TRANSPORTATION LINES SHOULD FURNISH BOND

Would Give Railroad Commission Authority to Regulate Motor Lines

AUSTIN, Feb. 4. — Legislative needs of Texas for the regulation of motor vehicle traffic was outlined in a statement issued today by V. D. Fugler of Marshall, member of the state legislature and secretary of the state highway commission. Chief among the recommendations of Representative Fugler are in deposit bonds, certificates of public convenience and necessity, granted by the railroad commission, and giving the railroad commission authority to issue orders regulating motor vehicle lines.

Representative Fugler's statement in part follows: "Legislation conferring regulatory powers of some character over motor vehicle transportation" has been passed by and is now in effect in 25 states including the following: Arizona, California, Colorado, Georgia, Illinois, New York, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, Oregon, Nebraska, Nevada, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Utah and Washington. The District of Columbia, Hawaiian Islands and Philippine Islands also have centralized control of common carriers.

Would Require Bond

Transportation companies should be required to furnish some good bond for the protection of the traveling public in cases of negligence resulting in death, personal injury or damage to property. At the present time an operator can make a small payment down on a second-hand car and enter upon the transportation field. Practically all new legislation on this subject requires these bonds. The bonds should not be required in uniform amounts without regard to character of operation or volume of traffic. Statutes should prescribe a maximum and minimum and leave the regulatory body to exercise discretion.

Before we can have safe, reliable and efficient auto service some

form of protection must be provided for the transportation companies who invest their money in modern, expensive equipment. A general discussion of the certificate of public necessity and convenience will not be necessary as actual experience has shown its benefits to the public by eliminating needless duplication of facilities and tending toward economy and efficiency of operation.

There is no other way by which we can encourage responsible operators, adequate equipment and reliable service. This certificate is needed more in the regulation of motor transportation than most any other lines on account of the small investment necessary for an operator to enter the transportation field. In most jurisdictions existing regulatory powers over transportation, the statutes require the securing of a certificate of public necessity and convenience as a prerequisite to beginning operation.

"Because of damage to the highways and of the possible curtailment of rail service, a large number of citizens in many states are opposed to the operation of motor buses and trucks. Where evidence indicates that the operation of truck lines would result in damage to highways disproportionate to the benefits to be derived from the service, then as a matter of justice to the public, the certificate should be refused. Many more people are inconvenienced by ruined roads than are benefited by stage or truck service."

Discussing the question of auto service against rail service, Representative Fugler said it is impossible to follow any set rule, but that each case must stand largely upon its own merits. "One element which might properly be considered in determining public convenience and necessity is the popular demand for the particular service," Fugler said. "If truck and stage service are ultimately to supplant short haul rail service, the process must be slow and gradual."

"The great majority of states have vested power of regulating motor vehicle common carriers in the railroad commission. The law placing such regulation should not limit its power too much, but should be broad and elastic so as to care for extreme cases. These bodies should take notice at the least that the task is a great one. It seems to have been the experience of commissioners who have assumed this burden that the regulation of motor vehicle traffic is approximately equal in time to all other work of the body combined."

Representative Fugler advised that the laws of the various states be considered carefully and a program of legislation worked out for Texas that will give the state benefits of the experience of other states.



Improvements of a varied and extensive nature to be included in the 1923 budget were proposed at the meeting of the city council Monday afternoon. 

PROPOSED CHANGES IN THE TEXAS ELECTION LAW

A bill has been introduced in the legislature providing for changes in the primary election law. One provision would require poll tax payers to give their party affiliation in making application for a poll tax receipt.

Neither good nor harm can be seen in the provision requiring the poll tax applicant to give his party affiliation. It might be useful in preventing members of one party from participating in the primaries and conventions of another.

The recent election in which injunctions threatened to keep the names of the democratic nominees from the ballot revealed a danger that calls for remedy. It ought not to be possible for anyone to go into a district court anywhere in the state on the eve of an election and obtain an injunction which, even while on appeal, would keep the names of candidates from the ballot.

The secrecy of the ballot ought to be maintained. Even a grand jury ought not to have the right to open up the ballot boxes at its own caprice and will. There are circumstances under which the grand jury ought to have this right, but it ought to be restricted.

It is probably too much to expect that the present legislature will change the election law so as not to operate to stifle a minority party in Texas. As democrats, we do not seem to be big enough to want to give the republicans a chance.

CAN YOU INVENT?

Ever try to invent anything? Or dream you invented something that made the dollar bills come down like paper snow in an old-time Lincoln J. Carter melodrama?

Well, then, you would find it interesting to attend the International exposition of inventions to be held in New York City at the Grand Central Palace, February 16-23.

Advance notices of the unique devices that will be exhibited make us marvel at the vast resourcefulness of the human mind. One inventor has an automatic typewriter eraser. Another has a mechanical chimney-sweep. About everything possible seems to have been attempted by the exhibitors.

Auto shows, by charging admission, introduced something new into the business world—making people pay to look into the show windows. Who knows but that the idea will be developed until the public has to pay admission to get into stores?

We hope the inventors charge sufficient entrance fee to provide a nestegg for each of them. An inventor usually needs it. As a rule, the profits from an invention are reaped by the people who create a sales market. Emerson said that if you make a better mouse trap the world will beat a path to your door. That was fine big talk. But it was hollow.

as every inventor learns when he starts trying to market his invention.

A good feature of this New York exposition is that it will bring together the inventors and the men with idle capital who are looking for something to promote. Henry Ford, recalling the trouble he had getting capital interested in his "gasoline buggy," will sigh and wish there'd been such a get-together meeting when he was a young man.

Your Simon-pure inventor used to be a jack-of-all-trades, with perpetual motion as his goal. He began getting more practical after Uncle Sam announced that he'd no longer even consider applications for patents on so-called perpetual motion machines.

Running our eye over the list of inventions to be displayed in New York, we are struck by the fact that—with only a few exceptions—the devices are highly practical in nature.

It's a good thing that the great human inventive force is flowing along practical lines. Nothing we use is anywhere near perfection. Most of our devices are not more than 10 per cent efficient. You are reminded of this when you notice that most of the furnace heat goes up the chimney. Perfection of a furnace that would utilize even three-fourths of the heat would be worth more to the steam age than a perpetual motion machine.

Salutations, you inventors! You are the leaders who are pulling civilization higher and higher. Your inventions make possible the existence of arts, higher sciences and personal leisure time.

SENATOR HEFLIN BLAMES THE REPORTERS.

Senator Heflin, of Alabama, whose remarks during a debate in the senate a few days ago were ordered expunged from the Congressional Record, is breathing words of fire against the "subsidized press" and threatens to move for the expulsion of correspondents from the press gallery of the senate.

It appears that the correspondents have offended the fiery Alabamian by reporting too exactly and literally what he said during his speech and by terming the senate action in ordering his speech expunged a "rebuke."

Senator Heflin is not unlike some other public men in trying to blame on the newspapers his own mistakes. Words often look differently to the speaker in cold print and read in sober reason than when uttered in the smoke of verbal conflict and the heat of passion. When the speaker reads them so and when the consequences of his rashness begin to bear upon him, it is indeed a big man who can take his medicine and who will not charge the reporters with distortion. Senator Heflin hasn't measured up to bigness.



JOHN ORION FAUBION DIES MONDAY NIGHT



MOVIE MAN SAYS HE SOLD CANDY AND NOT TICKETS

T. D. Wilkie, moving picture show operator of Burk Burnett, was fined \$100 and costs by a jury in the county court at law at 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon when it returned a verdict of guilty in the case in which he stood charged with operating a show on Sunday.

F. D. Wilkie, proprietor of a moving picture house in Burk Burnett who is on trial in the county court at law on a charge of operating a picture show on Sunday contends that he did not sell tickets for his show but that he sold the patrons boxes of candy and permitted them to see a show while they were eating their candy.

The defendant was tried and convicted in the justice of peace court at Burk Burnett and fined \$20 and costs. He appealed the case to the county court at law.

It is charged that on January 12, 1922, he operated his picture show on Sunday, in violation of the Sunday laws of the state. He testified on the witness stand Tuesday that he charged people fifty cents for a box of candy and that for each purchase people were permitted to see the show free of charge.

The state asked for double the fine in event the jury found the defendant guilty of the charge on account of a former conviction for the same offense.

PITCHES IN 53 CONTESTS YET HE WORKS ONLY FOUR FULL GAMES

In serving as iron men of the Hill during the 1922 season, Urban Faber of the White Sox, Urban Shocker of the St. Louis Browns, Bob Shawkey of the Yankees, Epps Hixey of the Reds, Claude Cooper of the Pirates and others no doubt felt that they had earned their semi-monthly pay checks.

For statistics tell the story that Faber pitched 53 games, Shocker 55, Shawkey 56, Hixey 51, and Cooper 53, but there is another member of the pitching fraternity who has evidence in the book showing that he had few idle moments in the National league last summer. He is Lou North, a right-handed pitcher with the St. Louis Cardinals.

When it comes to iron men stunts around the pitching rubber, North has a record that is something anything exhibited by Faber, Shocker, Shawkey, Hixey and Cooper.

North appeared in 53 games last season—more than any other major league hurler.

SELECTING OPPONENT FOR JACK DEMPSEY TOMMY GIBBONS IS BIG ENOUGH AND ENTITLED TO CONSIDERATION

Who will be Jack Dempsey's next opponent?
Will Harry Greb, who has been the best of the colored fighters, get the first crack at the champion?

What about Floyd Johnson? Did he win over the veteran Bill Brennan piece him in line for consideration?

Should any attention be paid to the demand on the part of Jesse Willard for a return bout? Dempsey won the championship from Willard, and usually a defeated fighter always receives consideration when seeking a return engagement.

Then there is Tommy Gibbons. What about Sir Thomas? A year ago Gibbons was considered a certainty for a Dempsey meeting. Then came the upset by Harry Greb, which cost Gibbons at least \$100,000. He could have easily demanded and received such a sum had it not been for his setback at the hands of Greb.

Grebe's defeat on points in the Greb bout, Gibbons certainly looks up as worthy of a chance. Dempsey fought Brennan, Carppeter and Mike, in championship bouts, and none of the trio had any more to recommend themselves as contenders than has Gibbons.

Harry Greb is the most difficult fighter in the world to fathom. He will outpoint most any fighter in the business who falls to land a steep-producing punch.

All of which makes it seem that possibly the public and the promoters are attaching entirely too much importance to Gibbons' defeat by Greb.

When the mention of a bout between Gibbons and Dempsey is made, the question of size is always raised. Some of the ring experts feel that physically Gibbons is not a big enough man to have a chance with Dempsey. Only recently the New York boxing commission vetoed a Dempsey-Gibbons bout for that reason.

Such talk is ridiculous. Working along that line of reasoning it was cruelly to let Dempsey step into the ring with Willard. Jesse towered over Dempsey in every way. There is no such difference between the physique of Dempsey and Gibbons.

Why not let an inter-sectional game between Vincennes and Passaic? It would come from the records of the two clubs that they are settled in reverse of the Passaic and J. high school. 

AGENTS REPORT A LARGE INCREASE IN SMUGGLING TO U. S.

GOVERNMENT IS BEING DE FRAUDED OUT OF MIL LIONS OF DOLLARS.

"DRY" ENFORCEMENT IS GIVEN AS CHIEF CAUSE

Other Lines Are Added to Increase the Already Large Profit.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—Reports from special agents of the treasury department show there has been an enormous increase in smuggling and while detailed figures are not available it is declared the United States is being defrauded out of millions of dollars in revenue by this illicit trade.

Prohibition enforcement is given as the chief cause for the increase in smuggling. Rum runners, who for several years now have been practicing their nefarious trade at various places along the shores and borders of the United States, are not content with their returns from this business, enormous though they are, and any of the more daring ones have added side lines of silks, narcotics, and other products the importation of which is either prohibited or which carry high protective duties.

But the United States is not the only sufferer from this trade for rum runners along the Canadian border, and probably along the Rio Grande as well, are not content to go back empty handed. They carry cargoes both ways and thus have established more or less thriving and profitable businesses on both sides of the international boundary.

As numerous and pestiferous as

run runners on land have become, however, their number is small compared with those operating along the sea coast. There in many sections, it has become a highly organized business and while the attention of the country has been attracted to the liquor boats riding at ease out beyond the three-mile limit in the vicinity of New York harbor, a similar but more extensive liquor smuggling represents but a small part of the total. All along the Atlantic coast, from New York to the Gulf of Mexico, hundreds of little bays and estuaries into which swift power boats can dash, leave their cargoes, appoint a place, and dash back to sea, to be lifted up onto the deck of the mother boat.

From Florida all along the Gulf coast the situation is even more ideal for this section, for the most part, is more low lying and with even a sparse population than along the Atlantic coast. There, according to reports filed with the customs division of the treasury department, the smuggling is called modern science to their aid. The cargo carrying ships are equipped with wireless and their confederates on the land have their individual receiving stations. The ship out in the Gulf radios its location by some pre-arranged code or where it will be at a given time. The little boats dart out, load up with contraband and are back up some bays making deliveries before the customs officers can more than get started.

Government officials frankly admit they are almost at their wits end. They derive through smuggling of liquor and drugs has attracted to this business the most daring among the lawless. Many ventures means something akin to affluence for all profit-sharing members of the band and the chance of capture is declared to be only about one in fifteen, even around New York, and the sparsely settled sections so that recruits are always to be found.

VERNON DISTRICT COURT IS CONVENED ON MONDAY

VERNON, TEXAS, Feb. 6.—District court opened here Monday with Judge J. V. Leak presiding. Judge Leak empaneled the grand jury and called the docket. Many cases were set. Judge Leak stated that he would call the cases according to number on the days that the cases are called. All cases set for Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday would be called in order and on Thursday of each week settings for the balance of the week would be called. Any case set for Thursday and the balance of the week would have precedence.

Judge Leak instructed the officers to keep all parties outside of the bar and out of the courtroom. He further stated that he did not want anyone standing around in the courtroom, that he would permit no reading of newspapers in the courtroom, nor sleeping, or eating. His remarks were well received by those who were listening and what he said gave evidence that this court would be a place to work and not to loaf.

INCREASE IN RECEIPTS AT ELECTRA POSTOFFICE

ELECTRA, TEXAS, Feb. 6.—Receipts of the local post office for the year just ended show an increase of nearly 40 percent over the previous year. This increase is shown for every quarter of the year, with the exception of the first three months ending March 31. Totals for 1934 are \$24,484.31, and for 1935 the total was \$33,793.21.

Postmaster A. N. Richardson insists that a statement of receipts does not give any adequate idea of the volume of business done by the post office, for the reason that so many of the larger companies operating here buy their stamps at other places where their head offices are located, sending the stamps to Electra for use of their force here.
