HOW REPUTATIONS OF COMMUNITIES BLACKENED.

The head of a land sales company which has sands of acres of land in the Rio Grande Valley has been found guilty by a federal grand jury at Kansas City of charges of using the mails to defraud. It was charged among other things that the company sold land representing it to be under in rigation, when in fact it was not and there was no water available to irrigate it. Many were induced to invest under false representations and little sympathy has been expressed for the men who per petrated the fraud and who are now being brought

to suffer in reputation from the frauds of this com pany and these men. As is known to many there are rich areas in the Rio Grande Valley for which water is available and which are productive and profitable almost beyond belief. Yet it will be hard make those who might be purchasers believe the truth because of the frauds practiced by a few un-

Texas as a whole and many of the oil commun ties of the state have suffered in reputation because activities of unscrupulous oil company pro There have been instances where land in counties that have never produced a barrel of oil and which are a hundred miles distant from any oil production have been represented as being located in the Burkburnett or some other productive oil suffer from the activities of this class of promoters.

It would be a good idea for commercial organizations in every city to have vigilance committees to be on the lookout for crooked promotions in their communities to the end that the reputations of these communities be kept clean.

WHY OMIT OTHER SINS!

One might think from the bill before the legis lature providing for the removal of public officials in the state who become intoxicated either while on or off duty, that it was a common practice for our public officials to engage in drunken apress. Such is far from the fact. Probably one in a thousand among our public officials indulges in intoxicants. It is also probable that a thorough investigation would find more of them committing embezzlement, adultery and other sins than would be found getting drunk.

The movement to enact a bill providing for re moval in such cases probably grows out of some special incident such as a member of the legislature having been intoxicated. Sentiment is fanned ifito a flame and as a result special legislation is enacted, having little effect other than to recall to posterity a state of hysteria that brought forth the legislation.
