## GIRL AND HER BROTHERS BACK TO WACO

### INVESTIGATION OF HOODED TRAGEDIES MOVING TO CLIMAX

#### SCORE OF WITNESSES CALLED TO TESTIFY IN LOUISIANA CASE.

#### SELF-DECLARED MEMBERS OF KU KLUX KLAN TESTIFY

#### New Witnesses Are Included in List to Be Examined.

#### By Associated Press.

BASTROP, La., Jan. 16.—Smith Stevenson, special policeman in the town of Bastrop, on the day of the baseball game and barbecue which preceded the kidnaping of Watt Daniel and Thomas Richard by a band of black hooded men August 24 last, testifies today in the state's open hearing investigation into masked band depredations, denied repeatedly that he had seen any point on the two men prior to the kidnaping.

He said he knew of no bitterness between Dr. McKinnon and the kidnaping men and that he knew of any bitterness in the Klan against them.

He explained he made no effort to identify the kidnapers because he apprehended the kidnapers as he was merely a special deputy and there was "nothing he could do right then."

Stevenson, who said he was a klansman, was questioned closely whether he was one of the party who had been testified, gathered in the Thomas Hardware store at Bastrop and armed themselves after news of the kidnaping was received.

The concluding question before recess was: "Do you realize that the only two conspicuous things you remember were you saw Richard, the deceased, only once, and that time he was intoxicated, and you did not see any hooded men in the vicinity of the night of August 24 or the evening?"

The witness said he did not understand the question and it was recessed. He was unable to answer it.

#### LOUISIANA INVESTIGATION MOVING TOWARD CLIMAX

BASTROP, La., Jan. 16.—Investigation of hooded tragedies of Monday house parish moved gradually toward a climax today with the riven of the net of evidence being woven by the testimony of two witnesses, self-declared members of the Ku Klux Klan, who testified against the kidnaping of Watt Daniel and Thomas Richard, victims of a band of "black hoods" to repel an expected attack by people of the neighboring village of Jones Rouge.

A score of witnesses were under subpoena in connection with the session of the open hearing. Fourteen new witnesses were included in the list announced to be heard today in addition to those on previous lists, but who have not yet appeared.

Several witnesses were expected to testify in connection with statements made by two of yesterday's witnesses, "Jap" Jones and James Harp, farmers of the village of Jones Rouge, who told of the preparations made by members of the Klan in Bastrop to stage off an attack which might have been planned by the citizens of Jones Rouge as a reprisal for the kidnaping of Daniel and Richard.

Harp testified that he was positive Captain J. C. Skipton, an ex-cyclops of the Morehouse Klan, was in Bastrop on the night that Daniel and Richard disappeared. His testimony was corroborated by Jones, who testified that he called on Captain Skipton early that night to find out whether the kidnaping of Daniel and Richard was the work of the Klan. He said the ex-cyclops denied any knowledge of the black hood band.

#### FOUR TEACHERS AND TWO PUPILS KILLED; TRAIN STRIKES CAR

OKLAHOMA CITY, Jan. 16.—Four teachers from a school in an outlying district died today when a northbound Santa Fe passenger train struck the automobile in which they were riding at the outskirts of the city.

Two of the teachers, Ruth Howell, 24, and Etella McQueen, 24, lived until early today, succumbing to internal injuries at a local hospital. The others, Cora Phelan, 29; Mrs. Opal Darrell, 25; Henry Maloney, 9; and Frank Davis, 10, were killed outright when the train crashed into the machine, dragging the twisted mass of metal and wood against the automobiles in which three of the victims, a quarter of a mile before it could be stopped.

#### MAAN ARRESTED AT CHICAGO NOT PARTY TO DENVER ROBBERY

CHICAGO, Jan. 16.—Receipt of a telegram from the Denver police resulted in freedom today for Daniel Guinn, who was arrested Sunday night as a suspect in connection with the \$208,000 Denver robbery on December 15. The Denver telegram stated that photographs and fingerprints of Guinn were not those of any of the main robbers. Guinn also gave the police a satisfactory alibi and was given his liberty.

#### REPORT RUM FLEET HAS BEEN INCREASED TO FOURTEEN SHIPS

NEW YORK, Jan. 16.—The rum fleet standing off shores today has increased.

Experienced observers reported sighting 14 vessels south of Ambrose lightship. The squadron comprised one tank steamer, a smaller steamer resembling a trawler, one three-masted schooner and 11 two-masted schooners.

No buyers were observed putting off from shore where everything was quiet, indicating that maritime bootleggers were adhering to their resolution to lay low after the heavy rum running last Thursday night.

The steamship Fort Victoria arriving in New York last night reported having sighted yesterday only one steamer and seven schooners.

VESSEL HAS DIFFICULTY GETTING BY RUM FLEET

NEW YORK, Jan. 16.—Captain Berry, attached to coast guard headquarters in this city, announced today that the commander of a vessel arriving from the West Indies had reported difficulty in crowding its way through the rum fleet standing off the Jersey coast. Complaint was made that the fleet constituted a menace to navigation.

#### RECEIVES NOTICE OF CHANGE IN NAVAL ENLISTMENT RULES

Enlistment Officer E. H. Bowman of the United States naval recruiting service received word from navy headquarters Tuesday that recruits would be enlisted on the first enlistment as third class firemen. The new order has only recently gone into effect; up to this time recruits enlisting for the first time were taken only as seamen, third class.

The communication states that the physical requirement for enlistment as firemen will be higher than the regular navy standard for enlistment.

#### AMARILLO "DUCK STORY"

AMARILLO, Jan. 15.—At 10:45 last night a pressman at work on a local newspaper, when he started out to lunch heard a flock of ducks flying low in fact, just above the tops of the two-story buildings. ### INAUGURATION OF GOVERNOR NEFF AND LT. GOV. DAVIDSON

#### FEATURES JOINT SESSION OF TWO HOUSES AT AUSTIN.

#### MANY PERSONS ATTEND FROM OVER-THE-STATE

#### Oath of Office is Administered by Chief Justice C. M. Cretton.

AUSTIN, Jan. 16.—Inauguration of Governor Neff and Lieutenant Governor T. W. Davidson, the former for his second term, formed the center of interest in legislative circles today. The inaugural ceremonies, following the fashion of inaugurations of previous years, took place promptly at noon.

A joint committee from house and senate escorted the executive and his lieutenant to the rostrum of the house where the oath of office was administered and where the two officials kissed the Bible as evidence of their intention to be bound by their oath. The oath was administered by Chief Justice Cretton and in the presence of other judges of the court and numerous state officials.

Incidentally the Bible used in connection with the ceremonies is the same that was used in the inaugural of Sam Houston in the early days of the state and has been used in every inaugural since.

"Many persons from various parts of the state are here for the ceremonies."

When the two houses had assembled in joint session and roll called, the Rev. Burke Culpeper, Methodist evangelist, offered prayer at the request of Speaker Seagler. The speaker then directed the clerk to read the returns of the general election as canvassed by the joint committee yesterday.

Deputy Governor T. W. Davidson was then inaugurated. C. M. Cretton, chief justice of the supreme court, administered the oath following his inauguration. Lieutenant Governor Davidson addressed the joint session. He called upon the legislature to conduct its business speedily and without delay. Opposition to extra sessions also was expressed.

Davidson declared the working out of measures for the construction of a state-wide highway system is probably the most important problem of the present legislature. He also emphasized the importance of educational problems, particularly in relation to the rural schools.

"I heartily commend and approve the fearless action of Governor Parker of Louisiana in leading the way in the adoption of a federal government to state to bring to justice those who would set at naught the law of the land and substitute their own will in its place."

The oath was then administered to Governor Neff by Chief Justice Cretton. The governor was inaugurated at 1:30 p. m. and returned to his residence today.

The inaugural party as it entered the house of representatives was headed by both sides: the governor and lieutenant governor, followed by the speaker and the speaker of the house; the lieutenant governor and the governor's military staff; members of the supreme court and court of appeals and state officials.

#### LEGAL ENTANGLEMENTS ARE TEMPORARILY TERMINATED

WACO, Jan. 16.—Pressure of a bench warrant upon Ranger Captain R. D. Shumate today terminated temporary legal entanglements over the right of possession of Miss Naomi, Horace and Bernard Boucher, who were held in custody by the three and the ranger captain before Judge J. P. Alexander in 19th district court here at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

The Bouchers had been taken out of McLennan county following their arrests on warrants sworn to by Sheriff Staggal and Deputy Captain Bernard Boucher, who was arrested at Rockwell and the girl at a private residence in Dallas.

Sheriff Staggal late yesterday served the bench warrant on Shumate at Dallas, ending search for the trio in which legal procedure governed.

Boucher, who was brought back to Waco last night by Sheriff Staggal and Deputy Captain Shumate, was released on bond of \$2,500 by Judge Alexander, who held him on instructions from Judge Alexander. Horace and Miss Naomi were expected here just before the hearing.

Miss Frances Ann Saunders, aged 14, of 806 Grace, is apparently the real loser as a result of the supreme court decision Monday in the Red River case.

Her loss may be as much as \$3,000,000. It is believed from press reports of the decision that from 25 to 30 wells drilled by the receiver on land claimed for her by her guardian, W. C. Witcher, will be declared north of the cut bank and therefore not in Texas. Whatever title Miss Saunders has is based on Texas title.

Mrs. Witcher was certain Tuesday whether Miss Saunders was loser, saying that a careful reading of the reports made it appear that the title might be placed far enough north to give the wells to the young woman.

The receiver has impounded oil to the value of \$4,000,000, and of that amount, the part produced from Saunders' land is valued at approximately \$2,000,000. Her potential loss is even greater, when the possible future production from the tract is considered.

Miss Saunders' loss is potentially even greater than \$2,000,000, as the value of their land, production of oil must be included.

Wells on Her Land

Practically all of the wells which the receiver has drilled are on land which Miss Saunders' guardian had claimed as part of her estate, and which was hers under Texas title. Until the "cut bank" is finally defined, it will not be known just how many of these wells she loses, but W. C. Witcher, her guardian, believes that from 25 to 30 of them will be found north of the line. ### DEFINE WHAT SHOULD CONSTITUTE SOUTH BANK

Hold Cut Bank Same As 1821 Except Where Shown Location Changed.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—The south bank of Red river, declared by the supreme court in an opinion rendered two years ago to be the boundary between the states of Texas and Oklahoma is located by that court in an opinion rendered by Justice Van Devanter, Justice McReynolds dissenting.

The southernly cut bank as it existed in 1821, was declared by the majority opinion to be the bank referred to in the treaty with Spain in 1819 as the boundary between the United States and the Spanish possessions and the court said it presumes that the cut bank as it exists today is the same as it was then, except where it can be shown by competent evidence that there has been a change in its location in intervening years due to erosion or accretion.

### PRESENT STATE LEGISLATURE WILL HAVE THREE FORMS FOR REVISING THE CONSTITUTION

AUSTIN, Jan. 15.—The present legislature will have three distinct forms of constitutional convention to choose from, if it decides to call such a convention. Already two of these plans have been submitted, while the third will be immediately framed.

The first plan is provided for under the terms of a joint house resolution introduced by Representative Rountree of Bryan and Quaid of El Paso; the second is proposed by a similar senate resolution by Senator Doyle of Teague, and the third is proposed by Representatives Joe More and Homer Hendricks of Ellis county.

A summary of the three proposals follows: Senator Doyle: Calling a convention in August, this year, with 100 members, one from each representative district; election of such delegates to be made in July.

Rountree and Quaid: Convention to meet September 2, this year, to frame a new constitution; convention to consist of 100 members, 50 to be elected by three from each senatorial district and 15 at large; to be elected; on May 9 precinct conventions to be held May 19, county convention, and May 22, district conventions, to select the district candidates for delegates. The final election would be held July 4. Vacancies in the convention would be filled by the governor.

Under the Hendricks-More plan, the people would vote on the proposition of holding a convention to draw up amendments to the constitution. The legislature also will be called upon to pass an act creating a commission on information which will prepare data for the convention. When the convention meets in January, next year, it would draw up amendments and these would be submitted to the people for final confirmation.

Governor Neff also has expressed favor to calling a constitutional convention, although it has not been made known what plan he favors. He probably will deal with this subject in one of his messages submitted to the legislature.

Whatever the outcome on the proposed convention, it is expected the resolution will call for extended debate and considerable opposition.







GOVERNOR OF N. J. FOR MODIFICATION OF VOLSTEAD LAW

DECLARES THERE IS NO DOUBT AS TO VERDICT OF THE PEOPLE.

SAYS PRESENT CONDITIONS IMMORAL AND INTOLERABLE

Suggests Law Cannot Be Enforced As Long As It Is Defied In Washington.

TRENTON, N. J., Jan. 16.—Amendment of the Volstead act, prohibition of the use of light wines and beers through action of a federal constitutional convention were outstanding recommendations of Governor George S. Silzer, democrat, in his inaugural address today.

"There is no doubt," said the governor, "that the electorate spoke and spoke decisively at the last election on the subject of prohibition. We must therefore respect the verdict of the people. Our people believe that true temperance can be brought about by discouraging the use of hard liquors and permitting instead thereof the use of beer and light wines. Present conditions are immoral and intolerable. If the Volstead act had been given an honest definition of intoxicating liquor we might have been well on the way to real temperance through the use of light beverages instead of bread- and whiskey drinkers, a nation of whiskey drinkers."

"If the Volstead act is capable of enforcement it should be possible to enforce it at the national level where the national government has absolute control with all its resources behind it. If Washington cannot be made a dry, what can be expected of enforcement in the rest of the country? But even there it has been a failure. Why continue this national hypocrisy when we should have the courage to face a situation and deal with it honestly and frankly?"

attorneys in their task of unraveling the mystery surrounding the kidnaping and slaying of Watt Daniel and Thomas Richard, victims of black hooded kidnapers. To members of the Ku Klux Klan put into the record a recital of an assembly and urged that all members of his party take advantage of the opportunity to see the work that was being done here.

The inquiry was limited to a preliminary and welcome to the visitors. Clint Wood requested that on account of the limited time that all speech making be postponed until the banquet Tuesday night; and assured everyone of an opportunity to air his opinions at that time.

Both insisted that the Klan had no part in the kidnaping, but that the gathering of the klanmen was deemed advisable as a precautionary measure in view of the tense feeling prevailing in the parish. Harp and Jones were the principal witnesses at the afternoon session of the hearing. They are preceded on the witness stand by F. L. Carpenter, parish sheriff, Gus Boyd, Collation storekeeper, from whom the black hooded band purchased gasoline while holding the two kidnaped men prisoners, and a half a dozen other witnesses.

Carpenter testified that the men who participated in the arrest of Braddock were commissioned as sheriff's deputies, but asserted that he had told Skipwith, when the klan leader informed him that he had been called to "fill" and asked to be deputized, and "go out and get the stills." Carpenter said at the time no warrant had been issued for Braddock.

J. P. Dalton, district court clerk, testified that a search warrant to enter Braddock's home had been issued, and also a bond for Braddock's appearance on a charge of illicit distilling.

Boyd, a member of the present parish grand jury, said that the purchase of the gasoline was arranged by a man who kept his features hidden by a black hood. He declared he did not recognize this man or any of his companions who were seated in a touring car and the truck in which the two captives were held, blindfolded.

"Wasn't it unusual to see parties of men with black hoods on?" Boyd was asked.

URGES BANKERS TO WATCH LEGISLATION AFFECTING THEM

FRANK KELL SPEAKS AT DISTRICT MEETING OF STATE ASSOCIATION.

VARIOUS PROBLEMS OF BANKERS ARE DISCUSSED

A plea that bankers manifest greater interest in legislation affecting them was voiced by Frank Kell Tuesday morning, in addressing the convention of the 24th district of state bankers, in session here. Mr. Kell, who delivered the welcoming address, discussed the work and course of the federal reserve system in the past few years, and spoke of present-day legislative tendencies, which, he said, constituted too much that was socialistic and dangerous. He sharply criticized the two Texans in congress who attended the recent meeting of radicals called by LaFollette, bankers who do not keep a watchful eye on Austin and Washington will suffer for it, he declared.

W. L. Bush of Decatur responded briefly to the address of welcome. Judge R. E. Huff of this city spoke on the workings of the guaranty system, declaring that, fundamentally, the efficacy of the guaranty system depended upon the character and ability of the state bankers themselves. He urged that state bankers cooperate with each other in checking speculation and carelessness in making loans.

U. O. McCallon, district bank examiner, addressing the meeting, telling of ways in which the state banks may effectively cooperate with the state department.

Luncheon was held at the Wichita club. Business matters occupied a brief afternoon session. No officers were to be elected Tuesday, those elected six months ago being scheduled to serve for year.


