### COLDEST WEATHER MONTH OF MARCH IN HISTORY OF TEXAS

DALLAS, March 19.—Coldest weather of the winter was reported over Texas yesterday and last night. This morning the mercury in the vicinity of Dallas was standing around 17 degrees above zero, the lowest temperature for March on record here.

Approach was felt for the safety of livestock in the plains country, according to unofficial reports. Whether fruit had been damaged has not been determined early today.

CHICAGO, March 19.—With only one day intervening before the arrival of spring, the entire Mississippi valley from the Rocky mountains eastward and from Florida northward to upper Florida today was gripped by a bitter cold wave and part of the area was covered by snow, dried into drifts by the high winds that were general throughout the region.

Sub-zero and near-zero temperatures prevailed far south at southwest Missouri where southern states reported low temperature records for this time of the year. In the upper Mississippi valley and the Rocky mountain region train service was paralyzed. Many trains were stalled in snow drifts and the situation was demoralized and four deaths resulted in Colorado from the intense cold.

Winter blizzards direct challenge to spring as it prepared to abdicate the seasonal throne. Weather forecasts indicated the first day of spring would find the greater part of the region east of the Rocky mountains suffering from intense cold, handicapped transportation and communications.

# TRANSPORTATION TO FEATURE DISCUSSION NEW YORK MEETING

## WILL BE CONSIDERED BY THE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE OF UNITED STATES

### TEST OF STRENGTH FOR WATERWAY IMPROVEMENT

Effort Will Be Made to Commit Organization to Liberal Policy.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 18.—Transportation will be the keynote topic for consideration at the eleventh annual meeting of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, in New York, May 7 to 10, and it is anticipated that something like a test of strength will develop between advocates of waterway improvement and those opposing it.

Delegates from the Mississippi valley section, according to information reaching here, intend to demand a show down.

Fear that the Chamber of Commerce of the United States is not altogether "solid" on the policy of waterway improvement is said to be prompted by a communication sent out broadcast by Elliot H. Goodwin, resident vice president of the national chamber, during the closing days of the ship subsidy fight.

It is reported that Goodwin has been accepted by mid-western members as a challenge, and they intend to do their best at the New York meeting to compel the national chamber to acquiesce in a liberal policy of waterway and harbor improvement.

**COLDEST WEATHER OF WINTER AT DENISON**  
DENISON, March 19.—The coldest weather of the winter was recorded here yesterday and today. The thermometer registered 15 degrees this morning.

**MINIMUM READING OF FOURTEEN AT ABILENE**  
ABILENE, March 19.—A minimum reading of 14 degrees above zero was recorded at the government weather observatory here this morning, setting a new record for this late in March. The weather was moderating rapidly under a warm sun.

**PRACTICALLY NO DAMAGE AS RESULT OF BLIZZARD**  
AMARILLO, March 19.—Fair and warm weather prevailed here this morning following a severe blizzard here Saturday night and Sunday. The temperature at 7 o'clock this morning was 14 degrees and at 9:30 was 27. Practically no damage was reported as a result of the blizzard.

**TWENTY DEGREES ABOVE REPORTED AT WACO**  
WACO, March 19.—The thermometer registered 20 degrees here this morning at 7 o'clock. At the same hour Sunday it registered 29 1/2. Growers say that the freeze is bound to have damaged fruit, as the swelling buds could not stand up under such temperature.

**LOWEST TEMPERATURE OF PRESENT COLD SPELL**  
AUSTIN, March 19.—The lowest temperature of the present cold spell was recorded here this morning at 8 o'clock when the thermometer registered 26 1/2 degrees. This is the second freeze within six weeks here, the mercury declining to 13 degrees on February 4.

**TEMPERATURE AT TYLER EIGHTEEN ABOVE ZERO**  
TYLER, TEXAS, March 19.—Fruit and truck growers in East Texas were awaiting the coming of the present cold on their crops. The temperature here was 18 degrees this morning and fears were expressed that garden crops and practically all tomato plants which had been put in fields were damaged seriously, if not killed. Some damage to plants in hotbeds and cold frames was reported. No authoritative estimates of the losses were available today.

**TEMPERATURE REGISTERS FIFTEEN AT HENRIETTA**  
HENRIETTA, March 19.—Henrietta has been in the grip of a very unusual cold spell considering the season of the year. A northerly strike here Saturday night at 11:30 with a high north wind which soon lowered the temperature to freezing point where it stood all day Sunday and through Sunday night. Monday morning the sun was shining and the temperature registered 15 above.

Great fears are entertained for the fruit, which however is not in a state to fully determine, as the majority of the trees have not come in bloom. Most of the early truck has been killed. The oat crop early

cabbage plants and Bermuda onions are thought to be injured.

**NO DAMAGE TO CROPS REPORTED FROM MISSION**

**MISSION, TEXAS, March 19.—**No damage to crops was reported from the cold that swept into the section yesterday. A high wind raged all night but the minimum temperature was 10 degrees.

**LOW GAS PRESSURE AT DALLAS ON SUNDAY**

DALLAS, March 19.—While no definite figures are available, H. C. Morris, general manager of the Dallas Gas Company, said probably more natural gas was used in Dallas yesterday than on any other day in the history of the company. Low pressure was reported in all the outlying districts of the city throughout Sunday. Mr. Morris said, and the shortage is likely to continue through today. A minimum temperature of 14 degrees here at 7 o'clock this morning was the coldest March weather here in thirty years.

**SEVERAL DAYS BEFORE DAMAGE IS KNOWN**  
HOUSTON, March 19.—H. H. Schuts, federal agricultural statistician for Texas, in charge of the bureau of crop estimates of the department of agriculture, stated this morning that it would be impossible to determine the actual crop damage over Texas for several days but that it was certain all tender vegetation where temperatures went below freezing was damaged.

Corn, fruit—especially strawberries—and potatoes are the crops which are expected by Mr. Schuts to have been the worst damaged. New born goats, calves, lambs and piglets are known to have suffered from the cold wave, he said. "All tender vegetation and very young animals were killed where temperatures went below freezing," Mr. Schuts said.

**NEBRASKA RECOVERING FROM EFFECTS OF STORM**  
OMAHA, March 19.—Nebraska was beginning to recover today from the effects of a blizzard which struck Saturday, crippling train and wire service and bringing suffering from cold to many homes.

Some railroad were still tied up but all officials generally reported service getting back to normal. In Omaha three below zero was registered early today.

**FRUIT AND GARDENS DAMAGED**  
HASKELL, TEXAS, March 19.—The mercury stood at 12 above here this morning which is the coldest spell of the winter. It is thought the fruit crop is killed and gardens were seriously damaged.

**MINIMUM TEMPERATURE OF 20 AT PALESTINE**  
PALESTINE, TEXAS, March 19.—A minimum temperature of 20 degrees here probably killed all young vegetation, according to local farmers, who fear that fruit has been considerably damaged.

**GOVERNMENT WORK IS TO BE SUSPENDED AS AID TO UNEMPLOYMENT**

WASHINGTON, March 19.—Secretary Hoover has recommended to President Harding that all governmental building and construction work should be slowed down in order to form a reserve demand for labor and materials, when the present high tide of private construction has begun to meet the country's needs.

IMAGINARY ILLS.

A neurologist tells us, a woman came to him on the verge of collapse, and it developed that what she really wanted was advice about investing her money.

Nerve specialists report a big increase in cases of pretended illness, technically known as hypochondria.

Frequently a hypochondriac's mental distress actually produces counterfeit symptoms of the imagined maladies.

The hypochondriac flits from malady to malady. One day, he imagines he has cancer of the stomach.

And so on, leading the doctor a merry chase, he meantime feeding the patient bread pills.

The hypochondriac usually is imitative—hears that some one else has a certain malady, then begins fearing he has the same.

A generation ago the "hypo" was considered a mental case, and even doctors smiled a trifle at him when they weren't cursing behind his back.

Now it is recognized that an imbalance of the body's endocrine glands is the most common cause of hypochondria.

In such condition, the "hypo" is sincere in the belief that all the maladies in the universe are clutching him.

There's still another type of hypochondriac—where the patient fakes illness and knows it.

The motive here is to attract sympathy. The well person is taken for granted without fussing.

We all have this craving for sympathy and care, though few of us are willing to "enjoy bad health" to get it.

As for the glandular-neurotic type of "hypo," it's much more agonizing to imagine you're ill than really to be ill.

A COURT HOUSE ON EVERY HILLTOP.

The Dallas News Sunday contained a timely cartoon by John Knott. The cartoon was titled "The Politicians' Dream, a Court House on Every Hilltop in Texas."

At the recent session of the legislature a considerable step was taken in the direction of realization of this dream.

They are already ninety-seven such courts. Each session of the legislature has created new district courts in recent years, and apparently as the courts have multiplied new devices have been found for delays and excuses for the creation of still more courts.

Noting the argument of crowded dockets used so effectively at the last session of the legislature for the creation of additional courts the Denison Herald says:

"And yet, it is common knowledge that at least half the trial courts in the state work less than one-half time for the reason, principally, that attorneys representing litigants are never very anxious to try the cases they file.

Habituals of courtrooms have been struck with the frequency of motions to postpone or continue cases when called for trial and in but few instances are causes submitted without such motions having first been overruled by the trial judge.

And these cases, which, many of them, have been on the docket for years and continued from term to term, are cited as evidence of an overcrowded docket necessitating the creation of an additional court.

The sessions of the higher courts are limited to nine months in the year; for three months the overworked judges rest. The arduous toll of the nine months is represented in the disposition of about one case per judge per week, if the statement of Governor Neff is true and we have no reason to doubt it. A distinguished member of the Dallas branch of the appeals court some weeks ago stated that no additional courts were needed, but strenuously urged that each judge—instead of one for an entire court as now provided, had the suggestion of one for each day.

Instead of simplifying existing machinery and making smoother the work of the judges—acting, the legislature decided it to be to the public interest to further complicate it by increasing the number of courts and providing neither with sufficient clerical help to enable them to function properly.

"The Herald has never been in sympathy with the suggestion repeatedly made that a political bar be raised against lawyers as members of the legislature. But if a constant increase in the number of courts with no effort made to relieve the judicial system of its top-heaviness is to be the sum total of their activities, we are not certain but what it would not be a wise policy to deny them the privilege of engaging in exploits in the legislative field."

PEACHES AND GARDEN TRUCK KILLED BY FROST

Farmers Report That Stand of Oats is Ruined by the Cold North Wind.

King Winter and his pack of frosty elves swooped down into the district Saturday night, riding on an unbridled north wind and gave chase to the elusive and mythical wild March hare.

Not satisfied with bringing the mercury to the 21 degree level Sunday morning, which took its toll of vegetable life, the king kept Jack Frost on the payroll and Sunday night this mischievous creature played havoc with the more tender buds and plants which however had stood the onslaught of the preceding night.

Truck farmers reported Monday morning that a large portion of the garden plants had been killed by the cold wave and farmers reported that fruit trees and the oats stand had been ruined.

Peach trees which gave promise of bearing a large crop were practically blown bare by the frost. Within an hour after the sun awoke Monday morning the orchards were shown the effects of the cold wave and the attack and suffered none, the oats crop was blown out to such an extent in the county, according to farmers, that they would permit it to stand for a while.

Vegetable plants, tomatoes, small truck and other truck crops, also damaged, but a large percentage of his crops had been killed.

The fire department was kept busy throughout the day repairing leaks in pipes occasioned by the heavy snow. A number of instances found out to their sorrow and loss that the freeze was heavy enough to affect the main pipes in homes.

The minimum reached by the thermometer locally during the night was 18 degrees, but the thermometer at the highest point attained was 37 degrees. A cold north wind swept the entire city during the day, but Monday morning a calm had settled over the entire district and the direction shifted to the west.

From points in the Panhandle and the north end of the Wichita Falls and Northwestern low thermometer readings were reported. One point reported a minimum temperature of two degrees above zero.

It was evident that the backbone of the cold wave had been broken and higher temperatures were forecast for the next 24 hours.

FRENCH SOLDIER IS KILLED AND GERMAN DIES FROM WOUND

DUESSELDORF, March 19.—The killing of a French soldier and a German civilian at Essen and announcement that the German mine owners had been allowed until April 15 to pay the 40 per cent coal tax, has been outstanding developments in the Ruhr situation over the week-end.

The soldier was shot at Essen railway station. A German who endeavored to escape was badly wounded and died later. Three others were arrested on suspicion.

French headquarters announced that the first of the penalties recently threatened if the mine owners failed to pay the coal tax had been invoked and that in some instances export licenses were being withheld. Continued failure to meet the tax obligation will result in arrest and court-martial, the Germans were warned.

Minister of Public Works Le Trocquier and Director of Mines Sarrailh are expected in the Ruhr today to note the progress of the mine and coke seizures. The German assertions that the allies now hold several mines, including properties near Bottrop and Oelenkingen, the French state they are ready to send coke to France with the assistance of German and Polish labor, which is quartered at the mines under the protection of the military.

Reports from Aix-La-Chapelle say that several thousand miners employed by a German concern have reached a working agreement with the Belgians, renouncing seven hours day with wages in Belgian currency.

The line of the Sherman Company, which runs a distance of 132 miles from McKinney, Texas, to Waskom, a point on the Louisiana-Texas state line, has been operated by the Missouri, Kansas and Texas Railway company but has been offered eliminated from that system by receivers in charge of the reorganization.

Mr. Edensborn will convey the line of the Sherman Company to the Louisiana Railway and Navigation Company of Texas, the order today said, a payment of \$1,500,000 in bonds of the Louisiana-Texas state line, has been operated by the Missouri, Kansas and Texas Railway company but has been offered eliminated from that system by receivers in charge of the reorganization.
