The government's pension bill, on account of he Civil war reached its peak in 1919 when the disbursements were \$222,259,292. This record will stand unless some such bill as President Harding vetoed the other day goes into effect.

Speaking of the growth of pensions the Houston Post says:

"In 1877, 12 years after the war closed, there vere 128,723 survivors on the pension rolls and 103,- Withhold the inquest when the hand is played. B\$1 widows, making a total of 232,104 pensioners, drawing a total of \$28,182,821.27.

Twenty years later, in 1897, the number of surfivors had increased to 733,527, and the number of widows to 228,522, making a total of 976,014 pensioners drawing a total of \$139,949,717,35 from the gov-

"That was 32 years after the war and in that year congress was greatly agitated over the pension bery, but nothing was done about it. In that year the New York Sun, in an expose of the system, presented statistics showing that while there were only 727,122 actual survivors of the war, there were 733,-527 drawing pensions as survivors. In addition there were enough widows drawing pensions and demanding pensions to run the number above 1,300,000.

"Ten years later, in 1907, there were still 679,-7 invalids and 287,434 widows, or a total of 967,-71 on the rolls, and the pension disbursement was \$138,155,412.26.

"By 1919 the survivors on the rolls had shown a wn to 303,311, or three times the number in 1877. he total number on the rolls in that year was 624, but the disbursement touched the new high level \$222,159,292. Last year for the first time since 90 the pensioners numbered less than 600,000, but ension disbursement was \$213,295,314.

"The president estimated that had the Bursum ease been accepted the precedent would have ed the way for a pension disbursement of \$50,-6,000,000 during the next half century.

"The president's veto of the Bursum bill should rk the turning point in the government's course elative to pension demands growing out of wars rious to the world war. The peak of disburses should be considered past.

"The country must now turn its attention to furcompensation of the survivors, both ablebodied stabled, of the last war. With the experience the past 40 years fresh in mind, it will be a task lienge the best thought and highest patriotism of the nation. A repetition of the old pension raids a scale commensurate with the magnitude of the mies engaged in the last war would bankrupt the entry."
