### TRANSPORTATION LINES SHOULD FURNISH BOND

Would Give Railroad Commission Authority to Regulate Motor Lines

AUSTIN, Feb. 4. — Legislative needs of Texas for the regulation of motor vehicle traffic was outlined in a statement issued today by V. D. Fugler of Marshall, member of the state legislature and secretary of the state highway commission. Chief among the recommendations of Representative Fugler are in deposit bonds, certificates of public convenience and necessity, granted by the railroad commission, and giving the railroad commission authority to issue orders regulating motor vehicle lines.

Representative Fugler's statement in part follows: "Legislation conferring regulatory powers of some character over motor vehicle transportation has been passed by and is now in effect in 25 states including the following: Arizona, California, Colorado, Georgia, Illinois, New York, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, Oregon, Nebraska, Nevada, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Utah and Washington. The District of Columbia, Hawaiian Islands and Philippine Islands also have centralized control of common carriers.

However, there are no beaten paths to lead or direct states in devising legislation along this line; consequently we find a great variety of regulatory statutes.

Would Require Bond. Transportation companies should be required to furnish some good bond for the protection of the traveling public in cases of negligence resulting in death, personal injury or damage to property. At the present time an operator can make a small payment down on a second-hand car and enter upon the transportation field. Practically all new legislation on this subject requires these bonds. The bonds should not be required in uniform amounts without regard to character of operation or volume of traffic. Statutes should prescribe a maximum and minimum and leave the regulatory body to exercise discretion.

Before we can have safe, reliable and efficient auto service some form of protection must be provided for the transportation companies who invest their money in modern, expensive equipment. A general discussion of the certificate of public convenience and necessity will not be necessary as actual experience has shown its benefits to the public by eliminating needless duplication of facilities and tending toward economy and efficiency of operation. All lines of public utility service. There is no other way by which we can encourage responsible operators, adequate equipment and reliable service. This certificate is needed more in the regulation of motor transportation than most any other lines on account of the small investment necessary for an operator to enter the transportation field. In most jurisdictions existing regulatory powers over transportation, the statutes require the securing of a certificate of public convenience and necessity as a prerequisite to beginning operation.

Because of damage to the highways and of the possible curtailment of rail service, a large number of citizens in many states are opposed to the operation of motor buses and trucks. Where evidence indicates that the operation of truck lines would result in damage to highways disproportionate to the benefits to be derived from the service, then as a matter of justice to the public, the certificate should be refused. Many more people are inconvenienced by ruined roads than are benefited by stage or truck service.

Prevents Slow and Gradual. Discussing the question of auto service against rail service, Representative Fugler said it is impossible to follow any set rule, but that each case must stand largely upon its own merits. "One element which might properly be considered in determining public convenience and necessity is the popular demand for the particular service," Fugler said. "If truck and stage service are ultimately to supplant short haul rail service, the process must be slow and gradual.

The great majority of states have vested power of regulating motor vehicle common carriers in the railroad commission. The law placing such regulation should not limit its power too much, but should be broad and elastic so as to care for extreme cases. These bodies should take notice at the least that the task is a great one. It seems to have been the experience of commissioners who have assumed this burden that the regulation of motor vehicle traffic is approximately equal in time to all other work of the body combined.

Representative Fugler advised that the laws of the various states be considered carefully and a program of legislation worked out for Texas that will give the state benefits of the experience of other states.

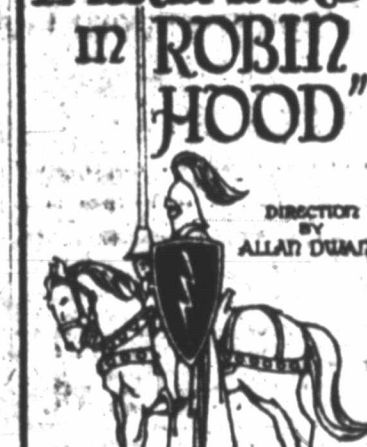

### IMPROVEMENTS OF EXTENSIVE NATURE PLANNED FOR CITY

INCLUDE INSTALLATION OF 10,000,000 GALLON PUMPING UNIT.

#### PLAN FOR DOWNTOWN CITY ALARM SYSTEM

Also Discuss Paving of Ten Blocks on Polk and Taylor Streets.

Improvements of a varied and extensive nature to be included in the 1923 budget were proposed at the meeting of the city council Monday afternoon. Although no definite action was taken on any of the proposals, the commissioners were asked to consider the installation of an initial pumping unit of 10,000,000 gallons, a city alarm system of 25 bells for public safety in case of fire or other emergencies, and the paving of 10 blocks on Polk and Taylor streets.

Commissioner of public utilities, called attention of the council to a statement from F. M. Lawton, superintendent of the city water works, declaring that the requirements of the city for water were beyond the capacity of the present pumping equipment.

Acting on the suggestion of Mr. Lawton, Mr. Stanton asked the council to consider the purchase of an initial pumping unit of 10,000,000 gallon capacity. It was shown by charts and figures submitted by the commissioner that the average daily consumption of water during the four summer months was 6,000,000 gallons. This figure does not include the requirements during fire which an extra charge is made upon the pumping equipment.

Last season when the plant was carrying its peak load it was stated that the capacity of the two 2,000,000 and the 5,000,000 gallon pumps was overtaxed. Mr. Lawton stated that he had been warned by the state fire insurance officials that unless a more satisfactory arrangement was made, that the city would be penalized by an increase in fire insurance rates.

A communication from the insurance department was read, promising a reduction in the present rates, which would amount to approximately \$5,000 annually to policy holders. If the suggested improvements are made in the city plant, it is estimated that the new pump can be purchased and installed for an expenditure of \$43,216. It was stated that funds were available in the city water department for the purchase of the necessary addition.

No action was taken at the Monday meeting, but the matter was brought up in order to allow the aldermen time for investigation. It is expected that some action will be taken at an early date; with immediate action the pump will be installed in June in time to relieve the situation by summer.

Police Commissioner Fitts asked the council to consider a plan which has been worked out and investigated for the installation of a system of 25 bells for the installation of 25 bells to be operated from the fire alarm office. Recent accidents caused by the failure of automobiles to hear the fire alarm provoked the suggestion. It is the belief of the police commissioner that the bell system would make it possible to clear the streets for fire and police vehicles in time of fire or distress and reduce the number of accidents to a minimum. The system could also be used to notify police in case of an emergency when all the force was needed.

It is estimated that the system can be installed for \$300; the cost of installation, it is said, could be met in one year by the reduction in the fire and police force.

Account of the finances of the city. The suggestion was held over until the 1923 budget is prepared. It will be brought up again at that time.

It was announced at the council meeting that paving on Polk and Taylor streets was being agitated and that the petition for certain blocks had been prepared and would be presented for action in the near future. The present plan included the paving of seven blocks on Taylor and three or four blocks on Polk. A local paving company is fostering the movement and the petition will be completed and submitted to the council at an early date.

Monday was the date set for the open hearing on ordinance 423; no objections were offered to the granting of the franchise for the extension of the traction company tracks to the new junior college. The ordinance was held over until the next meeting. Ordinance 424, closing an alley in Floral Heights addition was passed to its third reading without protest.

A petition to operate a grocery and drug store on Broad between sixteenth and seventeenth streets, was presented to the council. An open hearing was called at which time property owners will be given the opportunity to offer objections to the store at that point.

### PRESIDENT EXPECTED TO SUBMIT SETTLEMENT TO CONGRESS WEDNESDAY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—President Harding decided today to postpone until tomorrow at least his message to congress asking for modification of the debt funding law to permit final approval of the funding settlement recently negotiated with Great Britain.

It was said at the white house that no definite time had been fixed for transmission of the president's recommendations, which generally had been expected to go forward today. It was indicated, however, that the message would be sent to the capital as soon as further conferences with leaders in the senate and house had established what form of amendment of the law would be least likely to meet with serious opposition.

Those who conferred with Mr. Harding on the subject during the day predicted that he would be ready to act by tomorrow afternoon and that he would send his statement to the capital by messenger, instead of appearing personally to deliver it at a joint session.

During the drafting of his views for submission to congress, to which he was said to have devoted most of the day yesterday, the president held numerous conferences with administration leaders from the capitol with whom he is understood to have advised as to the most acceptable form in which to present the matter for legislative action. Administration leaders were confident today that its merits would be so revealed in discussion as to assure its approval.

### HOLD NEGRO ON CHARGE OF BURGLARIZING HOUSE

Lewis Robertson negro, was held Tuesday morning on a charge of burglary. It is charged that he entered a negro servant's house and appropriated some goods to his own use and benefit. It is alleged that he broke open a door in order to gain admittance. He made a statement to officials Tuesday morning and he was returned to jail.

### COUNTY WILL BUY TWO LOADMETERS TO WEIGH TRUCKS

#### COMMISSIONERS TAKE STEPS TO STOP HEAVY HAULING ON ROADS

#### WILL EMPLOY ONE ROAD SUPERINTENDENT SOON

Court Late Monday Afternoon Decide to Make Limit Four Instead of Three Tons.

Wichita county will buy two loadmeters as soon as County Auditor E. P. Walsh can advertise for bids. This action was taken late Monday afternoon by the county commissioners who have decided that the heavy hauling on the county's paved roads must stop.

As soon as these two machines can be purchased and delivered a road superintendent will be employed whose duty it will be to enforce the law regulating the size loads that can be carried over the roads of the county.

It was the consensus of opinion of the court Monday afternoon that the weight limit of trucks be raised from three tons to four tons. The state highway law permits the hauling of four tons across paved roads but there are certain rules, regarding the width of the tires that must be considered.

Judge R. D. Sartin stated at the close of the session of the court Monday evening that the court would employ at least one road superintendent but that if it was seen that one man could not regulate the hauling on the roads that another one would be employed to assist him.

A loadmeter, according to the commissioners is an apparatus that

can be easily conveyed over the roads and is so equipped that a truck can be jacked up and weighed without the loss of much time.

This system was invoked on the paved road between Fort Worth and Dallas immediately after the completion of this highway. The rule was made that trucks that were found to be overloaded were forced to yield a portion of the load alongside of the road so that the load remaining came within the limit of the state highway laws.

The statute has fixed a penalty in cases where truck owners carry more than the maximum amount allowed under the statute.

### SWEET CLOVER IS MOST VALUABLE AS PASTURE FOR STOCK

M. B. Oates, agricultural agent of the Fort Worth and Denver City railroad company, who has been greatly interested in sweet clover for the past few years advises that sweet clover should be planted in February and in a bulletin issued points out the value of a pasture of sweet clover.

He states that the advantages of sweet clover as a pasture crop are, late grazing in fall, drought resistance, high feeding value, early spring grazing after the first year, and last that it does not cause cattle to bloat.

In his bulletin Mr. Oates points out specific instances in this district as to the value, received from sweet clover pastures during the past year.

Men who have had the sweet clover pasture state that it will feed two cows per acre from March 1 to June 1 and one cow per acre from July 1 to October.

One farmer had thirty acres last year and he pastured 100 hogs, 50 shoats and eight cows.

### COURT DISCUSSES ADDING ASSISTANT JUVENILE OFFICER

County commissioners in session late Monday afternoon discussed the advisability of employing an assistant county juvenile officer to help W. G. Bralley in his work.

School officials residing out of the city of Wichita Falls had suggested to various members of the court that an assistant is needed as they feel that the juvenile officer has all the duties that he can attend to in Wichita Falls.

No definite action was taken on the matter by the court Monday afternoon but the out of town commissioners were instructed to ascertain whether their constituents thought it necessary to employ the services of an assistant whose duties it would be to attend to juvenile matters in the outlying districts of the county.

The commissioners will report their findings at the next weekly meeting at which time the matter will be disposed of.

### TWENTY CASES DISPOSED OF BY JUDGE GUY ROGERS

Judge Guy Rogers of the county court at law called his appearance docket Tuesday morning, marking the opening of a new term of court. Over twenty cases were disposed of. Judgments by default were taken in the majority of instances while several cases were dismissed, a settlement having been effected out of court.

### JOURNALISTS IN MEXICO WILL HAVE OWN HOSPITAL

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 6.—The corner stone for a "Newspapermen's Hospital" is to be laid here soon as the result of an active campaign for funds by virtually all of the publications of the capital. Although members of the profession are the nominal beneficiaries, the hospital will be open to all persons who care to take out membership. The best physicians of the city have signified a willingness to cooperate.

Day after day I lead the same existence, a boring, same grind, doing the same old thing over and over. How much better if I could get out and gallop in the pasture, visible roader through the door."

The patient, plodding horse is mistaken. He does get somewhere. For, by his monotonous galloping, he is making the treadmill revolve. That, in turn, operates the belt that keeps the chopping mill going, grinding corn and cob into feed.

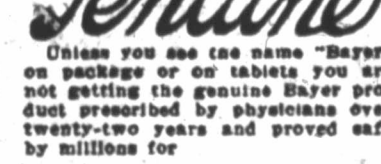

MOVIE MAN SAYS HE SOLD CANDY AND NOT TICKETS

T. D. Wilkie, moving picture show operator of Burk Burnett, was fined \$100 and costs by a jury in the county court at law at 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon when it returned a verdict of guilty in the case in which he stood charged with operating a show on Sunday.

F. D. Wilkie, proprietor of a moving picture house in Burk Burnett who is on trial in the county court at law on a charge of operating a picture show on Sunday contends that he did not sell tickets for his show but that he sold the patrons boxes of candy and permitted them to see a show while they were eating their candy.

The defendant was tried and convicted in the justice of peace court at Burk Burnett and fined \$20 and costs. He appealed the case to the county court at law.

It is charged that on January 12, 1922, he operated his picture show on Sunday, in violation of the Sunday laws of the state. He testified on the witness stand Tuesday that he charged people fifty cents for a box of candy and that for each purchase people were permitted to see the show free of charge.

The state asked for double the fine in event the jury found the defendant guilty of the charge on account of a former conviction for the same offense.

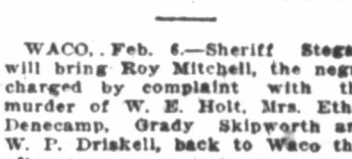

In serving as iron men of the Hill during the 1922 season, Urban Faber of the White Sox, Urban Shocker of the St. Louis Browns, Bob Shawkey of the Yankees, Epps Hixey of the Reds, Claude Cooper of the Pirates and others no doubt felt that they had earned their semi-monthly pay checks.

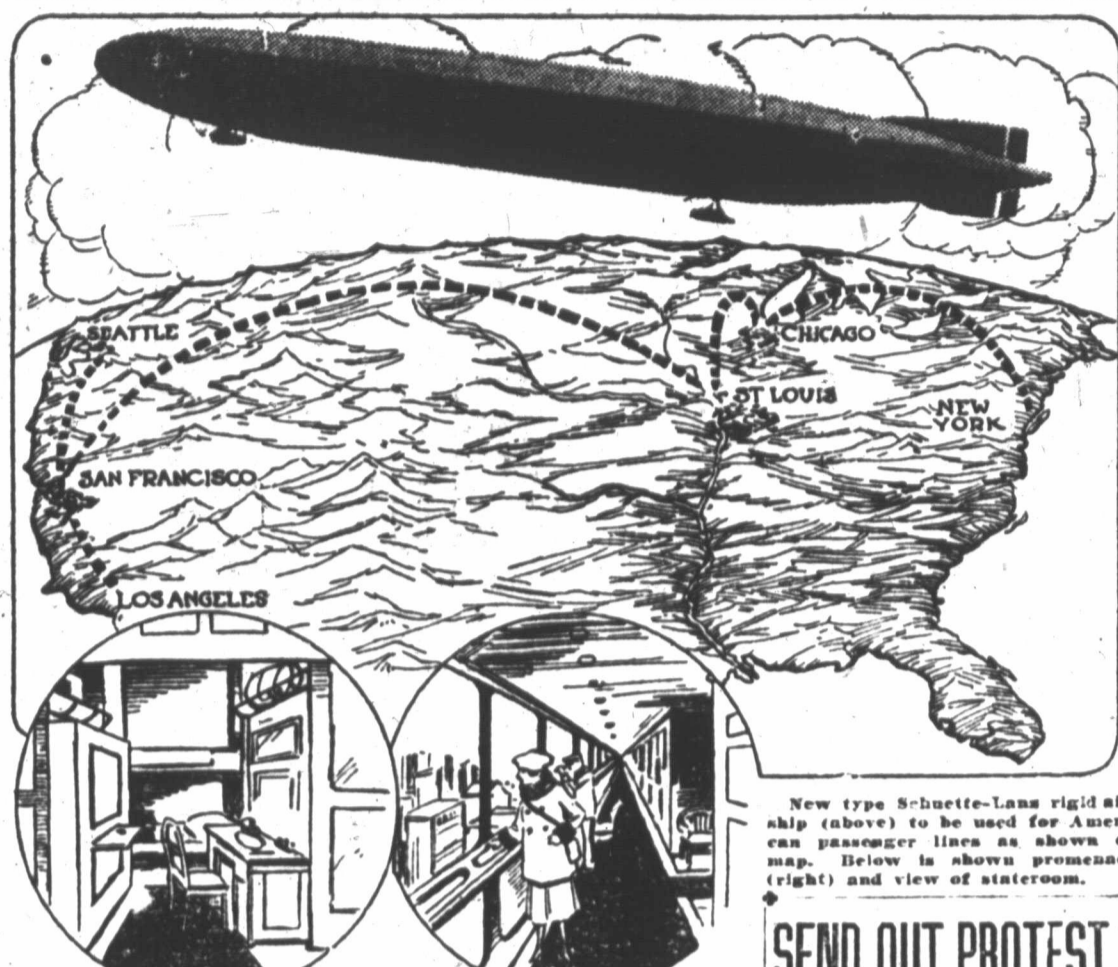

AGENTS REPORT A LARGE INCREASE IN SMUGGLING TO U. S.

GOVERNMENT IS BEING DE FRAUDED OUT OF MILLIONS OF DOLLARS.

"DRY" ENFORCEMENT IS GIVEN AS CHIEF CAUSE

Other Lines Are Added to Increase the Already Large Profit.

Made.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—Reports from special agents of the treasury department show there has been an enormous increase in smuggling and while detailed figures are not available it is declared the United States is being defrauded out of millions of dollars in revenue by this illicit trade.

It has assumed such alarming proportions that a conference of customs officials is to be held soon to determine what additional means should be adopted to put a stop to this business.

Prohibition enforcement is given as the chief cause for the increase in smuggling. Rum runners, who for several years now have been practicing their nefarious trade at various places along the shores and borders of the United States, are not content with their returns from this business, enormous though they are, and any of the more daring ones have added side lines of silks, narcotics, and other products the importation of which is either prohibited or which carry high protective duties.

But the United States is not the only sufferer from this trade for rum runners along the Canadian border, and probably along the Rio Grande as well, are not content to go back empty handed. They carry cargoes both ways and thus have established more or less thriving and profitable businesses on both sides of the international boundary.

As numerous and pestiferous as

run runners on land have become, however, their number is small compared with those operating along the sea coast. There in many sections, it has become a highly organized business and while the attention of the country has been attracted to the liquor boats riding at ease out beyond the three-mile limit in the vicinity of New York harbor, a similar but more extensive liquor smuggling represents but a small part of the total. All along the Atlantic coast, from New York to Miami, hundreds of little bays and estuaries into which swift power boats can dash, leave their cargoes, appoint a place, and dash back to sea, to be lifted up onto the deck of the mother boat.

From Florida all along the Gulf coast the situation is even more ideal, for this section, for the most part, is more low lying and with even a sparse population than along the Atlantic coast. There, according to reports filed with the customs division of the treasury department, the smuggling is called modern science to their aid. The cargo carrying ships are equipped with wireless and their confederates on the land have their individual receiving stations. The ship out in the Gulf radios its location by some pre-arranged code or where it will be at a given time. The little boats start out, load up with contraband and are back up some bays making deliveries before the customs officers can more than get started.

Government officials frankly admit they are almost at their wits end. They derived through smuggling of liquor and drugs has attracted to this business the most daring among the lawless. Many ventures means something akin to affluence for all profit-sharing members of the band and the chance of capture is declared to be only about one in fifteen, even around New York, and considerably less in the sparsely settled sections so that recruits are always to be found.

VERNON DISTRICT COURT IS CONVENED ON MONDAY

VERNON, TEXAS, Feb. 6.—District court opened here Monday with Judge J. V. Leak presiding. Judge Leak empaneled the grand jury and called the docket. Many cases were set. Judge Leak stated that he would call the cases according to number on the days that the cases are called. All cases set for Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday would be called in order and on Thursday of each week settings for the balance of the week would be called. Any cases set for Thursday and the balance of the week would have precedence.

Judge Leak instructed the officers to keep all parties outside of the bar and the courtroom. He further stated that he did not want anyone standing around in the courtroom; that he would permit no reading of newspapers in the courtroom, nor sleeping or eating. His remarks were well received by those who were listening and what he said gave evidence that this court would be a place to work and not to loaf.

INCREASE IN RECEIPTS AT ELECTRA POSTOFFICE

ELECTRA, TEXAS, Feb. 6.—Receipts of the local post office for the year just ended show an increase of nearly 40 percent over the previous year. This increase is shown for every quarter of the year, with the exception of the first three months ending March 31. Totals for 1934 are \$24,484.31, and for 1935 the total was \$33,793.21.

Postmaster A. N. Richardson insists that a statement of receipts does not give any adequate idea of the volume of business done by the post office, for the reason that so many of the larger companies operating here buy their stamps at other places where their head offices are located, sending the stamps to Electra for use of their force here.

The congestion, which was so marked at the post office during the holiday season, has been somewhat relieved. However, at present the facilities are inadequate, as the long line of men and women who gather every day at the windows testify. Every effort is being made to secure more room and a larger force in order that mail may be handled promptly.

W. H. COLEMAN DIES AT HOME OF HIS SON

VERNON, Feb. 6.—W. H. Coleman, one of Vernon's oldest citizens, died yesterday at the home of his son, H. L. Coleman, of this city. Grandfather Coleman, as he was familiarly called, was 90 years, 7 months and 25 days old. He had been a resident of Vernon for many years and died at the home of H. L. Coleman today. Dr. L. J. Mims, pastor of the First Baptist church, will officiate. The burial will be at East View cemetery.

Work of the state association during the coming year and plans for new activities will be considered at the business sessions of the convention.

Social features also will play an important part of the meeting, it is said. Among the plans for this phase of the program is a reception by Governor and Mrs. Neff at the executive mansion. SAVANNAH READY TO RECEIVE TROOPS HOME FROM RHINE

SAVANNAH, GA., Feb. 6.—Savannah is ready to receive the American troops from Germany who will arrive Wednesday aboard the transport St. Mihiel. Plans have been completed for a monster welcome to the last of the American troops from the Rhine, from the time the vessel is sighted until she departs Savannah at 7 o'clock Wednesday morning, is not expected to arrive in port until after noon, according to a radio message from the commander.

ONLY SIXTEEN STATES FREE FROM LYNCHINGS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—Only 16 states have been free from lynchings in the last 10 years, the commission of church and race relations of the federal council of churches of Christ in America declared today in an analysis of lynching statistics from 1926 to 1931. Of these, no lynching has ever been reported in

Massachusetts, Rhode Island, New Hampshire, or Vermont, the statement said, and none has been reported since 1899 in New Jersey, Utah or Connecticut. The other states given a "clear record" in the last ten years were Nevada, Colorado, Minnesota, Iowa, Wisconsin, Michigan, Indiana, Delaware and Pennsylvania.

The lynching victims from 1925 to 1921 included 1,011 white men and 17 white women, and 2,901 negro men and 49 negro women, according to the analysis. The statement cited the lynching of German during the war as "indicating that lawlessness spreads where prejudice abounds."
