CONGRESS ADJOURNS LAWMAKERS LEAVING 99 BILLS ARE SIGNED

WASHINGTON, March 5.—The principal legislative achievements of the 67th congress in its four sessions were: Fordney-Cummins protective tariff bill. The bridge and highway bill. Peace treaty with Germany. Ratification of the four power Pacific treaty. The naval aviation treaty and other arms conference treaties. Three sets of appropriation bills totaling billions of dollars. Established commission for funding \$11,000,000,000 war debt to the United States which reached an agreement with Great Britain. Immigration restriction legislation. Several agricultural relief bills. Drain reclamation legislation. More drastic prohibition laws. Created a commission to investigate current strikes in coal industries.

GRAND JURY IS GIVEN CHARGE IN WAREHOUSE CASE

Judge DeLoach expressed the belief that the grand jury would indict Mitchell this afternoon.

TWELVE LAWS WITHOUT SIGNATURE OF GOVERNOR

AUSTIN, March 5.—Twelve legislative bills and resolutions were filed with the secretary of state today by Governor Noyes to become effective without his signature. The measures included senate bill authorizing the state to acquire certain property of the Galveston and Western railway; directing extension division of state university to prepare data regarding literacy in Texas; and authorizing certifying questions to supreme court in cases of conflict of court authority between the state and majority of the remaining measures were local.

MORSE SUBPOENAS LASKER, PAYNE AND ATTORNEY GENERAL

The election came as a climax to the art student's annual revel, the thirty-first of its kind. This ball has always been one of the Parisian events where most of the conventions are ignored. Many were scantily clad and as the evening wore on, even a total absence of clothing failed to attract attention.

A number of girls got trotted all night in their birthday suits, with some even being paraded in the streets in their desire to get back to nature, discarded their slippers and rolled down silk stockings. But the more modest retained these at the end of the night.

Then, when the darkness outside was turning gray, the hour arrived for the "last contest." The 25 candidates lined up. The 500 judges, including many Americans, sat in a cozy circle on the ball room floor. Into this judging ring the girls climbed gracefully, each applicant taking various postures and turning slowly this way and that so her charms might be viewed to the best advantage.

Cheers greeted each one. Finally all were eliminated save Georgette and the champion of the last year, who were called in to circle together. Deafening were the cries of the partisans in their efforts to swing the judges toward their favorite by calling attention to her merits. At last the artists decided that Georgette's narrow hips, beautiful breast and slender form made her figure almost perfect from the point of view of what a model should be.

The losers were awarded two bottles of champagne each, as consolation prizes. 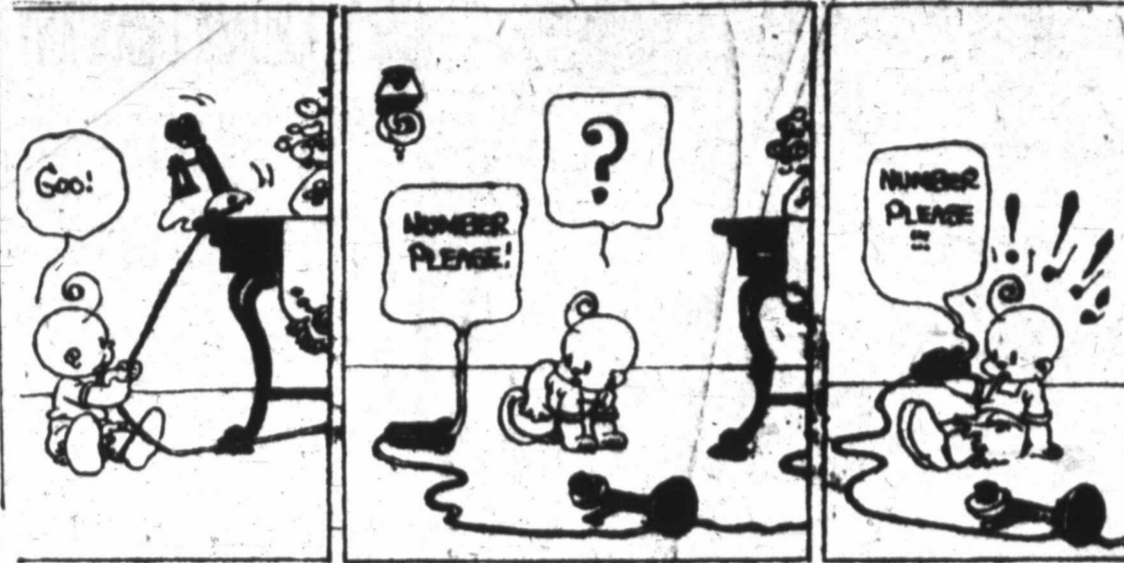

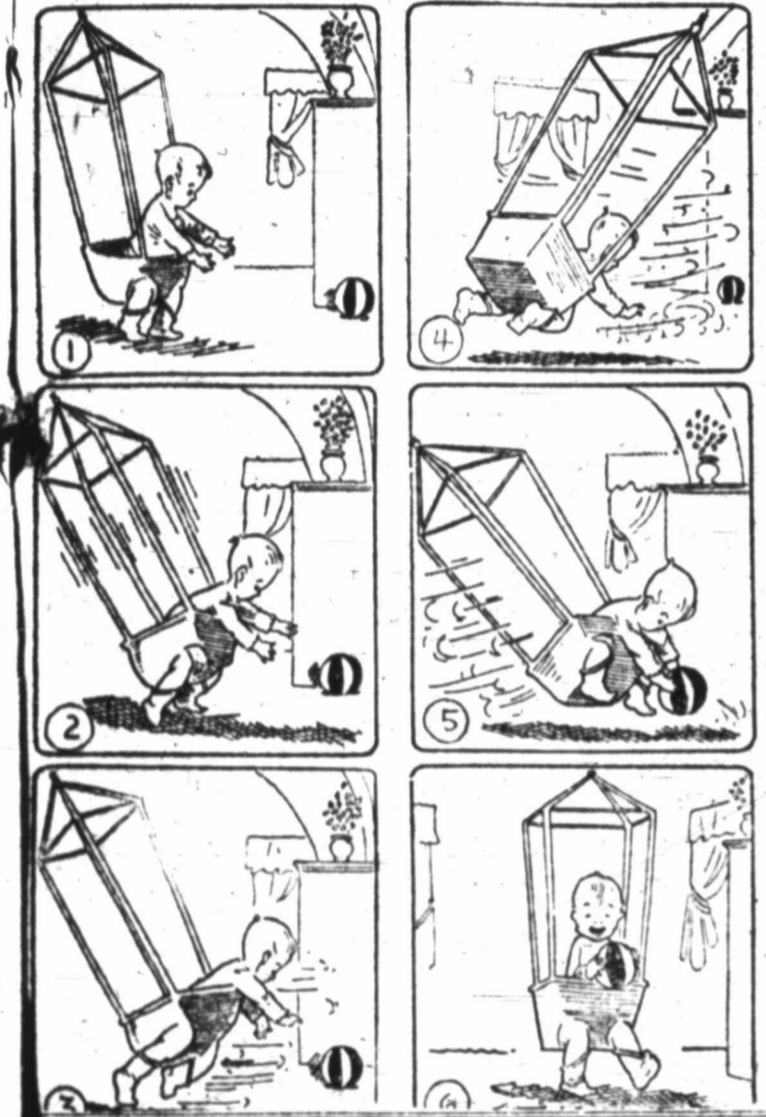

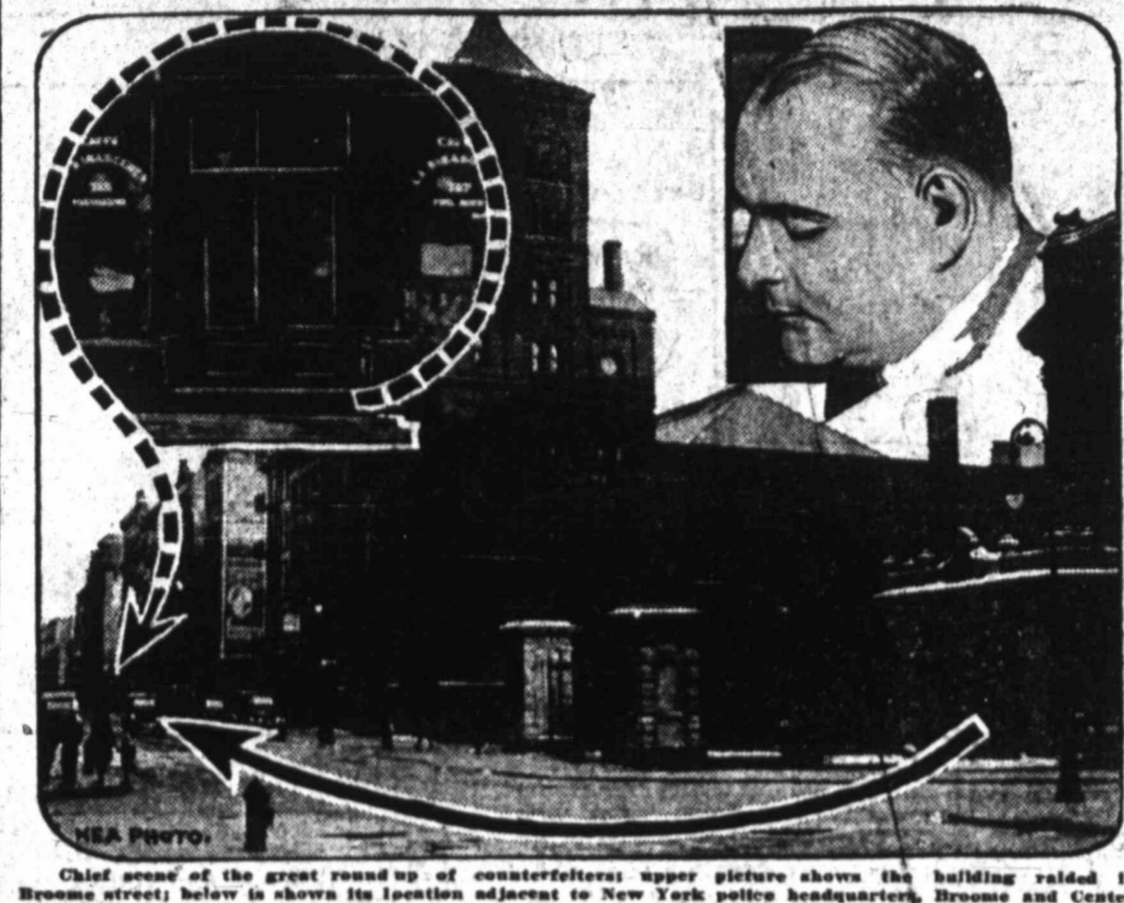
