SAYS OPINION WILL TURN AGAINST KLAN WHEN IT WILL DIE

AUSTIN, Jan. 27.—"Public opinion will soon turn against the Ku Klux Klan because of the murders and crimes they are committing, and then it will die," said Judge W. S. Simkins, professor of law in the university of Texas.

"The organization could be used for a powerful good if conducted in the right way," he continued, "and if the good conservative men in it could outweigh the influence of the fanatics, it would be a good thing. Of course bad men are going to get in every order of that kind, but if they would throw away their masks and do not know anything of the present organization, it probably differs from the old Ku Klux Klan in the initiation at least. Then, in the Ku Klux Klan of which I was a member, religion made no difference whatever with being a member. Jew or Gentile, Catholic or Protestant, if a man had fought as a soldier in the Civil war, he was permitted to be a member. We had to wear masks because of the danger to us."

"It is lamentable that the governor of the great state of Louisiana whose people rank high as loyal and law-abiding citizens of America, should, either for political purpose, to vent spleen or gain notoriety, so far forget the responsibilities of his office as to present to the people a presentation upon his own state. The hearing at Bastrop clearly brought out the fact that the governor of Louisiana was endeavoring to indict a patriotic organization rather than to apprehend criminals and see that they were punished. AIR PRESSURE HURLS PUMP HIGH INTO AIR IN UNIQUE ACCIDENT

One of the strangest accidents on record took place at 8:15 Friday night at the Lloyd Weaver Automobile company when a load of compressed air became unruly and hurled over 400 pounds of gasoline pump and concrete 30 feet into the air.

The pump caught on the light wires above the sidewalk, and hung there. It was necessary to erect the scaffolding to remove it. No one was injured, and the damage was confined to the pump and tank, which are practically a total loss.

A Boise like that of a dynamite explosion accompanied the accident and it was at first thought that it was due to the gasoline igniting. But the 480 gallons of gas in the tank did not ignite. The accident was due to the failure of the valve which regulates the compressed air pressure for the pump, and which limits the air pressure to a few pounds. In some way, this valve permitted the air to enter the tank in full force, and this force was sufficient to shoot the pump up into the night sky.

A negro attendant had just filled a can with gasoline, and was walking away from the pump. An automobile which was passing stopped in time to escape damage. The weight of the pump and the concrete which clung to it was found Saturday morning to be 412 pounds. This mass of concrete and metal dangled perilously amid the wires until it was lowered to the ground. Lloyd Weaver said Saturday morning that it was a miracle that the gasoline did not ignite, owing to the fact that electric wires leading into the tank were broken, and might easily have come into contact with each other. Had this happened, the big tank would have exploded, probably, with very serious consequences.

POST NEW ADVANCE IN PRICE OF CRUDE; IS QUOTED AT \$2.30

TULSA, OKLA., Jan. 27.—The Prairie Oil & Gas Company announced an advance of 10 cents a barrel in the price of crude oil this morning. The increase affects Kansas, Oklahoma and North Texas.

The advance makes the minimum price \$1.20 and the maximum price \$2.30 a barrel.

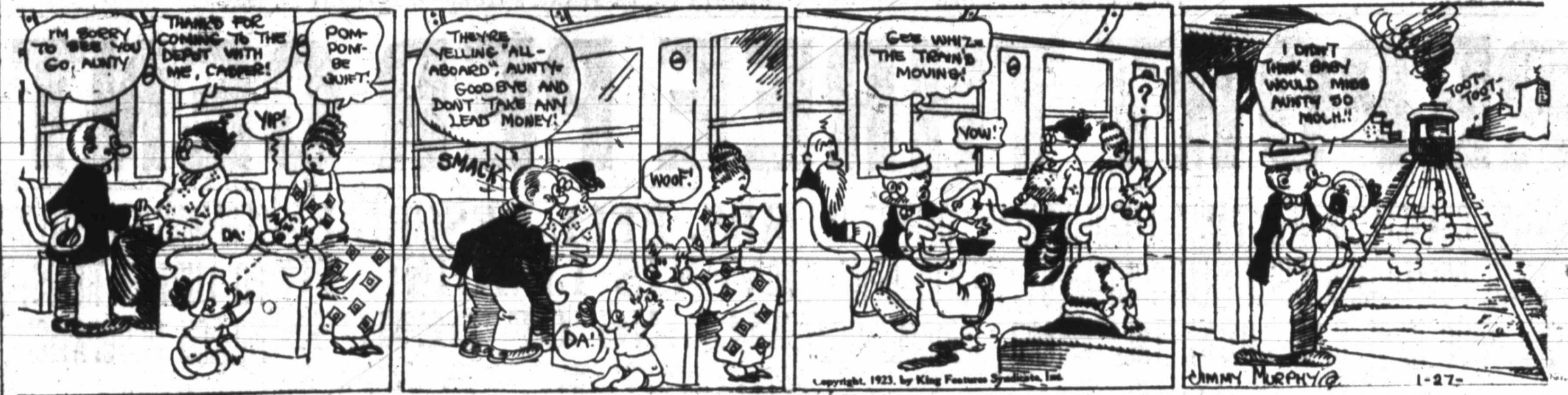

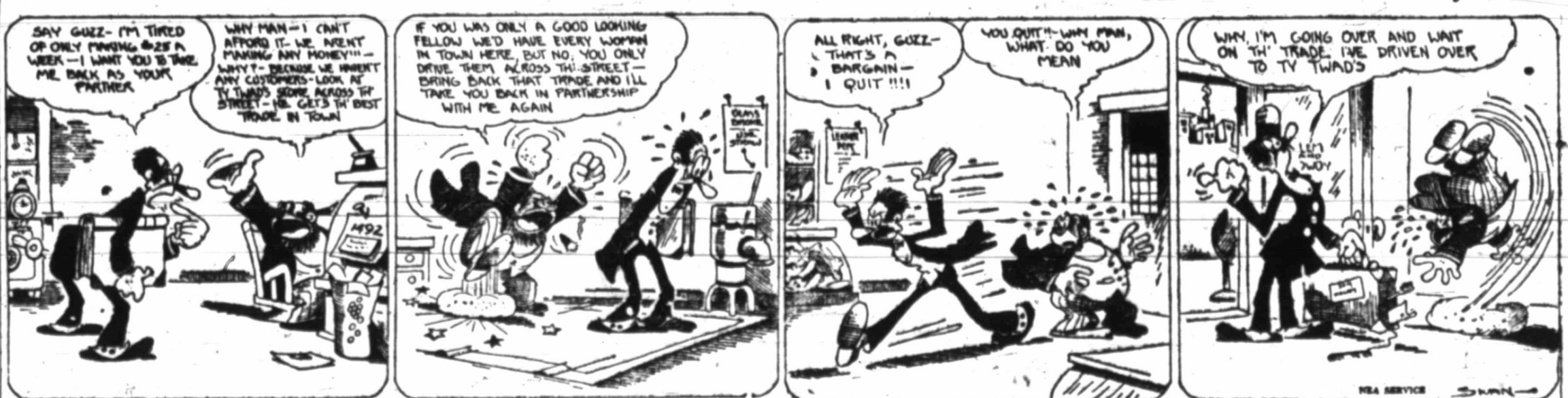

FORGE OF RANGERS

EXCEEDS 300 SAYS

ADJUTANT GENERAL

AUSTIN, Jan. 27.—State rangers have been called into service during the past two years to a greater extent than at any time in recent years, according to Adjutant General Thomas D. Barton. It is unusual for a day to pass without a request for assistance of the rangers in some portion of the state, the adjutant general declared.

As evidence of the activities of the rangers during the past year, Barton stated that during the recent railroad strike, it was necessary to increase the ranger force to 300 and then the state department was unable to furnish all the rangers called for at various points.

The forces at the present time number slightly over 300 and the special rangers are being discharged as strike duty is decreased.

The work of the rangers on the border during the last biennium also has been important, Barton said. He pointed out that 15 all-glass smugglers have been killed during the period and a large number captured. More than 14,000 pounds of narcotics were captured together with 25 automobiles and 150 horses.

Barton expressed the opinion that the border forces are being increased and that the forces should be increased by two companies. During the recent strike, a number of border duty and placed on duty at strike centers.

Adjutant General Barton believes that an increase in the ranger force to 300 as provided in a bill now pending in the house, would be sufficient to handle present situations.

LARGE AMOUNT OF LETTUCE IS SHIPPED

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Jan. 26.—Texas has come to the front as an important lettuce shipper, according to J. Amos Hunter, director of the Texas State Market News Service of the state department of markets. There has been an average movement of one car a day from Texas during the past season, most of the shipments going by freight, according to Hunter. Laredo has been the point of origin of most of the lettuce crop, it is stated. The Texas lettuce acreage this year is placed around 993 acres compared with 1,146 acres last year.

The national lettuce movement is totaling around 100 cars daily, the bulk of which is furnished from the imperial valley in California, Arizona, southern California, Texas and Florida.

DISABLED SCHOONER IS EXPECTED AT PORT

CHARLESTON, S. C., Jan. 27.—The schooner Helvetia, long overdue and disabled at sea, is expected to arrive in port today. The ship reported slightly injured in the recent coast storm is said to have been secured by a steamship, the identity of which has not been learned.

The crew is said to have undergone suffering from a shortage of food and water. The Helvetia sailed from New York December 11.

CHARGE POWERFUL ALLIANCE BETWEEN RUSSIA AND CHINA

SHANGHAI, Jan. 27.—Growth of a powerful alliance between soviet Russia and the southern faction of China, headed by Sun Yat Sen, is an editorial today in which Edgemoor Chen, personal secretary and right hand man to Dr. Sun, discusses the soviet conference yesterday between the Canton leader and a soviet envoy, extraordinary from Moscow to China.

"Russia," he writes, "shares with China a strain of blood high in Asiatic blood. It is this blood which you find a tartar. Is it this blood that has turned the face of Russia toward China? We can leave this thought to the attention of the post-war policy of the Anglo-Latin conquerors, for it is to Clementine's cordial sanitaries and its Casarian limitations that one must assign the presence of Russians at Ankara, Tehran and Kabul, in sight of the roads to India and Peking, and it may be added, survey extraordinarily from Moscow to China.

"There is a suggestion that the ultimate outcome of the policy underlying the conversations depends upon the attitude of the soviet government toward Russia and toward Sun Yat Sen. That outcome might be the cooperation of Russia and China in making available their resources to the use of humanity—or a continued hostility to Russia and what appears like hostility to Sun Yat Sen. It is a possibility that the soviet government will be a powerful ally of Sun Yat Sen."

MANILA, Jan. 27.—It is reported here today that the one ship of the coast-guarding fleet, reported wrecked off Formosa yesterday, was small, but it is not known how many persons were aboard.
