

FAST FREEZE SUNDAY NIGHT

ANOTHER COLD WAVE REPORTED TO BE HEADED FOR NORTH TEXAS WITH FREEZE WITHIN 36 HOURS

DALLAS, March 17.—The high bar over the Gulf coast was caused by light frost to the Gulf coast from Brownsville eastward to Galveston with killing frost in the interior. Some of the Gulf states last night, according to the Dallas weather bureau. Low temperature over Texas was at Taylor, 23 degrees above zero. At Amarillo the mercury fell to Dallas 25, Abilene and Houston 25, Brownsville 42, and Galveston 45.

Another cold wave overlying the northern Rocky mountains, is moving eastward, the bureau says. It is predicted that north Texas within 36 hours with probably freezing in west Texas Sunday night.

EXCEPTIONALLY SEVERE WEATHER IS FORECAST

CHICAGO, March 17.—March is scheduled to do another hot act Sunday, according to the weather bureau, which announced another cold wave, exceptionally severe for this season of the year, will strike the northwestern part of the United States on Sunday. With an advance guard of snow beginning Sunday, the bureau says the storm is expected to sweep into the valley from Canada Sunday morning and is expected to keep temperatures down for at least another 48 hours.

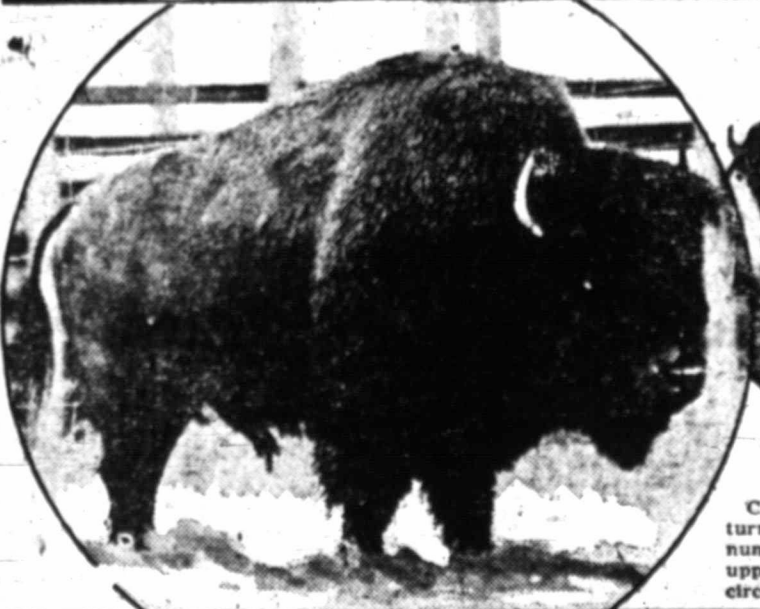

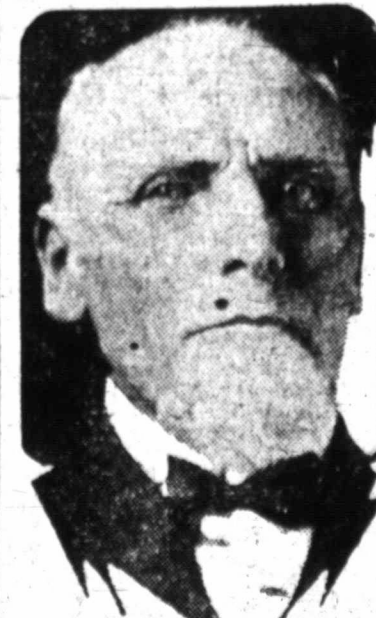

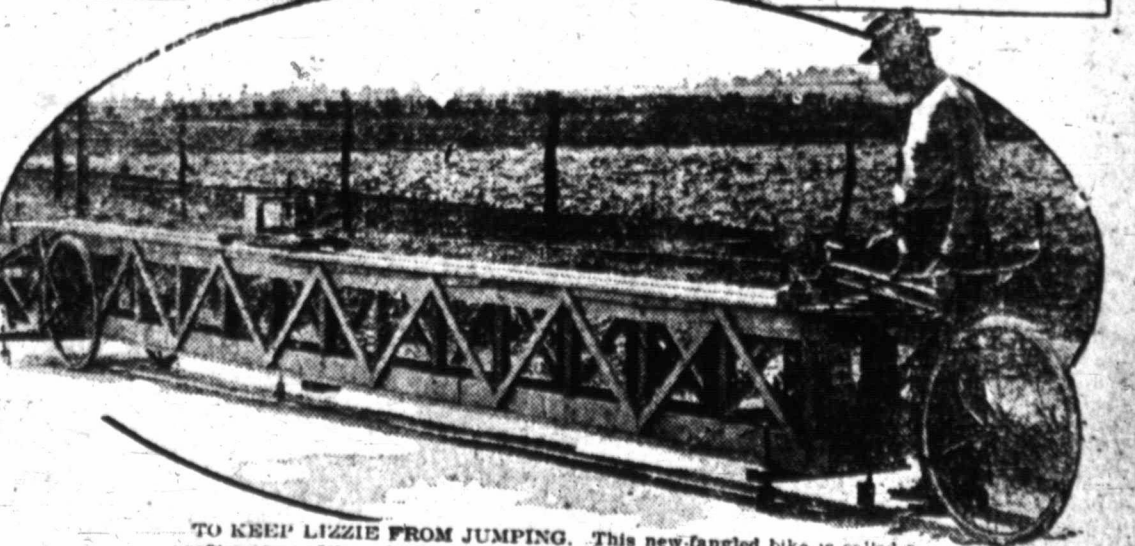

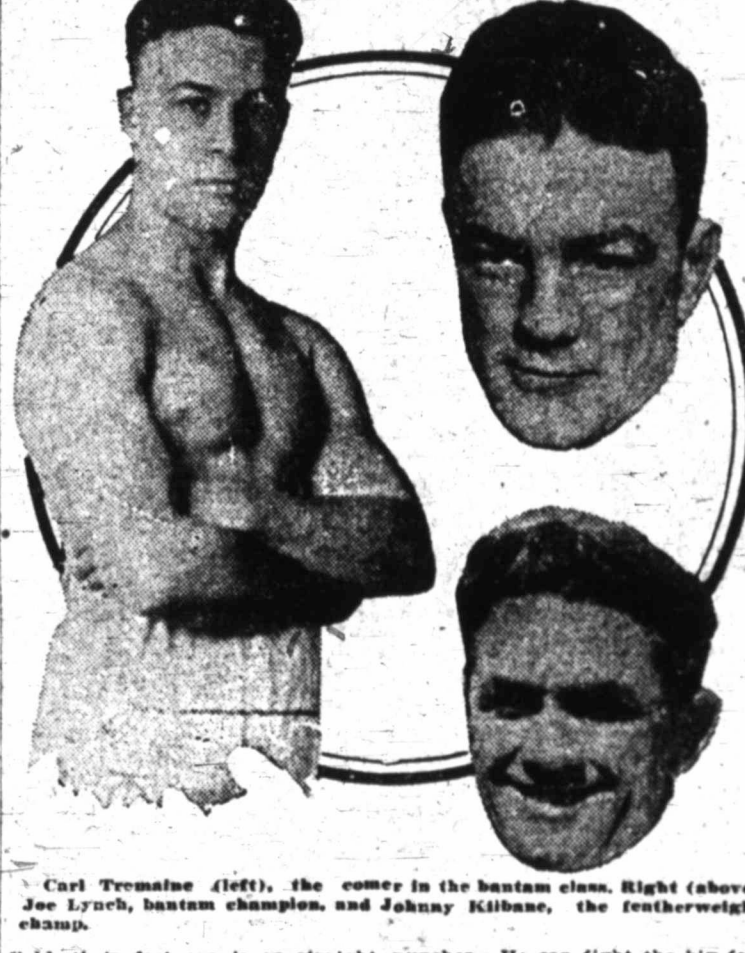
Tremain has the old English to his punch. When he hits you, you mean by English on his punches. I will use a baseball illustration to make my point clear.

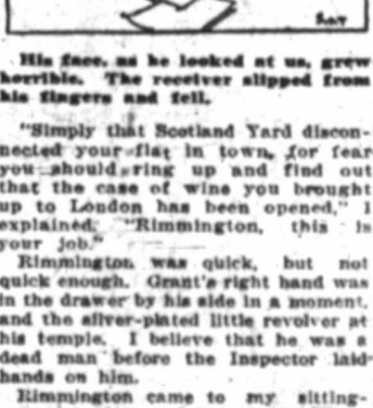
