# PROTESTS SENT ON

A number of messages protest-ing against authorization of carbon black plants by the legislature, were sent Wednesday to Austin by local oil men.

were sent Wednesday to Austin by local oil men.

J. W. Hassell, former chief supervisor of the oil and gas division of the railroad commission, is urging legislation to permit the use of natural gas in the manufacture of carbon black; heretofore using natural gas for that purpose has been barred in Texas, and the effort of the former official to change the law is encountering much opposition.

We have reason to hope for a much being followed in Pennsylvania and Kansas in reclaiming dry fields.

"It is absolutely against the in-terests of the public to permit natural gas to be used for such a pur-pose," said N. H. Martin Wednesday, "carbon black, which is used in making dyes, is made by burning great quantities of natural gas. Of course, the gas thus used is taken away from the state's fuel supply. there had been carbon black lants at Petrolia in the early days of the gas field there, the people of Wichita Fulls would never had nat-ural gas to burn in their homes. It a selfish misuse of a great and valuable natural resource to let carbon black plants operate."

Proponents of the bill contend at the plants would use only that the plants would use only such gas as could not be used for fuel; opponents point and fuel; opponents point out that while this might be proper in the case of an isolated gas well, a car-bon black plant at anoth bon black plant at such a well would consume the gas of any later that might be brought it.


