# FRANCE IS TAKING DRASTIC STEPS

## ADD ANOTHER TO LIST OF LOUISIANA DEAD

### FORMER SHERIFF DIES FROM WOUNDS RECEIVED FRIDAY ON ROAD 15 MILES FROM BASTROP

MONROE, La., Jan. 20.—John P. Parker, Jr., former sheriff Ouachita parish, who was shot on the Bastrop road 15 miles from Bastrop last night by Carey Calhoun of Monroe and a local constable early today without having regained consciousness.

BASTROP, La., Jan. 20.—John P. Parker, Jr., former sheriff of Ouachita parish and a prominent man of Monroe, who was shot and probably fatally wounded last night near his plantation home on the Bastrop-Monroe highway by Carey Calhoun of Monroe, was declared early today by Monroe hospital physicians to have little chance of recovery.

Monroe police early today said that from meagre information they had been able to gather, indications were that the shooting was the result of a quarrel over masked band affairs.

According to the story Parker met Calhoun, said to have been a close friend, on the street in Monroe and persuaded him to go to his plantation home. With them went Wess Saunders of Monroe.

On the outskirts of Monroe Parker stopped off at the home of a negro woman who cooks for him when he is at his country place, and Calhoun and Saunders followed him.

According to the police reports Parker and Calhoun quarreled regarding testimony given at the hearing here into masked band activities in Morehouse parish and the shooting followed.

Saunders fell asleep. Saunders is said to have told the police he fell asleep after entering the place and did not know of the shooting until he was awakened by the negro woman. He also declared that both he and Calhoun had been drinking during the day, the police said.

A deputy sheriff left Monroe late last night to place Calhoun under arrest.

Parker is the son of John P. Parker, Sr., whose name has been prominently mentioned in the open hearing. He, according to evidence, was a member of the "peace conference" held at Monroe between citizens of Bastrop, Mer Rouge and Morehouse and officials of the Ku Klux Klan to restore order in Morehouse parish.

In spite of the fact that the open hearing is under way, operations of masked bands have not ceased. Department of Justice agents reported to Judge Fred L. Odum yesterday that Sidney Rogers, Mer Rouge, was held up Thursday night near that place.

After being halted Rogers reported that he was asked if he was "Mr. Knight" and upon identifying himself he was permitted to proceed.

J. H. Knight, a grocer of Mer Rouge, officials said, was the man referred to by the night riders.

WILL FURTHER QUESTION YOUTH STOPPED BY BAND

BASTROP, La., Jan. 20.—Sidney Rogers, the youth who claimed he was a victim of a masked band near Mer Rouge Thursday night, will be brought here today by department of justice agents for further questioning and will be placed on the witness stand at the opening hearing some time during the day, it was officially announced.

Rogers reported to department of justice agents he was held up about two miles from Mer Rouge by six or eight black-headed men who asked him if he was Mr. Knight. He identified himself and was released.







He also said that he arrived in Oklahoma City on Thursday night 24 hours after he had escaped jail here.

He told Sheriff Murphy's chief deputy that he had read the preliminary report of the coroner's inquest on the morning papers at Oklahoma City and was preparing to leave that city at once. He said that his first secretary of the Vernon chamber of commerce had been traced as far as Waurika.



How to Make a Sawhorse Work-Bench  
Every one who works with tools should have some kind of bench. The one shown in the accompanying drawing is inexpensive and has the advantage of being portable. The ordinary type of bench is too expensive for most boys, so the one shown here was devised to take its place. As it is easily removed, the top of the sawhorse is quickly made available for ordinary work.

First, make a piece to support the legs, preferably a flat two inches by four inches. If this size is not available, use a piece of ordinary "two-by-four." This runs smaller than this size, but may be used. The drawing shows the legs bolted to fit this piece. If desired, the legs may be kept full thickness




