PARIS, March 5.-While Europe waits for the Angora government to speak the word which will push the apeak the word which will push the pendulum toward peace or war in the near east, there comes from a representative Russian source a statement which shows a significant shifting in the attitude of the non-bolshevik elements towards the Russian regime and the definite abandonment of hope of crushing bolshevism from without. This statement is to the effect that when the Moscow government shall have inaugurated reforms, like recognition of the right of private prop-

have inaugurated reforms, like recog-nition of the right of private prop-erty, and a general extension of civil and political rights, all Russians throughout the world will work to-gether for the reconstruction of their country without awaiting abolition of the soviet regime.

The above facts were outlined in a statement given the Associated Press.


