germany have been brought home. Only about eleven hundred remain.

According to reports there are now at least five French soldiers in the Coblenz area to every American soldier.

Aside from the fact of the anomaly of the situation of troops being quartered in a country with whom the United States is at peace, there is some actual danger in the situation. A clash between the population of this area and the French troops stationed there is possible at any time, the more so since the French are about to put into operation co-ercive measures and such a clash might involve American troops. Such an event might involve us either with Germany or France, an eventuality that is certainly not to be desired.

Had America ratified the Versailles treaty and joined the league of nations the stationing of a small number of American troops in Germany might have been warranted. The United States, however, rejected the treaty and declined to join the league of nations or to have anything to do with European troubles. It is difficult in view of these actions to justify the continued quartering of a single American soldier on German soil.

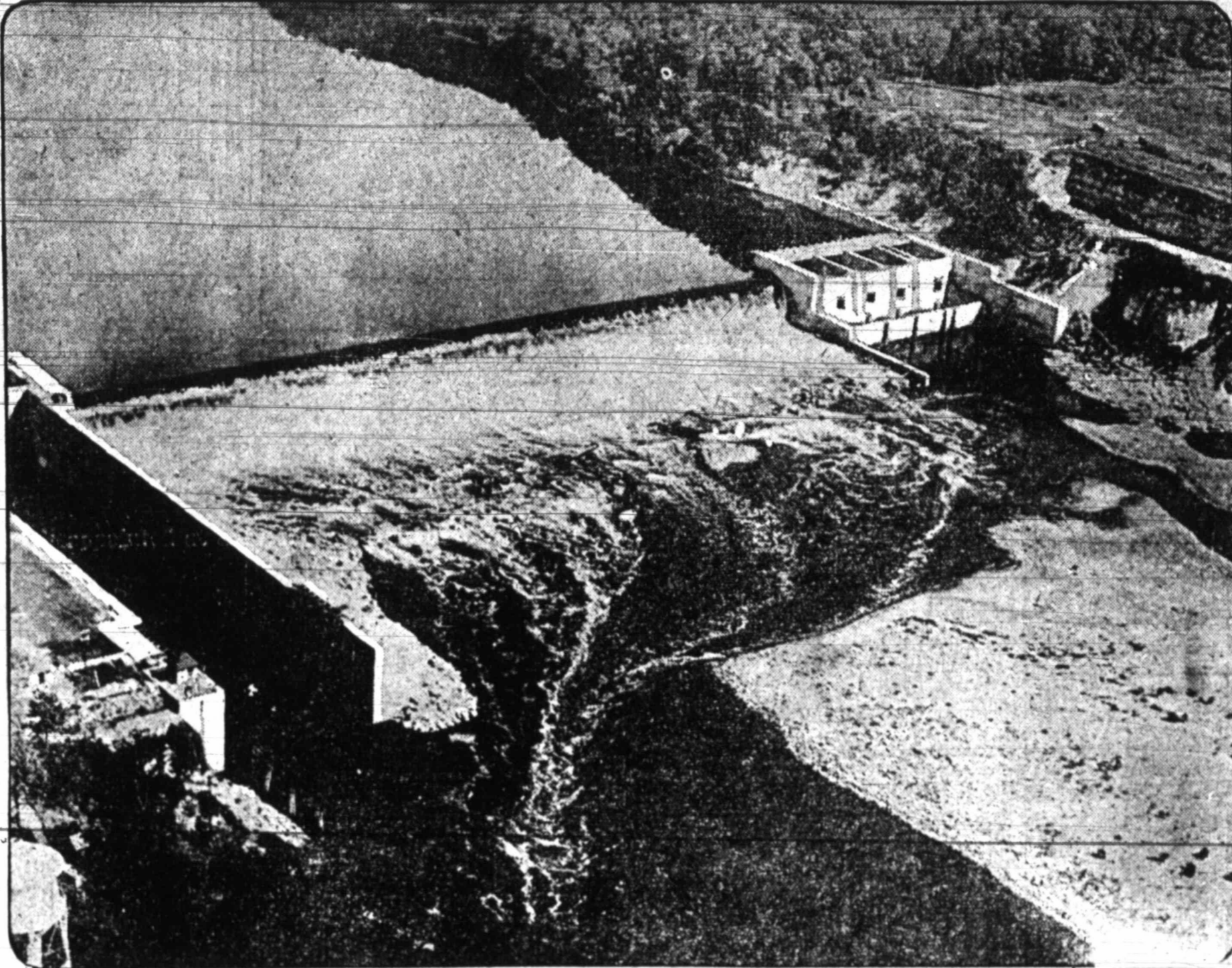
