





TRUTH IN FABRIC BILL IS PASSED BY HOUSE AT AUSTIN

Special to The Times. AUSTIN, Jan. 24.—The house late Tuesday passed finally the "Truth in Fabric" bill, requiring the correct labeling of virgin wool.

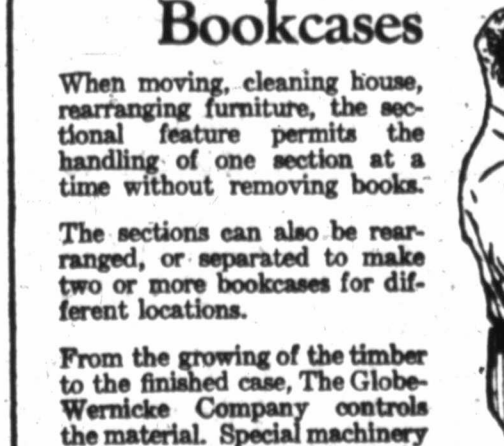

### 125 VENIREMEN TO REPORT IN MURDER CASE ON THURSDAY

A total of 125 special veniremen have been summoned to report to Judge H. R. Wilson Thursday morning at 9 o'clock when the murder case of Ida Bell is due to be called for trial.

Mrs. Bell stands charged by indictment with the murder of G. A. DeLoos, which it is alleged occurred on the front porch of the Elcom hotel on September 27, 1922.

Following a preliminary hearing she was remanded to the custody of the sheriff without bail bond but later on a \$10,000 corpus the bond was set at \$10,000, which she perfected and was released.

Since her release she has stated that she has made a contract with a moving picture concern which will feature her in the story of her life.

### WOMAN COLLECTS BOND FORFEITED IN COURT BY HUSBAND

A young white woman whose husband faces a charge of disturbing the peace, came before Judge Martin in the city court Wednesday morning with the request that the forfeiture in the case of her husband be set aside and the \$10 bond be given to her.

Upon questioning the woman it was learned that the charge had been brought against her husband following family troubles. The woman stated that her husband was gone from home and that she was left with four small children and was badly in need of funds.

The forfeiture was set aside and the bond given to the woman. The charge will be held against the man until he returns for trial.

### DISMISSES VAGRANCY CASE, BUT YOUTH IS HELD ON MORE SERIOUS CHARGE

A young man, charged with vagrancy, in the city court Wednesday morning entered a plea of not guilty. Judge Martin heard the evidence, dismissed the vagrancy charge and asked that a theft charge be filed against him in the county court. It developed in the testimony that the man was associated in the theft of a quantity of gasoline and at the time of his arrest was on his way to assist in moving the stolen property.

Bonds of \$25 were forfeited in the case of a young attorney and a woman companion who were arrested Tuesday night on a vagrancy charge. Neither of the defendants appeared for trial Wednesday morning.

One charge of drunkenness and two cases of traffic violation brought the revenue from the city court Wednesday morning to \$25.

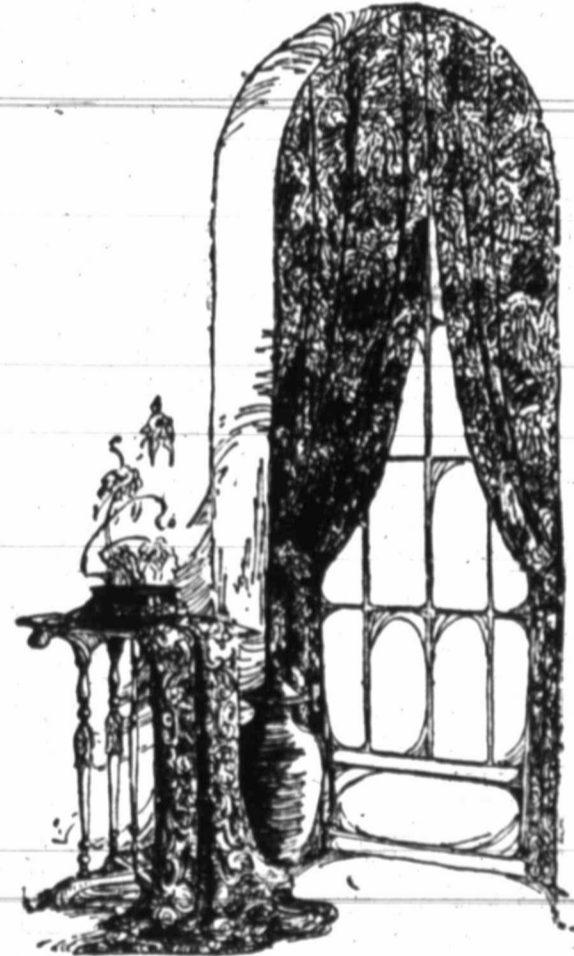

TODAY'S TALK BY GEORGE MATTHEW ADAMS. THE HIGHEST ART. We hear so much of art. But what is art? And what is the highest kind of art?

Latcadio Hearn says that "unselfishness ought to be the real test of the very highest kind of art." Why do I stoop and fondle and smell the velvet faces of my pet pansies during the summer time? Why do I look into the colors of the sunset and feel natural thrills, like streaks of electric threads, light up my brain?

A THOUGHT FOR TODAY. This is the victory that overcometh the world, even our faith.—I John 5:4.

The two sentiments which most inspire men to good deeds are love and hope. Religion should give freer and more rational play to these two sentiments than the world has hitherto witnessed; and the love and hope will be thoroughly grounded in and on efficient, serviceable, visible, actual and concrete deeds of conduct.—Charles W. Elliott.

TRUE EDUCATION. There may be practical objections to the arithmetic texts now in use in the public schools, and which the text book commission has decided to change, but these texts do have the merit of teaching the child to think.

Teaching children a set of rules is not true education. There is too much teaching of rules without the application of them. Too many students are like babies when it comes to applying the rules they have conned to the problems of every day life because they have not been taught to think.

"The power to think," the Houston Chronicle observes, "is like every other power. It can only be developed with practice." It is the most important power we poor humans possess.

"It is the one power which separates us from brute creation. It should be cultivated more persistently than other powers, more than memory, more than the emotions." Our whole system of education should center in and around it.

"Every branch of study should be directed to stimulate it. It enters into every trade, calling and profession. It is necessary to perform every duty. It, and it alone, has given us what we call civilization.

"What is the use of men knowing things if they can not think? At best they would be no more than parrots, repeaters, imitators and automatons." Wisdom is superior to knowledge, but wisdom is only knowledge supplemented with the power to think.

"The man who knows comparatively little, but who can build on it by himself and for himself, is far better than the man who knows a great deal, but who is stumped whenever he runs up against something he hasn't been taught how to meet." "Life is nothing so distinctly as a series of emergencies.

"These emergencies may originate in world-old principles, and the remedy may be discoverable in world-old principles, but there is always a little difference in the methods to be pursued. The man who can not think is helpless, no matter how much he may know. He may be able to point out the cause and to see the remedy that is indicated, but he can't do anything. He lacks that element of ingenuity which is all important."

DANGER IN TOO MUCH LAW. Disrespect for law has been growing in this country. There can be no doubt about that and we can't get back to normal until a better respect for law is restored. But the fault is not altogether with the citizens. Some of it can be attributed to some of our laws which invade individual liberty, and which as John W. Davis, president of the American Bar association, said last week in St. Louis, attempt to establish a "code of statutes to control the habits and morals of Americans." And some statutes have even gone further than that; they attempt to regulate the beliefs and thinking of men.

In recent years there has been more and more of this kind of legislation and in this respect we have been moving backward toward the dark ages. Some of this kind of legislation has even been proposed at the present session of the Texas legislature.

"Davis, formerly United States ambassador to Great Britain," says the Waaco Times-Herald, "made many in his address to the danger of 'too much law' and a tendency to ignore mandates of the constitution. He said, 'a mysterious being called the state should not be set up to the abandonment of the spirit of individual liberty.'"

"Speaking of the duty which lies before the legal profession to stem the tide of excess government, Mr. Davis asserted: 'I would advise you to preserve the image of God in man, rather than to set up the image of man in the state.'"

"The Waaco Times-Herald has talked in somewhat

the same strain over a considerable period, only to be told by esteemed contemporaries that it labored in vain or was too far behind the times to ever catch up. There is danger in too much law, but the American people are either not alive to the fact or their hands are tied by the primary election system."

Don't Be Deceived! Europe Is On Upgrade, Says Julius Barnes

What's going to come of the new turmoil in Europe? Few men are so well qualified to analyze conditions as is Julius Barnes, president of the United States chamber of commerce. For years, in his business as a grain exporter, Mr. Barnes has amassed information about economic and political conditions abroad. Then during the war he served as president of the United States Food Administration Grain Corporation and afterward as president of the United States Grain Corporation, rendering such distinctive services that he was decorated by the governments of Belgium, France, Italy, Poland, Finland and Bulgaria. Now as president of the United States chamber of commerce, Barnes is promoting the chamber's program for American representation on the reparations commission. He has written the following analysis of the European situation specifically for THE SERVICE and THE DAILY TIMES.

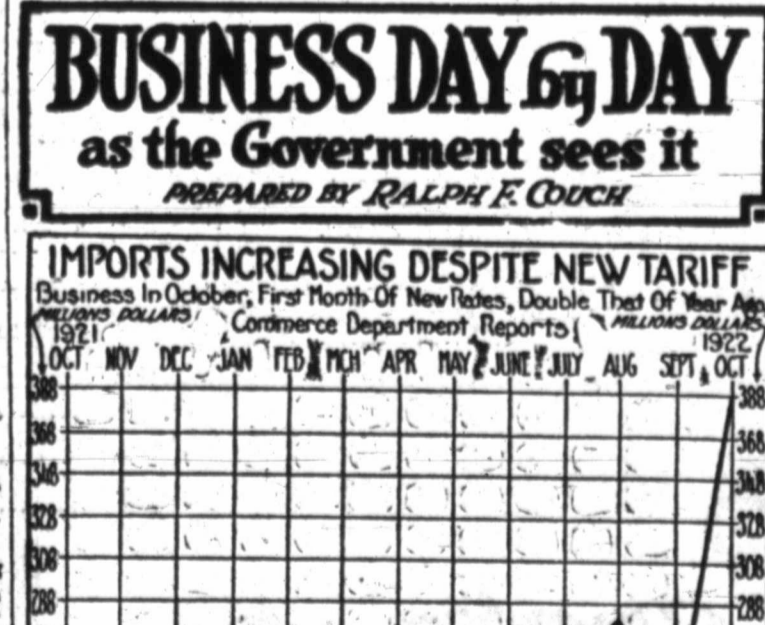

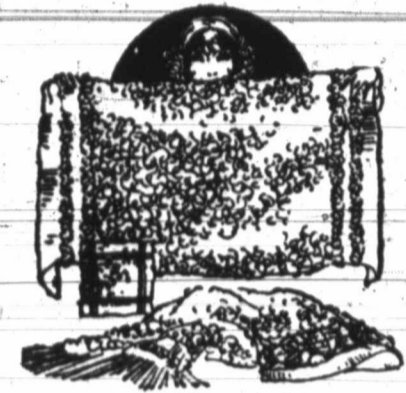

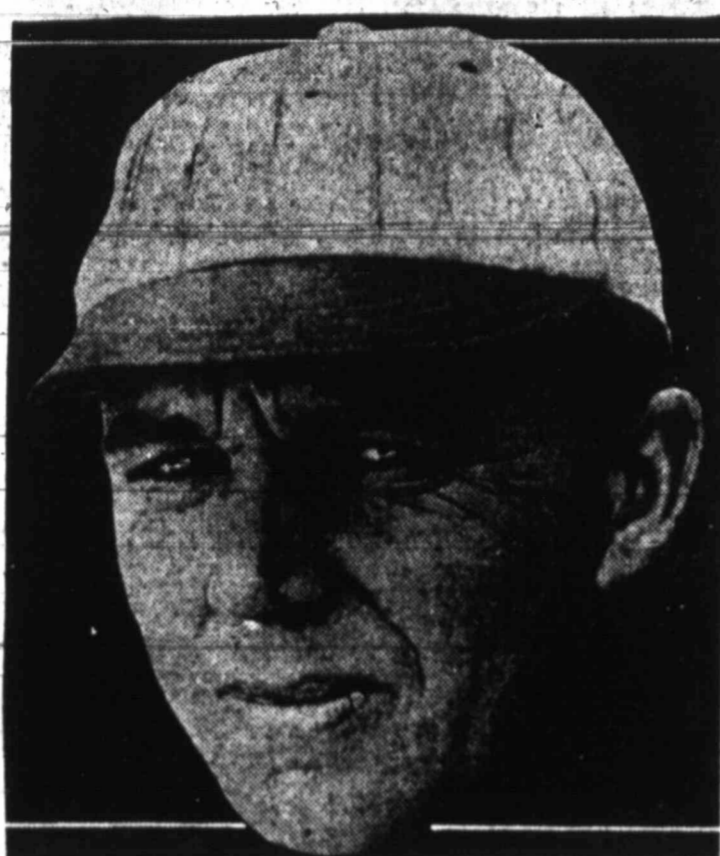

MUSTANG BASEBALL SCHEDULE FOR 1923 COVERS WIDE FIELD

DALLAS, Jan. 24.—The following is the schedule for the Southern Methodist University baseball team for 1923, according to Dr. J. N. Blackwell, director of athletics: April 7—Baylor university at Waco; April 9—Texas A. and M. at College Station; April 12—Oklahoma A. and M. at Stillwater; April 15—Oklahoma A. and M. at Dallas; April 22—Texas university at Dallas; April 25—Texas A. and M. at Dallas; May 1—Baylor university at Dallas; May 3—Texas university at Austin; May 11—T. C. U. at Fort Worth; May 14—T. C. U. at Dallas; Dr. Blackwell stated that the Mustangs would play several games with the Dallas Texas league team and probably games would be arranged with the champion Fort Worth Panthers in March. Baseball practice will begin February 1, according to Coach E. V. Freedland who is to handle the Mustang nine. As in all other branches of athletics, the school is looking for a good year. Freedland probably better in baseball than in any other sport, due to the large amount of material on hand. For the first time in the history of the school there will be a sufficient number of dependable pitchers. This year there will be three twirlers: F. G. Matthews, center, Texas; Duke Basinger of Lubbock, and Jess Becker of Kaufman, Texas. HOLDS GREAT CATCHING RECORD

By BILLY EVANS A catcher able to stand the big strain must be a husky athlete. Such an impression existed for years in major league circles. Big league scouts seldom paid any attention to catching recruits who were slight of stature. Ray Schalk, famous catcher of the Chicago White Sox, has for all time upset that baseball precedent. Schalk was secured by the White Sox from Milwaukee in the fall of 1912. I can vividly recall his major league debut. When Schalk joined the Sox he was a much more-abled young man. Comiskey had paid something like \$12,000 for him, a fancy figure in those days. When he reported to the Sox he was given a careful once over by all the veterans. 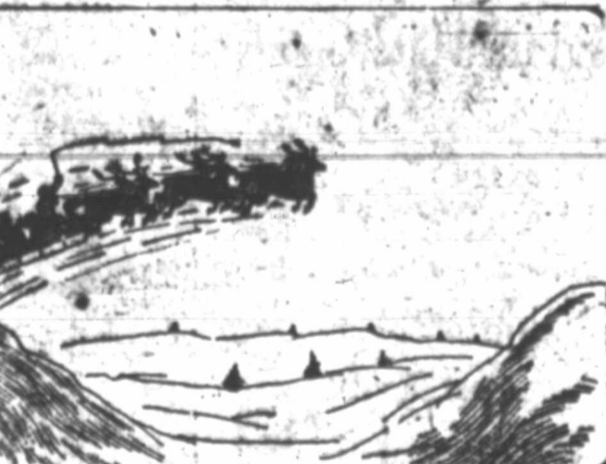
