





REPORT GOVERNOR FAVORS WEST TEXAS COLLEGE MEASURE

AUSTIN, Feb. 8.—Three members of the legislature who have conferred with Governor Neff relative to the West Texas Technology college bill which has passed both houses and is now pending the governor's approval or disapproval, stated today the chief executive had indicated to them he will sign the measure. Governor Neff would neither confirm nor deny the statements. The West Texas college bill passed the house finally on Tuesday and was sent to the governor Wednesday morning. Proponents of the measure have held several conferences with the executive. The bill provides for establishment of a technology college somewhere in west Texas and appropriates \$1,000,000 for construction of the school.

### OFFICERS START AN INVESTIGATION OF HOLLOWAY MURDER

#### EXPECT TO CONNECT MEMBERS OF HIS GANG WITH KILLING.

#### FIND BODY IN SHALLOW GRAVE NEAR TULSA, OKLA.

#### Persons Acquainted With Noted Gunman and Bandit Are to Be Questioned.

TULSA, Okla., Feb. 9.—Delving into the criminal history of Frank Holloway, notorious in the southwest as a gun man and bandit, Tulsa county officers today hoped to uncover evidence that would connect members of his gang with his assassination.

Holloway, old in crime, paid the penalty of the underworld for double crossing, if the theory of officers is correct.

"Secretly bound and gagged, he was 'rumped off' and his body thrown into a shallow grave in the brush on a lonely hill near Red Fork, a village south of here.

The body was found two days ago. Two bullets had been fired into the top of his head.

Officers working on the case strongly believe that Holloway was put out of the way because some of his associates thought they had been double crossed or feared that he intended to expose them to gain immunity for himself.

Several persons who knew Holloway will be questioned during the day. County Attorney Goldsberry announced.

Officers hope that some of Holloway's underworld friends may offer information that will lead to the apprehension of the slayers. At the time of his death Holloway was under indictment for alleged participation in a train robbery near Denison two years ago and at Texarkana some time later. He also was under indictment at Paris for bank robbery.

#### FIND BODY OF NOTED BANDIT OF OKLAHOMA

TULSA, Okla., Feb. 9.—Frank Holloway, ex-convict and known throughout the southwest as a bank and train robber, whose body was found in a shallow grave near here late Wednesday, was slain by members of his own powerful gang who traced him here in the belief that he had double crossed them and was about to expose them to secure immunity for himself from pending prosecutions on a train robbery charge.

This was the theory advanced by authorities here today, after the body had been identified by two local business men and their statements had been confirmed by two attorneys who had been employed by the dead man at various times.

Holloway was said by officials here to have been the brains of an "organization" composed of the "fastest steppers and most daring gunmen" of the west. This gang is reported to have operated between Mobile, Ala., and Los Angeles with Tulsa and Dallas as headquarters at various times.

#### During Band Robbery.

The story of Holloway's activities which led to his death, as told by local authorities, had its inception in New York City two years ago when more than \$200,000 in Liberty bonds were taken in a daring robbery. The bonds later turned up in Tulsa, so the story goes, in the hands of Holloway and his band. Their efforts to dispose of the loot is said to involve men high in the business and social life of Tulsa.

Holloway's manipulations with the bonds are said by those who related the history of his brief career to have led the members of his gang to believe he had double crossed them.

The gruesomely convincing evidence of the penalty assessed by his comrades for that offense was revealed late yesterday in the hidden grave in the shadow of notorious Pistol Hill where lay Holloway's dead body. It had been shot twice through the head.

The course of the bullet downward through his body drew a vivid picture in the minds of officers that Holloway had been killed while on his knees appealing to the slayers to spare his life. No arrests have been made.

## White Wife Shatters Romance of Wealthy Indian of Oklahoma

MUSKOGEE, Okla., Feb. 9.—After three hectic years of wedded life that required him to live up to his position as the world's richest Indian, Jackson Barnett is alone again and with a grunt of relief has just said the soft ways of civilization.

The aged Indian has discarded such inconveniences as starch linen and beds and is enjoying himself in aboriginal fashion, though amid the splendors of his ultra-modern bungalow near here.

Barnett's white wife, who recently was deeded more than half a million dollars, has gone to California with her daughter, Miss Maxine Lowe, leaving her seamy brocade husband to his own devices. And Jackson is enjoying his liberty.

The old Indian now has no worries, his fortune has been disposed of and he is assured of a life income of \$50,000.

Of the \$500,000 deeded by Barnett to his wife \$200,000 has been placed in trust for him on which he will receive the income during his life, together with revenues from other property. A big share of his wealth under terms of an agreement reached recently in Washington will go to an Indian institution in Oklahoma and to various charities.

Barnett's wedded life began three years ago when he eloped from his little hut near Henryetta and was married in Coffeyville, Kan. Charges were made at the time by his guardian and Indian agents that his bride had "kidnaped" him.

Pellet of quills. Before the glowing fire place in the living room of his bungalow, Barnett now makes a rude pallet of quills on the floor and gets a comfortable night's sleep.

Accused last night the Indian gave the first interview since his marriage at which his wife was not present. Asked how long his wife would be gone he replied:

"She say she be gone 'bout two weeks," and yawned sleepily. "She want me to move to California ever since we go out there that time last summer. I don't like it out there though. The climate don't agree with me. Too far from home."

"I tell her, 'spose I get sick out there' but she all time wants to go."

"So last Tuesday she's catch the train and go. She says she wanted to put her daughter in school but I try to get her to go to school somewhere around here."

"When we go off to Washington I catch cold up there. Ain't feel good ever since. Don't like to travel around all time, no how."

Barnett apparently is untroubled by his wife's going. All that he wants is to be left alone.

The association also voted to hold a picnic supper the evening of Washington's birthday, which will be the second benefit social affair this month, following the stunt party Friday night.

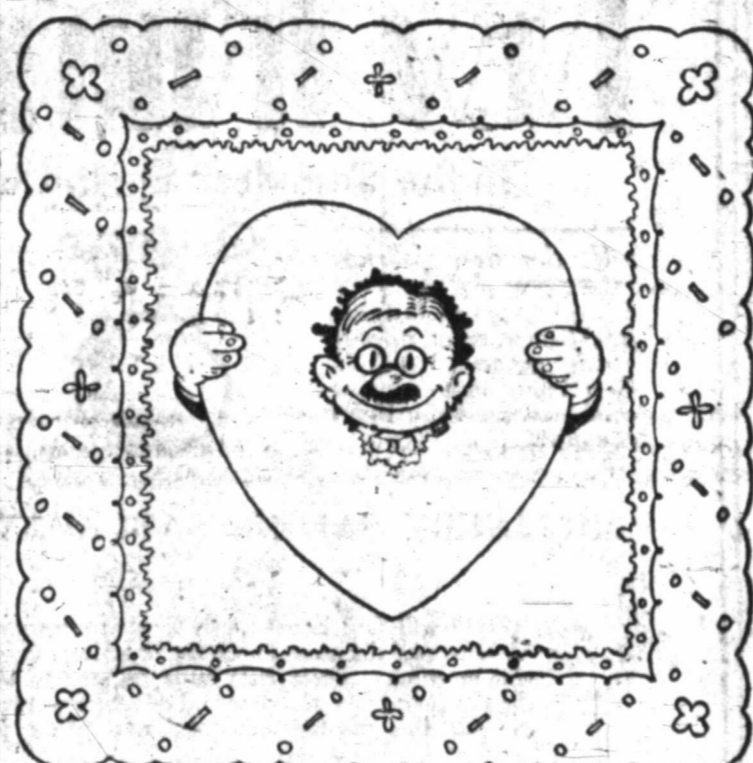

### SALE OF \$750,000 IRRIGATION BONDS EFFECTED THURSDAY

DISTRICT GETS \$30,000 PREMIUM ON BALANCE OF ORIGINAL ISSUE.

### ST. LOUIS CONCERN PURCHASES SECURITIES

Bonds Bring Much Better Price Than Those Sold in Fall of 1921.

Sale of the remainder of the irrigation district bonds, amounting to \$750,000, was effected Thursday morning by the directors, who will receive \$104 plus accrued interest, for each \$100 bond, the premium totalling \$25,500 on all the bonds. R. H. Grant & Co. of St. Louis were the purchasers.

The sale of the first installment of \$2,750,000 in November, 1921, was made at 92, the district receiving \$12 more per bond for the last installment than was paid on the first. It was considered advisable to sell the first bonds at such a price in order that work might be started and Wichita Falls' water supply assured, without further delay, and the directors feel that subsequent events have amply justified their course.

Earlier this month the directors turned down an offer of 103 for the bonds, feeling that the securities should command a better price; they were able to sell at a better price Friday.

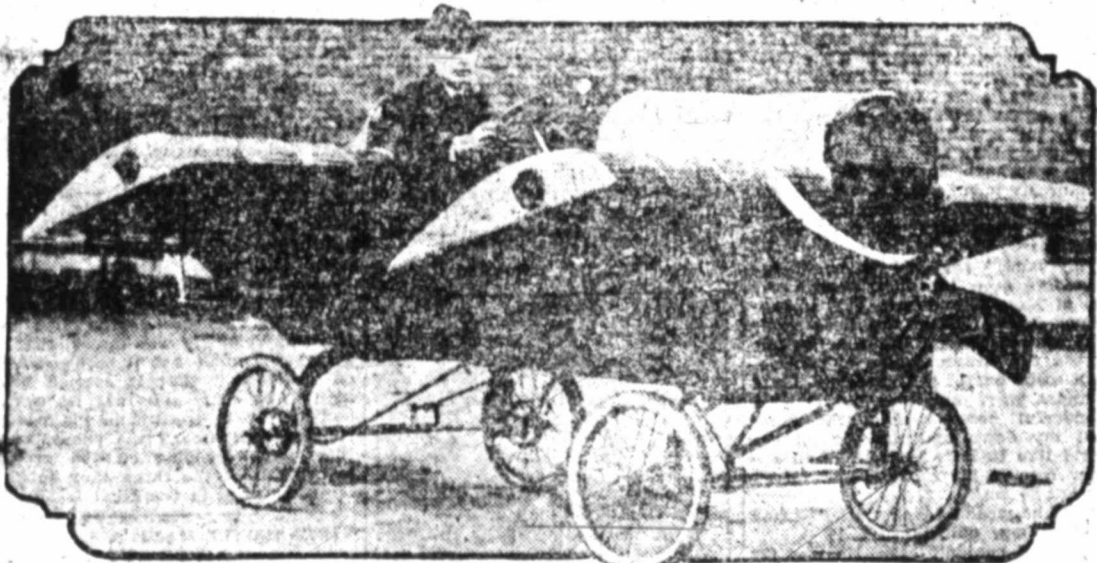

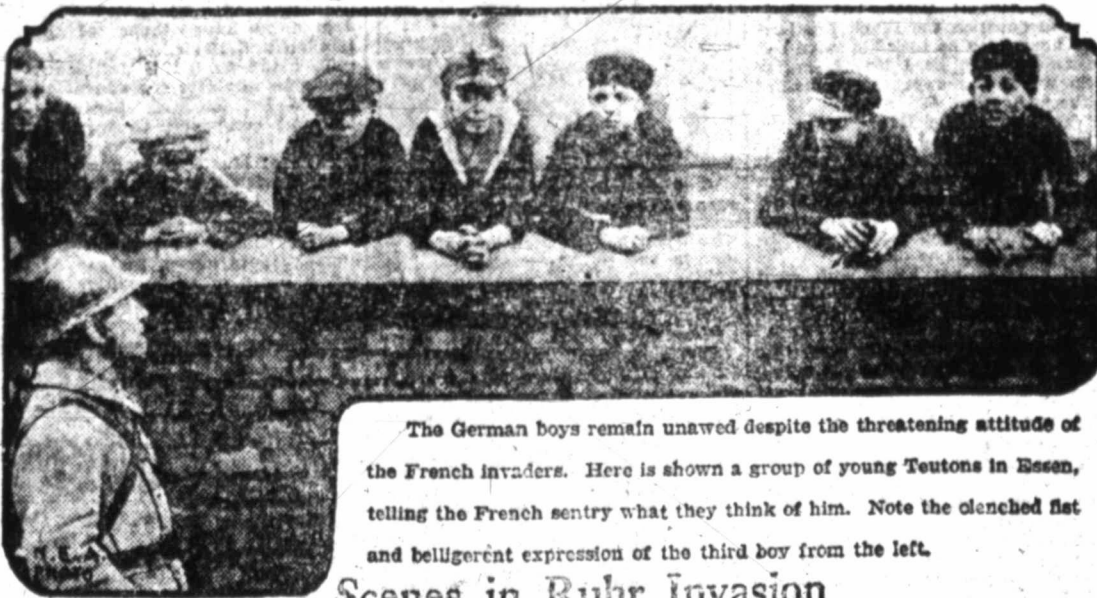

## Menus and Table Decoration Suggestions for February Holidays

February brings us three holidays on each of which one wants to serve something and to provide table decorations appropriate to the occasion.

St. Valentine's day offers many possibilities. Any heart-shaped cake or confection is suitable.

Cherries and hatches are associated with the name of George Washington.

For the anniversary of the honored Lincoln the humble log cabin or something representative of our flag are emblematic.

Cakes made to resemble hearts, hatches, rabbits and chickens are helpful and if you cannot find them in some store, any tinsmith will make them upon being furnished with a pattern.

Cookies are easy to make and attractive when garnished and frosted.

For instance, a heart-shaped cookie may be frosted pink or red, or frosted white and garnished with a heart made from red candies.

Cookie dough cut with a hatchet-shaped cutter might have a cherry baked on it.

An in finishing a cookie, remember that a brushing with delicate white of egg should precede baking.

For those who live in or near cities there are, in all the candy shops many attractive decorations in keeping with the season. Small boxes come in heart, hatchet and flag shapes, adding much to the appearance of the table and serving as souvenirs.

The children always enjoy Valentine's parties and the refreshments are not least important among the plans for them.

In the table's center have a big heart-shaped Jack Horner pie, done all in pink, with pink and blue streamers connecting with presents to be pulled from the pie's interior. The blue ribbons will be for the boys, the pink ones for the girls. The place cards should be Valentine-shaped.

Cakes and pink candies.

**FIRELESS COOKING AND THE USE OF STEAM**

Much has been written about the digestibility of foods cooked by various methods, but not quite so much has been said concerning the development of flavor.

Cookery teachers, who have the opportunity to experiment, are working with steam pressure and fireless cookers, to find out how the flavor of meats and vegetables is affected.

The woman of today objects to spending hours preparing a dish, if it can be cooked in less time without changing digestibility or flavor too much.

Of course, the fireless cooker is a new apparatus, using the old, well-known fact that heat obtained by cooking over a direct flame may be detained for hours, if the kettle or dish is protected so as to prevent its loss. Fireless cookers may be made, using straw or hay between the outer receptacle and the inner dish containing the hot food. The new fireless cookers rely on a vacuum. One can cook a stew or ham for a given length of time on the stove, place it in the fireless, leave it, and after several hours the meat or stew is thoroughly done and needs only reheating.

In pressure cookery, the material is placed under steam pressure for a very short time. For instance, meat requiring several hours' cooking may be made tender in a pressure cooker, under 15 or 20 pounds of steam, in 20 minutes. The flavor is good, especially if the meat is browned before putting into the kettle, and less seasonings are required, as there is no chance for the flavor to escape into the air.

The initial cost of these cookers is considerable, but they save time, and a housekeeper must spend time or money to get results.

### MANY POSSIBLE USES FOR PRUNE ARE SUGGESTED

The flavor of prunes is acceptable in so many different dishes that there is no need whatever of confining the serving of prunes to those which are merely stewed. The laxative value of a food is enhanced when prunes are included in its ingredients. Where additional cooking is put in the bran muffins or the honey cookies, the purpose of these articles in the diet is doubly served. Why not try prunes in other ways where dried fruit is called for? Prune gems and biscuits, prune breads, many forms of prune puddings and other desserts immediately suggest themselves to the ingenious cook.

The United States department of agriculture suggests that "prunes should be cooked in a covered dish or pan with just enough water to give the amount of juice wanted. It is important to use as little water as possible, so as not to dilute the juice unduly. Soaking is unnecessary if the cooking is done slowly. Sugar may be added if desired, but is usually unnecessary. In most of the recipes calling for prunes, cooked prunes are intended, although for some of the confections made of prunes the dry, pitted fruit is used. Where additional cooking is to be done the prunes may be soaked just long enough to get the stones out easily before being cut up or chopped, but unnecessary soaking should be avoided.

**Cooked Prune Pulp.** Cooked prunes pulp, made and flavored slightly with lemon and sugar, with or without chopped nuts, is the basis of a number of good dishes. Served with cream, the pulp is a dessert in itself. It may be used for a tart or patty shell filling, or as a cake filling, either with white or chocolate cake. Alone or with almonds, pecans, walnuts or peanuts, it makes a good sandwich filling. Spread on sponge cake instead of jelly, prune pulp makes a pleasant variation of the popular jelly roll. Prune shortcake offers a suggestion for dessert when fresh fruits are not available. Charlotte Russe shells of sponge cake, filled with prune pulp and sliced, are delicious. Prune bars may be made of cookie dough spread with prune pulp, or prune cookies made by putting two round cookies together after baking, with prune pulp between.

In addition to being spread on shortcake, prune pulp combined with biscuit dough in a bread of wafers, plainwafers are made by spreading the fruit, soaked, stoned and chopped, over a rolled-out piece of biscuit dough, which is then sprinkled with sugar and cinnamon and rolled up. Half-inch slices are cut from the roll, brushed with milk, sprinkled with sugar, and baked. "Roly-poly" is a form of boiled pudding in which a biscuit dough is usually spread with jelly, but prune pulp may be used instead. The roll of dough is tied in a cloth and boiled for three

hours. If the prunes are soaked, chopped and mixed with the dough, the pudding may be steamed in a tightly closed can for about the same length of time. Most people prefer to sweeten the dough for a fruit pudding or shortcake, but otherwise the ordinary biscuit dough is used. When a sweet or "hard" sauce is served with the dessert, sugar in the dough is not necessary. Whipped cream may be served as a sauce with any of these puddings.

**Prunes in Bread Pudding.** Prunes lend themselves to almost any form of bread pudding. For this purpose it is well to soak them until the stones can be taken out easily and then chop them. Layers of bread crumbs, alternated with prunes, with dots of butter and a sprinkling of sugar, are put in a shallow dish. A little nutmeg may be sprinkled over the top, if liked. An unusual bread pudding is made by taking the crusts off a loaf of stale bread, and stuffing it as full as possible of pieces of chopped prunes. **LOG CABIN DESSERT.**

1 pint rich cream.  
2 cup sugar.  
1 teaspoon salt.  
1 tablespoon gelatine.  
1 cup cold water.  
White of 4 eggs.  
1 teaspoon vanilla.  
1 lb. soft marshmallows.  
1 cup candied or maraschino cherries.

Heat the cream and add sugar, salt and gelatine which has been soaked in the cold water. Stir until sugar and gelatine are dissolved, then place over ice or in cold water, stirring until it begins to stiffen.

Beat whites of eggs until stiff. Add vanilla; marshmallows, cut into small pieces, and cherries, cut into quarters. Add this mixture to the gelatine and cream and thoroughly mix. Turn into an oblong mold, such as a small bread pan. Chill for several hours. Unmold onto the dish or platter to be sent to the table and over it place the lady fingers to look like a log cabin.

Marshmallows, held together with toothpicks, may be used to hold the roof so it may be pointed in center, on top of which place one marshmallow.

At the four corners of the platter place a mound of stiffly beaten cream and from each mound have a tiny flag flying.

### Comet Rice

Press slightly sweetened Comet-Rice into an oiled mold and when firm turn out and serve with apples or pears cut into slices and stewed in a sugar syrup.

Use in croquettes in place of potato. Use to extend scrambled eggs. Mix with chicken, tuna fish, or salmon in making salad. Mix with creamed-diced beef, tuna fish, chicken or veal to make it go farther.

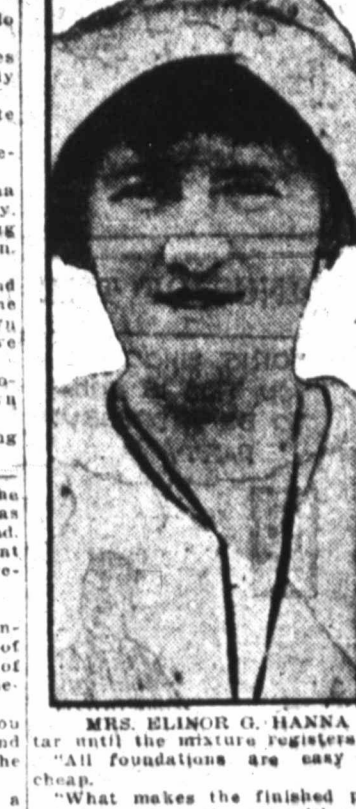
