AUSTIN, March 1.—The house this afternoon voted 44 to 27 to pass over the governor's veto the house bill providing the new district court for Bexar county. The bill now goes to the senate where it is expected similar action will be taken.

INDICT FORMER ACTING WIZARD OF KU KLUX KLAN

HOUSTON, March 1.—An indictment charging violation of the white slave act has been returned by the federal grand jury here against Edward Young Clarke of Atlanta, former acting imperial wizard of the Ku Klux Klan, it was revealed this afternoon. Others have been issued for the arrest of Clarke, it is understood. Clarke is said to be in Atlanta.

FIND PACKING CASES FILLED WITH MORPHINE

C., March 1.—Taking up the various measures designed to regulate masked bands, the North Carolina senate today voted down the Milliken bill to make secret organizations register the names of their members, refused a substitute to make appearance in masks a misdemeanor and then passed, 35 to 13, the Armfield bill, advocated by those who praised the Ku Klux Klan. The galleries were crowded and there was frequent applause and complimentary reference to the plan.

FURTHER INCREASE IN DAILY AVERAGE CRUDE PRODUCTION

GAIN OF 27,150 BARRELS PER DAY WEEK ENDING FEBRUARY 24.

TOTAL 1,784,700 BARRELS 1,757,550 WEEK PREVIOUS

North and Central Texas Districts Show Decrease For Period Included.

NEW YORK, March 1.—The daily average gross crude oil production of the United States increased 27,150 barrels for the week ending February 24, totaling 1,784,700 barrels, compared with 1,757,550 for the preceding week, according to the weekly summary of the American Petroleum Institute issued today.

Daily average production of the Rocky Mountains was 1,154,700 barrels, compared with 1,162,550, a decrease of 7,850. California production was 430,000, compared with 425,000, an increase of 5,000.

Oklahoma-Kansas showed a daily average production of 447,500 barrels, an increase of 950; North Texas a decrease of 1,500 barrels; Central Texas a decrease of 300; North Louisiana an increase of 1,100, and Arkansas an increase of 2,400.

In Oklahoma, production of the Osage nation was shown as 189,400, against 174,250 barrels; Oklahoma, 258,100, against 263,250; Oklahoma, 258,100, against 263,250.

There were no changes reported in crude oil prices for the major districts.

According to the institute, the imports of petroleum crude and refined oils at the principal ports of the week ended February 24 totaled 1,202,767 barrels, a daily average of 171,824, compared with 1,184,250, a daily average of 170,607, for the week ended February 17.

"One hundred and eighty-five thousand marks," the clerk informed the customer as he handed him a small package containing a safety razor.

"How will he mark this on the machine?" the American mused, noting that the figures on the register only numbered 1,000, four figures. "Is he going to ring it up 185 times?"

"The clerk opened the cash drawer, placed the money within it and on a little slip entered the amount of the sale."

"Yes, this is a beautiful piece of work," the proprietor volunteered, pointing to the cash register, "but it is as useless to me as a thousand mark note in a second class restaurant. We have to trust the clerk now, but it is easy; no one wants to steal this paper."

GOVERNMENT PAYS OVERDRAFTS MADE BY ARMY OFFICERS

LONDON, March 1.—While John Bull is being patted on the back for his honesty and straight-forwardness in settling his war time debts, some Englishmen are equally desirous of admitting reciprocal thumps on Uncle Sam's shoulders for clearing an odds and ends of American obligations in this country.

The invention's commission, sent to England recently, is holding daily sessions to hear claims which will cost the American government thousands of dollars, while the historic banking firm of Messrs. Cox is overjoyed because it has just received from Washington about \$20,000 of new overdrafts of approximately 50 American officers.

The firm advanced thousands of pounds to a host of young officers because most of the officers had been discharged from the American army and their addresses were unknown. Consequently the firm was surprised and gratified when it received the remittance from Washington.

Woman to File Charges Opponent Spent Too Much

CHICAGO, March 1.—Morton D. Hull, who defeated Mrs. Winnifred Mison Huck, Illinois congresswoman at large, for the Republican nomination in the second Illinois district, today deprecated Mrs. Huck's statements that he should prefer charges against the former state senator for alleged excessive expenditures in the campaign.

Mrs. Huck elaborated on previous statements and specifically accused Mr. Hull of spending \$100,000 to win the nomination.

"I am reluctant to believe the woman said such a thing," Mr. Hull said. "It is entirely untrue, of course. I doubt if my expenses have exceeded \$2,000."

"I shall prefer charges against Mr. Hull that he spent \$100,000 to win the nomination as soon as I return to Washington," Congressman Huck said. "The law permits him to spend only \$5,000. His action puts him in the Newberry class."

Mr. Hull said he had sent a statement of his pre-primary expenses to Washington and would file a justification of his primary expenses within 10 days, as prescribed by law.

ST. LOUIS MAN KILLED AT HOME BY BURGLARS

ST. LOUIS, March 1.—James Kieley, 45, reputed to be wealthy, was shot and instantly killed last night by several burglars whom he surprised in the act of plundering his home when he and his wife returned from a moving picture theater. The intruders also struck Mrs. Kieley over the head and escaped, abandoning their loot.

FORMER OFFICERS OF 36TH DIVISION DROP ELY PROTEST

FORT WORTH, March 1.—Former officers of the war time 36th division who decided at a conference here yesterday to drop their protest against the promotion of Brigadier General Ely, said today the matter was a closed incident and that no further action was considered.

The protest against the senate's confirmation of Ely was occasioned by newspaper reports of a speech in Kansas City containing supposedly severe criticisms of the Texas-Oklahoma national army division.

"The admission of the newspaper that its own account led to misinterpretation of General Ely's remarks leaves nothing more to be said," said General John A. Hulen of Houston, who headed the conference of officers.

"General Ely himself was denied these remarks and his denial is borne out by reputable national guard officers living in Kansas City and hearing his speech."

A wire giving this as the sense of the conference here was dispatched to Senators Sheppard and Culberson in Washington.

The attorneys are said to have done what they could to speed the hours for their prosperous clients while the latter established preparatory to filing their divorce complaints.

One even is said to have introduced one of the agents to young women who enjoyed parties entertained by beverages not compatible with the law.

Both officers, it is said, became highly popular with the feminine contingent of the colony. One received a variety of notes and smaller, but equally interesting variety of poems from one of the prospective divorcees. These he exhibited gleefully, without, however, permitting her name to become known. There is considerable apprehension in town regarding divorce suits to be filed.

Eight places have been raided on information obtained by the agents and complaints are to be filed against the 13 arrested, according to the United States district attorney.

IN VOLUNTARY PETITION IN BANKRUPTCY FILED

CHICAGO, March 1.—An involuntary petition in bankruptcy was filed today against the Leonard-Morton Mail Order Company, controlled by the Cooperative Society of America. Liabilities were declared to approximate \$1,000,000 and assets were alleged to be no greater than \$500,000.

INCREASE OF TWO CENTS HOUR FOR 65,000 WORKERS

CHICAGO, March 1.—An increase of two cents an hour for 65,000 freight handlers and station laborers on approximately 41 railroads and subsidiaries became effective today.

At the same time an eight hour day with punitive overtime went into effect for 821,000 members of the brotherhood of railway and steamship clerks, freight handlers, express and station employees.

A decision promulgating these changes was issued yesterday by the United States Railroad Labor Board. It stated that each employer should have one day off a week, preferably Sunday.

FIREMEN INJURED BY COLLAPSE OF WALL IN FIRE AT NEW ORLEANS

NEW ORLEANS, March 1.—Fire Captain Fred Smith was probably fatally injured and several other firemen slightly hurt when a brick wall collapsed during a fire last night, which practically destroyed the Hicks building at Baronne and Union streets, occupied principally by offices of cotton firms. The police early today placed the loss at between \$250,000 and \$300,000.

The upper floors of the building, a three-story structure, were occupied by Mason Smith & Company, Laurence Blum & Company, Duckworth & Company, Geisman and Hyman, and Hillier Hyams & Company, all cotton brokers.

Former Texan Will Not Squeal On His Friends

LOS ANGELES, March 1.—Bert Bruce, who, according to federal officers, said he "came from Texas, where people did not 'squeal' on their friends," has refused to confirm the officers' announced belief that he knows who stole an automobile, belonging to Robert L. Field of Long Beach, Cal., and violated the Dyer act by taking it to Texas.

They said Bruce had practically told them he knew all the details of the alleged theft.

Bruce was held to the action of the grand jury on a suspicion of felon charge.

PERMANENT COURT OF INTERNATIONAL JUSTICE AN ISSUE

WILL FIGURE LARGELY IN POLITICAL PLANS FOR 1924 CAMPAIGN.

NEXT SENATE EXPECTED TO DEVELOP A LINEUP

Upper House Will Devote Much of Time to "Making Medicine" For Campaign.

WASHINGTON, March 1.—If can be stated, not necessarily with satisfaction, but as a record of what is plainly going on, that the question of our adhering to the permanent court of international justice, is at this moment passing into the phase of a potential political issue.

be debated, will run along contemporaneously with the campaign of the various candidates for the presidential nominations in the two parties. That session of the senate will have the nature of a political forum in which the issues of the 1924 campaign will be thrashed out and framed.

Preceded By Hearings. Looking at it as a political issue, it is not only because his proposal makes him obviously an advocate, but also because his very act of making the proposal is a personal obligation. Both Harding and Hughes in the campaign which gave them their present power, made repeated and specific promises to take steps toward international cooperation. On the day they sent this proposal to the senate, all but one week of the first half of their administration had passed without action on their part of such a nature as to meet the expectations of the public on their promises. That the consciousness of this had something at least to do with the introduction of the proposal is a reasonable assumption. As a cabinet member expressed it, "the old man"—this is the affectionate term in which some of the cabinet members refer to Harding—"the old man is a person and doesn't rest easy until they are fulfilled."

As to Hughes it is serious talk that he regards rather too seriously in the eyes of some of the politicians on his place in history, and his place in history would leave something to be desired if he should go to the end of his term without an earnest effort toward fulfillment of clear promises to which he subscribed his name in October, 1920.

Urged to Make Fight. The urge on Johnson to make a fight against Harding for the nomination was already considerable. By the injection of this present issue it is made stronger. The pressure comes not only from those who sincerely oppose the permanent court, but by those who don't care a hoot about any question of foreign relations whatever, but have a very strong conviction that the attitude of extreme isolation was demonstrated in 1922 to be the best means of carrying the country for the Republican party, and believe it would be the means to create an analogous contrast to the Democrats and serve the same purpose of party success in 1924.

Let it be added that no complete and candid record of current trends, and shreds of tendency among the Republican leaders, would fail to say that among these leaders, especially among some of the little ones throughout the country, there are more than a few who say quite flatly that Johnson at the head of the Republican ticket in 1924 would get more votes and carry into office with him more Republican sheriffs

and common councilmen than another candidate. This advocacy of Johnson rests not only on his position as an isolationist but on his thoroughly demonstrated power as an all round spell-binder and voter-getter. Johnson personally is reported by his friends as realizing the pressure to be a candidate on the ground that if Harding is a candidate for renomination, a fight against him would be futile—futile, not only because of the power over the party organization possessed by a president in office, but also because even if a nomination should be won through aggressive criticism against Harding, the very act of making the fight would create party cleavages and necessarily provide arguments to the public for being against all Republicans whatever and electing a Democrat.

Speech to Figure. There remain several other interesting considerations. If things should work out as suggested, would Borah's speech be a real one? It is not enough; let us have a real court, and if by any remote contingency, the Republican situation in 1924 should become a free-for-all, and if Borah should be in it as well as Johnson, the debate between these two ablest and foremost of the old irreconcilables would be as fine a thing in the way of oratory and argument as this country has seen in many a day. Borah would probably beat Johnson. He has just as large personal following and in an all-round sense is an abler debater.

So much for the Republican aspect of the situation. There remains the question of how the Republican administration will affect Democratic policy, and how they will line up on foreign affairs generally in 1924.

Opposition Overstated. Most of this is frankly within the field of speculation. There can be made impossible by a failure of opposition to this permanent court issue to develop sufficient vitality in the popular politics. Just how much vitality it has or can be made to have, just what is the popular reaction to it, is the question on which practically every politi-

cal spy glass in Washington is now focused. On the inherent merits of the proposal, your correspondent feels he is in a position to express strongly the judgment that there is not as much real opposition to it here in Washington as is now made to appear. If the League of Nations had not been a political issue four years ago, and if the permanent court had not been because of that taken on a political basis, it is hard to see how it would be introduced as a separate thing standing on its merits without the background of League of Nations rancor. It would be adopted as a matter of course without flaring headlines, without excitement, and without much debate, except from a few who are by temperament honest and sincere isolationists.

SENATOR CHARGES ESTIMATES PARED DOWN FOR EFFECT

WASHINGTON, March 1.—Charges that governmental estimates had been pared down for political effect and then supplemented by requests for substantial deficiency appropriations were made today by Senator Overman, Democrat, North Carolina, when the senate took up the third deficiency bill carrying \$124,000,000. Senator Curtis, Republican, Kansas, replied that even with the three supplemental bills the total appropriated by congress was still "more than \$200,000,000 under the budget estimates."

"I give notice," Mr. Curtis added, however, "that this is the last deficiency bill I shall support, and I shall ever vote. Hereafter, if I am continued in my committee assignments, I shall insist that no government estimate be ever again made exact estimates of their needs and be held strictly to the original appropriations."

Although "Exes" in their meetings at various points in Texas and elsewhere Friday will probably informally discuss the question of the presidency of the university, made vacant recently by the resignation of Dr. R. T. Vinson, it is not likely that anything in the nature of formal action will be taken at the meeting here.

Among local "Exes" there is considerable sentiment in favor of Dr. H. Y. Benedict, dean of the College of Arts at the university, being elevated to the presidency. He becomes acting president automatically, if a successor to Dr. Vinson is not named before the latter leaves for Cleveland.
