CHICAGO, Jan. 22.—Twelve armed liquor thieves raided a West Randolph street building early today, bound and gagged a watchman and a newsboy, rifled through a vault and stole 600 cases of whiskey, according to police reports.

The police were summoned when the prisoners were discovered long after the watchman had fled with their loot.

Albert Short, the newsboy, told police he was walking through the alley at the rear of the building and saw the men leading the whiskey on to a covered truck. They stopped him and asked what he was doing there. He told them he was on the way to work. They then bound him and took him to the basement, to John John Gavens, the watchman. One of the bandits, however, gave Short a \$3 bill, explaining it was to recompense him for absence from his work. He said:

ISOLATION OF RUHR VALLEY NEXT MOVE IN FRENCH PROGRAM

PARIS, Jan. 22.—The complete isolation of the Ruhr valley, and absolute severance of its communications with the rest of Germany, was announced in government circles today as the next step in the French struggle against German resistance. If that resistance continues.

THREATEN GENERAL STRIKE IF GERMAN CONVICTED

DUESSELDORF, Jan. 22.—The Ruhr see-saw halted temporarily today pending outcome of the trial by French courtmartial of Fritz Thyssen and other industrialists at Mayence tomorrow. A general strike was threatened in government circles today as the next step in the French struggle against German resistance. If that resistance continues.

General Desingnes expressed the opinion that the Ruhr valley was the scene of the last battle of the war.

"If we win this," he said, "we shall have peace for 10 or 15 years. If we lose, all our sacrifices during the war will have gone to naught."

The communists and the organized national syndicates are finding little in common and around Bochum the former are gradually turning to the French. They have twice asked French protection against the nationalists. The majority of the Ruhr coal miners were still at work at noon today despite appeals from union headquarters at Muenster and Bielefeld that they lay down their tools.

BRITISH INSTRUCTED TO COOPERATE WITH FRANCE
LONDON, Jan. 22.—The British government has instructed its military representatives on the Rhine not to interfere with the arrests and expulsions of German officials being carried out by the French. At the same time the British are instructed not to cooperate with the French in such operations nor to allow themselves to become involved in any incidents of this nature.

PROTEST DECREASES RHINELAND COMMISSION
BERLIN, Jan. 22.—The German government has instructed its diplomatic representatives at Paris, London and Brussels to protest the recent decrees of the inter-allied Rhineland commission regarding the distribution of coal and the confiscation of the coal tax and customs duties.

The note declares that the distribution decree is designed solely to extend to the Rhineland the competence and activities of the new inter-allied commission at Essen, while the other decrees seek to divert German revenues from legitimate creditors to allied powers.

STRIKERS CHARGE THREATS MADE BY ARK. COMMITTEE

LITTLE ROCK, ARK., Jan. 22.—Charges by strikers on the Missouri and North Arkansas railroad that during the recent disorders at Harrison their lives were threatened by violence on the part of a "citizens' committee" to promise to return to work or agree to leave the railroad territory are supported by the Arkansas legislature's committee.

Among those who have agreed to testify is Sheriff Roy Shadock of Boone county. The legislature committee also has sought to obtain testimony of Judge J. M. Shinn and other court officials of Harrison.

Thus far the testimony at the legislative inquiry has been confined to stories by strikers who either fled, or, as they claim, were driven from the Harrison region by the "citizens' committee" which after the burning of bridges on the M. & N. A. railroad, expelled numerous union men from the territory.

Of the six strikers heard yesterday, four charged that they were visited by members of the "citizens' committee" and were told that they must either sign papers promising to return to work for the railroad or meet agree to leave the territory. Two of the four said that they agreed to the former course.

In the first days' testimony, Red Orr and Luther Wise said they pleaded guilty to a charge of the office, one for street wear and the third pair for Sunday, delegates to the Illinois State Society of Optometrists in final session here today, have departed.

The resignations followed a week of virtual control here by a "citizens' committee" selected last Monday night when armed men from points along the railroad arrived with the announced purpose of putting an end to burnings and other alleged depredations which have tied up service along the line.

SCOUT ACTIVITIES TO BE BROADENED, COUNCIL DECIDES

TRAINING SCHOOL TO DEVELOP MORE ADULT LEADERS TO BE HELD.

TO ORGANIZE TROOPS IN NEARBY TOWNS

Extension Program is Mapped Out At Meeting of Executive Council Monday.

A training class for scout masters, active and prospective will begin in this city on Monday, Feb. 4. The course will be under the direction of Lee Clark, chairman of the training and leadership committee, and its purpose is to prepare suitable men for leaders of the different troops of Boy Scouts. It was decided to extend the scout program over the entire county; heretofore it has been limited to this city and recently to the nearby districts. During the coming year, troops will be organized in communities in the county where the scout movement has not been fostered.

I. H. Roberts and Walter Cline were appointed as representatives of the local council to the regional conference of Boy Scouts to be held in Houston, Jan. 24. The conference includes the presidents of the councils in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico. James E. West, national scout executive, will be present at the conference. Mr. Roberts was to have Tuesday afternoon for Houston.

Rescue Three Men Adrift Eleven Days With Liquor Cargo

GALVESTON, Jan. 22.—Substituted for 11 days on a diet of British beer, three men half dead from exhaustion, exposure and hunger, were picked up by the Morgan line steamer El Occidente, 233 miles off the Carolina coast, on January 11, according to Captain E. B. Campbell, master of the steamer, on its arrival here. Names of the men were not disclosed.

The men were described as Florida fishermen, all past middle age, who said they were engaged in taking a cargo of liquor from the Bahamas to Cuba in an 18-foot motor boat. Their gasoline supply running out, they were carried by the current and wind out into the Atlantic. Two loaves of bread and two cans of beans, the only food on the craft, were quickly used up and for 11 days they subsisted on beer. Captain Campbell picked the men, launch and cargo, up. The cargo included whiskey, cognac, gin, rum, wine, cordials and beer, all packed in casks. The men desired to be landed on the Florida coast. Captain Campbell gave them the option of going ashore after Jacksonville, the liquor or coming to Galveston with the liquor and facing the customs officers. They agreed to go ashore at Jacksonville, where they were thrown overboard, and were turned over to fishermen friends on the Florida coast.

PIONEER MEMBER A. P. NEWS STAFF DIES IN CHICAGO

CONTRIBUTED MUCH TO DEVELOPMENT OF ORGANIZATION.

DECEASED WAS ALSO A PRACTICAL TELEGRAPHER

Voted Medal of Honor By Associated Press Directors For Good Service.

CHICAGO, Jan. 22.—Addison C. Thomas, a pioneer of a century ago, one of the most widely known newspapermen in the country, died at a hospital here early today after a brief illness.

The cause of death was a stomach ailment which had recently prevented him from taking any solid food.

Mr. Thomas, who was born July 14, 1851, was for a long time superintendent of the central division of the Associated Press with headquarters in Chicago.

In developing the present extensive leased wire system of the Associated Press Mr. Thomas played an important role and for a number of years was superintendent of this leased wire system. He was a practical telegrapher.

In Chicago in the eighties, he first demonstrated the possibility of the use of the typewriter by operators in receiving telegraph news direct from the Morse sounder. This increased the carrying capacity of circuits and immediately added greatly to the volume of news delivered to the newspapers of the country, a distinct boon to readers. It also made the work of telegraphers infinitely easier. The introduction of the typewriter was brought about only after much experimenting by Mr. Thomas and long after others had declared

the idea impracticable. But soon the typewriter became also an indispensable part of the equipment of commercial telegraph companies and railroads. The device known as the cyclo-graph, a duplicating machine used by The Associated Press, also was one of his inventions. It was the first machine to feed ink from the inside of a cylinder, a principle now adopted in mimeographing. As an executive, Mr. Thomas immediately directed the arrangements for handling the news of many stirring events. He was voted a medal of honor by the board of directors of The Associated Press. The pneumatic tube system by which Chicago newspaper offices connected with The Associated Press and with the city news bureau was devised by Mr. Thomas and installed under his personal direction. Mr. Thomas' warm hearted personality won him lasting friends in the most diverse circles. He was known to dozens of the most prominent men of his time. Mr. Thomas' mother, one of seven-teen children of a wealthy Protestant couple whose mansion adjoined Phoenix Park in Dublin, came to the United States to be a missionary among the Indians. His father was a prominent Quaker. Mr. Thomas is survived by his widow, in Chicago, a daughter, Mrs. R. C. Watters of Baltimore, and a son, Melville, B., who is an automobile salesman in Chicago. Burial will be at Denver beside the grave of a brother.

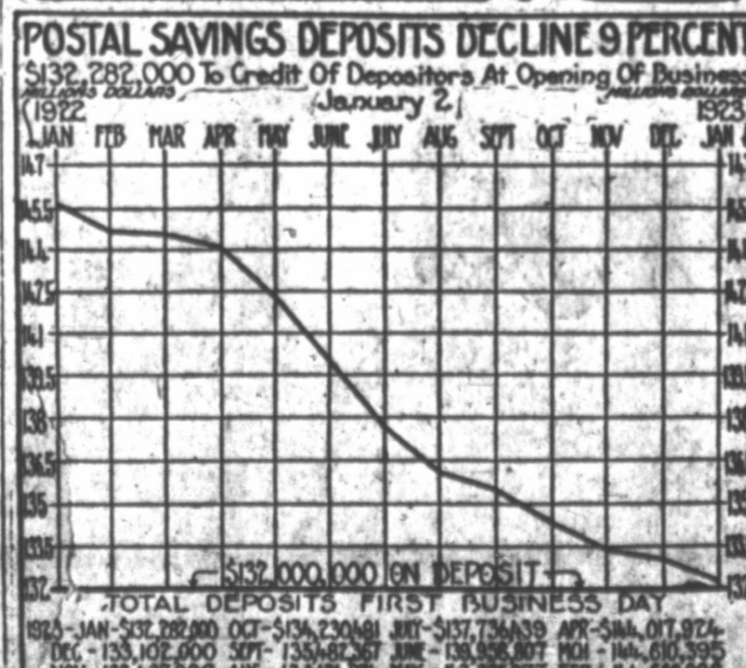

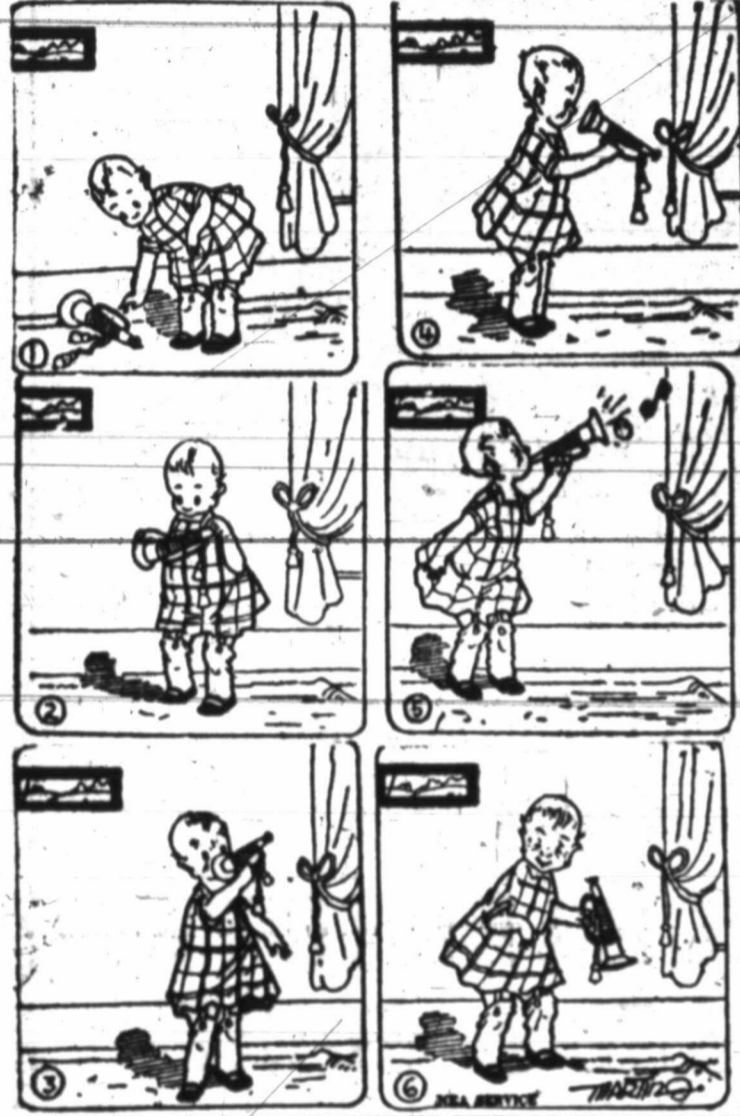

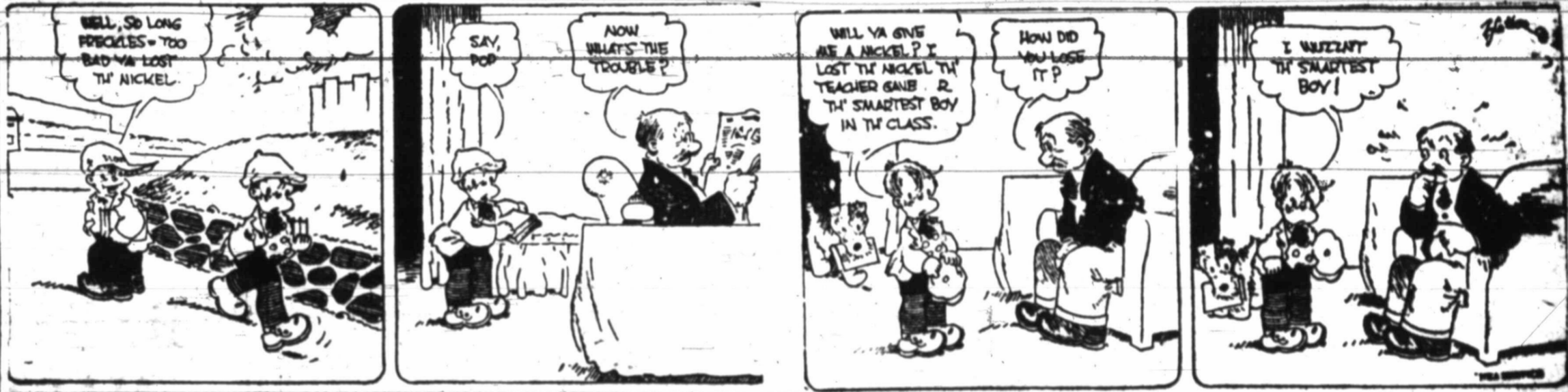
