WOMAN AND MAN ARE EXECUTED IN JAIL AT LONDON

CHARGED WITH THE MURDER OF THE WOMAN'S HUSBAND

EXECUTIONS TAKE PLACE WITHOUT DEMONSTRATION

Last Minute Efforts Fail to Secure Commutation of the Sentence

LONDON, Jan. 9.—Mrs. Edith Thompson and Frederick Bywaters were executed today for the murder of the woman's husband, Percy Thompson, on October 4 last.

Bywaters was executed in Pentonville prison at 9 o'clock. Mrs. Thompson was hanged a few minutes later in Holloway jail.

Bywaters, who made an eleventh hour attempt to save Mrs. Thompson by a "confession" met his death calmly, so far as reports indicated.

Mrs. Thompson, who collapsed last evening, had to be carried to the scaffold.

Bywaters maintained that Mrs. Thompson had no part in the killing of her husband and insisted that he had slain Thompson in self-defense.

The woman in her last interview with her family assured them that she went to death with no guilt on her soul.

The executions took place without demonstrations on the part of the crowds that had gathered outside both jails. Women marched in a procession in front of the walls of Holloway jail carrying placards inscribed "If these are hanged, the judge and jury are also guilty of murder," and "Murder cannot abolish murder."

The crowds gathered in the early hours of the morning, aware that British customs allow only a few officials to witness executions.

After last minute efforts to relieve the prisoners had failed, Mrs. Thompson and Bywaters were visited by their relatives. Mrs. Thompson, in the course of her last interview with her parents, brothers and sister, said: "I am prepared. I have nothing on my soul." She added that Bishop Stephen, who visited her earlier in the night, had asked whether she had anything to confess and that she replied:

"Nothing. I am innocent."

Bywaters was allowed to spend an hour and a half with his mother, who was overcome with grief.

An organization calling itself "League of Christian Intercession" announced late in the night that it had made a last unsuccessful petition to the king to reprieve the condemned.

Notwithstanding the agitation against capital punishment which has been heard in London, the London newspapers except the Herald, raise its voice today in protest.

Sensational Murder.—The execution of Mrs. Thompson brought to an end one of England's most sensational murder cases since the Crippen affair, and incidentally provided the first instance of capital punishment of a woman in England for fifteen years.

Percy Thompson, a shipping clerk, was stabbed to death in a dark street near his home in Ilford, a London suburb, on October 4 last, while returning from a theatre with his wife. When found the body was propped against a wall and his beautiful young wife was kneeling nearby in a hysterical condition.

Upon the strength of her story to the police, Bywaters, 30 year old steamship steward, was arrested two days later and charged jointly with Mrs. Thompson of murder. The police submitted at the hearing an alleged confession in which Bywaters appeared as declaring his love for Mrs. Thompson had prompted the act.

Later letters were produced in which Mrs. Thompson, addressing Bywaters in the most endearing terms, urged him to study the effect of various poisons on the human system and told of bringing several attempts on her husband's life by introducing various substances into his food. One letter told of using powdered glass from three electric light bulbs with no effect.

Verdict on Jury.—The jury, which included one woman, returned a verdict of guilty against both defendants on December 11 and sentences of death were immediately pronounced.

The lord chief justice on December 21 dismissed the appeals of the condemned couple and appeals for clemency were carried to the home office, the last resort, but without avail.

Petitions in favor of Bywaters were signed by more than a million people but comparatively few came out for Mrs. Thompson. Public sympathy for the man was based largely on the belief that he was the unwilling tool of the woman, who was eight years his senior.

The last hope for the pair was shattered yesterday when Home Secretary Bridgeman declared in answer to many queries, that he could not depart from his decision and that the execution must be carried out.

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PASS RESOLUTION WHICH EXONERATES ATTORNEY GENERAL

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—Attorney General Daugherty was given a clean bill of health today by the house judiciary committee which investigated the impeachment charges brought against him by Representative Keller, republican, Minnesota.

The resolution also proposed that the judiciary committee be discharged from further consideration of the Keller charges and the proposed impeachment of the attorney general and that the impeachment resolution introduced by the Minnesota representative be laid on the table.

In a resolution which was adopted by a vote of 13 to 3 the committee said that on the evidence obtained it did not appear that there was any ground to believe that Mr. Daugherty had been guilty of any high crime or misdemeanor requiring the interposition of the impeachment powers of the house.

Representatives Thomas of Kentucky and Sumner of Texas, democrats, voted against the resolution proposing dismissal of the impeachment charges. They voted also against referring to the house the refusal of Mr. Keller to respond to a committee subpoena.

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POLICE CAPTURE TWO CARS BOOZE FOR FORT WORTH

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., Jan. 9.—Police today swooped down on the Rock Island railroad yards here and attached two freight cars, each of which they allege was half filled with whiskey consigned from Frankfort, Ky., distillery to a drug store at Fort Worth, Texas, under the labels of cigarettes and merchandise.

Authorities expressed the belief that the spirits were to be unloaded here and sold among the throngs attending the inaugural celebration of Governor J. C. Walton.

Forty-two cases of liquor, was found in one of the cars, police said. The other has not yet been opened. No arrests have been made.

CONFERENCE OVER PROPOSED SALE OF RAILWAY OF TEXAS

AUSTIN, Jan. 9.—Sale of the Texas state railroad, extending from Palestine to Rusk, to the St. Louis and Southwestern (Cotton Belt) Railroad will be the subject of a conference here late today between S. B. Perkins of Dallas, general attorney for the Cotton Belt, and Lieutenant Governor Lynch Davidson, chairman of the board of managers of the state road. Details of the plan to be submitted by the Cotton Belt were not made known without it was stated the proposition has been under consideration for some time.

LEGISLATORS FROM NORTHWEST TEXAS WORK IN HARMONY

AUSTIN, Jan. 9.—Northwest Texas legislators seem to be acting pretty much as a unit so far. All of them supported Seagler for speaker, and all of them are on the fence on the constitutional convention question.

Gilpin and Avis of Wichita county, Storey of Wilbarger, McFarland of Graham, Loftin of Henrietta and Covey of Poard county constitute the delegation from the Wichita Falls section. All expect to have active parts in the oil county representatives conference, which will probably be held early next week.

Most of them feel that a new constitution is so nearly certain of defeat that it would be unwise to submit it at this time, and that the needed remedies can be best obtained by amendments to be voted on separately.

THOUSANDS CASES WHISKEY MISSING FROM WAREHOUSE

COVINGTON, KY., Jan. 9.—One thousand cases of whiskey is missing from the warehouse formerly owned by the Orene Parker company here. Federal prohibition agents reported last night following a tour of inspection. According to records in the office of Elmer Correll, district agent, the whiskey was transferred to the warehouse six months ago and should still be there. Investigation developed that the cases were intact but empty.

Owners of the building were out of the city. Frederick Hassman, night watchman, was held in \$5,000 bond.

CHICAGO.—Judge Francis Borrell, new judge of the speeders court, today announced that he will hold court once or twice a week in the county morgue beside the bodies of speeders' victims. Not only the speeding cars snuffed out the life of a person but all others required for speeding will be required to attend, he said.

RAILROAD SERVICE REDUCED RESULT OF AUTO COMPETITION

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 9.—Local accommodation service on the Pennsylvania system will be curtailed beginning next Sunday at Indianapolis and South Bend, Ind.; Columbus and Cincinnati, Ohio; Louisville, Ky.; Peoria, Ill. and St. Louis. It was announced today at division headquarters. Motor highway competition and electric transportation service is responsible for the curtailment, it was explained.

ORDERED TO CONTINUE RATES NOW IN FORCE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—The St. Louis, Brownsville and Mexico railroad was ordered today by the I. C. C. to continue in force the present joint rates over the Missouri Pacific to St. Louis and consuming territory beyond. The railroad by new schedules filed last September proposed to cancel the rates, but the interstate commerce commission ordered an investigation and required the existing levies to be maintained pending a decision.

Today's decision required the railroad to abandon the new schedules entirely on the ground that they would result in unjustifiable increases to shippers and also discriminate against the Missouri Pacific line.

NEAR TWO MILLION INCREASE IN BALES OF COTTON GINNED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—Cotton ginned prior to January 1 amounted to 3,995,000 running bales including 163,281 round bales counted as half bales, 25,438 bales of American Egyptian and 5,665 bales of Sea Island, the census bureau announced today.

To January 1 last year ginnings totalled 7,822,556 running bales, including 132,348 round bales counted as half bales, 20,549 bales of American Egyptian and 3,106 bales of sea Island.

Baptist Women Responding to Call From Buckners, following Disastrous Fire Last Week; Packing Boxes Now

The Baptist women of all of the local Baptist churches are responding right now to the emergency call from Buckner's orphanage at Dallas, which suffered such a disastrous fire last week, and every circle in the three mission auxiliaries are packing big boxes this week to rush to the relief of the orphanage.

The loss of the boys' dormitory, which burned to the ground at night with all its contents, including all of the boys' clothing except what they got out of the dormitory in, has been one of the most serious sustained by any southern orphanage in years, and the need for help is very great.

The call for clothing, bedding and other furnishings was made to all of the Baptist circles here Monday afternoon at the group meeting, and some things were brought to the meetings. All of the divisions have set days during the week or on Monday next to pack their boxes, and several meetings will be held to quit bedding for the boxes.

Packing the Boxes.
The first church circle—eight in number—have all called one extra meeting during the week to quit bedding, and another to pack boxes, which will be got off the last of the week. Circle Two, for example, will meet Thursday to quit, and Friday to pack a big box of bedding and underclothing and other garments. Each member of the circle there were thirty-two people Monday—promised an article of new underclothing and whatever else could be spared. The other circles are doing about the same things.

The Lamar Baptist circles, three in number, are meeting during the week separately to sew and quilt, and on Monday next a meeting is called at the church to pack a box. The Walnut street mission is responding in the same manner.

Circle Meetings.
The Lamar Baptist circles all reported through Mrs. Rawls, and three good meetings were held Monday.

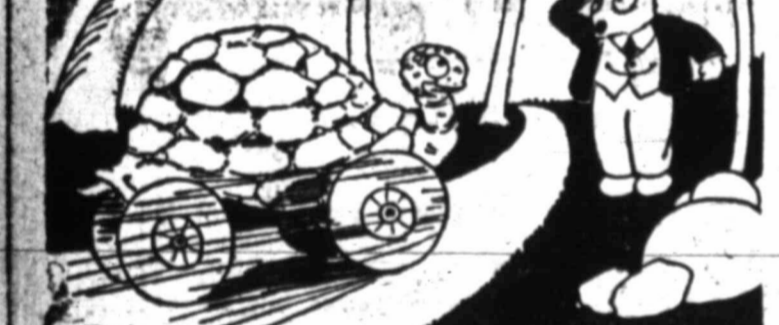

This route leads westerly to Kamakura, northerly to Tokio and Nikko, and southerly to Koda, Yumoto, Miyazohita, along the base of the renowned Mt. Fujiyama, to Kyoto, Nara, Osaka and Kobe, from which port the voyage lies through the beautiful Inland Sea into the Yellowish Sea, and to China.

The Lost Day.

PROPERTY OWNERS PROTEST PROPOSED STREET CAR ROUTE

Protests from property owners on Tuesday night against the proposed street car line on either of those thoroughfares to the new high school were entered with the city council at the meeting Monday afternoon when L. L. Albritton, representing the local traction company, asked for a franchise for the new line. The franchise was not granted on account of objections from several sources.

Mr. Albritton stated that the traction company did not care to make the suggested improvement unless it met with the approval of the public and that the line was being laid merely to give a contract. Lee Clark, superintendent of city schools, said the new line would accommodate 150 pupils and was almost a necessity.

The franchise as applied for called for an extension of the Kansas boulevard line eastward on avenue G to Jones street. It is planned later to extend the line on Jones street to a connection with the Kansas boulevard line. A meeting of property owners and representatives of the school board and traction company was called for Tuesday, January 9, at 8 o'clock.

Ordinance 137, regulating the operation of public dances and dance halls, was passed to its second reading. The ordinance is charged for a permit has not yet been inserted in the ordinance. Some discussion arose over the kind of permits to be issued; the ordinance as it now stands calls for an annual permit; the matter was held over until the next meeting.

Upon recommendation of City Engineer Ruegley, the council voted to accept the paving just finished by the West Texas Construction company on Eleventh from the intersection of the west property line on Austin street to the intersection with the east property line on Grace street. Property owners on Burnett appeared before the council to make inquiry concerning the pavement on Burnett from Eleventh to Thirteenth. Roy Grimes, of the construction company, stated that the work would begin as soon as a signature of all property owners was secured.

Plan Sale of Reservoir. Representatives of the Golf club came before the council with a proposal concerning the old tower tank at Eleventh and Burnett which has not been in use for several years. The council had received another offer on the tank but did not consider it a reasonable one. Commissioner Stanton and F. H. Lawton, manager of the city water system, were appointed to advertise the sale of the tank and report as early as possible to the council. The Golf club, it is understood will be in the market for the tank. Carter McGregor, a property owner in vicinity where the tank stands said residents in that section of the city were very anxious that the tower be removed.

Fire Chief J. L. McClure called the attention of the council to the negligence of autoists when fires were reported and when the fire truck had the right-of-way. A recent accident while the truck was returning from a fire caused an expenditure of \$1,100 on one of the State trucks. By a guarantee which the company places on their trucks, the fire chief was able to have the truck repaired without expense to the city.

The city ordinance requires that the streets be cleared of all traffic as soon as the fire alarm is given. The ordinance will be rigidly enforced from now on and the speed of fire trucks returning from a fire will be regulated.

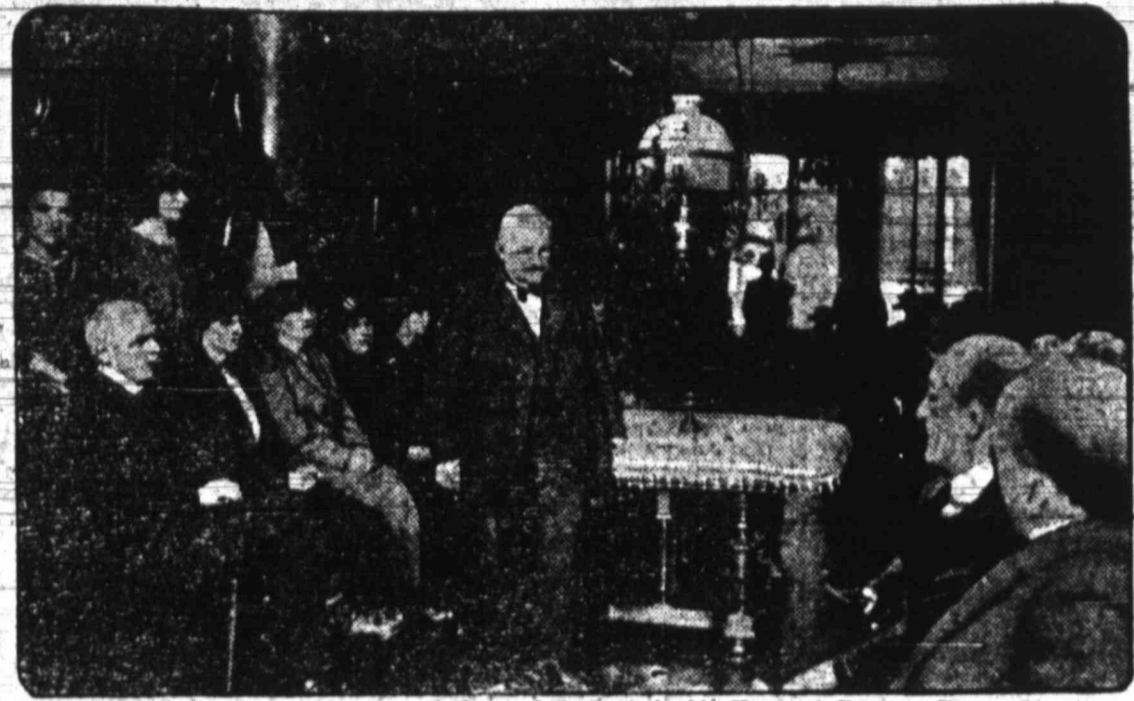

- On Wichita from Fort Worth to Jalonic, 310 feet of two-inch \$124.
- On Jalonic from Texas to Edwards, 700 feet of two-inch, \$475.
- Bibley-Taylor Addition.
- On Austin street from Lake Drive to Twenty-second, 578 feet of two-inch.

PRESIDENT HARDING'S COURAGEOUS VETO

Whatever else it may have been it was a courageous thing that President Harding did when he vetoed the bill the other day that provided increases for veterans of the Civil and Mexican wars.

Mr. Harding vetoed the bill because of the necessity of economy and because some of the provisions of the bill were loosely drawn.

The government's pension practices have been a national scandal for more than a generation and President Harding is the first president who has squarely faced the issue.

Speaking of the growth of pensions the Houston Post says:

In 1877, 12 years after the war closed, there were 127,723 survivors on the pension rolls and 103,251 widows, making a total of 232,104 pensioners, drawing a total of \$28,182,821.87.

"Twenty years later, in 1907, the number of survivors had increased to 733,527, and the number of widows to 238,822, making a total of 972,349 pensioners drawing a total of \$139,949,717.35 from the government."

"That was 22 years after the war and in that year congress was greatly agitated over the pension robbery, but nothing was done about it. In that year the New York Sun, in an expose of the system, presented statistics showing that while there were only 187,122 actual survivors of the war, there were 733,527 drawing pensions as survivors. In addition there were enough widows drawing pensions and demanding pensions to run the number above 1,500,000."

"Ten years later, in 1907, there were still 673,987 invalids and 257,434 widows, or a total of 931,421 on the rolls, and the pension disbursement was \$139,949,717.35.

"By 1919 the survivors on the rolls had shown a decrease to 812,811, but the number of widows had grown to 895,811, or three times the number in 1877. The total number on the rolls in that year was 624,497, but the disbursement touched the new high level of \$228,169,292. Last year for the first time since 1899 the pensioners numbered less than 600,000, but the pension disbursement was \$218,295,214.

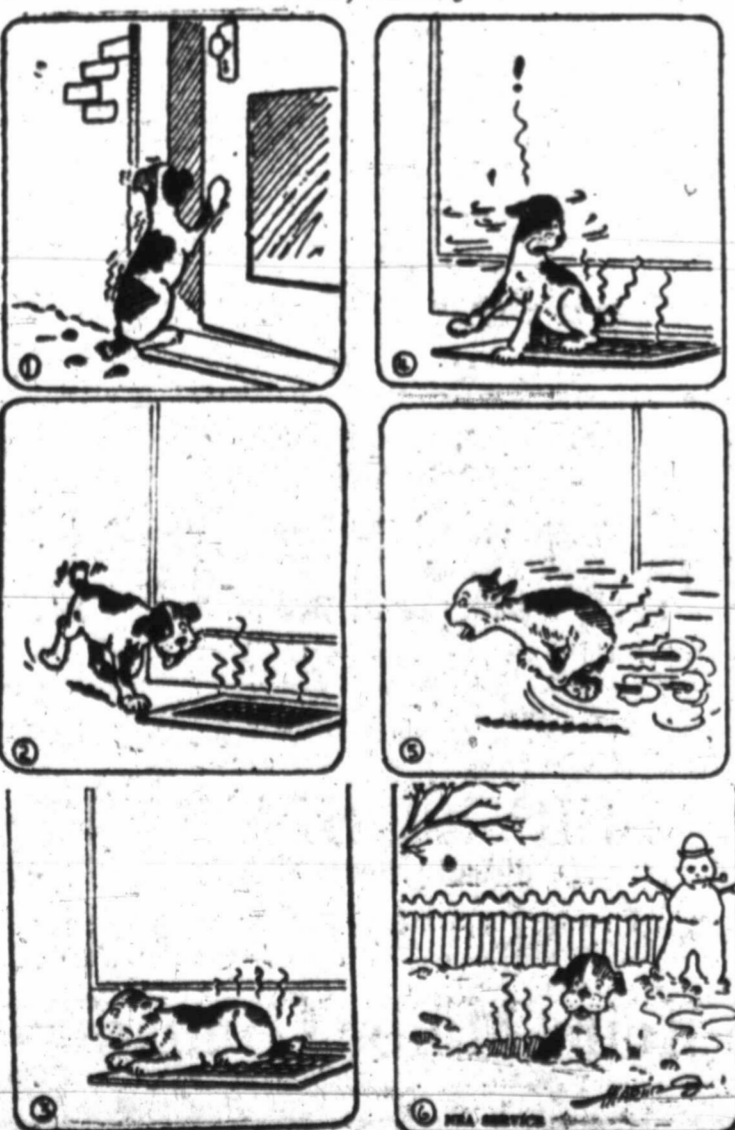

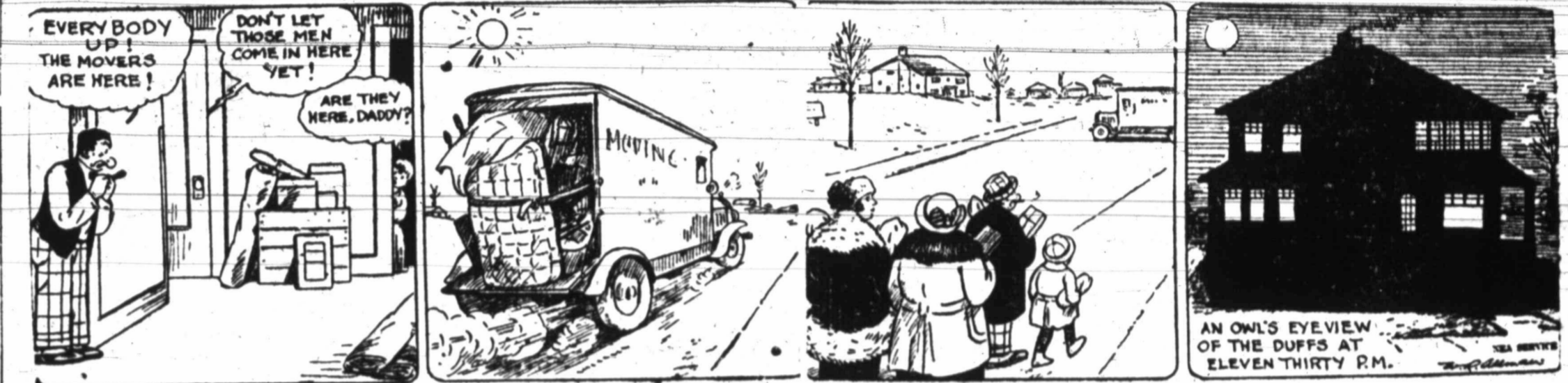

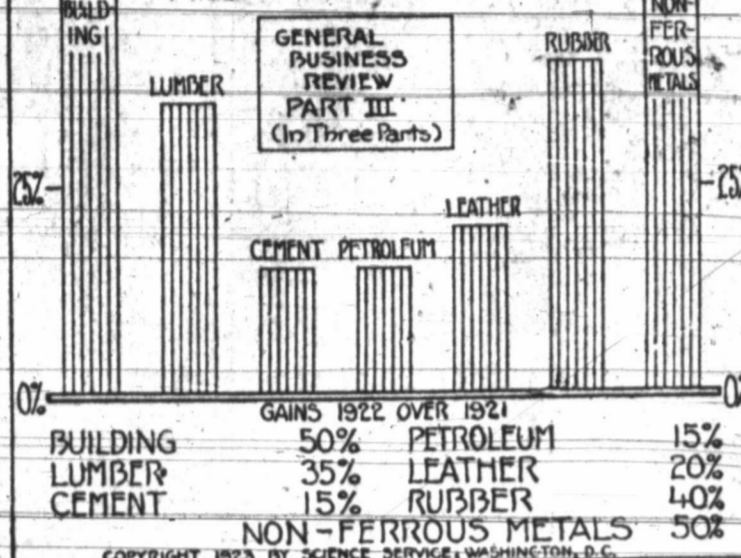

MASS MEETING TO DISCUSS PLANS FOR SCHOOL BUILDING
ELECTRA, TEXAS, Jan. 9.—A mass meeting has been called for Wednesday night to consider plans for a new high school building. The Thompson high school building was erected last year with the idea of relieving congestion, but an increase in scholastics of more than 200 made necessary the use of half a dozen wooden shacks.
Present enrollment in Electra schools is 2,612. The local board of education feels that the enrollment next year may reasonably be expected to show an increase of not less than 500, based on the building program for residences now in progress. This will necessitate provision for at least 1,000 additional pupils if the wooden shacks are to be done away with. Taxable values of the Electra independent school district amount to slightly more than \$2,000,000. While no suggestion has been made by the school authorities or the board of education, it is generally hoped that a building to cost not less than \$150,000 can be secured by next September.
The organization of a Presbyterian church in Electra will be perfected Sunday, according to plans adopted at a meeting conducted Sunday afternoon. Rev. A. L. Moore of Vernon preached, following Sunday school services at 3 o'clock in the afternoon. For the present services are being held in Laffus hall insofar as information has been gained, there are some 75 Presbyterians in Electra.
