COMMUNIST PARTY PROGRAM OF ACTION PRESENTED TO JURY

INTRODUCED IN CONNECTION WITH TRIAL OF WILLIAM Z. FOSTER. DESCRIBES DETAILS OF PLAN TO BE FOLLOWED. Attempt to Show Program of Force and Violence in United States.

By Associated Press. ST. JOSEPH, MICH., March 21.—Extraordinary theses and resolutions adopted by the third world congress of the communist international at Moscow in 1922 were read to the jury in the trial of William Z. Foster, charged with violating the Smith act against criminal syndicalism, today.

The state which introduced the Russian book yesterday attempted to show that the communist international, a governing body of communists throughout the world, committed the party in America to a definite program of force and violence in an effort to overthrow the existing government of the United States.

The fit became so bitter that proceedings were instituted in the district court here seeking to block the movement. A mandatory writ of injunction was sought to compel the commissioners' court to call an election for the development of another road which would have taken in a portion of the cross country road.

The chambers of commerce in the county were backing the movement. The success of the bond issue, the members of these organizations introduced by the state forces of the capitalist state on the one hand, and the armed forces of the proletarian revolution on the other.

PROPOSE TO MAKE BUYER OF BOOTLEG VIOLATOR OF LAW

LAW MAY BE SO AMENDED AS AN AID TO ENFORCEMENT

PROHIBITION TO FIGURE LARGELY IN CAMPAIGN

Republicans Are Expected to Have "Dry" Plank in 1924 Platform

WASHINGTON, March 21.—A development of prohibition which came to the front in Washington last week is the likelihood that the prohibitionists will make the buyer of bootleg liquor as well as the seller, the subject of criminal prosecution. The proposal goes in the same category as the proposal that the buyer of bootleg liquor is in the same category as the purveyor of stolen goods. Those who favor the proposal include at least one member of the cabinet and several others of such standing as to make the extreme pressure of certain. There will be behind it the determined prohibitionists who hold the purse strings of bootleg liquor to be chiefly responsible for the present difficulty in enforcing the law. There will also be behind it, paradoxically, many of the most ardent "wets" who hold the theory, whether valid or valid, that the best way to get rid of prohibition is to make it odious, and who number the "wets" who are now signing that of showing up what they call the hypocrisy of those who vote "dry" and promote prohibition and at the same time indulge in liquor themselves.

List is Published An episode that brought this angle of prohibition to the front was the publication in one of the local papers of what purported to be a list of the patrons of a local alleged bootlegger who had been raided by officers. This episode created in Washington a future not shared throughout the country, for the reason that the list included the names of prominent men in official life, or otherwise prominent, for the additional reason that it started among the knowing and among the leaders a mass of humorous speculation as to how it happened that certain other names did not appear on the list. "Wets" who are now signing that of showing up what they call the hypocrisy of those who vote "dry" and promote prohibition and at the same time indulge in liquor themselves.

Seemest Growing This episode is further proof of the early observed fact that here in Washington sentiment grows constantly in favor of observing the law. Persons who own stocks of prohibition liquor, legally acquired, who could lawfully serve it at their tables, tend constantly to abandon the practice in deference to rising standards of propriety. It can be stated without qualification that Harding and the administration, and the Republican party altogether, will next year go on record and make a campaign on a 100 per cent "dry" position, a position which, coupled with the personal stand to be taken by the candidate, will emphasize the instance upon more and more drastic enforcement of the prohibition law as it stands. This will be true if Harding is the candidate, and will be true if any other man is the Republican candidate. The overwhelming probability is that Harding will be the candidate, but if it should be changed, no one of the men who has any serious likelihood of taking Harding's place will be other than in favor of thoroughgoing enforcement.

Candidacy Menaced It is true there is a condition in the Republican party which grows somewhat in strength from week to week, which to some degree, at least, although it is still slight, menaces Harding's candidacy. No accurate record of what is going on among the leaders of the Republican party can be said to state that there is a small but aggressive group of these leaders who are bent upon putting forward Hiram Johnson, partly with the actual intention of substituting Johnson for Harding, but partly also with the mere intention of using Johnson to stimulate Harding out of the fight. With the ultimate purpose of making the Republican race a free for all one. There are several Republican aspirants who are pawing the dust just behind the starting line, and who will be off at a gallop at any signal of any change in the present program of renomination of Harding without serious consideration.

Plan "Dry" Campaign Either with Harding or with any other probable one of these aspirants, the Republican party will be "dry." Events from now on will further and further emphasize the determination of the Republicans to be on the "dry" side. Soon after Harding returns, he will call in Washington a conference of governors to consider means of enforcing prohibition. The conference would have been held some weeks ago but for the fact that some 45 state legislatures are in session, which makes it difficult for governors to get away from their state capitals. Those who have surveyed the attitude of party governors on prohibition—the Governor Pinchot of Pennsylvania, for example—say that the great majority of those who use Republicanism will provide their devices in drastic enforcement whenever among the Democratic gov-

Mrs. Mary Jane Skidmore Dies Wednesday Noon At Wichita General Hospital After Short Illness



Mrs. Mary Jane Skidmore, one of the few surviving daughters of an American Revolutionary patriot, died at the Wichita General Hospital Wednesday at 11:30 o'clock following an illness of several days.

Mrs. Skidmore's death removes from the United States another member of the fast diminishing list of those whose own fathers laid the cornerstone of American freedom. It is said there are but 12 or 13 real daughters of the Revolution in the whole country. And John F. Frazer, her father, was one of another small group in a class by itself in the war of freedom, he having enlisted at the age of 16 and served throughout the whole term of the rebellion. He was in General Craig's regiment, under General George Washington.

Mrs. Skidmore was born in Cleveland, Ohio, April 22, 1832, and would have celebrated her 91st birthday next month. She has been a resident of Wichita Falls for four years, making her home with her son, John A. Skidmore. Three sons, W. J. Skidmore, C. C. Skidmore and I. E. Skidmore, survive. Mrs. Skidmore retained until the past year, recollections of revolutionary incidents which her father had recounted to his children. Mrs. Skidmore was 60 years old when Mary was born, and lived to be 92, rearing two big families of children to young manhood and womanhood.

Democracy Attitude As regards the Democratic party, there is going to be a fight to determine whether the party shall be "dry" or "wet." There will be a dramatic fight on this question both as regards the Democratic candidate and the Democratic platform. The best judgment is that the Democrats will not nominate any candidate who is avowedly "wet." It is possible that as regards the platform, there may be a compromise which will either go on record in favor of law enforcement or else remain silent. But as regards the candidate, there is little likelihood of any voted "wet" being given the nomination.

SUCH IS VIEW HELD BY NAVY OFFICIALS AT WASHINGTON

ADMIRALTY IS ACCUSED OF VIOLATION OF TREATY

May Have Been Intimation That United States Aids Planned to Violate Treaty

WASHINGTON, March 21.—The purpose of the British government in informing the United States that its warships had not been altered to conform with the range and defense equipment is interpreted in many quarters here as having probably been to invite charges in the parliament that the admiralty was violating the Washington treaty. Whether an intimation has been intended that this country also proposed a violation of the agreement was the subject of extensive speculation.

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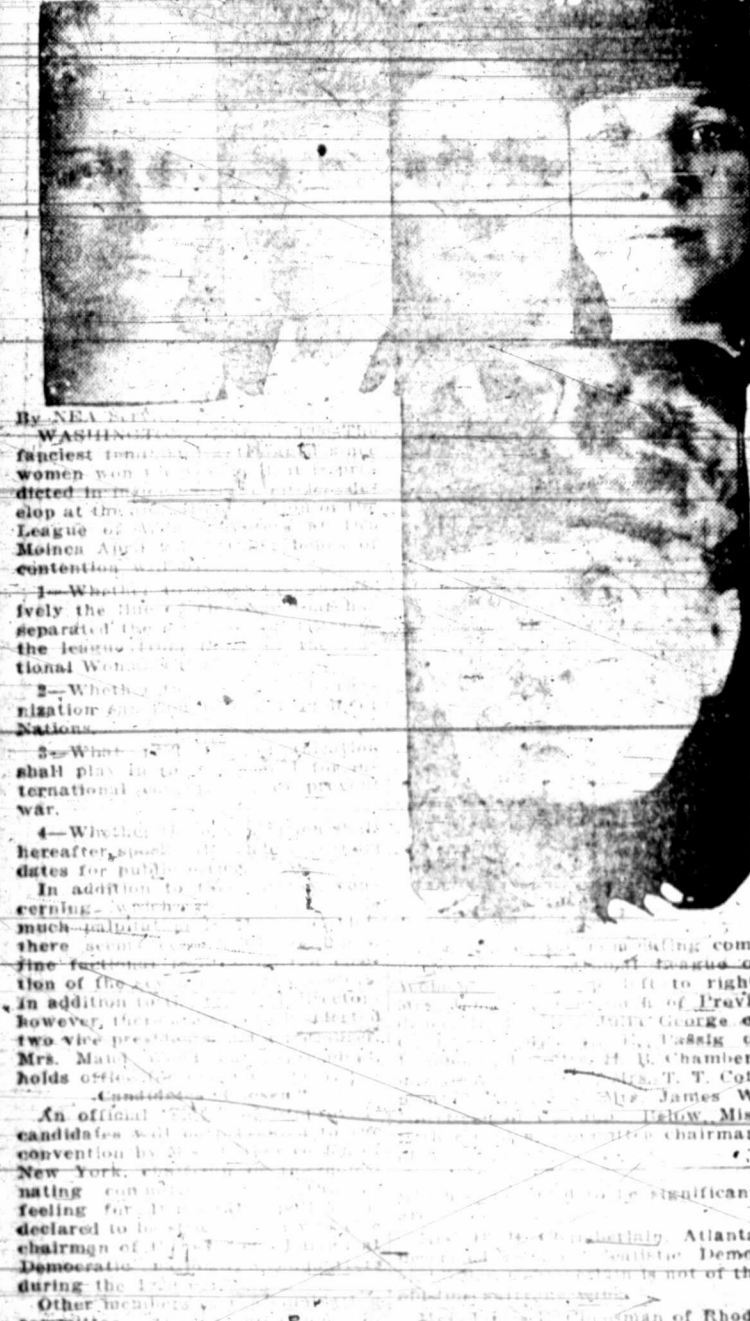

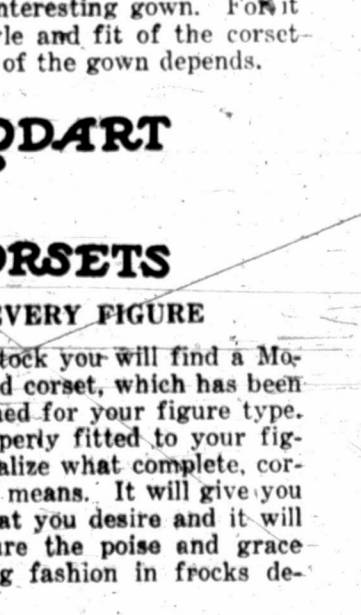

DOCTOR WHO IS FACING TRIAL IN FRITZ MANN MURDER CASE IS BLAMING 'FOOL ALTRUISM'

By NEA Service.
SAN DIEGO, CAL., March 21.—Good Samaritan to a pretty girl on a perilous byway of love.

Dr. Louis L. Jacobs, 49, debarred captain in the United States Public Health Service, Camp Kearney, will seek to persuade a jury this was his odd role in the case of Fritz Mann, for whose murder he stands indicted and will go to trial March 25.

"Dammed fool altruism," he says, accounted for his interest in the attractive 20 year old cabaret dancer whose half-clad body was found on the lonely Torrey Pines beach January 15.

For the circumstances shaping the tragedy—and for any act leading to her death—the army physician has stoutly disclaimed guilt.

Case Circumstantial

The case against him, so far as it has been divulged by District Attorney Kempcy, is wholly circumstantial. He expects to establish an alibi when the proper time comes.

Prosecution is based on the theory that Miss Mann was stunned by a blow on the head, and was then carried to the sea where she drowned after brief revival.

She had spent the early part of the previous evening at the Blue Boat canteen in La Jolla.

The two arrived in a cab and were registered by E. A. Kern, proprietor, as man and wife under fictitious names.

Kern had scrutinized the woman carefully and identified her readily. About the man he was less certain.

Miss Mann and her escort left the cabin for an hour, returned and left again for good. Kern will tell the jury.

Passengers Scattered

The spot where the body was found is 10 miles away. On the road, apparently scattered in flight, were the handbag, vanity case and kimono of the dancer and a blanket from the Blue Boat cottage.

That the pretty entertainer was the victim of her own popularity was the autopsy testimony. She had loved someone not wisely but too well, according to surgeons.

And it was in a way of the cause of her death that she consulted him, Dr. Jacobs. He had, he admitted, advised her about a contemplated operation, which was to take place a few days after the sea solved her problem. He had also arranged for a nurse, police say.

"I am a friend of the dead girl," the army man told officers the day investigation started. "She had recently confided in me. Told me she was secretly married. I want to do what I can to help clear the mystery."

Dr. Jacobs was arrested, released on a writ of habeas corpus, and then secretly indicted two weeks later after Chief of Police Patrick had said to him, "I'm not at all satisfied with what you have told me."

The weakness of the state's case is the professed inability of E. A. Kern positively to identify Jacobs as the man who occupied his cottage with Miss Mann.

Dr. Jacobs' defense weakness lies in failure thus far to substantiate with witnesses his claim that he was at the Grand Hotel during the hours fixed by investigators as the death period.

TEMPERATURE IS BOOSTED BY WARM RAYS OF OLD SOL

Under the influence of a bright shining sun, the mercury was boosted upward Tuesday to the maximum height of 73 degrees. The effects of the sun were materialized by a southwest wind which however at intervals attempted to show its power.

During the night Tuesday, the lowest point reached by the thermometer locally was 48 degrees. At points north and west of the city on local railroad lines the minimum temperature for the night ranged from 39 to 44 degrees.

Generally clear skies were reported from all directions early Wednesday morning with a southwest wind in control.

No disturbing elements were reported by agents in any direction from the city and it was believed that there would be no change within the next 24 hours at least.

RAINMAKING ENTIRE FUTILE UNDERTAKING GOVERNMENT REPORTS

WASHINGTON, March 21.—Rain making, in the official opinion of the United States weather bureau, "is an entire futile undertaking."

The government's meteorologists, says a statement by the bureau today, "do not know of any scheme for the artificial production of rain on a scale of practical magnitude, nor for otherwise affecting atmospheric behavior. In spite of these facts, statements appear at intervals in the press heralding new ways of making rain, preventing rain or fog, or forestalling the disastrous effects of storm."

"It is true that in the laboratory a small amount of moisture can be precipitated by the use of special equipment. But widespread drought is due to lack of sufficient moisture in the atmosphere and the absence of other conditions essential to the formation of rain. If there is little moisture to bring down, obviously, no device for causing rain artificially has any value."

OVERCROWDED AND RADIO EXPERTS SEEKING SOLUTION

PLAN DISTRIBUTION TO GIVE ELBOW ROOM FOR EVERYBODY

GREATEST PROBLEM IS TO ACCOMMODATE DEMAND

By Associated Press.
PARIS, March 21.—A definite move by labor and socialist parliamentary groups to renege British, French, Belgian and Italian governments to place the Ruhr situation in the hands of the league of nations was foreshadowed today following a conference of delegates representing these political factions in the several legislative bodies.
Spokesmen of the British laborers and the French, Italian and Belgian socialists, deciding that a settlement of the controversy could only be effected through American intervention or a decision of the League of Nations, came to the conclusion that the question of league assistance should be brought up in the British house of commons and in the chambers of the other governments. Accordingly, J. Ramsey MacDonald of Great Britain, M. Vandervelde of Belgium, Signor Modigliani of Italy, and Paul Boncour of France were designated to carry out the wishes of the conference.
In an endeavor to provide their governments with additional information on the general situation, a subcommittee of the conference will make a survey of both the Ruhr and unoccupied Germany, seeking data bearing on the whole reparations issue.

WASHINGTON, March 21.—The U. S. is overcrowded. So the radio experts at large are fixing to redistribute it so as to give elbow room everybody.
A group of a dozen experts were session all of Tuesday at the department of commerce trying to figure it out and continued it today. Failure of congress to enact the Radio Bill which passed the house, was lost in the senate jam at the time of the session has left it up to secretary Hoover and his aides to carry out some form of voluntary regulation that will serve until congress meets again and adopts radio legislation.
The problems before the conference are:
1. Public use of wave lengths between 1 and 100 meters, now reserved exclusively for government stations.
2. Restriction of power used by certain high powered stations that tend monopolize air channels.
3. Improvement of communication and broadcasting on special wave lengths for ships and university radio stations.
4. Elimination of non-essential and frivolous use of the air.
5. Point to point communication by government and commercial interests.
6. Elimination of interference by domestic stations with radio communication.
7. Restriction of all services to exclusive use of wave lengths allocated.
8. Designation of silent periods for broadcasting and amateur stations.
9. Regulations for line radio (wireless).
10. Special methods for selective, point-to-point communication.
11. Temporary methods of reducing interference.
The great problem is to accommodate the demand for short wave length distribution so that the vast numbers of listeners can receive the entertainment programs and other material sent out by broadcasting stations in their locality.
A technical engineer pointed out to the conference that there are 23 channels in the range from 600 to 1500 meters. So it is the shorter wavelengths that possess the greater possibilities for radio communication.

OFFICIALS CORRECT RECENT STATEMENT ABOUT BRITISH NAVY

WASHINGTON, March 21.—On assurance from the British government that capital ships of the British navy will not be subjected to alterations, increasing gun range and destructive armament, their public statements to that effect have been corrected by officials of the United States government.
Secretary Hughes, announcing that the state department has been advised by the British government "that no such alterations have been made, in a statement yesterday corrected his reference to "naval ship modifications in his speech at New Haven last December. He gave him pleasure to correct the statement, the secretary said, in which he had "relied upon action information which had been furnished by the navy department, which of course the navy department believed to be entirely trustworthy."

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FORMER MEMBERS OF CONGRESS GIVEN IDEA OF NAVY LIFE

PART OF NIGHT IN LATIN-AMERICAN JAIL IS FIRST LESSON

U. S. S. HENDERSON, WITH former members of congress have learned that a portion of the night in a Latin-American jail is part of the sailor's life they set out to study at first hand the conditions of the life.

In the uniform of ordinary seaman they strolled about the ancient streets of Old Panama City taking in the sights. They failed to give the cus-tomary salute to officers on one oc-casion, but promptly complied when asked to do so. For they had prom-ised as condition for the loaning of the uniform that they would abide by all the regulations.

They forgot the one which said they should return to the ship at 11 o'clock, but a member of the civil police force did not forget and put them under arrest at 10:30 a.m. at the hour when all ordinary seamen are required to be back on their ships.

There followed loud protestations but the civil police have had to deal with sailors before and did not take them seriously. When finally lodged in jail they raised such a hue and cry that the chief reconsidered the point to the extent of consenting to communicate with the New York.

An independent liberal amendment offered by Sir Alfred Mond, asserted that although Mr. Snowden had rea-soned carefully he had failed to show that the socialist system would not be the victim of suchills as were al-lleged to have befallen the people un-der the capitalist regime.

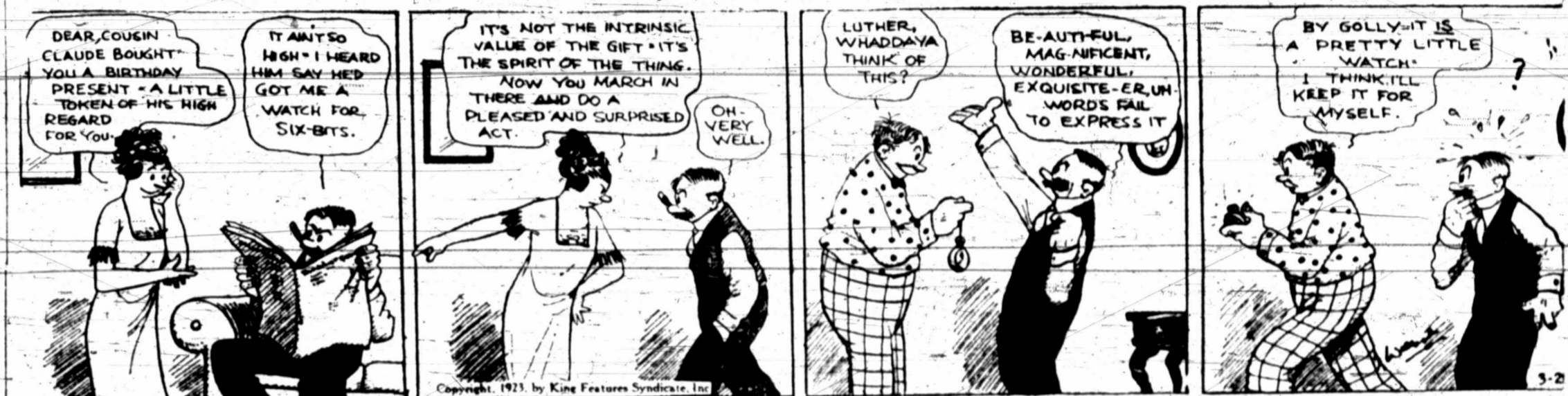

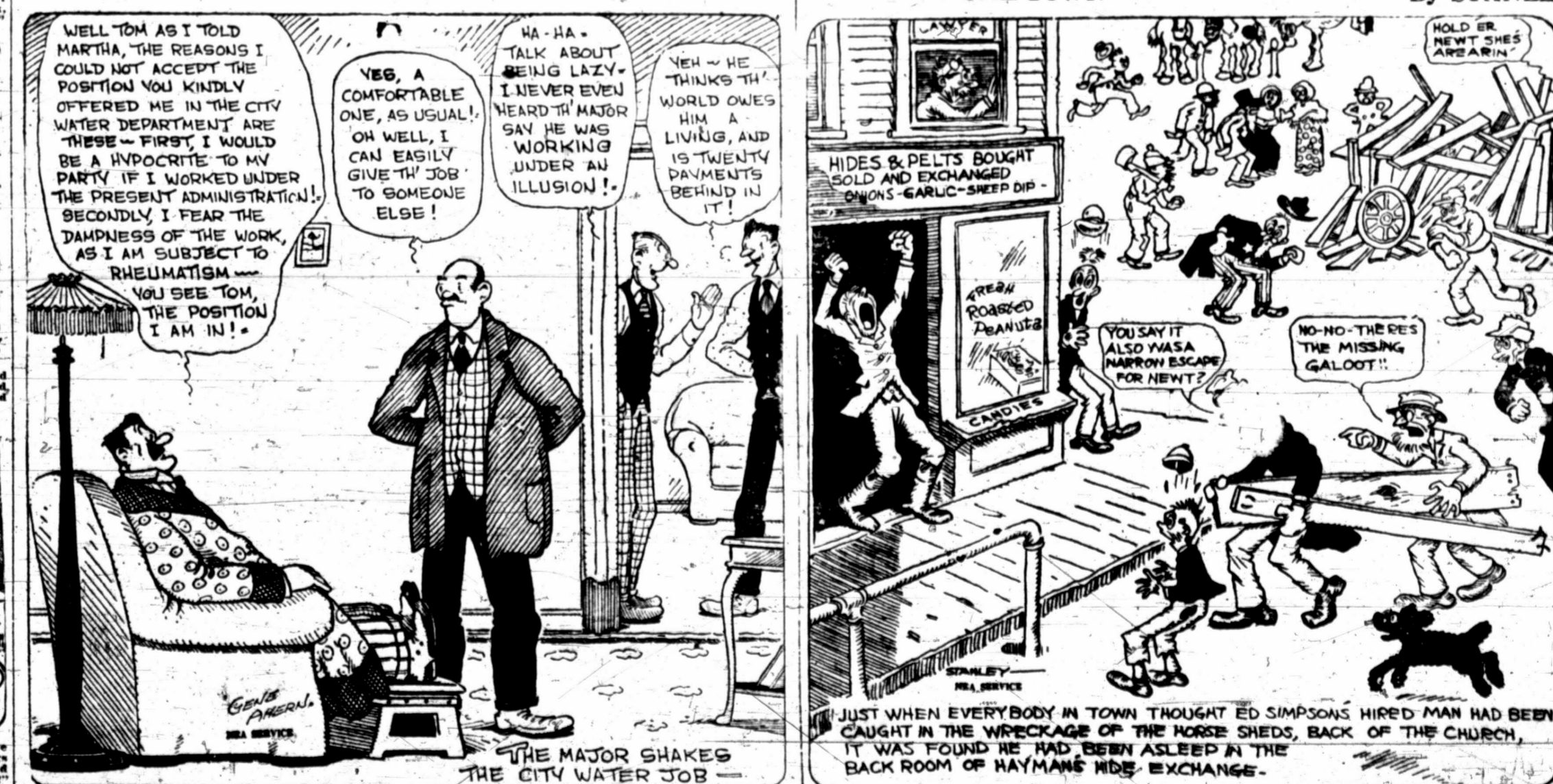

NEW YORK, March 21.—Dorothy King, the model, slain with chloroform in her apartment last Thursday, was killed because she would not enter into a plot to blackmail the mysterious "John Marshall" out of \$50,000.

That may be only a coincidence and again, may be significant. The whereabouts of that young woman that night must be established. "The girl's mother was aware of the plot and was an aide against it as her daughter, Marshall, was informed of it and was on his guard. Whether he wrote letters is not known. But the man who proposed to blackmail him had in mind confounding him with his friendship for her, rather than basing the blackmail on any letter."

Information was obtained today by the authorities that "John Marshall" planned to marry Miss King. At the district attorney's office, Mrs. Keenan described "Marshall" as 50 years old, five feet, six inches tall, white haired, with blue eyes, of stocky appearance and possessed of an English manner. John Keenan estimated his height at five feet, six inches.
