REPORT CRITICIZES GIRLS' SCHOOL

MEDICAL PRACTICE ACT IS PASSED AND SENT TO GOVERNOR

DEFENSE ATTORNEYS MAIN TRIAL CLAIM RULING IS VICTORY

AUSTIN, March 7.—The senate made passage of the Cousins medical practice act and the Wood sheriff's fee bill final when it occurred in house amendments to both measures this afternoon. Minor and corrective amendments had been added to both bills. They now go to the governor for signature.

AUSTIN, March 7.—The house this morning finally passed and sent to Governor Neff the Cousins-McBrook senate bill amending the medical practice act. The vote was 50 to 19 and came after the house rejected, 49 to 57, an amendment by Representative Lewis striking out the clause of the bill which granted exemption to chiropractors and Christian Science practitioners provided they do not charge for their services.

The house finally passed under unanimous consent agreement the Quaid general emergency appropriation bill. The bill makes a supplemental appropriation of \$213,234 for various institutions and departments for the fiscal year ending August 31, 1935.

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SENATE AND HOUSE WORK THREE SHIFTS TO CLEAR CALENDAR

**EXPECT TO ACT ON MANY
BILLS PRIOR TO
MARCH 14**

**TAX MEASURES HAVE
SENATE RIGHT OF WAY**

Prospects Good for Final Action on All Six Measures Pending

AUSTIN, March 1.—With both houses working in three shifts a day—morning, afternoon and night—members of the 53rd legislature are making a real effort to get rid of some of the most important matters on the calendar. With both houses sitting Wednesday at noon, March 1, as the date for their adjournment, there is enough time remaining for the transaction of much business, and there is need for just that if the session is to accomplish the amount of work most of its members are hoping for. The fact that the senate caucus decided to give revenue measures preferential treatment in the way of consideration also indicates that there will be final action, one way or the other, on the six revenue measures the house has sent and on the seventh—the inheritance tax bill—it is expected it will yet send.

Manager Bill Approved

The house worked hard into a frenzy Monday afternoon over the bill to increase the number of Texas managers from four companies to six, and the bill was engrossed only after there had as queer a parliamentary situation developed as this session has seen. The Pope amendment was rejected. The same amendment moved to reconsider and table, and the motion was lost. Then the amendment that had been rejected a minute before, without a word of debate, was reconsidered and then—on record votes—was adopted. The same occurred with regard to another Pope amendment to reduce the companies proposed from six to four—it was rejected, motion to reconsider and table voted down, reconsidered and then adopted. The votes were usually very close, one being a tie and another \$1 to \$2, but the bill was engrossed by a sufficient majority to secure later suspension of the constitutional rule and final passage.

Many Proposed, Few Accepted

Many are proposed, but few are accepted holds true with regard to constitutional amendments. Not one out of the nearly 50 that have been introduced in either senate or house has as yet got by in both houses, and perhaps a majority of them have been killed either by committee or failure to engross.

Prohibition Enforcement

The house passed the very drastic bill regarding prohibition enforcement, but it also indicated its favor for the Fairchild senate bill, which proposes to reduce the penalties in first dry law cases by ordering the bill printed in the face of an adverse majority report. The Fairchild bill is expected by its author to help in dry law enforcement through making the penalties lighter on first offenders, albeit there are a fine and mandatory jail sentence provided for all convictions under it. The law as it present stands makes first offenders guilty of felony with a penitentiary sentence, and Senator Fairchild claims his bill will get many convictions from juries that would not send a man to the penitentiary for violation of some of the minor phases of the law.

Road Legislation

The bill to extend the term of highway commissioners to six years and to increase their salaries from \$1,900 to \$2,500 a year is now up to the senate, whose approval is expected. This session has considered several important road legislation than any previous legislature, and if the senate puts through the bills along this line that the house has passed, the demands of the federal government for meeting federal appropriations will have been satisfied. The gasoline tax bill and the vehicle license tax bill will furnish a good many millions of dollars from the state's highway needs, and the committee will benefit materially from the fact that the state takes over maintenance of the designated highways and leaves 27 1/2 cents horsepower

tax to the different counties which may use them on lateral roads instead of on highways, as is now the law.

Considerable interest attaches to the legislature to the campaign against "politics" in the naming of a new president of the university, which apparently featured the meeting of many Texas-Ezes in various parts of the state. The fact that the matter was brought before so many of such meetings has led to the suspicion that the movement is not spontaneous, but has emanated from some central source, and that the reason behind it is the proposed appointment of Governor Kell to the university presidency. Whether the movement is in the interest of some other candidate for the place has not come to light. It is believed in some quarters here that the governor has been offered the post and that he would consider it if he were given the complete honorarium as a governor. It can be stated with as much certainty as can be had about any of the governor's intentions—going to do until after he has done it—that he would not accept the place if it necessitated his resignation from the governor's office, but there is some reason to believe that he would take it if he were allowed to serve the remainder of his term in the governor's mansion.

Most Consider Legislature

Another development with regard to the university is adoption of the Pope resolution by both branches of the legislature demanding that the legislature be considered in the financing of any loan presented to the amortization of the \$250,000 annual income derived from the university lands. It has been reported that the regents without consultation with the legislature has arranged for a \$2,500,000 loan at five and one-half per cent, albeit the enacted pre-empted "specific legislation" for the handling of the fund, and the criticism is made that such loan, if it has been arranged, was made without competitive bids and without consultation with the legislature. A committee of two senators and three representatives was named under the resolution to confer with the regents in regard to what has been done or is to be done.

County Treasurer

Texas voters may have a chance to vote on the abolishment of the office of county treasurer. That of Tice has been pretty much of a superfluous since the county depositary system came into vogue. In many counties the constitution has been evaded by making the salary

of that official so low that nobody would care to run for it, giving the commissioners courts the opportunity of appointing some official of the county depositary bank to attend to the important clerical duties the treasurer is called upon to perform. Salaries in such counties are as low as \$10 a year. But in other counties which have not seen fit thus to get around the constitutional requirement the salaries have ranged from \$1,500 up to \$2,500 a year. The senate has adopted the Burkett senate joint resolution proposing such an amendment and it likely will be adopted when it is brought over to the house.

Consolidation Bill

The Frisco-L. & G. M. consolidation bill is due to come up this week, having been introduced in both houses. It would make of the Texas Frisco a major system, including the International and Great Northern, the Quamish, Acme and Pacific, the Port Worth and Rio Grande and several minor lines. The prompt passage in both houses of the bill which consolidated the Depuquent and Great Northern, Trinity and Colmanet branch of the Katy is taken as a favorable augury for the second consolidation bill of this session.

The senate has passed the \$900,000 emergency appropriation for the penitentiary system to carry its work up until September 1. The governor recommended \$900,000. The bill prohibits the use of any part of it for the payment of any notes owed by the system. The senate also passed finally the bill which increases the salaries of county auditors and sheriffs which permits sheriffs to ride on passes, but not to charge mileage when they do so.

Kill School Bill

The senate killed the bill reducing the scholastic age limit to six years instead of seven and taking all limitations off the upper limit between the ages six and seven and six years may enter kindergartens supported by public school funds, but are not eligible to receive anything after completing the kindergarten work for another year, although they usually are received as pay pupils.

Members About Re-elected

Members who wanted to close at the end of the \$5 per diem period are about reconciled to remain five days at the \$5 per diem salary

They are willing to make that sacrifice in order to clean up as far as possible on the calendar, which still include many important measures of the senate session in driving revenue measures preference during the day sessions is expected to insure some final action on the several such measures which the house has passed and which are now pending in the senate.

At least two committees will continue their work after the session adjourns. These are the tax book investigation and the committee to visit the reform schools and institutions. Both are expected to require several days and in the case of the latter much traveling to complete their reports.

**SCHOOL BOND ELECTION
MAY BE POSTPONED**

ELECTRA, TEXAS, March 1.—The election called for March 19 to determine whether or not bonds in the sum of \$154,000 will be issued by the Electra Independent school district must be set at another date 30 days hence. Information to this effect was secured from the attorney general, by President E. M. Friend of the school board and superintendent R. M. Dismore, who went to Austin to look into the matter.

An extension of 30 days has been asked in the option to purchase taken by Little Rock, Ark., parties for which they had made a deposit to guarantee purchase to buy the bonds at par and accrued interest, delivery to be made by April 15. The bonds bear interest at 5 per cent and mature from one to forty years.

**CONDUCTING CAMPAIGN FOR
SALES OF AUTOMATIC WASHERS**

G. B. Richardson of Dallas, manager of appliances sales for the Texas Power and Light Company, is in the city in connection with the Automatic Electric Washer campaign which the local company is putting on.

R. E. Broyles, appliance manager for the Wichita Falls Electric Company said Wednesday that the company expects to make this campaign, during the month of March, an annual affair, as in the case in other localities in connection with electric appliances.

Mr. Broyles stated that six extra salesmen with John Deck, as sales manager, have been put in this district, which includes the towns that use power furnished by the local company, which are Electra, Henrietta, Iowa Park and Burk Burnett. The campaign was opened with a dinner for the sales force at the Kamp Hotel, where plans were outlined and a goal of 100 sales for March was set.

Mr. Broyles said that half a car load of washers have been received and another car load has been shipped. He stated that the automatic washer is a new type of machine, offering the advantages of simple construction, compactness and light weight. An average year's supply, 12 packages, of Crystal White soap chips is given with each machine purchased during the campaign. Mr. Broyles said.

Civic League Sanitary Committee Doesn't Think Annual Bath Is Good Preachment for Civic Cleanliness

"Where people are financially able to hire cans and garbage hauled, they should keep clean up, and a general spring cleanup should not be the goal of the sanitary department."

The sanitary report was heard with the greatest interest and evident approval none of the details of the chairman's plan of work having been previously outlined. And it was evident that the chairman and her committee, Meadmore C. A. Steadman, R. W. Gundry, W. E. Lowrey, R. Hillbary, J. E. Shipley, B. O. Stanford, W. H. Costley, Burk Taylor, W. P. Parker and M. H. Glover, had weighed the old "annual bath" or spring cleanup campaign and found it wanting.

In two or three districts we are hoping to lend cooperation by securing city teams, through the city health department, for special cleanups, but a general city-wide spring cleanup, on a day, or two or three days does not seem to us to answer the requirements of civic cleanliness. Our committee will work to the extent possible to clean up all the time, and will concentrate on educational work concerning closed garbage piles, keeping back yards or chicken coops clean, and fly-breeding places and clean premises generally.

Our special preachment to all Civic League members is, if you do not already use a covered garbage can, get one. Pick up all your old cans and trash and have them hauled away; plant seeds and vines in your back yards and alleys. If you keep coops or chickens, keep such premises cleaned up and help destroy all mosquito and fly-breeding places. We are working through our members' influence and example. Beautify your own premises and see how quickly the contagion will spread.

Plans for the annual membership luncheon for April were reported from the entertainment committee, of which Mrs. Fred C. Barron is chairman. Mrs. C. E. Hately, first vice president, presided over the March meeting in the absence of the president, Mrs. B. E. Roberts, who is ill.

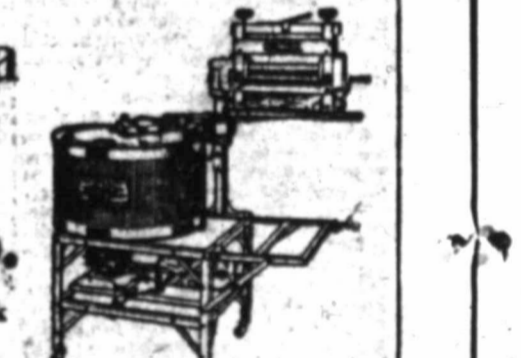

SEEK PUNISHMENT SELLER OF LIQUOR THAT CAUSES DEATH

FIVE STATE LEGISLATURES HAVE MEASURES TO COVER CASES MORE STRINGENT LAW PASSED IN OKLAHOMA

Possession of Apparatus to Manufacture Liquor is Made a Felony

By Associated Press. CHICAGO, March 7.—Five mid-western state legislatures have passed or are considering bills to punish sales of intoxicants that cause death. The penalty imposed is either a murder or a manslaughter sentence and in some cases applies equally to liquor given away.

The drive against poisonous liquor is the common denominator of all the legislative proposals to strengthen prohibition laws in more than a dozen mid-western states. In Kansas a bill is pending to make it murder to sell or give away intoxicants that cause death. In Oklahoma a similar measure, with the murder penalty for either selling or giving away, already is a law. In Iowa the senate has passed a bill making the sale of such liquor manslaughter. In Ohio a bill has been passed and signed making the furnishing of such liquor second degree murder.

Michigan has pending a bill making sale of liquor that causes death manslaughter while in Indiana a bill making the penalty murder for selling or giving away fatal liquor was indefinitely postponed. Other legislation embraces a variety of proposed enforcement laws, with few instances of wet activities. In Wisconsin wet have announced they propose to try to make it illegal to search for liquor except upon absolute knowledge of the purchaser equally guilty. They have considered memorializing congress to modify the Volstead act.

Minnesota has pending a joint resolution to ask congress not to modify the Volstead act. In North Dakota physicians have been limited to a total of five gallons of liquor each for medical purposes.

The Missouri legislature has on hand several proposed enforcement measures, one making it a felony to possess a weapon that might inflict bodily injury while transporting liquor unlawfully.

DALLAS WOMAN DIES FROM BURNS RECEIVED

DALLAS, March 7.—Mrs. Mary Alexander, 37, died early today from burns received at her home last night when her clothing caught fire on an open gas stove. Mrs. W. J. Wilson and Robert Martin were severely burned while tearing the dead woman's burning clothing from her body.

GOVERNMENT BARS ALIEN CONTROL OF U. S. OIL FIELDS

WASHINGTON, March 7.—Determination of the government to adhere to its policy against alien control of domestic oil fields was seen today in the decision of the interior department denying the lease sought by the Roxanna Petroleum Corporation to extensive oil lands of the Creek Indian tribe in Oklahoma. The decision, announced yesterday and approved by Secretary Fall as his last official act before leaving from office, upheld departmental regulations pursuant to the act of 1920 by which the secretary said alien leases of Indian lands were specially restricted to those countries which did not deny similar privileges to citizens or corporations of this country. The Roxanna Company, the decision said, is owned by the Shell Union Company, 65 per cent of the common stock of which was said to be owned by Dutch and British interests and to form the controlling stock of the corporation.

FORMER SULTAN HAS HAD ENOUGH WORLD TURMOIL

JEDDAH, KINGDOM OF THE Hedjaz, March 7.—Former Sultan Mohammed VI has seen enough of the world's turmoil and desires to spend the rest of his days in quiet reflection in Mecca, where he is no longer a guest of King Hussein, sovereign of the Hedjaz.

The deposed head of the Turkish state recently told Charles R. Crane that he would never resume his position as head of the Mohammedan world unless there was a united call for him from the faithful. His most cherished hope, he said, was to find a final resting place in the sacred city of his fathers, where he has found refuge. The conversation was carried over the telephone between Jeddah and Mecca, for no Christian is permitted to enter the forbidden city. The refugee told Mr. Crane that his health was good. DECISION OF BOARD ASSURES VACATIONS STATION EMPLOYES

CHICAGO, March 7.—Vacations for members of the brotherhood of railway and steamship clerks, freight handlers, express and station employees of the New York, New Haven and Hartford railroad this year are assured under certain conditions by a ruling of the United States Railroad Labor Board. Clerks who have been in continuous service for one year or more January 1 last, will be granted a vacation with pay provided the carrier does not have to hire persons to carry on their work. Clerks in service one year and less than two years will receive one week; those in service two years and less than three, 10 days; those in service three years and over, two weeks.

PRIMARY TO NOMINATE CANDIDATES IN DETROIT

DETROIT, March 7.—Nomination of two candidates for mayor, one of whom will be elected in April to fill the unexpired term of James Couzens, now United States senator, held chief interest for Detroit voters today in the spring primary. There were six candidates for the mayoralty nomination. The voters also had before them a proposal to raise the salary of the mayor from \$5,000 to \$15,000 a year. 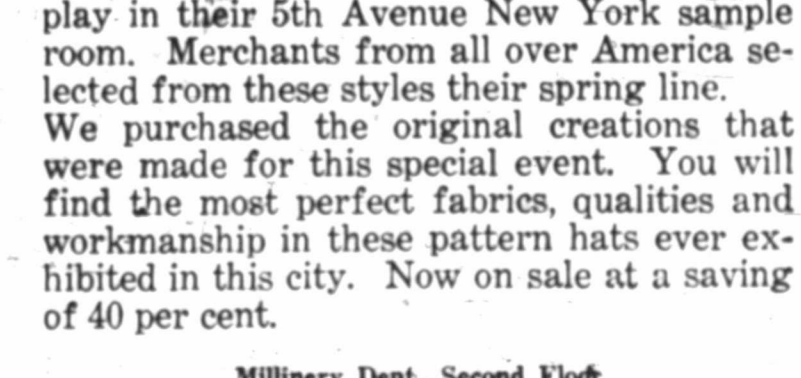

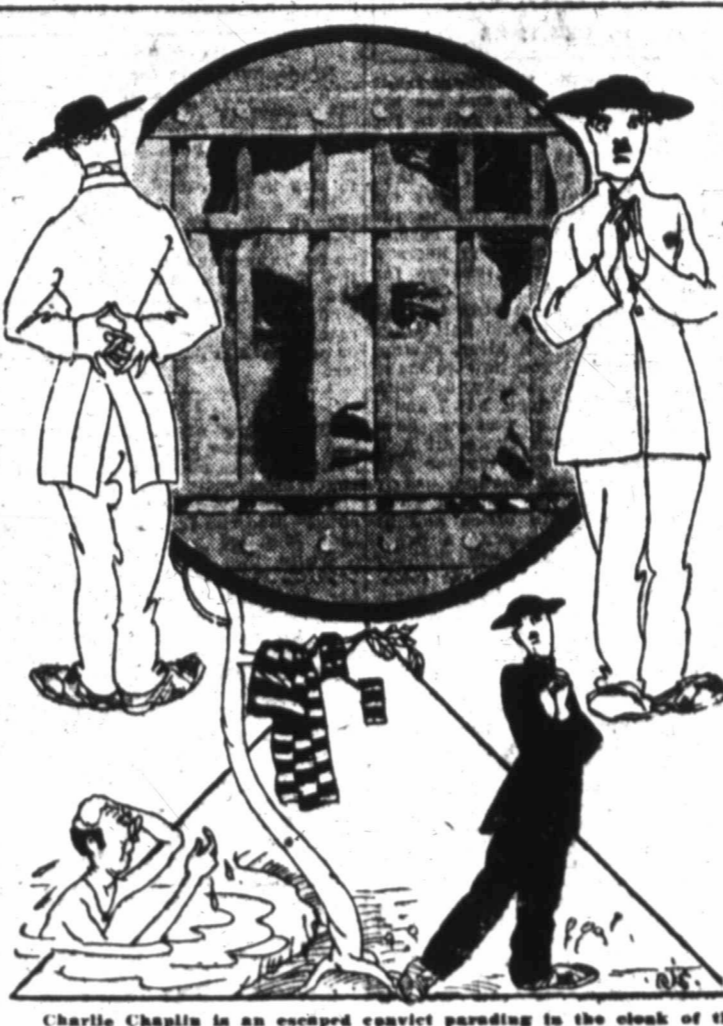

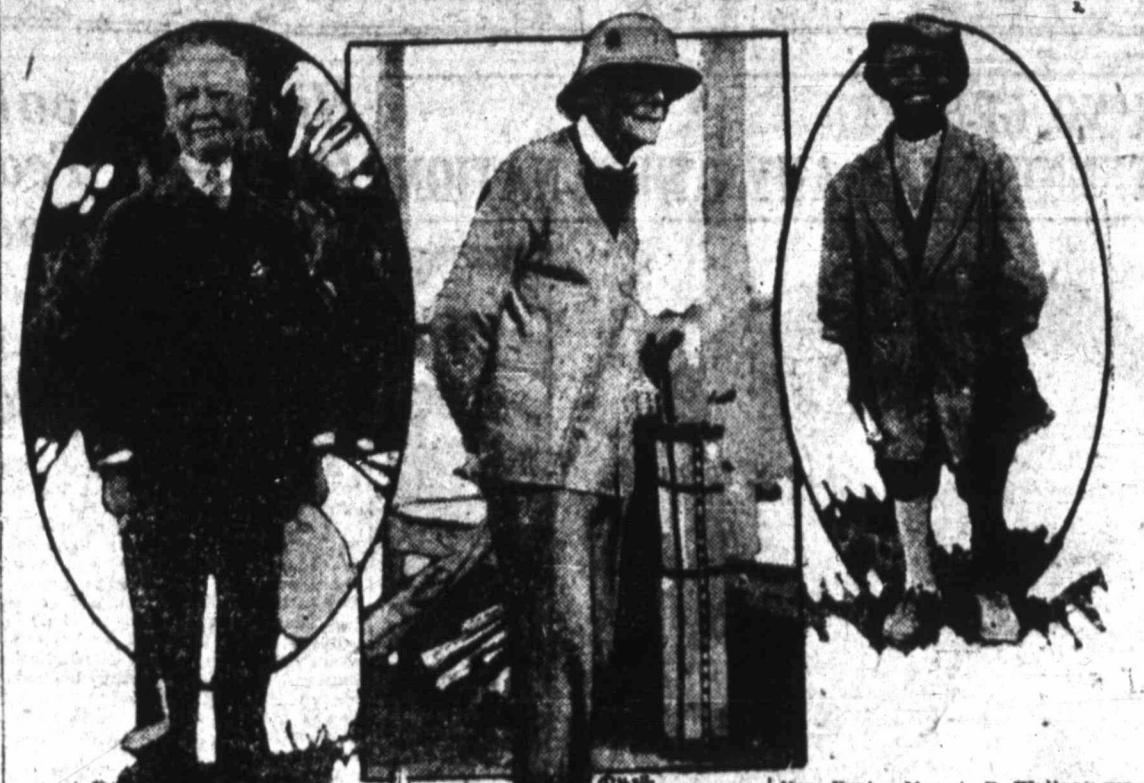

ORMOND BEACH, March 5.—For a week I have been living across the street from the world's richest man; walking with him, sitting with him, talking with him, though not officially interviewing him; watching him as he played golf; going to church and musicales, in his wake; getting a picture, intimately, of his playtime life.

He likes to wander alone in the early morning. He gives away new dimes to rich and poor alike. He takes a daily pampering from a masseur. He wears brown glasses to protect his eyes from sun.

He refuses to talk with anyone about public questions. His after-dinner diversion is playing "Numerica." He plays golf daily and tips his caddy a dime a hole.

When he took over the house he sent word to his son that he wanted an organ. A letter came asking height of ceilings, and statistics like that.

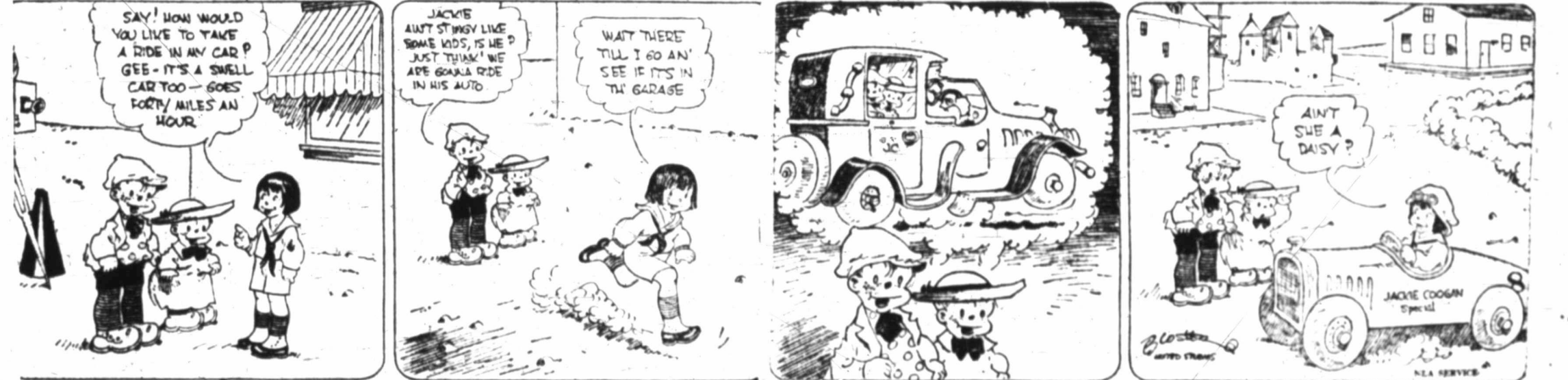

New York Cotton. NEW YORK, March 7.—The cotton market early today, with contracts for May delivery selling up to \$1.06, while all old crop months made new high records for the season on continued trade buying and covering. The opening was irregular on old crop months, but 13 points lower on the new crop deliveries. The south was a seller of new crop months here which accounted for their relatively easy showing and the initial advance in the old crop positions brought out considerable realizing. This caused reactions of several points right after the call, but there was a continued good demand and the market showed a steady rise during the early trading. Realizing became more active during the middle of the morning while the prospects for better weather in the belt appeared to be bringing in a considerable southern selling of the new crop months. This weakened the market and a steady decline set in to about \$0.75 for May contracts around midday or eight points net lower while old crop months advanced 28.66 or 34 points below yesterday's closing. The mid-day reaction was checked by renewal of covering by May and July shorts and prices worked off to \$1.15 during the early afternoon or into new high ground, and 18 points net higher than the close of the old crop pulled the new crop positions up to or a shade above yesterday's closing. The market was quiet on October selling at 27.02 and prices were within 10 or 12 points of the level around \$1.00. Cotton closed irregular.

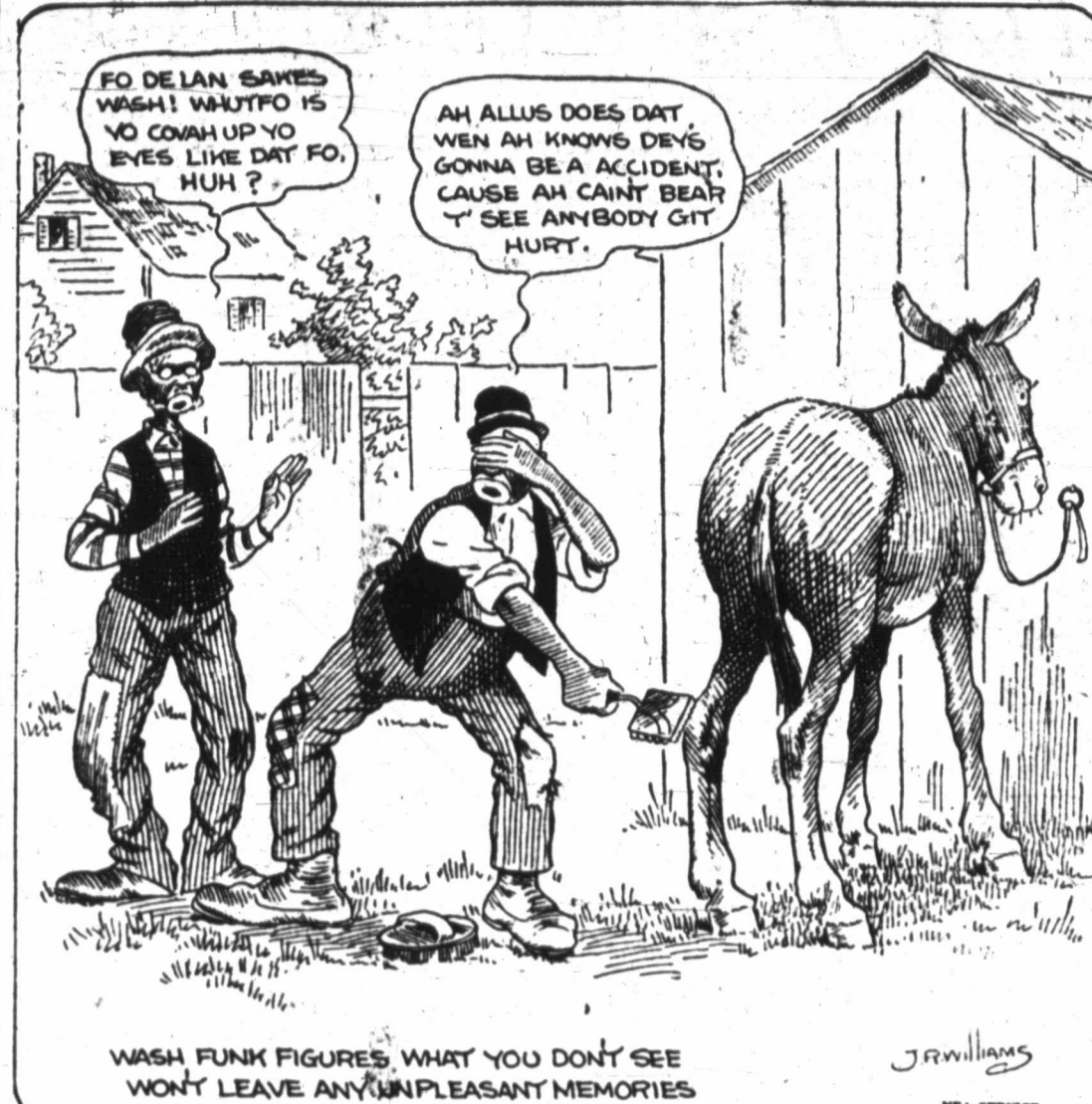

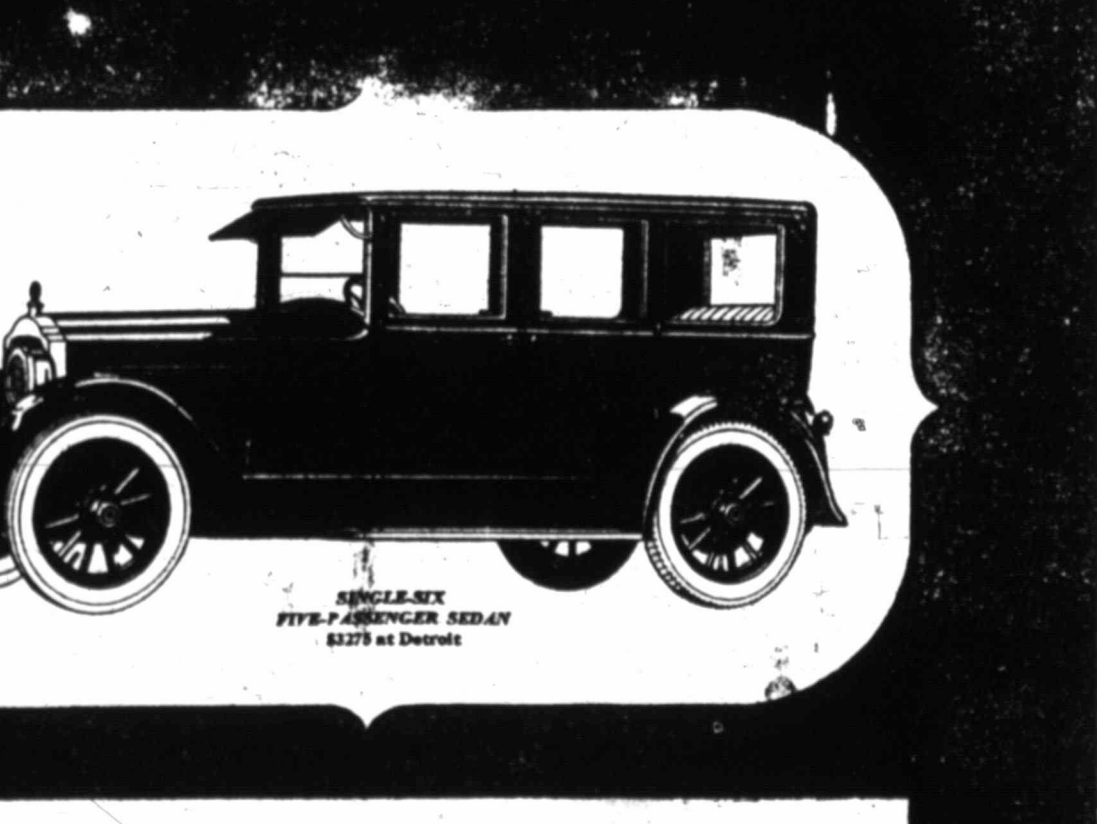
